

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CALIFORNIA-HAWAII ELKS MAJOR PROJECT - "PURPLE PIG" DONATION REPORT FOR THE ELK YEAR 2019-2020

This program, founded in 1950, aids children with physical disabilities at no cost to their parents. It provides physical therapists who travel to a disabled child's home to provide services and also provides pre-school vision screening for children with vision issues.

Our Santa Maria Lodge donations totaled: \$44,433.89 or \$14.26 per Member

Our West Central Coast District donation totaled: \$208,806.58 or \$17.70 per Member

CHEA Total donation to CHEMPI: \$3,785,973.44 or \$43.58 per Member

DRESS CODE IN EFFECT FOR ALL FUNCTIONS

Elks Lodge 1538 is a flagship among Elk Lodges and not just another "Bar or Club." As such we have a Dress Code. Most times it is casual and allows more casual wear: Long shorts, like Bermuda and cargo style shorts are acceptable after 6:00 pm - except Thursday Lodge Night.

- Please no mid-thigh, cutoffs, short-shorts, or torn/frayed wear.
- Please wear all pants at your waist, not below! And no "Plumber Pants!"
- No Sweat Suits or Beach Apparel No Flip Flops (rubber style shower shoes) - Sandals okay
- For Ladies: No Inappropriate tops No dresses shorter than mid thigh
- For Men: No muscle shirts No T-shirts or caps with vulgar or inappropriate slogans - No gang attire. Gentleman, wear pants at the waist, not below! Hats should be worn properly, not backwards or sideways, and please remove hats when sitting at the table to eat.

Our Greeters, Staff, and Officers do not wish to embarrass or upset any Member or guest, so please do not put them in that position. We will ask you to leave to change. Members are responsible for informing all guests of the dress code!

Members may bring up to 8 guests.

All persons attending Friday Night CYO must be over 21 years of age.

These rules will be updated as needed and are at the discretion of the Greeters, Staff, or Officer in Charge the day of the event.

SANTA MARIA ELKS LODGE #1538 - DID YOU KNOW?

I am so confused, do I go out or stay home? the Lodge is open, then it's not. I decided to hunker down safely in the Lodge Historian's Room and hope for the best, so here we go.

We resume the Historical journey of our Lodge in March of 1980. Construction on the dedicated Lodge room has begun! Remember when the "Indian" went missing from the lobby? This explains why he was there: Elks field was dedicated in April of 1948, constructed with the labor, materials, and financial assistance of Elks Members. The semi-pro Santa Maria Indians called this field home. The park was founded in 1944 by 16 prominent businessmen, all #1538 Members who used the park as their "wigwam and reservation". Officers of the "tribe" were all Elk Members (political correctness had not yet arrived).

At the Junior Grand Nationals, the Lodge purchased the Supreme Grand Champion Hog belonging to a local FFA girl, no price was noted. Once again in May one of our BBQ teams prepared the opening night dinner at State Convention in San Jose for CHEA and Grand Lodge officials. The annual Calcutta was held this year over the 4th of July weekend at San Marcos Camp near Lake Cachuma. An ad for the card room re-appeared in July. At the State Vice President's visitation it was announced that the BPOE would have a float in the Rose Bowl Parade. In 1980 the Lodge made \$12,000 from the annual BBQ in Fresno, and other outside BBQ's around California brought in \$1,200, \$1,700, \$6,000, and \$1,300, WOW. In addition to participating in the Santa Barbara Fiesta Parade, 1538 served our Santa Maria BBQ on the Friday night of Fiesta. At the Grand Lodge Convention in New Orleans in July, Santa Maria received a 2nd place award for Community Service, guite an honor given the number of Lodges in the country at that time. In September, the bar entertainment was a juke box. The annual Sock Hop in October included some classic cars from the 50's and 60's. Our Workers BBQ this year was put on by the Lompoc BBQ team. A survey in the Elks Horn asked the Members their opinion on pricing of dinners at the Lodge. Should guests pay more? Should they only be allowed at Đ the dinners each month? Should no guests be allowed? Or should the policy remain the same? The 6,900 sq. ft addition, primarily the dedicated Lodge room, was completed in November 1980 and the first meeting was held on November 13th to coincide with our Veterans Day observation. At the December 4th Lodge meeting there was a resolution to nominate Leland "Butch" Simas for California-Hawaii Elks Association President (this is not how CHEA Presidents are nominated today).

By January it was already announced that Butch would be installed as President at the Convention in San Diego. In December, the Touring Elks held their first official meeting, 16 members joined that evening. The following Sunday, 11 Members went on their first official ride to Templeton for breakfast with a stop at the San Luis Obispo Elks Lodge on the way back. The result of the survey regarding guests at Lodge dinners such as CYO came in with the consensus that guests should pay a little more. In February 1981, the Lodge gazebo was stolen. At the March 3rd Lodge meeting Members sitting in the south-east corner of the Lodge room were reprimanded for their conduct during Lodge, who were these Bad Boys? Also, in March the Lodge horseshoe pits were opened for friendly competition. Teenager of the month awards became Student of the Month. Butch Simas was installed as CHEA President in May 1981. Saturday June 13, 1981, at Angels Stadium, Past Grand Exalted Ruler Bush threw the first ball to President Butch Simas, no report on the outcome. Looks like Saturday lunches once again are discontinued. Dedication of the new Lodge room was celebrated Saturday August 29th, 400 guests attended the ceremony and dinner including two Past Grand Exalted Rulers, a Grand Trustee,

six Past State Presidents and our current President Butch. A giant white elephant/swap meet was undertaken in the parking lot on September 20th; Members had their own sales tables and donated 15% of their sales to Major Project.

In September, a choir was suggested with some interest. On November 12, 1981, a vote was taken to approve repairs to the parking lot, cost not to exceed \$53,000, the motion passed. December 10th it was announced that hot and cold sandwiches will be available at the bar, no mention of days or times. The New Years Eve car raffle raised \$7,500 for the building fund. The homecoming of our CHEA State President Leland "Butch" Simas was held on March 13, 1982. #1538 was honored to have three Past Grand Exalted Rulers along with Elks from throughout California, Hawaii, Nevada, and Arizona attend the celebration. A good-sized chain saw was presented to Butch along with other gifts.

At State Convention in May, #1538's donation to the Major Project (Purple Pig) was a check for \$27,500 and a \$9,500 station wagon. Also, we received the Best Public Image Award. In the June Elks Horn, the Exalted Ruler reminded Members to "behave themselves" during Rodeo, (this may have been too late).

The first annual Calcutta "Firecracker Special" dinner dance was held at CYO to kick off 1982 4th of July weekend. Country Western dance lessons were proposed, what ever happened to the Disco lessons? #1538 was the "Mother Lodge" for the Santa Ynez Valley Lodge #2640 which was instituted on July 11, 1982. 66 of the #1538 Members that lived in the Santa Ynez Valley transferred to the new Lodge. In October 1982 it was proposed and voted to build another addition to the kitchen to provide more storage for dry goods and additional walk in freezer, the cost was estimated to be \$35,000. The Bingo Committee in 1982 brought in \$81,000. In March 1983 the new Lodge room mortgage was paid off. The average meeting attendance for Elk year 1982-83 was 222. 1982-83 lapsation was 1.7% and as of March 31st, 1983 Membership was 3,021. For the Elk year 1982-83 Grand Lodge had the first District All American Lodge Contest. #1538 easily came in first in the district and placed first in officer training and public relations.

At the 119th Grand Lodge Convention in Hawaii in July 1983, #1538 was second in the National All-American Lodge competition and placed third for community image. #1538 was also selected as Best Lodge in California, (Lodges are judged on their Lodge activities). On the convention floor it was said that "few Lodges, if any, can stand up and equal or surpass our accomplishments". Every year the Bowlers BBQ Classic hosted by the Lodge is extremely popular, over 800 bowlers from all over Southern California attend. At the Mid-Term Conference in October our BBQ Team put on a Santa Maria Style BBQ for over 1,600 Elks, Wow. #1538's float participated in parades from Santa Barbara to Salinas during these years. Sadly, beginning in January 1984, the price for corned beef and cabbage will increase by .25 cents due to the cost of products, (probably not the cabbage). Cribbage continues and a Super Cribbage competition was held in November. Pool tournaments are planned. In January 1984 there was first mention of having a Superbowl party, and Monday Night Dinners became Family Night. In February, the Veterans Committee delivered clothes and a golf cart to the VA hospital in L.A.

I began this journey using only the Elks Horn for reference but as I started the 1980-81 Elk Year, Lodge Historian PER Tommy Gee, suggested I also read the minutes from the Lodge meetings. Oh, why not? There were only 168 meetings....

HOWDY RODEO FANS,

The 77th Annual Elks Rodeo and Parade, although postponed until September 24th through the 27th this year, is still in the planning stages. The Santa Maria Elks remain cautiously optimistic and hopeful that the show will go on despite the many challenges our country and communities have been presented.

The Santa Maria Elks Rodeo Committees are driven to do everything humanly possible to make the 77th Annual Rodeo happen primarily because of all the businesses and community organizations that depend upon it. The Elks Board, sponsors and hundreds of volunteers are very proud of the contributions that rodeo gives back to the community including the Queen Contest, a cornerstone of the rodeo season. Last year's campaign raised nearly \$800,000 for local charities.

Success does not come easy and a substantial amount of work and planning goes into the both the Rodeo and Queen Campaigns, starting just weeks after the previous rodeo ends. Although the Queen Committees had been working since January to plan and prepare to advertise their fundraising events, plans had to be paused with the Shelter in Place Order issued in March. Soon it was clear the 77th Annual Elks Rodeo and Parade typically scheduled for the weekend after Memorial Day would need to be canceled or postponed. With overwhelming support from Community, Local Government and Business Leaders, the Elks Recreation Board decided to preserve the Queen Contest and Rodeo by postponing the event to the end of September.

Tradition requires that the Queen Candidates names be held in strict confidence until they are unveiled on the evening of Rodeo Queen Kickoff, six weeks prior to Rodeo Weekend. This year we realized that the postponement of the rodeo would make it very difficult to continue this tradition, so with the challenges the Queen Committees were facing due to changing circumstances, the Queen Candidates were named through a "soft release" via Social Media.

The Santa Maria Elks Rodeo Board of Directors are proud to announce the following Queen Candidates: Isabella Gamino - Kiwanis Club of Guadalupe; Sabrina Dana - North Santa Barbara County United Way; Anna Kuykendall - St. Joseph High School; Faith DeBrum - VTC Enterprises. You can meet them on our Facebook page or our website at elksrec.com, and we ask that you please support these young ladies and the non-profit organizations they represent.

We continue to be optimistic that we will be able have a rodeo this year and are moving forward planning our schedule of events, but recognizing that safety is our first and foremost concern for all in addition to adhering to Federal, State and Local Government requirements which may prevent us from doing so. We are pleased to assure our community that even if we are unable to have our rodeo, the Queen Contest is in full swing and a 77th Annual Elks Rodeo Queen will be crowned.
