## Martha Chaves

#### COMEDIAN

Martha Chaves is a Latin-Canadian-LGBTQ awardwinning comedian, actor, activist, and playwright.

With her unique sense of humour, friendly-in-yourface style, and devilish charm, Martha paints hilarious stories drawn heavily from personal experiences, like her upbringing in Latin America. She came to Canada as a refugee, but Martha has established herself as one of the country's most sought-after comedians.

She's known throughout Canada for her coast-tocoast stand-up tours and for her tailor-made corporate shows, her many appearances on the Just for Laughs Festival, the Winnipeg Comedy Festival, The Debaters, and as a regular cast member of the hit CBC show Because News.

She starred in her two national comedy specials: Comics! on the CBC and Something About Martha on the Comedy Network. Martha won Stand-up Comic of the Year at the 2018 Canadian Comedy Awards, and her comedy album, "CHUNKY SALSA," was featured among the 11 Best Comedy Albums of 2019 (Interrobang Magazine.)


She is also a fierce human rights activist, using humour to challenge the status quo in four different languages. She's the host of "When Feminists Rule the World"- a new podcast series produced by The Nobel Women's Initiative, which is run by five Nobel Peace Prize winners.

# Amanda Rheaume

#### SINGER. SONGWRITER

One of Rheaume's great gifts as a songwriter is her ability to take the personal and make it universal, drawing upon her own experience to deliver messages with a wide resonance.

She digs deep on The Skin I'm In, reflecting upon her Metis heritage, as on the profoundly moving title track and "Return To The Water," and addressing issues of identity and mental health. Her earlier albums met with widespread critical acclaim.

2013's Keep A Fire earned her a 2014 Canadian Folk Music Award for Aboriginal Songwriter of The Year as well as a Juno Award nomination for Aboriginal Album of the Year, while 2016's Holding Patterns received a Canadian Folk Music Awards nomination. An engaging performer, Rheaume has developed a following across Canada and in Europe, where she tours regularly.

She has long employed her music as a force for good, as shown by three trips to Afghanistan to perform for Canadian military personnel, plus visits to the Alert base in Canada's far north and the Indigenous community of Attawapiskat.


Rheaume co-founded Babes4Breasts, an initiative that, through concerts and recording projects, raised money for breast cancer charities across Canada over a 10-year period. This is an artist with a heart as big as her talent.

# Jonathan Nathaniel

#### **ACTOR & ADVOCATE**

Jonathan Nathaniel is an unapologetically queer, Black Canadian television actor and 2SLGBTQIA+ rights advocate, based in Toronto, whose affable and gutsy personality landed him a seat 'on the couch' for 3 seasons of MTV Canada and LOGO's 2009 groundbreaking, sleeper hit '1 Girl 5 Gays'.

Its personal, provocative and progressive nature is what garnered the show its fervent cult following and a cemented its place in queer television history.

Jonathan started performing and training in theatre as a child and, after graduating from the Dramatic Arts Program at Mayfield Secondary School, moved to Toronto to continue training and embark on a career as a professional actor in television and film.

Between work on various television productions, Jonathan co-produced and starred in 3 short films that had successful screenings on the film festival circuit including Toronto's Inside Out LGBT Film Festival at TIFF Bell Lightbox and ReelWorld.



## Rahim Thawer

#### INTL ADVOCATE

Rahim Thawer has had a strong presence in Canada's LGBTQ community since he began working in the HIV/AIDS sector in 2009.

He works as a psychotherapist, clinical supervisor, facilitator and public speaker, sessional lecturer, writer, and community organizer. Rahim loves all things mental health and is particularly interested in examining innovation in queer relationships.

Whether in a classroom or therapy consulting room, he strives to operate from a harm reduction, sex-positive, anti-oppressive and trauma-informed approach providing psychotherapy to newcomer, racialized, queer, trans and HIV-affected communities around issues of anxiety, depression, trauma, body image, and problem substance use. This is complemented by his vast public speaking portfolio, which is both thematically and regionally diverse spanning from Toronto to Ottawa, Winnipeg to Vancouver, and from New York to Austin to Atlanta.


He developed curriculum for a number of courses in Centennial College's Addiction and Mental Health Worker Program (AMHW) before its launch in Fall 2016.

Rahim was one of the co-founders of Ismaili Queers: Advocates for Pluralism and dedicated almost 10 years to community organizing with Salaam Canada, a national volunteer-run LGBTQ Muslim organization. He was also a co-editor and essay contributor in a local history anthology entitled Any Other Way: How Toronto Got Queer, which was shortlisted for the 2017 Toronto Book Awards.

#### **Gavin Crawford**

#### CANADIAN TREASURE

Gavin was born in Taber, Alberta. After graduating from the BFA Acting Program at the University of British Columbia, Gavin moved to Toronto where he quickly took the comedy scene by storm.

His unique style of performing character monologues in a stand-up setting got him noticed by Toronto's famed Second City where he joined the cast in 1998 for two main-stage productions: Y2K: The Chip Hits the Fan and Nude Beachwear, 100% Off.

In 2000, The Gavin Crawford Show was a critical success for the Comedy Network. Following international recognition, he would star in 8 seasons of This Hour has 22 Minutes on CBC. during which he created countless original characters and interviewed many politicians, (including Prime Minister Stephen Harper) often in character as teen correspondent Mark Jackson.

After 8 successful years with 22 Minutes, Gavin made the difficult decision to leave the show. His most recent work includes a recurring role on the upcoming series 24 Hour Rental and his 1/2 hour pilot, Gavin Crawford's Wild West aired on CBC in July, and he continues to perform live with upcoming solo shows at Montreal's Just For Laughs Festival and the Edinburgh Fringe.


Today you can hear Gavin on Because News on CBC. He is also a regular at Fringe festivals and live performances.

## Tim McCaskell

#### **HIV ACTIVIST**

Growing up in the little town of Beaverton Ontario, well before the "decriminalization" of same sex sex, seems an unlikely springboard for a life associated with queer activism. But Tim McCaskell was soon caught up in the anti-war, anti-establishment movements of the 60s and 70s which finally led him to gay liberation.

Tim came out at Toronto Pride in August 1974 and soon joined the collective of The Body Politic (TBP), Canada's national gay liberation magazine. When police raided Toronto bay baths and arrested hundreds of men in February 1981 he was part of The Right to Privacy Committee, helping organize the massive demonstrations and community response. By the mid 80s his work as the international news editor for TBP put him in touch with Simon Nkoli, the leading gay anti-aparthied activist in South Africa, and he helped organize the Simon Nkoli Anti-Apartheid Committee, building support for anti- apartheid activism in queer communities in Canada.

He also worked at the Toronto Board of Education for 20 years doing anti-racism and antihomophobia work among students and teachers.

Tim has been living with HIV since the early 80s and was a founding member of AIDS ACTION NOW! which fought against government indifference to the epidemmic, and demanded research and access to treatments for People Living with AIDS/HIV. He continued his social justice work with Queers Against Israeli Apartheid in Toronto, and later with the No Pride In Policing Coalition, supporting Black Lives Matter's demand for an end to uniformed police participation in Toronto's Pride parade

# Lenore MacAdam LEADER IN DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION

Lenore MacAdam is the Head of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion at Corus Entertainment. In this role, Lenore leads the design, development and execution of the company's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion strategy. Previously, Lenore was the National Inclusion Leader at Deloitte Canada, reporting to the Chief Inclusion Officer, where she also served as the National Chair of the LGBTQ Employee Resource Group, and the Accessibility Employee Resource Group. She has previously worked in management consulting, focusing primarily on organizational development and process efficiency. She has worked in employee engagement, performance management, innovation, culture, and policy development.

She is a frequent panelist and speaker at events related to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. As a volunteer, Lenore has served as the Chair of the Board of three organizations – Pride Toronto, Pride at Work Canada, and Community One Foundation. She has also served as a Board Member at Springtide Resources, Canadian Business SenseAbility, and the Nexus Group at the Rotman School of Management.

She was also a member of the Employer's
Partnership Table within the Accessibility
Directorate of Ontario, which was formed to advise
the government on innovative ways to connect
persons with disabilities to the job market.

In May 2015, Lenore started a series of networking breakfasts for women in the LBTQ2S communities. Over the next two years, the breakfasts grew to a national program, taking place in ten cities across Canada. The breakfast series was sponsored by Pride at Work Canada and Deloitte Canada.

Lenore received the Canadian Centre for Diversity and Inclusion's Award of Success in the "Community Contributor of the Year" category in 2018, and the Deloitte Lynda Bowles Spirit Award in 2019. Lenore has a BAH in Communications from Queen's University and an MBA from the Rotman School of Management at the University of Toronto Keep learning:





In 2020, amid a global pandemic, Shelly founded UPlift Black (http://upliftblack.org) the first social service agency dedicated to increasing the visibility and socio-economic development of the black community in Simcoe/Muskoka. To combat homophobia among the black community and to challenge misogynoir, UPlift Black is anchored in 2SLGBTQ+ inclusivity, with hopes of leading the change in what it means to be a diverse and inclusive social agency.


Overall, Shelly brings passion, leadership and drive to everything she does, and she is an inspiration to people of various backgrounds to become the leaders their communities sorely need.

Larry is currently the Executive Vice President of the Canadian Labour Congress, Canada's largest labour body representing over 3 million unionized workers



Fully engaged, whether singing and fundraising for AIDS-HIV and other causes, upon returning to the Public Service in 2003, he found his true calling - serving those who serve the public - as an elected union leader, defending those whose rights were being disrespected in the workplace, including and especially 2SLGBTQI workers.


Our work will never be done, as long as hate is given space. Therefore, let us continue our long march on the moral arc of the universe, with love, hope and optimism!

The moment her heels hit the stage, the passion and effort is evident showcasing creativity and humour, and enchanting audiences across North America with a signature style of beauty, glamour and fashion.

From glamorous showstoppers to club kid cool, you never know what to expect from this multitalented illusionist.

Icesis Couture's love for the art of Drag and the creative outlet it provides is what fuels her to keep evolving and pushing the boundaries of performance art, providing an entertainment spectacle and experience that leaves her appreciative audiences howling for more.

A leader in Canada's drag community, Icesis has raised thousands of dollars for local and national 2SLGBTQIA+ charities. Icesis believes that art has the power to transform realities and tell stories.

In 2021, Icesis Couture modelled the Amsterdam Rainbow Dress. The dress is made from the flags of countries where queer and trans identities are illegal. As rights change, flags are removed from the dress and replaced with rainbow flags.
