A WOMEN-LED PACIFIC COMMUNITY RADIO ALLIANCE

"(We have) Lots of little peacebuilders doing work but to have a Pacific network is central. We can pool resources and respond to conflict, we can address these issues quickly rather than waiting for groups to come in. When we pool resources, we have people on the ground to share resources and information with."

FemTALK 89FM is a flagship radio station of a Pacific women-led regional media alliance that, since its establishment in 2004, continues to facilitate a vibrant multiracial rural community media network.

In 2016 we were the first Pacific media organisation to join the UNWomen Media Compact reflecting our commitment to progress the commitments in Section J of the Beijing Platform for Action, including our role as the Pacific coordinator of the Global Media Monitoring Project (GMMP).

FemTALK 89FM Suva remains an important broadcast hub of regional priorities raised by our network partners.

Capitalising on regional network meetings — such as the Regional CSO Forum on Peace and Human Security and the Pacific Feminist Forum, we have been able to produce content for broadcast and podcast, and for our You-Tube channel which bridges the gap in content for and about Pacific Island women.

Our community radio approach also strengthens the participation of young women including rural women, dis-

"We have these MASI - Media Association of Solomon Islands - but MASI is still a patriarchy association...and we had a training last week you know building towards the 16 Days of activism for all media reporter and most of the media reporters they say that they have male editors (so) it's a bit hard for them to push for women's stories in the paper and radio so that's one of the challenges. So that is how I started this Women In Media and Communication in Solomon Islands because we think that, yes we have value; we need to put our stories upfront but in doing so we need to be empowered first so it's a network of women working in media, coming together and it's never been done in the past so it's like empowering, sharing from these experiences, pushing gender equality agenda forward." At the inaugural Pacific Feminist Forum held in Suva, Fiji, as the media partner, we demonstrated the role of our feminist media network and contributed to discussions on the role of communications activism and women's rights in the pacific advocating on community media practice.

Peace on the Airwaves

Part of our contribution towards International Day of Peace in 2016 saw the adoption of "Peace on the Airwaves" as the network theme with our partners focusing on local and national productions:

Fiji:

26 Suva based civil society groups and leaders as well as women leaders from local groups in our central division network participated in a 2-day broadcast event on femTALK 89FM.

Bougainville:


In Port Moresby, two daytime talk-back radio programmes were produced that targeted older and younger listeners via the National Broadcasting Commission (NBC) and FM100.

Tonga:

In Nukualofa, the Talitha Project conducted 2 major broadcasting events including a media partnership with Tonga Broadcasting that resulted in a 15-minute video on "Youth and Peace" as well as a 2 hour "Peace on the Airwaves" radio programme titled "Building Blocks for Peace with the Longolongo Youth Choir."

Solomon Islands:

"Peace on the Airwaves" was also incorporated into Vois Blong Mere's weekly programme as part of their team for the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation (SIBC) which featured CSO and police representatives.



In 2017 our women-led community media alliance, with the broadcast and production hub based at femLINKpacific's Suva community media centre resulted in 8093 community radio broadcast hours, more than 600 women featured in radio programmes in more than 400 radio programmes during district, divisional, national and regional convenings. These women leaders featured in online and print media publications such as Community Radio Times and Pasifika Peace Talanoa. Key recommendations were published in the Women's Human Security First reports and the 2016 Policy for Peace.

We also produced 24 episodes of the Radio with Pictures series with Fiji Television.

femTALK89FM

femTALK89FM, as our flagship radio station in Suva, continues to facilitate a vibrant multiracial rural community media network that remains a key tool in localizing Section J of the Beijing Platform for Action in the Pacific.

Our regional media network continues to enable more women to access the media whether they feature in community media initiatives, including our community radio broadcasts, interactive dialogue with government officials, television simulcasts and even television current affairs programmes.

"(The) media is very male focused, everything being said and pictured is all male, even when a female journalist was there (the story is) often speaking about men."
