

Opposition and resistance from within all branches of the military made a real difference to the course of America's engagement in Vietnam, and helped end the war. This exhibit shows how the GI Movement unfolded, from numerous antiwar coffeehouses outside military bases, to hundreds of GI newspapers giving voice to active soldiers, to stockade revolts and resistance on naval vessels and in the Air Force.

The exhibit and its companion book include first-hand accounts and images of underground newspapers, posters, flyers and photographs documenting soldiers' and verterans' resistance.
