



HUMAN TRAFFICKING is a Global Issue.



24.9 million people in modern slavery in 2017.



16-20 million are exploited for labor.



4.8 million are being sexually exploited.



5.5 million victims are under the age of 18.

What is Human Trafficking?

The **United Nations** defines human trafficking as the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring, or receipt of persons by improper means (such as force, abduction, fraud, or coercion) for an improper purpose including forced labor or sexual exploitation.

This modern slave trade is a threat to all nations. A grave human rights abuse, it promotes the breakdown of families and communities, fuels organized crime, deprives countries of human capital, undermines public health, creates opportunities for extortion and subversion among government officials, and imposes large economic costs.

- · An estimated **24.9 million victims** are trapped in modern-day slavery.
- Of these, 16 million (64%) were exploited for labor, 4.8 million (19%) were **sexually exploited**, and 4.1 million (17%) were exploited in **state-imposed forced labor**.
- 15.4 million victims (75%) are aged 18 or older, with the number of **children under the age of 18** estimated at 5.5 million (25%).



- 25,000-35,000 girls are trafficked from Nepal each year.
- Nepal is a poor country and girls from the remote villages are targeted.
 - Girls and women of these poor communities desire the freedom to live a life of hope and purpose.
 - Traffickers use this desire to trick and persuade girls with false promises of love, success, and lucrative jobs.
 - The open border between Nepal and India makes it easy for traffickers to transport the girls to India.

Freedom Pathway

Our goal at Our Daughters International is to provide holistic care to the girls and women we rescue. Without a strategy that includes trauma counseling, education, and job skills training, many of the rescued girls will be vulnerable to being re-trafficked. By engaging in leadership development and training, our daughters will return to their villages as leaders and begin the process of community transformation.

Vulnerable Communities | Freedom is Desired

1 Week to 1 Month

Girls are tricked, persuaded, forced or sold into human trafficking in India or the Middle East. Once in a brothel, victims are sold to men 20-30 times per day.

Border Stations Freedom is Truth

2 to 5 Days

Potential trafficking victims are stopped at the border between Nepal and India and interviewed by experienced staff. If they are identified as trafficking victims, they are reunited with their family or taken to the Safe Home for ongoing care.

Safe Home Freedom is Hope

4 to 8 Weeks

When these survivors enter the Safe Home they become "our daughters." While in the Safe Home, they receive intense trauma counseling, health assessments and care, and peer to peer counseling.

Training Center Freedom is Transforming

6 to 9 Months

Learning job skills will allow our daughters to return to their community with a self-sustainable job. They also become an anti-trafficking advocate so they can defend the next generation.

Healing Community Freedom is Empowering

6 to 12 Months

As empowered leaders, our daughters return to their communities and establish self-sustaining businesses, women's empowerment groups and savings groups. Some of these savings groups have grown into federal banks!

Since 2009...

- Over 153,800 girls and women have been counseled at the border stations.
- Over 12,300 trafficking victims have become survivors.
- Over 1,650 survivors have become our daughters at the Safe Home and Training Center.
- Over 300 businesses have been launched by our daughters as they return to their communities.
- 9 Community Based Organizations have been established made up of 111 women's empowerment groups and over 5,600 members.



BORDER STATIONS AND INDIA RESCUES Freedom is Truth.

Nepalgunj Border Station Team



Our Daughters International and our partners operate 10 border surveillance stations at the border between Nepal and India.



At these border stations, potential trafficking victims are stopped and interviewed by an experienced border counselor. Most of these border counselors are rescued and restored daughters themselves and are experts at identifying victims of human trafficking. Once the trafficking victims are told the **truth** about their trafficker's false promises of a better life in India, they have the **freedom** to begin their journey of healing and restoration. They are reunited with their family or taken to our Safe Home for ongoing care. **They are now survivors.**

Our partners also have a team in Delhi, India that **rescues and repatriates girls** who have made it across the border and are held in hotels while traffickers negotiate deals to sell them abroad or into the brothels of Delhi. Through raids on these hotels, the trafficking victims are rescued. They are then taken back to Nepal and either reunited with their families or welcomed to our Safe Home to join other survivors who were rescued at the border stations. **They too, are now survivors.**

2021 BORDER STATION AND INDIA RESCUES Victims Become Survivors.

- 10 border stations and 1 train depot
- 14,053 girls and women were counseled at the border between Nepal and India
- 861 were identified as trafficking victims... they are now survivors.
- 98 girls were rescued and repatriated from India and are now survivors.

2021 SAFE HOME IMPACT She is now Our Daughter.

- The current Safe Home can house up to 20 daughters at a time.
- On average, daughters will stay at the Safe Home for two months.
- 110 daughters were welcomed into the Safe Home from rescues at the border stations and India.

In the 2nd quarter of 2021, construction began on our **second Safe Home** in Chitwan. This new Safe Home will be twice the size of our current home with the capacity to house up to 40 daughters at a time. With this additional capacity, over **300 trafficking survivors per year** will gain the freedom to **hope** and **dream** for a life of purpose, while being loved and cared for at the Safe Homes.



SAFE HOME

Freedom is Hope.

Our goal is to see rescued girls return home to be reunited with their families. However, about 10-15% of the time, trauma or unsafe situations prohibit the girls from going home. Instead, they are welcomed into our Safe Home where they are now "our daughters". While in the Safe Home, **our daughters receive counseling, health assessments, and care** as needed from an experienced and loving team. During this recovery process, emotional walls begin to come down and the **freedom** to **hope** begins to be restored. During their 4-8 week stay in the Safe Home, our daughters begin the process of identifying their passion and plan for life after recovery through skills training. During this time, they also begin the process of rebuilding the relationship with their families if possible.



OUR DAUGHTER PROVIDES FREEDOM THROUGHOUT NEPAL Nisha's Story.

visited her sister who had left home and moved to the city for work. One evening she went out with her sister's friends and was secretly given drugs in her drink making her unconscious. Upon waking, Nisha discovered she had been sold to a brothel in India where she would endure physical and sexual abuse every day for three years. Finally, a customer took pity on her and helped her escape to the border where she was rescued and brought to our Safe Home.

Nisha experienced crippling trauma, but with the encouragement of the Safe Home counselors, she was able to begin healing and found hope and a purpose for her life

...she wanted to become part of the movement to help protect other vulnerable girls like herself. After her time at the Safe Home, Nisha graduated from the Training Center and became a border counselor, using her own story to counsel and rescue hundreds of other at-risk girls. Still, she wanted to do even more to protect girls like her that were vulnerable to human trafficking.

Nisha accepted a position with our partners as the Assistant Education Coordinator. She travels to schools around the nation, proactively educating children about the dangers of human trafficking and encourages girls to stay in school. She uses her own story publicly to raise awareness and advocate for legal intervention and systemic change. Nisha has visited over 50 schools nationwide, presenting to more than **1,500 students**.

Nisha also uses social media to engage and educate her followers about issues like human trafficking and gender inequality in Nepal. She was recently interviewed by a news network during **Anti-Human Trafficking Awareness Day** to share her views on policy change that is needed to become more victim centric.

Through the teaching of a storytelling course in our Social Leadership Development Training program, Nisha has multiplied her impact. As a result of this course, many daughters have come forward to share their own stories in communities throughout Nepal...no longer living in shame, but empowering each other, raising their voices against human-trafficking, and forming women's groups to stand against injustice.



TRAINING CENTER

Freedom is Transforming

During their 6-9 month stay in the Training Center our daughters have the **freedom** to **transform** into entrepreneurs and leaders as they are taught a job skill which enables them to establish their own micro-business. This business will provide them with a sustainable income which decreases their vulnerability to trafficking.



Fach daughter that moves back into her community is provided **seed money for her micro-business.** She also receives mentoring from a network of regional community leaders. The daughters establish their business as a team of three which helps overcome challenges they may face. Types of businesses that are started include **sewing and tailoring**, **beauty salons and barber shops**, **cafés**, **grocery marts and more**.



The Social Leadership School that they attend during their time at the Training Center, develops select daughters in leadership skills such as public speaking, professionalism, and societal understanding. These daughters will engage public officials and others with testimonies about trafficking in Nepal and **encourage** action to combat it.

2021 TRAINING CENTER IMPACT Our Daughter is Transformed

Due to COVID restrictions during parts of 2021, many of the daughters at the Training Center were unable to graduate and return to their communities and therefore spent an extended amount of time in our care. Additionally, 24 daughters tested positive for COVID which forced the Training Center to go under a strict quarantine delaying the training timeline for them.

- 67 daughters spent time at the Training Center.
- 45 daughters graduated and have been reintegrated into their communities - 9 of them have opened either a tailoring or salon home-based business.
- 6 of the daughters have joined the team as seamstresses at the Kingdom Hope Garment Factory.

Due to the economic impact of COVID in Nepal, the daughters were unable to open any new store-front businesses in 2021.





OUR DAUGHTER BREAKS BARRIERS IN NEPAL Roshani's Story.

ROSHANI WAS THE ELDEST SIBLING

abandoned by her parents and left to be raised by her grandparents. Her grandmother relied heavily on her to complete household chores, leaving no time for an education, and her grandfather regularly abused her. Becoming so disparaged, Roshani developed a plan to run away and find employment in India. Arriving at the border, Roshani was stopped and counseled by a member of our border **team.** She learned about the dangers of human trafficking and was invited to stay at the Safe Home and learn skills with other girls who had suffered in life as she had.

As Roshani transitioned from the Safe Home to the Training Center, she learned about an opportunity to **develop cosmetology skills** in cutting men's hair. Nepal is a patriarchal society that typically prohibits women from leaving the home and

only allows men to cut another man's hair. While Roshani was intimidated about blazing a trail in the industry as a female, she remembered her past and how far she had come. She decided to take the training.

After graduating from her training program, Roshani struggled for two years to make her salon successful. Men were apprehensive about allowing her to cut their hair, but **Roshani refused to quit.** She became the first woman in Chitwan to successfully own and operate a man's hair salon.

"People used to doubt me, they used to say, "how can a woman do this?" I did not let them pull me down, I had confidence in myself."

Roshani now encourages her fellow sisters to follow in her footsteps. She has offered internship opportunities to several daughters studying cosmetology at the Training Center, and she employs two that have graduated. She is currently working on an expansion and plans to hire four more daughters upon its completion. Because of her courage and determination in **breaking** down barriers in Nepal many other daughters have a future filled with hope and financial security.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT Freedom is Empowering.

Women form empowerment groups to work together to establish self-sustaining businesses, bring anti-trafficking and child-marriage awareness to their communities, encourage self-value and leadership, and host cooperatives (farming, job skills training, and savings groups) and entrepreneurial development.

These communities are stronger because our daughter has returned, giving her a platform to share the **freedom** of **empowerment** to those around her.

"I did not want anyone to suffer from violence and abuse like I did. I formed women's groups and youth groups in my community to raise awareness among my fellow sisters."

Our Daughters International works with our Nepal partners to form Man-Up Defender groups in the communities of restored daughters. These groups prepare the males of the community to be "real men" who will fight against human trafficking and gender-based violence. The men in these groups value the women in their lives and work to elevate the status of women in their communities. They are helping eradicate human trafficking by influencing the patriarchal society of Nepal which devalues girls and women and is one of the root causes of trafficking.

OUR DAUGHTER BRINGS LASTING FREEDOM TO HER COMMUNITY Pratima's Story.

THE COMMUNITY Pratima lived in had no direct access to water. Girls and women would have to walk through the jungle for almost three hours to return with a bucket of water each day.

One day as she returned from the river, Pratima was sexually abused by truck drivers who would travel a similar path and wait for girls to pass. Feeling helpless, Pratima reached out to friends to try and process her horrific experience. Her friends confided that they too had gone through similar situations while making the journey for water and others had been taken and sold in India.

To overcome her trauma and find hope for her life, Pratima came to our Safe Home. While there, she was burdened with wanting to help protect other vulnerable girls in her community that were still traveling for water. **Pratima** returned home and formed a small women's coalition that worked together in appealing for a water supply tank in the village. The group grew from 10 women to 25, and they were able to raise \$1,000 collectively. With additional assistance from ODI, these women were able to bring two water tanks to Padampur, providing running water to over 200 households in the village. Vulnerable girls and women no longer had to make the dangerous journey to the river to be abused or potentially trafficked.


The women's coalition now has over 1,000 members and formed a micro lending bank providing loans to many women in the community who have opened businesses.

Some of these businesses include grocery and cosmetic shops, banana plantations, livestock ownership, and more. One business that began with a loanfromthecooperative manufactures rugs to sell. **It now employs over 60 women** from the community, providing important jobs that insulate them from being vulnerable to traffickers.

Pratima is now the chairman at the cooperative bank and runs her own tailoring business. She is married and actively helps other girls and women become thriving members of their flourishing community. She continues to advocate and educate her community on risks to girls and women and has become a powerful agent of lasting change.





THE ODI FAMILY RESPONDS TO CALLS FOR HELP

Nepal COVID-19 Relief Fund

When Nepal experienced a surge of COVID-19 in the second quarter of 2021, many families around the nation were struggling to survive. Not only were people getting sick, but borders closed to India cutting off income channels that provided for daily needs. Families were going without food, and depression and suicide rates began to rise.

Our daughters heard the cries of those in their communities and wanted to do something to help alleviate the stress on families during this difficult time. A goal was set to raise enough funds to provide relief to 400 families in devastated villages where many of our daughters are from. Due to the generosity of the ODI family, that goal was far exceeded with 38 donors giving \$73,570... enough to provide relief to 680 families. Each family received food for two weeks in addition to needed PPE.

It was inspiring to witness our daughters, who have been abused and neglected by society, responding with empathy and **compassion** for the same communities that tossed them aside. It was our daughters who went out into the villages, loading bicycles with bags of rice and lentils, delivering food, hope, and love to people who were feeling hopeless.



Kingdom Hope Garment Factory Expansion

The Kingdom Hope Garment Factory provides fair-wage jobs to 20 of our rescued daughters as they create the patterns and sew the garments for ODI partner Elegantees, a New York fashion brand focused on combatting human trafficking. Ramesh and Katie, founder & CEO of Elegantees, made the bold decision to expand the capacity of the garment factory to provide sustainable and equitable

This dream is now becoming a reality. The capacity of the factory has been expanded to 45 daughters through the generosity and love of over 80 donors who gave more

THE ODI FAMILY SUPPORT PROVIDES FREEDOM FOR OUR DAUGHTERS

The support of the ODI family is providing hope and transformation for hundreds of daughters each year as they journey the freedom pathway. Each year ODI meets with our partners in Nepal to understand their needs for funding. In 2021, the breakdown of the funds needed is is shown below.



Border Surveillance & Rescue



She is now a Survivor.

Over 80% of the 50+ border surveillance team members are rescued and restored daughters. • During the COVID-19 surge in 2021, the 10 border stations and 1 train depot remained open as traffickers continued to lure girls to cross the border into India. • The Transit Home at each border station provides lodging for the team members of that station along with emergency counseling and lodging for 481 trafficking survivors.

Safe Home



She becomes our Daughter.

Approximately 10-15% of survivors become our daughters by coming to the Safe Home. • The Safe Home is called the Dream Home by our daughters as their stay there has given them the freedom to dream about their future. • Construction of the 2nd Safe Home began in Q2 2021 and represented 65% of the Safe Home budget in 2021.

Training Center & Business Launch



Our Daughter is transformed.

Tailoring and cosmetology have on-staff trainers that teach these skills to our daughters. • The Marketplace Training Center provides our daughters who graduate from the Training Center with internship opportunities at MoMo Land Café, Perfect Cut Salon and the Tailoring Shop.

ADDITIONAL 2021 ODI INITIATIVES IN NEPAL



English (ESL) Training

Having the ability to speak English gives our daughters another level of respect in the patriarchal and caste systems of Nepal. **This will allow for their voice to be heard** and their stories to be shared which can lead to societal changes in the country. Speaking English will also provide them with a better means of communication as they operate their store-front businesses, especially with the customers there as tourists. A pilot program was conducted in 2021 with 4 ESL volunteer tutors and six of our daughters in Nepal. The processes for expanding this program will be finalized by mid-year 2022 and will be open to more volunteers and daughters.

NO Child Students Graduate

Completing their education protects vulnerable girls from the risk of trafficking. In 2021, twenty-five daughters receiving scholarships from the NO Child sponsorship program graduated with outstanding results. Most of these daughters were from communities that have a high dropout rate and practice child marriage. **Several of them were the first girls in their families to ever graduate from school...** breaking a cycle of poverty and a high risk of trafficking.

These graduates are now enrolled in bible college, nursing school, business school and some have started working part-time jobs.



Enhanced Leadership Training

Even with the constraints experienced in Nepal due to COVID-19, the Enhanced Leadership Training (ELT) program was still able to launch. Recent graduates from the Training Center and past graduates who are operating businesses are invited to participate in ELT. The goal of this two-month program is to provide our daughters with a better understanding of running their business through an **internship at the Marketplace Training Center.**



Daughters Renewal Conference

Our first annual Daughter's Renewal Conference was held in November with **80 daughters attending.** Daughters who have graduated from our programs in Nepal and have gone back to their communities were invited to participate in this two day conference. The conference focused on learning about the daughter's challenges in being leaders in their respective communities.

The daughters had an opportunity to learn and commune with each other, while forming a more consistent communication channel for them to stay connected once they return to their communities. The daughters from the ELT program conducted leadership sessions and the two days were an incredible opportunity for the daughters to support each other, to share their highs and lows, and to deepen their relationships with each other.


