<u>Take-A-Hike for Eagle Island—A Huge Success</u>

More than 170 participants took part in "Take a Hike for Eagle Island" fundraisers from May through July, raising \$26,257 for the Friends of Eagle Island, Inc. (FEI). This first major fundraising effort drew alumnae and staff, their families, friends, kids hoping to be future Eagle Island campers, and community supporters. Hikes took place across the United States—in Maplewood and other New Jersey towns, the Midwest (to view an eagle's nest), Los Angeles, and points in between—and further afield, like London and Australia. Individual organizers set their own locations and pace. This year's organizers urge you to start planning your 2012 hike now. Don't wait for the spring rush. If you participated this year, we want to see you again. And everyone who couldn't make it—we look forward to welcoming you in '12. Bring your friends, family, and neighbors. When we attended Chapel Isle services on Sunday, I was invited by the pastor Dr. Newton W. Greiner Sr. to say a few words at the opening of the service about the Friends of Eagle Island and our mission to acquire and save our camp. There was a wonderful response from the congregation which included many people who were unaware of the status of the Island.

We visited the Six Nations Indian Museum and got to spend time with the Mohawk family that founded and



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operate this amazing place. We remain in contact and they will be a great resource for historical information and friendship with our campers.

Judy Meagher, granddaughter and daughter of the Morton's and Graves caretakers invited us to her beautiful home at Gilpin bay and we shared stories and photo albums of Eagle Island from the Graves era and the first year of Eagle Island. We had a luncheon for Buz Graves, great grandson of Henry Graves, Jr. at Doctor's Out. Dart Emerson (legacy camper 1938 and former EIC Director), and Connie Garbutt, (Program Director early 1950s) attended along with other EIC alums in the area. Buz Graves is actively engaged in trying to save Eagle Island.

Ginny and I visited Eagle Island, along with Mary and Jim Hotaling and Howard Kirschenbaum, experts in Adirondack historical preservation and architecture. We all had assignments to inventory the property and its current condition for reopening as a camp, if we can acquire it. The inspection was very thorough and reports have been sent to FEI Board of Directors.

Pledge Support for FEI Going Strong

In August and September a dedicated group of volunteers set out to confirm financial pledges for the acquisition and future operations of Friends of Eagle Island. Nearly 400 people were contacted by phone or e-mail to confirm their pledges from 2010 surveys. The group focused primarily on potential donors of \$500 or more. Chris Hildebrand developed two e-mail blasts to people who had never pledged, and those who were not assigned to a call group. The results were overwhelmingly positive. Of those contacted, nearly 100% confirmed and many increased their pledges, representing \$290k or 87% of previously pledged dollars . We will continue our efforts to reach the remaining 13% over the next few months.
