2020 In Review



Cultivating Healthy Food

- Grew and distributed 60,000 lbs. of fresh produce up 9,000 lbs. from last year's 51K last year - the most food we have ever grown
- 341,000 servings up from 290k last year
- Serviced over 90 diverse families through our CSA Veggie Membership Program
- Constructed two new Greenhouses on Steele Ave - Our 5th farm site in the neighborhood



Educating Our Community

- Grew Backyard Garden Program with 9 total home garden installations for neighbors
- Welcomed many people through video farm educational tours online - pre-recorded and live.
- Hosted 10 virtual workshops
- Trained and educated 15 individuals through our internship program



Caring For The Land

- Campus wide created more renewable energy than we consumed making us the first overall Net Zero Organization in Dayton
- Planted over 1000 native plants, trees, and seeds for the purposes of increasing biodiversity, carbon sequestration, and to enhance ecosystem services
- Our total renewable energy creation onsite offset 43,000lbs of C02 from being released into the atmosphere

Dear Community,

Mission of Mary Cooperative celebrated our 10 year anniversary rooted in the Twin Towers neighborhood!

We adapted many of our programs to continue to live out our mission and meet the growing needs during the covid pandemic. Our theme this year was to be a 'People of Hope' even amidst the biggest challenges of our generation. We were able to develop a safety plan that kept all of our staff, interns, and the people we serve covid free.

Mission of Mary yielded an abundance of fruit from our long standing commitment to the people and environment in Dayton. With strong partnerships and dedicated volunteers a few of the fruit of our labor are as follows: served 87 low-income pregnant moms with veggies, built and started operating 2 greenhouses at the new Steele St. garden, grew and distributed over 30 tons of produce, organized 10 digital educational workshops, and planted 1,000 native trees, plants, and seeds.

Mission of Mary will continue to be servant leaders to meet the growing needs in our community in our second decade by being a catalyst and partner for sustainable urban development through food access, education, and restoration.

Mission of Mary Cooperative became the first Lay Marianist founded, operated, and sponsored nonprofit in the U.S. in 2010. Mission of Mary Cooperative was created by a group of residential Lay Marianist communities that were founded in 2007 in the Twin Towers neighborhood of Dayton. In 2009 the first urban farm site was created. The residential Lay Marianist communities invested half a million dollars of value through sweat equity and financial donations from 2007-2014. Through this investment our community founded Mission of Mary Cooperative in 2009 by starting a grassroots urban farm on vacant lots that was based on the Twin Towers neighborhood needs we witnessed through being present to the people and land.

With Bro. Ray Fitz SM and Bro. Tom Pieper SM being spiritual mentors to our community from the beginning as well as currently long-standing board members, they helped us attain legal services through the generous support of the Society of Mary's lawyer to apply for nonprofit status. We were excited to celebrate our 10 year anniversary this past year and look forward to serving and growing as servant leaders for the 2nd decade!

We were able to develop a safety plan that kept all of our staff, interns, and the people we serve covid free. From our in-house online store ordering facilitated by contact free pickups to several virtual farm tours and educational videos on social media to continue educating our community.

- Expanded current infrastructure wash-pack and storage area to meet growing food access needs

Produce Prescriptions

- Formed a new partnership with Dayton Children's Hospital - 15 Produce Prescriptions for patients in their Healthy Me Clinic each week. - October 2020 -April 2021
- Continued Produce Perks partnership with a Produce Prescriptions Expansion at Five Rivers Maternal Health Systems and Centerpoint Health - low income pregnant moms
- 87 low-income pregnant moms and their families received our veggies during 2020.
- Provided a CSA share to patients and their families for six month intervals

Caring for the Land

Our overall vision for the land we steward in our neighborhood is to create beautiful green spaces out of formerly vacant and neglected land. This involves cleaning up dumping, removing invasive plant species and working closely with property owners. We are blessed to now manage over 4.5 acres of land on five separate parcels on which we have organic vegetable production, natural areas repopulated with native vegetation, hoop houses, a community building with a barn and green energy creation, a fruit orchard, and welcoming greenspaces.

We're increasing biodiversity by planting native plants, trees, and seeds for the purposes of increasing biodiversity, carbon sequestration, and to enhance ecosystem services.



Caring for the Land

Accomplishments Around the Neighborhood

- Installed two new greenhouses on Steele Ave for food production
- Educated 7 interns on native land restoration initiatives
- Conducted tree inventory on MMC property
- Started Greenhouse gas (GHG) inventory
- Planted over 1000 native plants, trees, and seeds for the purposes of increasing biodiversity, carbon sequestration, and to enhance ecosystem services

The Year Ahead


In 2021 we will focus on continuing to provide quality programming for youth and adults in our neighborhood who are seeking to become more active and more involved with their food system and their community.
