# **Helping Create Safe** and Nurturing Homes

#### Dear Friends,

There is usually a moment or specific incident that triggers Savio to become involved with a family. A teacher may have noticed a child wasn't bathing regularly. Or a teenager's pain caused them to act out aggressively.

These moments are years in the making. Parents have often experienced trauma, are strained by financial hardship, and are facing their own mental health concerns. Those challenges end up impacting their children until one incident highlights the entire family's need for support.

Similarly, our interventions can't fix every issue in one session. It usually takes three to six months of services to support before families can manage the challenges they are facing. When we've done our work well, we have helped families establish healthy routines and relationships.

Along the way, we start seeing happy moments replace the bad. Within this Gratitude Report you will find a short story from three of our service areas. We hope this gives you further insight into how these children and their families can overcome the most difficult circumstances.

Your financial support plays a critical role in this transformation. Donations help launch new programming, fill funding gaps for needed services, and provide treatment to families who can't afford it. The pandemic is challenging families in new and unique ways, making your support more important than ever.

## **Child Protection**

Savio's Child Protection Team supports families when a child safety concern has been identified, typically after abuse or neglect. Savio therapists build a plan with the family in the comfort of *their* home, allowing therapists get the full picture of the family's relationships, community, and safety concerns. This context helps the therapist understand the family's story and strengths, and develop a treatment plan alongside of them. The result is impactful services that strengthen families and keep them together.

# Happy Days...Made Possible By You

Now in the care of their aunt and uncle, Olivia (5), Jameson (4), and Emily (3) felt safe for the first time ever. These children were victims of sexual abuse at such a young age that their development was severely affected.

Emily, the three-year-old "baby," is now speaking. Previously, her words were so garbled that no one could understand her, and she often would go into screaming fits and isolate herself



if she did not get what she wanted. Now, emily can ask for what she wants, and won't just shut down or scream to get her way. She can answer questions and identify her emotions in family meetings. It caught me off guard the first time she said, "I felt happy today". That speaks volumes about the healing capabilities of the family-based interventions that we use at Savio.

## **Adolescent Services**

Savio adolescent programs address a range of behaviors including substance use, aggression, running away, and delinquency. We treat teens and their families together in their homes and communities. Our interventions strengthen families and build hope for everyone. This approach is far more successful than separating children from their families and moving them into institutional facilities.

#### **Treatment Breakthroughs...** Made Possible by You

Sixteen-year-old Alison came to Savio after her third arrest. It wasn't long before we started talking to her that it became clear the behavior was being driven by issues in her home. Her mother, Sharon, was struggling with addiction and inadvertently pushing her daughter away.

There is no greater pleasure as a therapist, than to facilitate a moment that changes everything between people struggling. This moment happened about a month into our



therapy sessions. We were talking in the grandmother's living room when I asked Alison to talk about her feelings instead of her talking at her mom with blame and anger. As she began to speak, she fell to the floor, sobbing. She struggled to catch her breath long enough to speak the power words she so deserately needed to say. But she managed, in between the tears, to share how angry and confused she'd been feeling for years.

It was then that Sharon felt she could do the same - she talked about her own pain, her own childhood trauma. She told her daughter how she wanted to be healthy, free of her own pain, and have her daughterback in her life. In that moment - Alison and her Grandmother "got it." For the first time they started approaching Sharon with understanding instead of blame and judgement.

This story ended with a young girl, who learned to talk about her feelings sometimes, and a mom who learned to forgive herself, most times....and a relationship that was rebuilt with some grace and acceptance.

# Foster and Group Homes

Savio operates foster and group homes to provide children with safe and stable homes when they have been separated from their families. Savio provides the family with the therapy, life skills, and support to allow children to heal.

Josie surprised her sisters, bouncing giddy with excitement as she came out of the kitchen with a plate full of apple slices each with a perfect dollop of peanut butter and ice clanking on the side of four glasses of cold lemonade. She tripped, nearly spilling everything off the tray as she proudly came into the living room to present the "movie snack" to them. Her eyes were wide as she caught herself and the tray, before it went tumbling and they all giggled.

Most kids would never consider this a "movie" snack. But for Josie and her three sisters, this snack was a treat. At 16, and the oldest of all the siblings, Josie is able to understand and appreciate a healthy snack - having rarely had food that didn't come in a bag, box or from a drive-through window. These four sisters, ranging in age from 9 to 16 have not only seen, but been subject to levels of abuse that most people would hide their eyes from watching.



#### Is Savio financially stable?

Yes, Savio operates on a balanced budget and maintains six months of operating reserves. Savio grew to serve additional families in 2019 and expects to continue to growth.

#### How will you use my donation?

#### Are the families you serve low-income?

Yes, 42% of the families we served in 2019 have an average household income of less than \$16,000. 90% earn less than the median income for a Denver household.


