Again, we are that time of year where the season changes and we start gathering wood for the fire and putting the extra jacket in the car. We have now

gone through six months of our Elk year, and it has been a good ride thus far. Our Members throughout the years have shown that Santa Maria is the place to make things happen; we are continuing to show it. On one Thursday night we asked for donations for the flood victims of Tennessee and mentioned that the Lodge would match what we gathered. We had set a goal of \$1,538 that we would like to receive from the Members. To my surprise we raised that amount in one evening--this is what I like about our Members who step up when asked. Following up on my last article regarding Cook Your Own and general Lodge etiquette, the most important thing you need to know is that on any Friday night. aside from the bar

staff, we only have 2 - 3 paid employees in the whole building, and they all work in the kitchen. Everyone else "working" is just an Elks volunteer. This includes the tickets sellers, the greeters, the meat crew, the salad bar team, and the barbecue pit crew.

What we do not have anywhere in the Lodge are busboys, table cleaners, glass/ bottle picker uppers. This applies to the dining room as well as the bars. We rely on all Members to clean up after themselves and to inform their guests to do the same. So, I am asking in the nicest way possible, please clean up after yourselves whenever you are in the Lodge and kindly inform any new Members or guests of this simple rule. Here are just a few other rules and traditions do we have:

Ladies First - We are all about courtesy and respect. When men walk through the door, we expect them to open the door and allow any lady to enter the Lodge before

Collared Shirts - We require all men to wear a collared shirt after 5:30 on Friday nights. We are not a fancy place, but we also do not want to be a tank top and flip-flop place on Friday nights either.

Hats - We ask all men to remove their hats while eating. This used to be a common courtesy that was never questioned, and we like to keep tradition alive and show respect. We remove our hats during meals, in Lodge, when we pray, and when the National Anthem is played, etc.

The Eleven O'Clock Toast - With Elks, the hour of 11 has a tender significance. We take a short minute to remember all our Absent Members. Remove your hat, remain silent, listen to the Toast, and remember those who may come no more. To Our Absent Members!




