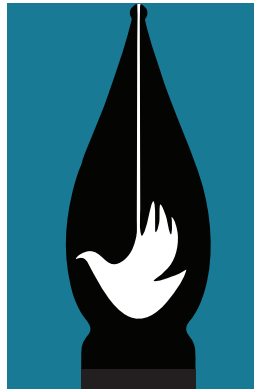

Opposition and resistance from within all branches of the military made a real difference to the course of America's engagement in Vietnam, and helped end the war. This exhibit shows how the GI Movement unfolded, from numerous antiwar coffeehouses outside military bases, to hundreds of GI newspapers giving voice to active soldiers, to stockade revolts and resistance on naval vessels and in the Air Force.

The exhibit and its companion book include first-hand accounts and images of underground newspapers, posters, flyers and photographs documenting soldiers' and veterans' resistance.

### Essay Contest

The North Carolina Triangle Veterans For Peace will award a \$500 prize for the best student essay (400 - 650 words) on "Waging Peace in Vietnam: What it means to me and its lessons for today." Open to all Triangle Area students.

The panel of judges includes two Vietnam veterans and the renowned poet, memoirist and National Book Award finalist, Carolyn Forché—Ms. Forché is the recipient of the Juan E. Méndez Book Award for Human Rights in Latin America, to be awarded March 2 by Duke's Human Rights Center at the Franklin Humanities Institute.
