
### **DVAA Book Group: List for 2023**




The Passion of Artemisia, by Susan Vreeland David Deakin will lead




Harlem Renaissance: Hub of African-American Culture, 1920-1930, Steven Watson Bill Brookover will lead






# Flying Couch: A Graphic Memoir, by Amy Kurzwell. Linda Dubin Garfield will lead.




#### The Last Painting of Sara de Vos, by Dominic Smith




#### Portrait of an Unknown Woman, by Daniel Silva

## **Off the Wall: Portrait of Robert Rauschenberg**, by Calvin Tomkins


From Goodreads: "Off the Wall chronicles the astonishingly creative period of the 1950's and 1960's in American art.




**Attribution** by Linda Moore Susan Richards will lead
