Meet four of the thousands of soldiers and sailors who paid a price for opposing the war.

Susan Schnall, Navy nurse sentenced to six months hard labor for dropping thousands of flyers from a plane onto SF Bay military installations and then leading and speaking at an antiwar rally.

Mike Wong, drafted in 1968 but chose exile in Canada rather than deployment to Vietnam. Returning to San Francisco, he served as a draft and military counselor during the Persian Gulf War.

William Short, incarcerated twice at the US Army's Long Binh jail in Vietnam for refusing to continue killing Vietnamese.

David Cortright, labeled a troublemaker by the US Army and transferred after he refused to stop his girlfriend from protesting the war. Plaintiff in the famous first amendment lawsuit, Cortright v. Resor.

Also, **Diane Winston**, Knight Chair in Media and Religion, USC Annenberg School and **Dana Moss** (moderator) Assistant Professor of Sociology, University of Notre Dame.
