## FEI IN THE COMMUNITY

In its continued efforts to connect with the community of Upper Saranac Lake, Santa Clara, and the surrounding area, and to gather community support for the approval it needs from the Town to re-establish a youth camp, FEI has provided a number of presentations and an Open Island Event.

### Santa Clara - Community Meeting

On Sunday, May 29, Friends held a casual community information session at the Santa Clara Community Center. Despite a torrential downpour shortly before the start, there was a good showing from the community, as well as supporters of FEI, with a total attendance of about 35.

Paula McGovern and Carole Mackenzie copresented. Paula handled the introductory remarks, overview of FEI's goals, and the current status. Carole narrated the slide tour of the Island, sprinkling her discussion with camp lore and experiences. Rose Foody, Hannah Grill, and Alex Loveall assisted with notes and explanations; providing a younger alum perspective.

Paula then opened it up for Q&A. The community asked some great questions and gave the team the opportunity to delve into FEI's objectives and to dispel misinformation about what the program would and would not include. Several of the community members in attendance spoke out in strong support of the restoration of youth camping on Eagle Island! We could not have said it better than they did!

### **USLA** Meeting

Torrential downpours seemed to be a reoccurring theme for FEI as Chris Wubbolding and Carole Mackenzie and others from FEI attended the USLA Membership meeting on July 9th. Similar to the Santa Clara presentation, Chris provided a detailed outline of FEI's goals and objectives while Carole gave an outstanding virtual tour of island to around 200 attendees. There was some time for discussion and the invitation was extended to visit Eagle Island for its first Open Island day the following day.

### Open Island

It was a special day for over 100 people from the local community who visited Eagle Island on July 10th. For many local residents it was the first time to see



the beauty of the island from the inside (not just peering through the trees to catch a glimpse of an old building or tent platform). Most were able to get themselves to the island by personal motor boat, canoe or kayak. Everyone who attended was amazed. And of course the children loved the beach and some went swimming.

FEI representatives have also been engaging with the community by attending the "Zone Meetings" and other community gatherings. This is a great opportunity to get

to know our neighbors and allows one-on-one time to learn about Eagle Island and the strong organization behind it.

## ON THE ISLAND!!

### Volunteers hard at work!

It's been an extraordinary summer with so much accomplished towards clean up, stabilization, and safety repairs. Thanks to the efforts of many volunteers, our General Contractor Todd Hall, and Crew Chiefs Jim Bowes and Kathy Gilrov, we have much to report. I wish we could list everyone's name who contributed their labor but know that it has not gone unnoticed and we extend a heartfelt THANK YOU!

Work began Memorial Day Weekend and has not ceased. There have been over 100 volunteers during the course of the summer. Some have been back for multiple weekends. Ages have ranged from 16 - 72 (or more!). What started with cleaning and inventory continued with much more serious and professional work in carpentry, electrical and plumbing. Shingles have been stained and are slowly being replaced, as has rotten decking, small staircases, railings, and glazing windows. Brush, branches and trees have been cleared from pathways in preparation for well drilling in mid-August. Old mattresses and debris have made their way over to the dumpster on the mainland. There has been a great showing of Pete's former maintenance crew too!

## Here's a partial sampling of what else has been accomplished so far:

- Mounds of debris hauled off the island including old bicycles, broken furniture, rotted wood, doors and windows piled high under the buildings
- Organization of Carpenter's (Workshop) for our hordes of donated tools!
- Staining thousands of donated cedar shakes
- Window pane replacement, removal of old putty and new window caulking (ongoing)
- Scrubbing and cleaning the inside of all buildings, notably the Kitchen and Dining Hall
- Walk-in Refrigerator is operational
- Mariner Boat House plumbing and (lake) water operational

- Septic System testing with 900 feet of pipe installed to leech field
- Removal of all electrical lines to Adirondack Areas
- Replacement of deteriorated electrical in Main Camp (ongoing)
- Hilltop Platforms refurbished
- Repaired breezeway floor between Family Cabin & Annex
- Obtaining Roofing and structural estimates



## RECENT PURCHASES/DONATIONS



This 1997 New Holland tractor was discovered in NJ through connections and the previous owners Ed and Dolores Kresge agreed to sell it and many of the attachments including log splitter, front loader and backhoe. It was transported up in June and was gently moved to the island on FEI's own barge. This tractor and its accessories will enable FEI to more efficiently dig necessary utility trenches, remove trees and haul just about anything.

A big 'shout-out' to all who have donated tools and especially Tricia Hawley who gave so many that we needed a trailer to take it all to the Upper Saranac Lake.

A GS troop based in Livingston, NJ who aged out donated their remaining funds to purchase a supply of paddles.

While attending one of the U. Saranac Zone meetings a huge supply of excess cedar shakes donated by the new neighbors found a home at Eagle Island. Another local Saranac resident donated a canoe and a small motor boat that has never left U.

Saranac Lake so it seemed fitting that it would continue to live on at Eagle Island.

## NORTHERN ADVOCACY COMMITTEE

The newest FEI committee is already one of the most active; the Northern Advocacy Committee (NAC) assumes primary responsibility for promoting Friends of Eagle Island, (FEI) Mission and developing support from individuals and organizations in and within the surrounding Upper Saranac Lake region. This includes generating awareness of FEI's long-term goals and financial needs. The NAC is an advisory committee to the Board. With Carol Jackman, board member and year-round Saranac Lake resident as chair its role is to:

- Determine annual and long term goals for the committee
- Provide leadership and support to all FEI fund development activities
- Identify, research, cultivate, solicit, and steward donors

Most exciting about this group is how many of our neighbors (without direct Eagle Island connections) have eagerly signed up. The group has met once in person with another meeting scheduled for the end of the month to be hosted by Nancy Howard. Through email and conference calls they are sharing ideas and making connections with great enthusiasm.

## **GRANTS COMMITTEE**

FEI received a \$10,000 matching grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation. This matching grant is for the preparation of detailed architectural drawings for many of the historic buildings. These drawing will better guide the architects and contractors when designing, updating, and upgrading.

The Grants Committee dedicated WEEKS in July under the leadership of Michele Racioppi and Tomoko Werbe (Grants Chair) in submitting two major grant applications to New York State, each requesting \$500,000. It was a FULL committee effort writing, reviewing, and documenting the application.

## JIM BOWES, CREW CHIEF


"Volunteered" by wife
