Program Notes

I. Wandering, Seeking, Separation, and Community

Tonight's program focuses on those who have been separated from their families, and encourages each of us to work in our own way to help bring families together. We start with an exploration of children separated both from family and homeland as a result of the dangerous conditions they face. Thus they wander, sometimes great distances and at significant risk. We will wander with them tonight; we will learn about the Journey of Hope program which houses children who have been separated from their families in this way, and we will learn about some of the many social service programs offered by Holy Family Institute.

We recognize that, in our own way, each of us is a wanderer; each a seeker. While we may seek different things, in different ways, we come wired with this basic purpose. The thrilling opening composition by Jonathan Dove urges us to "Seek Him That Maketh the Seven Stars," a quest which promises to "turn darkness into morning." We musically transform this encouragement over the course of the first part of the program into a suggestion that we each work to turn darkness into morning by creating community in our midst: *Let us, shall we*: stick together ... abide with us ... stand by us ... and (in German), "Bleib bei uns," so that, working together, we can alleviate some of the suffering around us.

Melissa Dunphy's "Dancing in Buses" takes us to Latin America, where we groove to Reggaeton dance music. We move our bodies, carry a boombox; we learn to dance: put your hands in the air; twist them as if picking limes. We do the "rake" the "sweep," the "Horchata scoop." Feel free to take a spot on the dance floor! ... And then, suddenly, ... it's a dance no longer! You see, Dancing in Buses tells the story of a Dreamer. The poetry of Javier Zamora, from his collection "Unaccompanied," tells of his harrowing experience as a 9-year-old travelling from his Salvadoran homeland during the ravages of that country's civil war in the 1990s. His relatives put him on a northbound bus in order to reunite him with his family. The bus was hijacked and he disappeared for three weeks. This music reminds us powerfully of both the exuberant joy of childhood, dancing, and travel, as well as the very real dangers that these children experience. We are grateful to Ms. Dunphy for donating the score for this performance to VoiceGivers.

II. Kids ... Should Be Just Kids: Separation and Reconciliation

We acknowledge that there is much suffering in the world. We can't always stop it. At the same time, we are not afraid to act—each of us carries within ourselves the ability to relieve some of this suffering. The spiritual "Great Day" invites the "valiant-hearted" to join our quest.

When we started this year's VoiceGivers project seeking "Hope and Help for Vulnerable Children," we had no idea that the children that we learned about could be filled with so much joy. Nor did we realize how much we would learn from their spirit as they strive to make the most of their world, how much they are just normal kids with child-like sensibilities and interests. We celebrate childhood with "De Colores," a traditional Spanish language folksong about the wonders of bright colors. It has been popular in Latin America since the colonial era. Another popular Spanish language song, "Sólo le Pido a Dios," asks, "May we not be indifferent to the suffering of others," and observes that a person who must go to live in a different culture can become hollowed out.

"Pasar la Vida," or "Hymn of Life" offers hope for those who wander. The piece describes four different kinds of wanderers: the wandering shepherd (trashumante), the walker or pilgrim (caminante), the sailor (navegante), and the immigrant (inmigrante). The first four stanzas develop haunting images of what motion means for each of these; and each stanza concludes with a solo summary. The piece also describes some of the joys of wandering, including the realization that "amazing sky and sea offer themselves to the one who is a lover of what is found through a wandering adventure." The stanza on immigrants observes that they "always live in the moment because it is all and none at the same time" and describes the shame of being branded "illegal." The final stanza brings back each of the four wanderers and concludes with the hope that, despite "old wounds," each of them will embrace their fate and become a "militant inhabitant of life." The piece concludes with a beautiful musical flowering, showing the way forward as the adventure continues with positive and uplifting energy. The lyrics are by Jorge Mansilla Torres, a Bolivian national who was forced to live away from his home country for many years.

"Away and in Danger" is an arrangement of the traditional Christmas carol, with additional lyrics—and strikingly poignant harmonies—addressing the differences and similarities between modern refugees and a refugee from long ago who had no crib for a bed. It was premiered by the Los Angeles choir Tonality on a program focusing on the plight of refugees. We invite you to join us in the familiar portions, and are grateful to Mr. Kirchner for donating the score for this performance.

III. Holy Family: Reconciliation and Community, Allowing Space for Hope and Joy

We learn through Leonard Bernstein's wit that, in fact, a ten year-old is a person, too. And it's not just because they may be cute, or curious, or fun to watch when they play with a balloon. In fact, they are imbued with the same essential human attributes that we all share (and thus are worthy of our care and attention).

When we were first discussing this program with some of the Holy Family staff, Senior Vice President Liz Stephenson observed that it sometimes seems easier for the public to understand and empathize with the plight of immigrant refugees from far away than with those right here in our local communities who suffer, and are in need. She will describe some of the ways that Holy Family Institute addresses these needs.

Then, fresh off of Liz's heartening words, our program engages in a hopeful and joyous sprint to the finish. We learn from Dolly Parton in the song "Light of a Clear Blue Morning" that we can, in fact, see light, even after a long dark night. "You Do Not Walk Alone," by the wonderful young composer Dominick DiOrio, reminds us that part of the path to light is generated by standing together as a community, working together to help each other in difficult times. We close with the wild, romping Spanish dance, "El Vito," a tour de force which calls for two pianists and the full vocal resources of the ensemble. These pieces address the clarity and hope and triumph that come when we help others and also help to express our belief in the role of music itself in addressing the world's problems. Given its comforting abilities, we implicitly believe that music is an ideal vehicle for a program devoted to support for those who suffer. In addition, music and song serve as a metaphor—that is, music and singing as a metaphor for the good work that we seek to do in the world, as well as the joy with which we do it.

Biographies

Joseph Stuligross, VoiceGivers Artistic Director, is Conductor of the University Singers at the Mary Pappert School of Music at Duquesne University. He is active as both a singer and choral conductor, and has earned a Bachelor's degree from the College of Wooster in Ohio and a Master's degree in Choral Conducting from the University of Wisconsin. In addition, Mr. Stuligross has completed advanced conducting study at West Virginia University and has studied conducting with renowned conductors Robert Fountain, Joseph Flummerfelt, Simon Carrington, Robert Page and Paul Salamunovich. He has conducted singers of all ages and skill levels, including many years directing high school-age groups at the Lawrenceville School in New Jersey. He has also conducted college-age singers as well as amateur and professional adults, guided by the belief that all are capable of honest and genuine musical expression. He continues to serve as Choir Director at Waverly Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh.

In addition to his musical interests, Mr. Stuligross served for many years as a federal court and appellate litigator for the United Steelworkers.

Kyle Davies, Piano. As a pianist, composer and organist, Kyle has had a lifelong passion for music. He brings this passion to each of his musical endeavors. Kyle earned a Master of Music degree in Piano Performance from Syracuse University. During his time at Syracuse, he served as both affiliate artist and graduate teaching assistant. Kyle attained his Bachelor of Music degree from Susquehanna University. Kyle possesses extensive experience in solo and collaborative performing and has concertized in several states. Currently he serves as Director of Music Ministries at St. Valentine Catholic Church in Bethel Park, PA.

Daryl Shawn, Guitar, grew up among Amish farms in rural Pennsylvania, studied classical and flamenco guitar in between jazz classes at Berklee College of Music, then moved to Oaxaca, Mexico, where he spent five years focusing on the solo guitar before settling in Pittsburgh. He has released seven albums and performed over 500 times in 33 states, as well as Canada and Mexico. His videos have been viewed over a half a million times on YouTube. He maintains a full schedule of solo performances in Pittsburgh, and also streams a live "micro-concert" every weekday at 5 pm on his Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/darylshawnmusic).

Jordan Bender, Percussion, is a junior at the University of Pittsburgh pursuing a double degree in computer science and music with a concentration in percussion performance. He is a percussionist and pianist trained in classical music and jazz and is also proficient at musical theater. At Pitt, he is a member of and has been a featured performer in the university orchestra and the jazz ensemble. Jordan also is playing in the pit orchestra for theater productions from Pitt Stages and the Pitt Musical Theatre Club. He is also a composer and arranger.

Thank you for attending this, the second performance in the inaugural season of *VoiceGivers*, a new, professional-caliber chamber choir that works with nonprofit organizations to raise funds and awareness of community issues.

We understand that one of the reasons audience members, including maybe you, are here is to support a cherished nonprofit organization and the profound work that it does. Your presence and our purpose go beyond the momentary gratification of an entertaining evening. We acknowledge and applaud that purpose and your attendance. May this time be nourishing and fulfilling for you.

We also recognize that the world today bombards us with an extraordinary volume of information, often in ways that lead to paralysis rather than action. "What can I possibly do to help?" we sometimes hear people say, with a sense of frustration and powerlessness. We strive to encourage deep engagement with issues and connections with the organizations that work toward solutions. *VoiceGivers* musical programs are integrated with the mission of each partnering nonprofit. The excitement of music follows an emotional arc interspersed with exploration of community issues and the work that the nonprofit does to address them.

This season, dedicated to *Help and Hope for Vulnerable Children*, deepens our understanding of three issues and associated nonprofit organizations. In fall 2019, we joined with the **Pediatric Palliative Care Coalition** (ppcc-pa.org) to explore the challenges faced by caregivers of children with medically complex diagnoses.

Today's program spotlights **Holy Family Institute** (https://doi.org/linear.com, an organization that offers a wealth of social services to children and adults, including the Journey of Hope program (https://doi.org/journey-of-hope), which cares for children arriving at our southern border without parents or legal guardians. The dedicated staff of Holy Family offer shelter, food, clothing, counseling, recreation, and education to these children, who typically stay for 30-45 days before being placed with family members or qualified sponsors.

On May 9, we support **Wilkinsburg Community Ministry** (wcm15221.org), an emergency food pantry and meals program serving Wilkinsburg and neighboring communities. That program will explore challenges of hunger; it will be held at Waverly Presbyterian Church in Regent Square.

We are so grateful to the spectacular singers who have volunteered time, energy, and talent in support of this mission. We are especially thankful to the team at Holy Family Institute who have taught us so much about these issues and have been so easy and fruitful to work with in preparation for today's performance.
