In addition to being rural arts advocates and creative conveners, we also operate as intermediaries dispersing funds to rural cultural workers, incubators of rural arts projects/ideas, and cheerleaders of rural changemakers through programs like Activate Rural, which supported the development of artist-led creative gathering places in five communities across Minnesota during 2023.



**DoPT is not only one thing.** We work at the intersection of arts/cultural production AND economic development. Y'all, we received our first grant from the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) to provide technical assistance to small businesses! We work at the intersection of creativity AND civic life. We sit at tables with local municipal leaders AND national thought leaders in the fields of democracy, safety, and climate resiliency. We choose to do this intersectional work in and with rural communities because rural people and places know what it means to not be one thing—to wear many hats and to dance many dances... and, in these places, are the front porches where we like to sit.

Department of Public Transformation is an artist-led nonprofit organization that works to develop creative strategies for increased community connection, civic engagement, and equitable participation in rural places.

Our 150-year vision is one where rural communities across the country acknowledge, support, and integrate art and artists as vital contributors to economic, community, civic, and social life.

We believe that rural people and places have the answers they need to address community challenges and opportunities, but economies of extraction and narratives of deficit have fragmented many of our communities. This prevents us from reimagining our rural spaces and sharing the knowledge, skills, and resources we have to dream and build an equitable and just future. We seek to support rural communities in identifying and leveraging resources through artist-led, creative, cross-disciplinary, and radically inclusive programs. We believe in celebrating rural culture and cultural workers by uplifting small-town stories and connecting people to each other and their places. In doing so, we are working to shift damaging dominant narratives of what it means to live and work in rural America.

#### **CORE VALUES**

#### Accessible Play

We believe play is an essential component of human connection to break down perceived barriers and make room for vulnerability; we utilize the power of play to ignite and inspire meaningful connections, cultivate untapped creativity, and provide platforms for challenging conversations.

#### **Deep Compassion**

We believe in having deep compassion for the people and places we work with; we meet people where they are; we strive for critical self-awareness; we act as responsible stewards of the land and her stories.

#### Reciprocal Exchange

We believe everyone has value to add; we view our work as a reciprocal exchange and not an extraction or dissemination of knowledge, skills, or resources; we work with, not for; we work together.

#### **Intentional Representation**

We believe in intentional, intergenerational opportunities for women, non-binary people, people of color, LGBTQ2IA+, New American, and Indigenous community members to work towards equal representation in artistic and civic leadership; we strive to compensate artists equitably for their work.

#### **GUIDING PRINCIPLES**

#### **Build Trust**

We believe in leading with accountability to and for the people we serve; we understand rural cultural work is slow, generational, and relational; we strive to move at the speed of trust.

#### **Prioritize Connections**

We believe in being good neighbors and bringing good times to connect with each other across differences; we illuminate unexpected connections between people, places, and ideas.

#### **Cultivate Creativity**

We believe engaging our creativity leads to happier, fuller lives and more vibrant, welcoming communities.

#### Shift Narratives

We believe that the story of rural communities must be told by people who live and work in rural communities; we believe geography must be considered in the national conversations around equity and access to resources; we believe rural-urban solidarity is vital to moving forward together.

#### Lead with Love

We believe in cultivating supportive, creative spaces and radically welcoming environments.

















#### **PROGRAMS**

We support rural communities through artist-led, creative, cross-disciplinary, and cross-sector initiatives that celebrate and build on existing efforts while inspiring new ideas, approaches, and ways of thinking.

Our work sits at the intersection of arts and rural economic and community development; we are a nonprofit organization that seeks grant funding, but we're also distributing funds directly to artists and communities. Through piloting and building programs and networks with bird's-eye-view fieldwork, we operate as connectors and pollinators, encouraging creativity and ideas to grow.

As arts and cultural workers, we listen to the stories that rural people and places tell about themselves and the stories that are told about them. We critically examine and adjust our role in shifting damaging narratives of scarcity, isolation, and decline to those of abundance, connection, and hope.

DoPT is a multi-centered organization that works on projects and programs in and with Southwest Minnesota; statewide throughout Greater Minnesota; regionally in the Upper Midwest; and nationally across the United States.

## Department of Public Transformation uses these four key strategies to achieve our mission:

- Support rural arts & cultural workers
- Connect rural municipalities & artists
- Activate rural community assets
- Nurture the rural arts & culture field

#### CONNECT

Rural Civic Arts Partnership works with civic and municipal leaders, building peer networks, offering workshop series, and sharing resources to work with arts and cultural workers to develop creative strategies for civic engagement and community problem-solving

#### **SUPPORT**

- Ignite Rural invests in rural BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) and Native artists and culture bearers through a cohort model to implement people-centered creative projects in their own communities
- Fiscal Sponsorship supports mission-aligned arts groups, individual artists, entrepreneurs, and small businesses working with arts-led strategies in rural communities

#### ACTIVATE

- Activate Rural uses a cohort-based learning lab to cultivate and increase welcoming physical infrastructure in rural communities using an artist-led asset activation framework
- The YES! House is a gathering space and arts venue in Granite Falls, MN, which offers creative programming for Southwest Minnesota residents of all ages and backgrounds

#### NURTURE

- Beyond the Clock is a series of virtual learning exchanges connecting and lifting up rural artists, culture workers, and connectors across the country
- Partnerships such as MN Rural-Urban Exchange with Art of the Rural, Rural Minnesota Community Safety with Nonviolent Peaceforce, and Radical Shift in Philanthropy with Minnesota Artist Coalition
- Consulting, coaching, mentorship, and communities of practice supporting rural civic and social artists, municipal staff, and curious communities in moving forward with creative projects and cross-sector initiatives

#### PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



**The YES! House** is a creative community gathering space and arts venue in downtown Granite Falls, MN. It is an inspired inclusive space where staff and volunteers host locals, artists, and visitors in conversations, collaborations, and creativity. The space includes two apartments, a shared studio space, a performance venue, an art gallery, and a co-working/gathering space. Other spaces currently under renovation include a rock climbing room, an audio recording studio, a media lab, and an artist and wellness workshop/classroom.

The YES! House staff work closely with a group of local volunteers who make up the Creative Collaboration Team (CCT) to continue the "Art of Neighboring" event series, which showcases both local and visiting artists and creatives. #### PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



During 2023, DoPT supported eight rural artists and culture bearers from North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, and the 23 Native Nations through **Ignite Rural**. Each of these emergent artists received six months of programming designed to foster growth, a \$4,000 creative fund, and a \$6,000 living stipend to provide additional financial support to drive focus to their art. The residency culminated in an artist showcase at The YES! House in Granite Falls, MN. These artists brought unique perspectives to the program, contributing to the overall rural artist landscape. Through Ignite Rural, they not only advanced their artistic practices but also forged strong connections with each other and their communities, highlighting the vital role of rural artists and culture bearers across the Upper Midwest.

The program was led by Ignite Rural Program Director Holly Doll/Anpao Win (First Light Woman) and supported by an Advisory Committee of artists, community organizers, and changemakers: Angela Zonunpari, Anne O'Keefe, Dyana DeCoteau, Eileen O'Keefe, Nancy X. Valentine, and Peter Strong.

#### PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



Department of Public Transformation believes in working with artists, cultural workers, and connectors to strengthen rural places by supporting the role of community assets—social, cultural, and built—as a lens to help communities investigate and celebrate their collective story: past, present, and future. From creative taprooms and gathering places to multi-use community hubs and knowledge centers, DoPT supports creative building activation projects that inspire, motivate, and open up possibilities for rural communities across Minnesota through **Activate Rural**.

In 2023, we launched a two-year learning lab with an inaugural cohort of five building activation projects and teams. The Activate Rural Learning Lab is a cohort-based peer network and resource hub that supports community leaders and artists in cultivating welcoming and creative physical places of connection in rural communities. Each team received \$25,000 for artist-led community engagement projects, DoPT staff support and individually curated technical assistance, cohort exchange visit funds, and cohort-specific workshops and gatherings. The program is rooted in an artist-led asset activation framework and is working towards equitable access to social and financial capital, process transparency, and public participation.

#### PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



**Beyond the Clock** (BTC) is a monthly online gathering for rural connectors and cultural workers that fosters fellowship, shared learning, and community care. Co-hosted by Department of Public Transformation and Voices for Rural Resilience, with support from the Rural Assembly, BTC invites creative rural rockstars from across the country to join digital happy hours and learning exchanges that connect and inspire.

Our goal is to create connections for rural, place-based cultural workers—regardless of location or physical boundaries—that help them sustain work that often feels isolating. Rural arts and culture workers often oscillate between the need to belong in their community and the need to lead the way in embracing new cultures, values, and attitudes. Operating in this space requires vulnerability, courage, discomfort, self-love, and grace. We model these qualities in our virtual gatherings and strive to curate a space that sustains rural practitioners, allowing them to continue leading rural communities toward vibrancy, equity, beauty, and love—embracing the best of our past and our future aspirations.

BTC Learning Exchanges invite rural connectors and cultural workers to share experiences, grapple with tensions, and celebrate the joys of rural work. Topics include preventing burnout, accessing resources, cultivating joy, and more. Practitioners share their voices, generate ideas, and find breakthroughs for daily challenges alongside their peers, advancing missions and contributions as vital, valued community members.

#### **OPPORTUNITIES**

Some lessons we have learned along our way

#### MOVING AT THE SPEED OF TRUST

During 2023, we focused on slowly and intentionally building and strengthening our relationships and partnerships (locally, in Southwest Minnesota and across the country) and increasing diversity on our board, staff, and committees by dedicating time and resources to these important efforts. We believe that true transformation comes from fostering deep, meaningful connections and ensuring that diverse voices are represented and heard. Prioritizing trust and inclusivity enhances our ability to support and connect with rural communities effectively, as we continue to work towards cultivating environments of trust, equity, and community care.

#### **BUILDING A STRONG FOUNDATION**

We are thrilled to announce the successful completion of our first audit, earning a "clean opinion" from our auditor. An audit is a thorough examination of our financial records—and is required for nonprofits with annual revenue of \$750,000—necessitating significant resources and diligence. This major milestone for our small arts nonprofit demonstrates our commitment to transparency and financial integrity, reflecting our dedication to building a strong foundation and solid operational processes. As we continue to foster creative connections and support rural artists, this accomplishment is worthy of celebration, marking our progress and setting a high standard for our future endeavors.

#### **CONTINUING ACCOUNTABILITY WORK**

Transparency and accountability are crucial in community work. We work towards this through collective leadership in our programs. In 2023 we invited a 7-member YES! House Futures (YHF) Committee of local residents and an interim group of 5 members representing the Creative Collaboration Team (CCT) and YHF to initiate the design of The YES! House Advisory Council's structure, which will be initiated in 2024 to ensure a shared vision and stewardship of The YES! House. In Activate Rural, we began working with the cohort on a Transparency and Accountability process for Community Engagement. Our Equity & Engagement Committee (made up of members of board and staff) meet monthly to hold us accountable to our values and investigate any underlying inequities within our policies, systems, and services.

#### **BECOMING AN INTERMEDIARY**

We have continued to step into our role as an intermediary by both advocating for geographic equity and redistributing resources to rural changemakers. With only 5-7% of national philanthropic resources reaching rural communities, we're committed to changing this narrative. In 2023, we distributed over \$293,000 to rural artists and projects, empowering creative leaders to drive transformational change. This is a path we are dedicated to continuing, ensuring that rural voices are heard and supported. By directing more resources to rural communities, we aim to foster vibrant and equitable rural futures and move toward our mission by uplifting rural creative changemakers and continuing to advocate for the resources they need to thrive.

## 2019-2023 FINANCIAL TRENDS



In the state of Minnesota, nonprofits that reach a \$750,000 income threshold are required to undergo an independent financial audit, and we completed our audit after the release of the 2022 Annual Report. Although there were a few differences, these were identified during the audit process, and we received a "clean opinion" on our inaugural nonprofit audit!


A "clean opinion" in a nonprofit financial audit means that the auditors found an organization's financial statements to be presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This indicates that the financial statements are free of material misstatements and provide an accurate representation of the nonprofit's financial position.

During 2023, we were below the income threshold, so we elected to complete an independent financial review instead of a full audit. No material misstatements were found and the financials are prepared in accordance with GAAP.



#### **2023 FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES**

Functional expense allocation for a nonprofit organization is the process of categorizing and assigning costs to various functional areas, such as program services, management and general operations, and fundraising, to accurately reflect the organization's spending and resource utilization in achieving its mission.



#### Non-Profit Doesn't Mean No Profit

Nonprofit finances can fluctuate based on the timing of grant dollars and pledges, funding restrictions, multi-year commitments, program timelines, and more. It is possible for a non-profit organization to end one year with a surplus and another year with a deficit. In fact, some organizations can develop a (somewhat) predictable cycle of surpluses and deficits based on the relationship between their program spending and donor timing.

During 2023, DoPT spent more funds than we raised, causing a negative change in net assets. We expected this because we received significant grant support in previous years (including a \$525,000 multi-year grant for Activate Rural!) that was spent to implement programming in 2023. We anticipate there will be a continual ebb and flow from year to year as we work to achieve our mission.


#### THE SAY YES! CREATIVE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

DoPT is in the midst of the **Say YES! Creative Capital Campaign** to renovate and transform The YES! House, a creative gathering space and arts venue located at 726 Prentice Street in Granite Falls, MN.

The programming and design of the space emerged through a year-long (and ongoing) community engagement process in which local community members collaborated with local and national artists and architects to dream and plan. Existing community assets were also mapped to avoid duplication of resources and services, aiming to amplify and complement the work of artists and community members already thriving in the region.

The Campaign began in 2018 with preliminary research and infrastructure repair, then entered its quiet phase in earnest in 2019. DoPT intended to publicly launch the Campaign in 2020—on the cusp of the emerging COVID-19 pandemic—and made the decision to postpone amidst uncertainty. Construction continued progressing with infrastructure work and specific projects made possible by early contributions, loans, and restricted grants. The Campaign was officially launched publicly in February 2022.

As of December 31, 2023, the Campaign raised approximately \$585,233 (60% of the updated goal) and spent approximately \$771,289 (80% of the updated budget.) The amount spent is currently greater than the amount raised due to the timing of funding agreements and receipts; this is made possible by the utilization of secured low-interest loan funds and prior unrestricted surpluses.
