Who are we?

The Cook Islands Seabed Minerals Authority (**Authority**) is the key regulator of seabed minerals activities under Cook Islands jurisdiction. The Authority administers the Seabed Minerals Act 2019 (**Act**) on behalf of the Cook Islands Government.

Commissioner's Welcome

We are in a pivotal moment of our country's SBM journey. For the first time, the Cook Islands will manage licensed **exploration** activities in our waters. This exploration research and data gathered will provide us with valuable knowledge on our Marae Moana, and help pave the way for our future. This was the message shared by Prime Minister Mark Brown in Parliament last week.

Globally, we are already seeing a major shift away from fossil fuels towards renewable energy, and that will only increase over the coming decades. This concerted effort is a response to the effects of climate change. Strategic minerals such as cobalt, nickel, copper, and rare earth elements will be required to fuel the global transition. Our country's polymetallic nodule resource, estimated to be around 12 billion tonnes, contains these minerals.

For the Cook Islands, it is vital that the development of our SBM sector and the role we play in this global transition is well planned and managed, and importantly does not leave our people behind. Auraka i tetai uatu tangata i runga i te vaka kia akarukena ia.



Reflecting on our journey, early key steps include passing our first seabed legislation in 2009, and establishing the Authority in 2013. The previous ten years has been marked by the slow and steady development of the SBM sector, and the preparatory work to put in place laws, processes and systems.

Currently, the Authority is processing the four exploration licence applications we received. We will provide public updates on progress shortly.

Looking ahead, once exploration licences are granted we will transition into monitoring exploration activities and ensuring compliance with our laws and licence conditions.

The Authority has four priority areas that guide and drive our actions:

- Well-regulated Industry underpinned by a robust regulatory regime to responsibly and sustainably develop our SBM sector
- Community Engagement with our people and with stakeholders on what we are doing in the SBM sector
- Capacity Development of our people in the skillsets required for both the current and future needs
 of this industry
- Cooperation and Collaboration with our partners to efficiently and effectively develop the SBM sector

It is essential that development of the SBM sector respects our Marae Moana, cultural, environmental, social and economic values. I am confident that by working together with our people and stakeholders, we will be able to achieve this. Kia Manuia.


Prime Minister Brown addresses Cobalt Conference

The conference is an annual event that brings together the international cobalt industry. This year, the focus is on the role of cobalt in ensuring a sustainable future.
