WriterCoach Connection



WriterCoach Connection is a nonprofit that brings trained volunteer coaches into public middle and high schools in the East Bay to help students develop strong writing and critical thinking skills. Over the past 24 years, WCC has coached over 37,000 students. Our coaches provide individualized attention to students to help them become free-thinking, confident writers. With coaching last year, 80% of low-performing students improved or significantly improved their skills. 100% of high school seniors whom WriterCoach Connection coached on essay questions for college applications were accepted into college. We recruit coaches of all backgrounds, and no formal training in teaching or writing is required. We coach directly in schools, working with teachers to provide support within the curriculum students are already engaged in. We coach all students in a class, and our program is not a pull-out.

We ask our volunteers to commit to a consistent shift for the entirety of our 10 to 12-week program. Volunteers can sign up for as little as an hour a week, with the option to sign up for more shifts as they please. We provide all the training needed to coach, including a mandatory orientation and a core training session. Our coaches are encouraged to focus on encouraging students to develop confidence in themselves as writers. Our job is not to correct grammar or enforce writing rules. Rather, we want to help students get their ideas down on paper and experience the joy of writing.

This fall we are running programs at 3 middle schools: King Middle School (Berkeley), Betty Reid Soskin Middle School (El Sobrante), and Elmhurst United Middle School (Oakland). We have coaching shifts available Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday during the school day (8:30-4). The first step for folks interested in volunteering with us is to <u>fill out our volunteerinterest form</u>. Celebrating the Unity of Flesh & Spirit

"Long years must pass before the truths we have made for ourselves become our very flesh." – Paul Valery, poet



The Apostle Paul, author of the "epistles" in the Bible had received a classical Greek education that taught that flesh ($\sigma\dot{\alpha}\rho\kappa\alpha$ -sarka) and spirit ($\pi\nu\epsilon\dot{\nu}\mu\alpha$ - pneuma) were always in strict opposition. This "war" between flesh and spirit is waged throughout his letters and has continued in parts of our Christian tradition with some fairly dramatic consequences.

By accepting these rigid dualisms, spirituality for Paul was pretty black and white. You were either driven by flesh or by spirit - and flesh was bad and spirit was holy! It was either darkness or light - certainly no value in fog! Later Christians then designated everyone as either "saved" and headed for heaven or "deprayed" and headed for hell.

This unyielding dualistic strand of the Christian tradition is deeply problematic and has gotten the faith into the most trouble over the centuries. By creating dualistic categories for humans, we have slaughtered beloved children of God by labeling them heretics, unbelievers, pagans, foreigners, or simply strangers. This thinking, when allied with corrupt political power, has supported ethnic cleansing and religious genocide. In simpler forms, it breeds persecution and oppression and is thereby antithetical, in my view, to a Gospel that is meant to be Good News for the poor, the oppressed, the stranger, and the outcast.

Dualistic thinking is also pervasive throughout secular culture too. It is on rabid display in our political discourse for sure and makes compromise of any kind impossible. And, if we tell the truth, most of us - even if we have been actively trying to avoid dualistic thinking - have a hard time remembering the beauty and holiness of our "flesh" and we'd like to be more "spiritually" evolved.

I believe that the teachings of Jesus were aligned with Jewish teaching and philosophy which is far more wholistic than dualistic. So much so, in fact, that there isn't even a word in masoretic Hebrew for "but". The primary conjunction in Biblical Hebrew is "and" or את.

And even if you aren't a Jesus person or religious person of any sort, we live in a culture that constantly puts bodies into categories of good and bad; ugly and beautiful; so learning to love your body and soul together is a great way to heal wounds left by our judgmental culture.

Finally, I believe that flesh cannot be separated from spirit in this life. You cannot pray (or think or feel) without a body - nor should you even try - because the gift of the Christ is dependent upon incarnation: the Word (Jesus) became flesh and dwelled among us. And it was good.

Do you love your flesh/body? Is it easy or hard? What spiritual practices do you do to honor your body?
