PUBLIC SAFETY & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Neighborhood Updates:
 - Howard University- The institution has reviewed safety protocols in practice and alignment with the Metropolitan Police Department and there have been various safety precautions put in place to prevent future altercations with local juveniles from occurring. The Banneker Recreation Center has lighted its field and other surrounding areas to deter the location from being a late night hang out spot. Those under the age of 17 years old are "being in any public place or on the premises of any establishment Sunday through Thursday from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., and Saturday and Sunday from 12:01 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. Enforcement, which began Friday, September 1, involves officers bringing minors found violating the curfew to Department of Youth Rehabilitation Services "achievement centers" until they can be reconnected in the morning with a parent or guardian."
 - Violent Crime: On August 23, ANC representatives met with the Attorney General Brian Schwalb and Assistant Police Chief Morgan Kane to discuss growing concerns for crime. AG Schwalb shared that less than 10 percent of arrests are children under the age of 18. He also stated that the vast majority of crime is committed by people over the age of 18 and therefore goes to federal attorney. Matt Graves is the US attorney who handles federal cases which many are since D.C. is not a state. Chief Kane shared that the city was up 38% city wide in violent crime and up 36 homicides over this time last year. There was a 19% decrease in assault with dangerous weapons crimes with the 6th district seeing the biggest decrease and over 33 guns and 16 stolen autos have been recovered by MPD in 5th week of their target initiative. Future meetings are set to occur.
 - This past month a fatal stabbing occurred at the McDonald's located on 14th and U, in addition to a fatal shooting outside of the Columbia Heights Metro station and three men were shot on 18th Street and Columbia Road.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Main Streets – Clean Streets (Lower GA Ave, Shaw, 14 Street, and U Street)
- Neighborhood Updates:
 - Reeves Center: The Office of the Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development (DMPED) has selected Reeves CMC Venture to redevelop the Reeves Center site. The project will include a hotel, a headquarters for the NAACP, municipal office space, a new Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and

School, a Washington Jazz Arts Institute, a Viva School of Dance, a restaurant by Food Network celebrity chef Carla Hall, a Dave Chappelle Comedy Club, and a new home for the Christian Tabernacle Child Development Center, a hotel and space for municipal uses that will sustain daytime foot traffic. It will also include 322 residential rental units of housing, of which at least 30% will be affordable for DC households making at or below 30% of the Median Family Income and at or below 50% MFI.

- 1617U Street [NEW]: The Zoning Committee Public Hearing scheduled for June 26 will be rescheduled later this year.
- Proposed Alcohol Moratorium: The Westminster Neighborhood Association (WNA) established a Work Group to propose an alcohol moratorium for the 9th & U Street area. The moratorium petition will be for Taverns/Nightclubs and restaurants that apply for endorsements – but not Restaurant Licenses which are food-based. The goal is to address the adverse impacts from overconcentration of operations such as noise and disturbances, residential parking and contribution to neighborhood crime.
- T Street Task Force: The Task Force continues to look at ways to address drug dealing and illegal activity that occur on the 600 Block of T Street and the 1900 Block of 7th Street. MPD patrol work and undercover work to address the drug sales, providing services for the individuals with behavioral health and substance abuse issues, implementing built environment interventions that disrupt illegal behavior, and programming the block more regularly to make it less feasible to sell and use drugs there.

ANC 1B Fiscal Year 2024 – DRAFT Budget Notes

The purpose of this budget notes document is to accompany the budget and to precisely define each category and line item within the budget, and clarify what precisely the Commission is authorizing the Treasurer or Executive Committee to do on its behalf. The budget notes are meant to be adopted alongside the budget itself.

Authorization

The Commission authorizes the Treasurer to make purchases in accordance with the Fiscal Year 2024 budget and the budget notes on its behalf, so long as the purchases are under \$2,000 per vendor, per Fiscal Year. Any purchases over this threshold require the written (or emailed) authorization of at least one other member of the Executive Committee. The Commission forbids the Treasurer to make purchases that are not in accordance with this budget, unless the budget is amended to allow for those purchases.

The Commission requires that the Treasurer report to the Executive Committee all purchases made with any Commission debit card within 7 calendar days of purchase, regardless of amount.

Per OANC rules, all purchases made via check must be signed by the Treasurer and at least one other member of the Executive Committee.

For any charge or amount that the Commissioner authorizes the Treasurer to spend, the Treasurer may further delegate that authority. For instance, if the Commission authorizes the Treasurer to spend \$10 on printing and Treasurer asks a Commissioner to spend that money on printing on behalf of the Treasurer, that Commissioner's spending is authorized by the Commission.

The Commission's authorization to the Treasurer covers spending that takes place in Fiscal Year 2024 – that is, on any date from and including 1 October 2023 to and including 30 September 2024.

The Commission authorizes the Treasurer to update the budget spreadsheet's cell C6 ("Balance Forward") to match the actual balance forward as of the end of the day on 30 September 2023 before submitting this budget to the Office of ANCs.

1. Personnel

1.1 Administrative consultant

This line item authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for an Administrative consultant or any position that is qualitatively the same as the Administrative consultant position, even if the name is changed. This line item also authorizes backpay for any work that the Administrative consultant conducted in Fiscal Year 2023 but has not yet been paid due to administrative delay.

1.2 Neighborhood engagement intern

This line item authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for a Neighborhood engagement intern or any position that is qualitatively the same as the Neighborhood engagement intern position, even if the name is changed.

2. Direct Office Cost

No costs are budgeted in this line.

3. Communication

3.1 Printed Commission-branded materials (includes business cards etc.)

This line item authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for business cards for Commissioners and/or Commission employees, and for similar printed materials with the Commission brand. The Treasurer has discretion regarding the precise amounts spent on each item in this category.

3.2 Online communications materials and licenses (includes website, Zoom, etc.)

This line item authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for online and electronic communications, including but not limited to payments for livestreaming and virtual meeting services, payments for the Commission's website, payments for the Commission's mailing list, and payments for cloud storage. The Treasurer has discretion regarding the precise amounts spent on each item in this category.

3.3 Translation services

This line item authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for services related to translation of written or recorded materials, and/or interpretation. The Commission will seek DC-provided assistance for translation and interpretation first; this line item is mean for cases in which DC is not able to provide translation or interpretation that meets the needs of the Commission. The Treasurer has discretion regarding the precise amounts spent on each item in this category.

3.4 Mail services (includes P.O. box, stamps, shipping, etc.)

This line item authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for services related to mail, including but not limited to payments related to the Commission P.O. Box, stamps, and shipping for any items mailed on behalf of the Commission. The Treasurer has discretion regarding the precise amounts spent on each item in this category.

4. Office supplies, Equipment, Printing

This category authorizes the Treasurer to spend up to the listed amount in payments for printing services, office supplies, and office equipment. This may include items related to hosting hybrid

meetings of the Commission. The Treasurer has discretion regarding the precise amounts spent on each item in this category.

5. Grants

14th Street Bus Lanes Design Request

WHEREAS the 2021 Update to the DDOT's [Bus Priority Plan](#) designates 14th Street NW from Euclid Street NW to Thomas Circle NW as part of the District's bus priority network, and specifically designates the corridor as the highest ranked bus priority corridor in the District,

WHEREAS DDOT has not begun the design process for the 14th Street Bus Priority project and has not determined whether it will consider bus lanes as an option in the project,

WHEREAS the 14th Street NW corridor is a critical bus corridor for the 52, 54, and 59 MetroBus lines and the Woodley Park-McPherson Square Circulator, which carry TKTGTK average weekday passengers,

WHEREAS these bus lines carry riders to, from, and through ANC 1B to access jobs, attend schools and universities, reach essential services including healthcare facilities, and patronize local businesses,

WHEREAS despite its importance, the 14th Street NW bus corridor was given an "F" rating in the [2019 MetroBus Report Card](#),

WHEREAS buses on this corridor had only 66% adherence to headways, 63% adherence to bus schedule, and an average speed of 7.8 mph,

WHEREAS the low performance metrics for the buses on 14th Street NW result in passenger delays, crowding, and overall poor service,

WHEREAS these buses operate past MetroRail's closing hours and under a proposed Council funding measure would operate 24 hours a day serving as a vital corridor for nightlife workers and patrons in the U Street and 14th Street corridors whose hours of operation extend after MetroRail closes,

WHEREAS WMATA's Better Bus network redesign project proposes increasing the frequency of bus service along 14th Street NW,

WHEREAS 14th Street NW is a Tier 2 High Injury segment in the District's Vision Zero plan and since 2018 there has been 1 pedestrian death and 281 reported injuries along the corridor (158 driver and passenger, 60 cyclist, and 63 pedestrians),

WHEREAS There is currently a painted unprotected bike lane and sharrows along 14th Street NW,

WHEREAS The existing bike lane design, including the right-turn blind spots adjacent to bus shelters, is unsafe for cyclists,

WHEREAS There is sufficient right-of-way on 14th Street NW to maintain a travel lane, bus lane, existing curbside parking, pick-up/drop-off areas, streateries as well as incorporate a protected bike lane,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose a design for bus lanes on 14th Street NW between Euclid Street NW and Thomas Circle NW and that it presents said plan to the ANC for community input and engagement,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose a design that includes cargo and pick-up/drop-off (PUDO) zones in available curbside space on 14th Street NW as a part of its bus priority project,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose a design for protected bike lanes on 14th Street NW as a part of its bus priority project,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose both of these designs with consideration of the needs of mobility challenged individuals including curb ramps, ADA parking spots and loading zones, and other interventions

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this should not be construed as great weight for any interim or final design,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests DDOT return to ANC 1B to consult the community during its planning process.

RESOLUTION CALLING FOR REFORM OF THE VACANT & BLIGHTED PROPERTY LAWS AND REGULATIONS IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

WHEREAS; The District of Columbia includes over 4,400 vacant or blighted properties, with 1,150 of those properties (26%) sitting vacant for over 4 years¹. At least 800 of all vacant or blighted properties across the District of Columbia are located in major commercial corridors, hereinafter defined as including Mixed-Use (MU), Neighborhood Mixed-Use (NC), and Mixed-Use-Uptown Arts (ARTS) zones²;

WHEREAS; Ward 1 includes over 495 vacant or blighted properties, with 132 of those properties (27%) sitting vacant for over 4 years. At least 150 of all vacant or blighted properties in Ward 1 are in designated commercial corridors;

WHEREAS; Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) 1A includes over 115 vacant or blighted properties, with 35 of those properties (30%) sitting vacant for over 4 years. At least 26 of all vacant or blighted properties in ANC 1A are in designated commercial corridors;

WHEREAS; Vacant and blighted properties often provide cover for illegal and criminal activity³, contribute to lower property values, remove potential housing units from the market, and create unsafe and insanitary⁴ conditions for neighboring buildings and the community;

WHEREAS; Vacant and blighted properties along commercial corridors impede the neighborhood's economic sustainability and growth potential, significantly limiting some areas from attracting and maintaining businesses, large and small. Therefore, the opportunity cost of properties in commercial corridors is higher than those in residential areas;

WHEREAS; The “Fiscal Year 2011 Budget Support Act of 2010” created a Class 3 property tax rate for vacant properties and a Class 4 tax rate for blighted properties in the District of Columbia. Class 3 is taxed at \$5 per \$100 of assessed value and Class 4 is taxed at \$10 per \$100 of assessed value.⁵ These values have not been adjusted for inflation since their creation;

WHEREAS; Despite increased tax rates for Class 3 and Class 4 properties, some property owners will pay the minimum in taxes owed to retain ownership and avoid a tax sale. In this instance, the property maintains its Class 3 vacant or Class 4 blighted status and begins to accumulate the higher tax rate again;

WHEREAS; Despite increased tax rates for Class 3 and Class 4 properties, accumulated taxes may go unpaid or uncollected for many years. Thus, these tax penalties have proven to be an ineffective incentive for owners to rehabilitate the blighted status, occupy the vacant property, and/or dispose of the property by selling it;

WHEREAS; When a vacant or blighted property accumulates significant unpaid monies or is delinquent per Department of Buildings (“DOB”) or Office of Tax Revenue (“OTR”) guidelines, OTR may file a tax lien covering all unpaid taxes, fees, penalties, and interest on the property. These tax liens are sold at auction through a process that has been recognized as predatory and often perpetuating a continued cycle of inaction and a prolonged failure to remedy vacancies or blight⁶;

WHEREAS; When a lien is sold via a real property tax sale, the current owner has one (1) year from the sale date to redeem the property, which requires paying the minimum owed in taxes to maintain ownership, oftentimes starting the same cycle of non-compliance over again;

WHEREAS; Managing over 4,400 vacant properties across the District of Columbia requires DOB and OTR to maintain accurate records, keep up with status changes of the property, collect tax revenue in a timely manner, and have precise communication between agency officials;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT; ANC 1A calls on the D.C. Council to pass legislation reforming the way the Department of Buildings classifies vacant and blighted properties, altering the incentives and penalties offered by the Office of Tax & Revenue, and reforming the real property tax sale process;

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; ANC 1A calls for the creation of a “Commercial Area (“CA”)” and “Residential Area (“RA”)” classification to be added to Class 1 – 4 statuses in order to designate properties in commercial corridors versus residential corridors. ANC 1A recommends that Mixed-Use (“MU”), Neighborhood Mixed-Use (“NC”), and Mixed-Use-Uptown Arts (“ARTS”) zones be used to determine properties that fall within the bounds of commercial corridors. ANC 1A recommends that Class 3 and Class 4 properties with the CA designation receive higher tax rates compared to those with the RA designation, given the higher opportunity cost associated with commercial corridors;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; ANC 1A calls for Class 3 and Class 4 tax rates to be adjusted in accordance with inflation and then to gradually increase in accordance with the length of the property’s vacancy status, therefore encouraging long-standing vacant property owners to act;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; Given the additional revenue from higher tax rates for CA properties and long-standing vacant properties, that DOB and OTR hire additional Full-Time Employees to maintain accurate records, collect tax revenue in a timely manner, and ensure precise communication between the two agencies;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; ANC 1A calls for the creation of a “Class 4 Commercial Sale Incentive” that would cancel accumulated taxes on a Class 4 CA property if the property owner sells to a certified buyer. ANC 1A recommends the creation of regulatory guidelines to determine what qualifies as a certified buyer and guidelines to evaluate each property’s merit to receive the “Class 4 Commercial Sale Incentive;”

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; ANC 1A calls for the real property tax sale process to give preference to abutting and nearby businesses who are interested in buying the vacant property when the property up for tax sale is classified as within a CA. This would encourage the expansion of businesses already located in a neighborhood and increase the likelihood that tax sale buyers will bring the property back in working order;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; ANC 1A calls for the creation of a “District-wide ANC Taskforce on Vacant & Blighted Building Reform” to recommend legislative and regulatory reforms to the D.C. Council and the Executive. The ANC Taskforce will be comprised of at least one member from every Ward. The ANC Taskforce will also provide input and serve as a resource for the D.C. Tax Revision Commission as it works toward a report to the Council by end of 2023;



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT; The resolution is proposed by Commissioner Jeremy Sherman and serves as the point of contact for further information on the subject;

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED THAT; The Chair of Advisory Neighborhood Commission 1A, or designee in their absence, shall be authorized to communicate this resolution to, and represent the commission before, members of the Council of the District of Columbia and all governmental agencies.

We are writing to you on the future of the Reeves Center. The community is excited that DMPED has selected a winning bid. Both teams had well-rounded proposals and the ANC is delighted that the Reeves CMC will bring significant arts uses to U street, in addition to the NAACP office space and hotel.

There are a number of issues that were raised during the consultative hearings on the future of the site and we want to highlight some of our concerns as you negotiate the final details and the disposition agreement. These issues were not addressed in the RFP but came up during the hearings as areas of community concern. Based on previous experience, it is better to lock some of these details into the disposition agreement, rather than addressing them ad-hoc during construction.

- 1) Maximizing Affordable Housing on U Street
- 2) V Street parking loss and significant alleyway obstruction and congestion leading to W Street
- 3) Supporting the unhoused residents and users of the Reeves Center
- 4) Hiring opportunities for local residents
- 5) The need for a construction mitigation plan, and in particular worker parking
- 6) Naming a comedy club for Dave Chapelle may not be appropriate for the U Street neighborhood
- 7) Creating a local bid requires buy in from large business, and Reeves CMC is the right team to lead that process
- 8) Future Parking at the Reeves Center needs to be open to the public

Maximizing Affordable Housing on U Street

During the big process, DMPED asked both teams not to comment on the affordable housing component except to note that it will meet all statutory goals. We want to re-emphasize the community interest in bringing more affordable housing to U Street. In particular, there is a need for affordable family housing and also deeply affordable housing. We understand the targets the Mayor has set for new affordable housing, and it would be great to have the future Reeves center be part of that process. The ANC looks forward to being briefed and updated on the ultimate affordable housing mix that is negotiated.

V Street parking loss and significant alleyway obstruction and congestion leading to W Street

The RFP asked developers to assume that the current curb cut to the parking garage on U Street will be eliminated, and that the main entrance to the site will be on V Street. This is a poor design decision, the primary curb cut should remain on U Street. We heard a great deal of concerns that absent a larger plan, a garage/drop off entrance will result in too much congestion on V Street. There is already an alley on the north side of the V Street on that block that is causing problems. Garbage trucks and other alley traffic block V Street and causes backups. In addition, the District needs to look at the loss of parking that the new Reeves project will create on V street. DDOT needs work on a traffic management plan for V Street that includes the future traffic that will be generated by the new Reeves Center.

Supporting the unhoused residents and users of the Reeves Center

During the first round of the RFP, the Reeves CMC team pointed out that one of their members had a great deal of experience with the Primo Center in Chicago and in particular in helping families experiencing homelessness. We hope that Reeves CMC can use that experience during construction and running the Reeves Center to help the local residents (both housed and unhoused) who use the sidewalks as their primary venue. One idea that was brought up in community meetings was dedicated space at the Reeves Center that unhoused people could access. The Downtown BID has been successful in running a larger program like this, and this sort of investment will pay off in the long run.

Hiring opportunities for local residents

We know that the RFP requires the developers to follow District guidelines on local employment, but this is a unique opportunity to hire Ward 1 one residents for both the construction and operations of the new Reeves Center. Even highlighting in an online dashboard how many workers were hired from DC and Ward 1 would be start.

The need for a construction mitigation plan, and in particular worker parking

We all know there will be multiple issues that come up during constructions that impact local residents, and writing a plan to mitigate these issues and designing primary points of contact will help immensely during this project. For example, parking for workers will be very limited, and the best practice would be contractors to have a remote parking lot with a shuttle. DPW needs to add enforcement on resident street parking during construction. A construction mitigation plan should also include placement of Port a Potties. We are also very concerned about the construction impact on residents of the Geno Baroni building, and having designated points of contact would be useful. Just having a website where construction updates are posted could be a start, as the management at Geno Baroni is not necessarily passing information along to residents.

Naming a comedy club for Dave Chapelle may not be appropriate for the U Street neighborhood

The ANC thinks a comedy club would be an excellent use of the new Reeves Center. Mr. Chapelle has strong local history and ties. However, his comments and jokes on trans people

and other members of the LGBTQIA+ community have hurt some residents of ANC 1B. The District and the developers need to look at this part of the plan carefully, and be conscious there are some local residents who are questioning why privatized public space should be named for Mr. Chapelle.

Creating a local BID requires buy in from large business, and Reeves CMC is the right team to lead that process.

During the first round of the RFP, Reeves CMC committed to acting as leadership for a local BID. There is a strong need for a BID both in terms of branding and in operations. We wanted to call on Reeves CMC to continue that support and to act as leaders for a process to form a BID inclusive of consideration of financial support.

Some future parking at the Reeves Center needs to be open to the public

The current Reeves Center has one of the few garages that is open to the public. We understand that the proposed office space (NAACP and District Government), hotel and residents will require parking. However, it is important that the disposition agreement have traffic demand plans in place for both the hotel and office space uses. Some parking in the new garage needs to be open and available for community use. There are opportunities for reduced price or free parking for church use, and fee-based parking for other users.

We look forward to continued conversation with both DPMED and the Reeves CMC team in the future. None of these issue have easy solutions, but we think raising them now and finding solutions together will help make this project a success.

14th Street Bus Lanes Design Request

WHEREAS the 2021 Update to the DDOT's [Bus Priority Plan](#) designates 14th Street NW from Euclid Street NW to Thomas Circle NW as part of the District's bus priority network, and specifically designates the corridor as the highest ranked bus priority corridor in the District,

WHEREAS DDOT has not begun the design process for the 14th Street Bus Priority project and has not determined whether it will consider bus lanes as an option in the project,

WHEREAS the 14th Street NW corridor is a critical bus corridor for the 52, 54, and 59 MetroBus lines and the Woodley Park-McPherson Square Circulator, which carry TKTGTK average weekday passengers,

WHEREAS these bus lines carry riders to, from, and through ANC 1B to access jobs, attend schools and universities, reach essential services including healthcare facilities, and patronize local businesses,

WHEREAS despite its importance, the 14th Street NW bus corridor was given an "F" rating in the [2019 MetroBus Report Card](#),

WHEREAS buses on this corridor had only 66% adherence to headways, 63% adherence to bus schedule, and an average speed of 7.8 mph,

WHEREAS the low performance metrics for the buses on 14th Street NW result in passenger delays, crowding, and overall poor service,

WHEREAS these buses operate past MetroRail's closing hours and under a proposed Council funding measure would operate 24 hours a day serving as a vital corridor for nightlife workers and patrons in the U Street and 14th Street corridors whose hours of operation extend after MetroRail closes,

WHEREAS WMATA's Better Bus network redesign project proposes increasing the frequency of bus service along 14th Street NW,

WHEREAS 14th Street NW is a Tier 2 High Injury segment in the District's Vision Zero plan and since 2018 there has been 1 pedestrian death and 281 reported injuries along the corridor (158 driver and passenger, 60 cyclist, and 63 pedestrians),

WHEREAS There is currently a painted unprotected bike lane and sharrows along 14th Street NW,

WHEREAS The existing bike lane design, including the right-turn blind spots adjacent to bus shelters, is unsafe for cyclists,

WHEREAS There is sufficient right-of-way on 14th Street NW to maintain a travel lane, bus lane, existing curbside parking, pick-up/drop-off areas, streateries as well as incorporate a protected bike lane,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose a design for bus lanes on 14th Street NW between Euclid Street NW and Thomas Circle NW and that it presents said plan to the ANC for community input and engagement,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose a design that includes cargo and pick-up/drop-off (PUDO) zones in available curbside space on 14th Street NW as a part of its bus priority project,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose a design for protected bike lanes on 14th Street NW as a part of its bus priority project,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose both of these designs with consideration of the needs of mobility challenged individuals including curb ramps, ADA parking

Euclid Street Protected Bike Lane Study

WHEREAS, "[moveDC](#) is the long-range transportation plan for the District of Columbia," which "establishes goals, policies, strategies and metrics for District Department of Transportation (DDOT) to invest in transportation facilities and programs that address the future needs";

WHEREAS, DDOT approved the moveDC plan in January 2022 including a bicycle priority network on Euclid Street NW from Columbia Road NW to Georgia Avenue NW,

WHEREAS the 15th Street cycletrack, one of the most used bike lanes in the District of Columbia, intersects with Euclid Street NW,

WHEREAS the planned north-south 11th Street bike lane and the planned Columbia Road NW bike lane, intersects with Euclid Street NW,

WHEREAS Euclid Street NW contains sufficient right-of-way to include a one-way protected bike lane while maintaining parking on both sides of the street,

WHEREAS Two-way segments of Euclid Street NW in ANC 1B in particular encounter significant issues with two-way thru car traffic unable to pass due to the narrow right-of-way and wider vehicles on average,

WHEREAS The existing road design is unsafe for all road users and there have been 44 reported injuries along this segment of Euclid Street NW since 2018 (23 driver and passenger, 11 cyclist, and 10 pedestrian),

WHEREAS "In developing moveDC, DDOT did not conduct project-level planning for the modal priority maps. However, DDOT will adhere to federal requirements and national best practices throughout the project development process and is committed to creating a District-wide bicycle network";

WHEREAS DC Law 23-158, the Vision Zero Enhancement Omnibus Amendment Act of 2020, requires "DDOT to construct a protected bike lane or cycle track on a road segment where called for in the District of Columbia's Multimodal Long-Range Transportation Plan";

WHEREAS the Transit Priority Network map "does not specify what treatment will be made on a given street";

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ANC 1B endorses moveDC's plan to include connected bicycle lanes on Euclid Street NW from Columbia Road NW to Georgia Avenue NW and urges that said lanes be converted from sharrows and painted bike lanes to protected bicycle facilities,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT evaluate and create plans for converting existing bicycle facilities to a one-way protected bike lane on Euclid Street NW from Columbia Road NW to Georgia Avenue NW,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT evaluate and create plans for converting Euclid Street NW from 15th Street NW to Georgia Avenue NW to a one-way road for vehicle travel,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B encourages DDOT to present any bike infrastructure proposals at an ANC 1B meeting, or similarly sized public meeting that overlaps with the entire Euclid Street NW area.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B requests that DDOT study and propose both of these designs with consideration of the needs of mobility challenged individuals including curb ramps, ADA parking spots and loading zones, and other interventions,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this should not be construed as great weight for any interim or final design,

ADA PARKING FOR MULTIFAMILY RESIDENCES

WHEREAS, The Residential Disability Permit Parking (RDPP) program operated by the District Department of Transportation (DDOT) allows certain residents with disability placards and a mobility impairment to apply for a reserved parking space on their block of residence,

WHEREAS The program is only available to residents with disabilities who live in a single-family dwelling and meet certain other requirements,

WHEREAS This program excludes residents with a mobility impairment who live in multi-family dwellings but may not have access to off-street parking,

WHEREAS Many multi-family dwellings in ANC 1B, especially older dwellings, do not have off-street parking,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That ANC 1B requests that DDOT expand eligibility for the RDPP program to multi-family dwellings if those dwellings do not provide designated off-street disability parking.

ANC 1B TRAFFIC SAFETY INPUT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS The District Department of Transportation (DDOT) initiated the Traffic Safety Input 2.0 (TSI 2.0) program in December 2022 to replace the previous Traffic Safety Investigation request process,

WHEREAS This input process “provides a mechanism for DDOT to hear from residents on roadway segments and intersections where users have safety concerns.”

WHEREAS The process prioritizes 800 requests per year for investigation and consideration at 200 per quarter,

WHEREAS DDOT has previously rejected requests for traffic calming measures such as speed tables, speed bumps, and raised crosswalks on residential streets in favor of speed limit signs, which are less effective,

WHEREAS Residents of ANC 1B have reported dangerous and excessive speeding on non-arterial residential streets at all hours, but especially during late-night nightlife periods,

WHEREAS The TSI 2.0 process allows for ANCs to provide great weight ahead of the consideration of TSIs of their support for any requested measures,

WHEREAS The requests listed in Appendix A of this resolution are requests for interventions to reduce traffic speed and protected pedestrians that are currently under review by DDOT,

WHEREAS The requests listed in Appendix B of this resolution are requests for interventions to reduce traffic speed and protected pedestrians that could be considered in the future by DDOT,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ANC 1B provides its great weight in support of the installation of physical traffic calming measures such as speed tables, raised crosswalks, and speed bumps at the TSI’s currently under consideration listed in Appendix A instead of speed limit signs, which have limited traffic calming impact,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ANC 1B provides its great weight in support of the installation of physical traffic calming measures such as speed tables, raised crosswalks, and speed bumps at the TSI’s “For Future Consideration” listed in Appendix B instead of speed limit signs, which have limited traffic calming impact.
