DID YOU KNOW...


I have bad news and I have more bad news; it is 2020 after all as I write this. First, the 1993-94 Elks Horns are missing, and the meeting minutes are somewhere in one of the storage buildings. We just assume Mac Clark had a great year as Exalted Ruler and this was the year the window behind the stage became a brick wall, perhaps. The other bad news as you know is that we had/ have another shut down. There is also a curfew, so I must leave the sanctuary of the Lodge History Room to be home by 10:00 pm. I am also not allowed to leave home to come to the history room until 5:00 am. Those of you that know me are laughing: but don't "they" know I am an essential worker? Okay, enough. Let us forge ahead into 1994-95 and see what we find.


In 1994 the first Harley raffle was held by the Touring Elks Club; it was deemed a great success and so the tradition began. Monday night dinners increased to \$5.00 and a large milk will be .50 cents. On May 4th while honoring the Citizen of the Year, the Lodge will also honor a Student of the Year chosen from the top 14 Students of the Month. The Traveleers campouts seem unusually calm and well behaved--I am concerned. The Kadiddlehoppers for Elk Year 1993-94 had 49 performances attended by over 150,000 people (this includes parades such as the Rose Parade). The clowns put in 1,300 hours and covered over 3,000 miles. The Santa Maria Indians (baseball team) reported that "the tribe is on the warpath again" hoping to win more games in 1994. Fans were encouraged to come out and "watch them take more scalps". (Society in 1994 was still awaiting "political correctness"; it was a simpler time). By this time, it was becoming apparent that the Rodeo needed its own event center. The facilities at the Fair Grounds were getting smaller yet more expensive. The 107 acres, owned by Unocal, was being investigated as a prospective site. The Traveleers had been hosting campers for Rodeo for many years. In 1994 the campout was held at Adams Basin and 261 rigs attended. On Friday night 369 dinners were served, 540 were served for Saturday Brunch, 616 for Saturday Dinner and 504 guests attended Sunday breakfast along with 120 volunteers. The first annual Independence Day Block Party was held on, yes, the 4th of July. Food, beverages, games, and fireworks! On July 30th the annual International Chili Cook-off was held. Competition was keen as the winner was eligible to compete at National Competitions. Lest the competition gets too intense, the Touring Elks were working security and parking control for the event. International Night, August 27th, featured "an evening of fine Italian food, wine and music". Traditional Italian accordion music was played at each table during dinner. Seems at the Family Picnic the Chug-a-Lug contest was replaced by slots and blackjack, probably wise. The adult Halloween Party was combined with the Grand Goblin Ball with the Lodge once again partnering up with Sunny Country 102.5 FM to benefit the Shelter Services for Women. Regular CYO prices were charged but open to the public. I have been curious why the usually wild and crazy Traveleers have been so reserved lately. Well, in the October Elks Horn there was mention of a grandchild at the campout. New Year's Day 1995 would be the last year the BPOE had an entry in the Rose Parade, sad. I am all for donating needed items and food to the homeless shelters, but prune juice?? 252 Members attended the November 10th annual Veterans' Night BBQ rib dinner. Fifteen active-duty Marines in uniform marched in, sat down, consumed, devoured, and annihilated buckets of ribs, saluted, and departed. No one knew who invited them or where they were from, but everyone hoped they would be back next year. The Kadiddlehoppers remain extremely busy and are still offering "free parking" for anyone

attending their meetings. The New Year's Eve party was \$70.00 per couple and missing from the menu was the peach half with cottage cheese and we do not know if the salsa was "ala Ortega". The Traveleers filled 560 balloons with helium for their Christmas party, but the next morning they were all on the floor. Perhaps the six gallons of eggnog consumed in the process may have contributed to the failure. Here are some Monday Night Dinner statistics: 20,965 dinners served for the 12-month period, the three most popular were BBQ Chicken 6,056, Chicken Fried Steak 4,210, and Pork ribs 1,925. The Crab Crack included champagne at each table; the cost was \$16. Fish (Halibut) and baked potatoes were added to the CYO menu in May 1995. The Kadiddlehoppers were looking for Spanish speaking clowns, I believe the word for clowns in Spanish is "Payasos"? In April, Members remodeled the Ladies Bar, extending the space to create a nonsmoking area. The Touring Elks donated \$4,000 for the new Elks Event Center. Fine wine and craft beer became available in June at the bar: Fess Parker, Firestone and SLO Brewing.

The Traveleers were back at it for their King City campout featuring entertainment by "The Bungling Brothers 3 Ring Circus". Featured performers included "a lion trainer and lions, tight rope walker, fire thrower, clowns, bearded lady, slapstick jokes, tallest man and paper eater". Not scheduled was the 4.9 earthquake. Meanwhile, 750 Traveleers cookbooks went on sale in June entitled The Gourmet Traveler with proceeds donated to the Lodge. A Celebrity Dunk Tank was added to the Family Picnic fun. (Let us bring that one back!). Once again #1538 was awarded as the Number One Lodge in the United States for the Elk Year 1994-95 at Grand Lodge Convention. Our Exalted Ruler was asked many times how Santa Maria does it. I think we all know the answer. Violin music and errant Bocce Balls were reported at the Traveleers Cachuma Lake campout. The group is back on track. On October 21st, a West Central Coast District Pork Chop Cook-off was held at SLO Lodge #322, and of course team #1538 won. Saturday November 18th was a fine example of a busy day at #1538 which started with a morning District Clinic for the officers, next a blood bank, then a car show, and finishing with a Sock Hop and dinner--easy. The Traveleers Bakersfield campout featured a dog bite, a stolen bicycle, and a new game called "Plunger with Hip Movement"; fortunately, no further information or photos were available. As 1995-96 ends we are wondering if #1538 will once again host a Mid-Term Conference in 1998.

As this Elks Horn (January 2020) comes out, Elkdom will be into Ritual Contest Season, or at least we hope so. District Ritual competition normally takes place in late April, so here is a little background. The first Ritual of Initiation was authored in 1868 at the time the Order of Elks was founded by a group of theatrical professionals known as "The Jolly Corks". They were a fun-loving group and therefore the ritual was not rigidly standardized, and it incorporated considerable "horse play". Over the years, the Ritual underwent many changes until it evolved from the simplistic to the sophisticated and dignified Ritual we know today and in 1928 the Grand Lodge adopted a Ritualistic Committee to supervise subordinate ritualistic contests. This committee placed great emphasis on attaining perfection in rendition of the ritual. Over time, the contest rules and methods of scoring contestants have been refined into highly standardized procedures. However, due to the nature of the contest and the criteria for achieving perfection, the scoring procedures are, and probably always will be, somewhat subjective.

DID YOU KNOW?....CONTINUED

The Exalted Ruler's part of the ritual contains 1527 words, the Esquire has 1089, the Leading Knight has 542 words. The team starts out with a score of 100, and the only way they can go from there is down. Once they march into the Lodge room and take their seats, the next 45-50 minutes is a time of intense concentration.

Each officer must not only remember his/her words, pronouncing and accenting them flawlessly, and they need to make their delivery with all the feeling and skill of a trained actor, but they must do this while being constantly aware of all body movements: feet, head, shoulders, arms, hands ... and yes, even the expression on their face. All team movements must be in unison and every movement is precisely specified in the Ritual.

Nothing is left to the discretion of the officer. The team is graded on personal appearance, word accuracy and pronunciation, deportment (body movements) and impressiveness. The latter addresses the voice delivery, sincerity, dignity, and many other subjective parameters. The word judges score word accuracy from behind a screened booth located at each end of the Lodge room. All other scoring is done by the floor judges.

We'll pick this up again in 2021, #1538 is Team Santa Maria so no matter what "We'll always be great at #1538!
