Hometown: Brooklyn, New York



Nastasya Popov

The Brighton Beach neighborhood in Brooklyn, New York, is known for a large number of Russian-speaking immigrants living in this ocean-front community near Coney Island. It's an area in which Russian culture has flourished and in which Nastasya Popov, the daughter of Russian immigrants herself, sees

Area of Interest: Filmmaker

Nastasya, a graduate of Northwestern University with a major in radio, TV, film and screenwriting, is not new to the art of filmmaking. She has already completed 4 previous films -- two of them documentaries and two of them narrative shorts. She previously received a competitive grant from Northwestern for the production of her earlier film, "Healing Chicago."

With the HBW Memorial Grant, Nastasya will be able to begin production on a short film about Brighton Beach focusing

on a brother and sister from a Russian family. The film's story, which Nastasya acknowledges is in part somewhat auto-biographical, aims "to investigate cross-generational strain under tough circumstances."

Clearly passionate about film and its ability to tell complicated stories about the human experience, Nastasya has displayed a talent and sensitivity that is very much in tune with the goals of the Hunter Watson Memorial Fund.

Hometown: Alameda, California **Area of Interest:** Music Production

Lorenzo Wood may only be a high school junior, but he's also a talented young man with broad experience in the music field. He's the operator of Lorenzo Wood Music Studios and has already been working in various areas of commercial music for over four years.

Beginning at age 14, Lorenzo started performing as a singer/musician. It was then that he also set up a studio to record both his own music and that of other young musicians in the Oakland-East Bay area. His musical work has included leading three bands and performing in several others as a singer, or a musician on drums, bass, guitar or keyboards.

His work in music was what drove Lorenzo to apply for an HBW Memorial Fund grant. While he has had a recording studio setup

for several years, he has not been able to acquire the professional computer programs and equipment that would allow him to produce high-quality recording sessions for himself and his clients.

Lorenzo will now use this HBW Memorial Grant to acquire a top-grade audio interface, accompanying extensions, and professional-quality microphones. With these improvements, he will be able to record and process quality, professional-level recordings in a small, non-stressful environment.



You Made Five New Grants Possible

Hometown: Kingston, St. Vincent and the Grenadines **Area of Interest:** Commercial Pilot's License

Imagine yourself as a young man in a relatively poor Caribbean country with ambitions that might not seem attainable to most. This certainly seemed to be the case for Keston Baynes as he was growing up in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

But Keston wasn't willing to accept what might seem impossible odds. At the age of 14, he won a tennis scholarship that enabled him to travel alone to Florida for tennis training.

Several years later he graduated cum laude in the field of computer science and followed that with a position in a bank in Kingston, soon moving up to the head teller position. While he clearly was being successful, Keston also realized that his education and work were not fulfilling his real ambition -- to become a pilot.

Interest in aviation has grown in St. Vincent since the recent opening of a new international airport. It's helping spur the tourism economy while also creating an immediate need for new pilots for the growing number of local airlines.

Keston has begun working toward his goal of becoming a commercial pilot. He will be beginning training shortly in a commercial aviation program in Florida. As might be expected, it is both a difficult and expensive career option to pursue. Keston's HBW Memorial Fund grant is providing an initial first step toward his goals and is helping secure the educational loans he will need to complete the commercial airline pilot training program.

Hometown: Minneapolis, Minnesota **Area of Interest:** Music and Film

Ryan Bloomingdale looks at the world in a different way than most of us. He tends to see it in terms of the music he composes and performs, the poetry he writes, the photographs he takes and the films he makes. Yes, he is someone with artistic talent and someone driven to produce original creations that communicate to the world.

Now a senior at the Minneapolis College of Art and Design, Ryan applied for the HBW Memorial Fund Grant to help fund the recording studio and instruments that he will need as he completes his senior thesis in the coming year. An accomplished mu-

Hometown: Columbia, Illinois **Area of Interest:** Art Entrepreneur

All it takes is a steady hand, patience, and a good deal of artistic talent. Seventeen year-old Carter Nelson has all of that and when he adds a sunny day and a magnifying glass he has the basics for the "Burning Love" business he is developing and for which he is receiving a Hunter Watson Memorial Fund grant.

This young entrepreneur is starting a business in "solar pyrography," an artistic endeavor that uses the focused power of the sun to burn creative designs into wood. Carter's business will personalize these artistic efforts by

allowing his clients to choose the design wanted and, if desired, even to supply a piece of wood with special significance for the client onto which the original design will be burned.

Carter, a junior in high school and a gifted competitive swimmer, has a love for the outdoors and nature which is part of the reason for using the sun's power to help create his art. He also wants his business to be aiding the community and is designating ten percent of the company's proceeds to support the Soul River charity, a group that benefits veterans suffering from PTSD and inner-city youth by creating opportunities for them to experience nature.

His creative talents and his entrepreneurial passion closely matches the talents and interests that Hunter Watson displayed in his life.

50% of Potomac High School Students Sign "Hunter's Pledge"

The Potomac School's Boys Leading Boys Club is the first to sponsor this campaign at a High School where they were able to get more than half the students at the high school to sign Hunter's Pledge Not to Drive Distracted. Hunter Watson was a graduate of The Potomac School along with 7 members of the HBW Fund Founders Committee.

Boys Leading Boys' mission is to bring together young men, in order to raise awareness about sexual assault and explore key principals of consent. In addition to learning about sexual assault and the principles of consent, Boys leading Boys provides a path for young men to make significant change within the male culture to create a world where sexual assault does not exist

Two Unspeakable Losses Brought Fraternity Brothers Together

Greek Students Continue Syracuse's Safe Driving Week



The two tragic accidents happened just a few months apart.

It was late 2016. The members of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity's Syracuse University Chapter began the school year reeling from the death of their brother and friend, 20-year-old Hunter Watson. Earlier that summer, Hunter had died as a passenger in a distracted driving accident. Then, in October, the chapter lost a second brother when senior Vinny Maugeri was fatally injured after his car crashed and caught fire.

Eric "Rick" Donlick and Cam Kerry had just begun their freshman year at Syracuse. The student deaths rocked this closeknit college community, and the young men recall the deep impression made on them by members of Phi Kappa Psi who paid glowing was clear these guys genuinely 14,000." care about each other," Rick says. "Yes," Cam echoes, "hearing about Hunter was extremely influential in my choosing to join this strong brotherhood."

With the support of Hunter's father, Jerry Watson, the brothers held their campus's first-ever "Safe Driving Week" that fall. The effort was a campus-wide campaign to spread awareness of — beginning with a candlelight vigil in honor of Hunter. (It was during this week that Maugeri lost his life.)

Repeating the effort in 2017, Rick and Cam took part in preparing to reach even more students. Distributing educational literature and awareness-building mementos at tables set up throughout campus, they and their chapter brothers worked hard to urge as many fellow students as possible to sign Hunter's pledge to end distracted driving.

This October, as philanthropy co-chairs, Rick and Cam, along with Aram Leighton, spearheaded the initiative in its third year.

"It keeps growing every year. This year we raised almost \$6,000 in charitable donations for safe driving, and we got an additional 1,200 students to sign the pledge," Cam notes. "That's on top of over 3,500 signatures from the past two years. That's a pretty good percentage of students given that tribute to Hunter and Vinny. 

Thankfully, many large companies like ATT, Toyota, and AAA are using PSA's to make people aware of the dangers of distracted driving. However, the research shows that the most effective tool is the use of a written, signed pledge - just what the HBW Fund is doing already!

So, it appears that gaining a written pledge is a worthwhile way to increase the likelihood that behavior change efforts will have effective long-term results. This supports the HBW Fund's distracted driving campaign strategy to save lives by reducing the incidence of distracted driving.

A Pledge Brother's Mom Gets Involved

Hunter was a pledge brother and friend of my son Jack at Syracuse; his death devastated Jack and his entire fraternity. Having lost my mother at age 16, I could relate to the pain that the boys felt in the loss of someone so young. For most, it was their first experience losing a friend so suddenly and it had a tremendous impact on them.

To make sure Hunter would not be forgotten, Jack became actively involved with the HBW Memorial Fund scholarship committee at Syracuse. Several fraternity brothers as well as Hunter's other friends got tattoos to never forget him!

Learning about Hunter and his family compelled me to help, so we began supporting the HBW Fund. I was impressed by an unexpected thank you call from his father -- his passion was contagious. As a family, we participate in the charities we support, like volunteering and donating food and other things people need. So, I feel inspired to become more involved with the HBW Fund, and, I intend to explore ways to do so. Our family supports causes with a clear and strong message. To me, the HBW Fund's message is that there are consequences to everything we do, and unfortunately, Hunter's death was the consequence of someone else's action. The HBW Fund's support for distracted driving campaigns to educate college kids to drive responsibly is a powerful message.

I think it's important for the HBW Fund to grow and expand and I would be happy to help. I have experience in this area - I started a company in Chicago and expanded it to 20 markets in 11 years. We had a non-profit component as well.

I would definitely ask my friends and family to support the HBW Fund. By setting up a recurring monthly gift we became HBW Fund mentors early, and we encourage others to consider doing so. We are in the habit of making year end gifts to our favorite charities, and we do that as well.

I think high school age students would benefit tremendously from distracted driving campaigns as well because more high school kids (than college kids) have cars. Many students in high school, as in my own family, drive to their sports and activities, their jobs, their social events. They are new drivers too. The education should start before they even get their licenses.

(Boulder, CO):



played a lot of roles but there are none I'm prouder of than my role as a member of the Founder's Committee for the Hunter Watson Fund.

Hunter Watson was my friend and anyone who called Hunter a friend is a very lucky person indeed. He touched people's hearts in such a genuine and caring way. At his memorial service, they played videos that Hunter's dad recorded every year on his birthday. In one video, his dad asked him, "Who are your best friends." Hunter replied, "I don't want to name them because I don't want to leave any one out." That was the Hunter I knew . . . always working to make everyone in the room feel welcome and appreciated.

Hunter was also one of the most multi-talented human beings I know. I used to tease him, "You're so annoying. You're good at everything." At one point, he and I decided we were going to make a rap music mix tape. Neither one of us knew how to rap. But Hunter set his mind to it and, sure enough, he was good at that too.

I still think of Hunter regularly. When I'm at a music festival and think, "Hunter would love this band." And each year when I review the applications from young people applying for grants from the Hunter Watson Fund. I read every application attentively and ask myself... "What would Hunter like about this person?" and "Do I see some of Hunter in this person's dreams?"

It's the time of year when I can most feel Hunter's presence. What makes this organization so amazing is that it really is carrying on who Hunter was and keeping his spirit alive. Hunter understood that he was privileged to be able to pursue his passion for music, sports and entrepreneurship. He believed every person should have the same opportunity to pursue their dreams. And now, through the Hunter Watson Fund grants, he is making that possible for dozens of young people.

I spoke to Hunter just a couple days before he died. Hunter had noticed my Facebook posts were not as perky as usual, so he called to check on me. He listened as I told him how much dating sucked. I'll never forget the last thing he said to me. "Well, Abs, all guys have issues but just try to choose the nicest one. You'll be fine because you're a good person and good people find good people."

I guess good people really do find good people and I'm deeply grateful that I found Hunter Watson in my life. Let's all continue to keep his spirit alive by generously supporting the Hunter Watson Fund.

I Would Not be Alive Today if Not for Hunter

I'll never forget the day I got the phone call telling me Hunter Watson had died. I was home sitting at the dinner table with my parents. We all broke down.

My parents had never met Hunter, and at the time I couldn't have told you much about him. Regardless, we did know the world had just lost one of its most remarkable people.

I had only met Hunter once. It was the night that he saved my life.

I literally wouldn't be here today if not for Hunter's kindness and courage. It's hard for me to talk about what happened, but if sharing my story helps others see how good he was and encourages people to lend their support to the charity that bears his name, I'm happy to tell it a hundred times and more.

One night during my senior year of college, I had been out drinking with friends and I decided to go to another bar alone. It was December in Syracuse, NY. The next thing I knew, I woke up in the hospital.

I had suffered from severe hypothermia. My body temperature had been so low that if I had stayed in the cold another 10 minutes, I would have died. The doctors said that someone found me and put me in his car to warm up and get me home. When he realized how much I needed help, he called an ambulance to take me to the hospital.

That someone was Hunter Watson. He asked to remain anonymoushe didn't want a reward or accolades. I later learned through a mutual friend that it was Hunter, and I am so grateful that I was later able to thank Hunter for what he did.

Now, I am so proud to be doing something in his honor – serving on the Founders' Committee for the Hunter Watson Memorial Fund. There's a beautiful serendipity to it all.

I have learned so much about myself in the years since that cold night in Syracuse. I've learned to be passionate about life and to pursue the things that really get me up in the morning. That's what the Hunter Watson Fund is all about . . . helping fuel young people's passions by providing grants to help them pursue their dreams. There's nothing short of amazing and incredible about the young people who we are helping. They are doing incredibly important and unique things with their lives.

At the end of the day, what happened to me could happen to anyone. Rather than letting this experience slow me down and hold me back, I have pushed myself to be a better person. I became someone who looks out for others... just like Hunter did for me. It's the least I can do .. . and wouldn't the world be a lot better if more people did that?


