



A Message from Executive Director



Since announcing our exciting news last year that we had identified the location of our first home to provide residential programming and care for survivors of human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, the momentum and energy generated has led to greater collaboration and partnerships within our community. We are encouraged that so many people not only see the need for safe, specialized, and supportive housing for this population, but that they also they want to come alongside us in filling the gap.

Earlier this year, Shane Renovations offered to manage the renovation process for us and has generously donated time, energy, and expertise. We received a grant from the Acts of Grace Foundation to fund the purchase of new windows and doors. We have also had multiple groups volunteer their time and muscles with various projects at the house. (See page three for more updates on the house.)

Generous supporters have coordinated fundraisers for us or participated in events like Ride for Refuge. These events are crucial to our overall fundraising efforts and we couldn't do this work without the support of our dedicated donors who care about our survivors, our community, justice, hospitality, and extending love. I encourage you check out pages five to ten to read more about the exciting events we have coordinated and participated in this past year.

We continue to be supported by various faith groups not just in our region, across Canada, and throughout the United States. We are regularly asked to speak at churches and faith groups. My role as Executive Director continues to be funded in partnership with the Reformed Church in America where I have churches and individuals from Ontario, British Columbia, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, and Wisconsin supporting me through RCA Global Mission.

I write regular blog posts reflecting on issues related to human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation for the Christian Reformed Church's "Do Justice" website (http://dojustice.crcna.org). Various CRC churches across our region support Restorations in a variety of ways like providing volunteer work teams to assist in our renovations, inviting us to visit their community to share more about this justice issue, and taking up offerings to support our work.

Our Board of Directors represents the ecumenical nature of Restorations with each person coming from varying denominational backgrounds. Together, we are united in the words of God who has said, "But I will restore you to health and heal your wounds" (*Jeremiah 30:17a*).

From this verse, we move forward to live out our organization values: Living God's Love, Embracing Community Connection, and Honouring Individual Uniqueness.

We accomplished much from November 2018 to October 2019, but it is just the beginning as we look ahead to 2020. We look forward to completing the renovations of our home and, ultimately, to opening our doors to welcome our first residents in 2020 with love and compassion.

Restorations stands for the truth that individuals are made perfectly and purposefully by God with the right to live free from exploitation and abuse. We will create a community that rejoices in each other's uniqueness, restores physical, spiritual, and mental well-being, and empowers individuals to step into their life's purpose.








Renderings of our Home

Sleep Tight

A few years ago, a group of us from Restorations attended Sleep Tight's PJ Party in Kitchener, Ontario. It was an incredible event to raise awareness about human trafficking in our region and to collect PJs for organizations who work with trafficked and at risk individuals. Over the years, Sleep Tight has evolved into a fundraising event, raising thousands of dollars for organizations who serve and support survivors. Meaghan Martin is the face behind this incredible event. She volunteers her time and resources to run Sleep Tight, raise awareness, and fundraise. Her natural skills at connecting within the community, consensus building, and inspiring people is what makes this event thrive.

Meaghan approached us over the summer of 2018 and asked if we would consider being the recipients of the event's fundraising efforts. We gladly said yes! In 2018, the event raised more than \$11,000* for Restorations. Meaghan also surprised us by announcing at the event that we would be the recipient of the funds raised in 2019 as well! This event is so incredibly creative and we are so honoured to be a part of it!

We are extremely grateful for Meaghan and her partnership in our work.





Home Sweet Home

This past year, we coordinated our first fundraising event (that was not a third-party fundraiser). Home Sweet Home, a cocktail reception and raffle event, was held on Friday, June 14 in Hamilton, Ontario. At the event, we revealed the renderings and a 3D walkthrough video of the renovation plans for the home. With over 100 people in attendance, over \$6,000 was raised to support our work




























Ride for Refuge

In the spring, Restorations was asked to be the host charity of Hamilton's Ride for Refuge event. As host charity, we were responsible for coordinating this event in Hamilton and we strengthened our connections in the community by recruiting over 60 volunteers, raising awareness about the event, and encouraging other charities to reach their fundraising goals. In Hamilton alone, over \$109,000 was raised for 24 charities, of which \$19,565 was raised for Restorations!

This past summer, we received a Canada Summer Jobs grant from the Government of Canada to employ two individuals for eight weeks.




Kyra, our Media & Communications Coordinator, built a new website for Restorations and redesigned our logo.



Delainy, our Event Director, coordinated our involvement in Ride for Refuge. Following the event, her contract was extended and she currently serves as our Fund Development Coordinator.


Our new website



Our new logo still highlights a butterfly as we believe butterflies represent transformation through cycles of life. Butterflies are only butterflies because of what they endure as caterpillars. The "transition stage" of the caterpillar's life can last a few weeks, a month, or even longer. Transformation takes time and energy. We know this. That's why at Restorations, our programming will allow for residents to live in our home for up to two years. This logo highlights the transition stage of a caterpillar's life and its goal to emerge as a butterfly.

The logo also features multiple circles encircling the butterfly. These three circles represent those coming alongside survivors in their journeys. The first circle symbolizes Restorations and our community of supporters, donors, volunteers, and staff. The second circle symbolizes our wider community, our partners, and faith communities, those with whom we partner in this work to support survivors. And the third circle symbolizes God who has called us to this work and desires for us to experience love, belonging, and community.






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Staff and Volunteers


