Friends of Eagle Island, Inc. organizes to save the island

The Girl Scouts Heart of NJ voted to divest itself of Camp Eagle Island at the October Board Meeting. Since then, the Friends of Eagle Island, Inc. has increased its efforts to save Eagle Island by acquiring it from the Girl Scouts. Here is a quick list to bring you up to date on where the Friends of Eagle Island group currently stands:

On January 16th, 2011, at an expanded Steering Committee meeting of about 25 people, the group came to a unanimous agreement on its mission:

"Donated by the Graves family in 1937 to provide outdoor opportunities and experiences for girls and young women, Eagle Island Camp has developed generations of women leaders. The mission of Friends of Eagle Island, Incorporated, is to perpetuate this legacy by providing an environmentally responsible Adirondack island camping experience for diverse youth, with an emphasis on girls and young women, while preserving Eagle Island's natural and historic character."

Update on the Graves Family

The man who originally donated the camp to the Girl Scouts, Henry Graves Jr., and his wife, Florence, had four children. Two of them, Henry Graves, III and George C. Graves, (whose names are on a plaque in the lodge), were killed in separate car accidents—contrary to Eagle Island legend. Henry III had three

children. George had none. The other two siblings were Duncan, who had three children, and Gwendolyn, who had two. Some of you may remember the boat Gwen, given with the Island when it was donated, which is named after Henry Jr.'s daughter.

George C. Graves was an adventurer and is probably responsible for most of the animal heads on the Island. His nickname was Toot or Tooty. Newspaper articles report that he was involved in expeditions in Asia and Alaska, resulting in animal specimen contributions to the American Museum of Natural History and the Field Museum in Chicago. So who knows where all the animal heads in the lodge came from?!

Professor Jill Martin, a representative from Friends of Eagle Island, has spoken with Gwen's daughter, Nan Fullerton Sharpe, who is about 80. She remembers summers on Eagle Island with her grandparents. Mr. Graves donated the camp when she was nine. She has fond memories of walking the Lakeside path with her grandmother and playing in a rowboat in the cove. She remembers her Uncle George landing a sea plane in the sailing cove. Jill also spoke with Henry D. Graves, Jr. (also known as Buz), the grandson of Henry Graves III, but the island was donated to the Girls Scouts before he was born. Both are concerned about Eagle Island's future.

Upper Saranac Cookbook wins 2nd place!

The Upper Saranac COOKBOOK has taken second prize in the Morris Press's annual *Best Benefit Cookbook Contest*. The prize was \$2,000 towards the invasive milfoil control program. The Eagle Island alumnae purchased an ad in the cookbook and is a sponsor. Several of you donated recipes.
