VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHT

Jon-Luke DeStefano

Meet Jon-Luke, a family camper who became a Maintenance team member in 2004. Jon-Luke was a tremendous help on the island this past summer; fixing camp vehicles, clearing trees, doing trail maintenance, cutting logs for El's new stump circle, and helping wherever needed. He brought his own set of tools "just in case" and ended up finding uses for most of them around the island.

He also helped with the Winter Carnival parade and gathered a group of fellow supporters to march along. Dressed as a hiker, Jon-Luke distributed El bracelets to kids in the crowd.

Currently a full-time Engineering Technician, Jon-Luke also has a company of his own called STAY STRONG CO. His company allows him to make multimedia crafts and home goods.

When asked what he would like to see for the future of Eagle Island, Jon-Luke responded; "I would like to see Eagle Island get back to its former glory with some new additions and updates, of course. It hasn't been whole in quite some time, and I feel it would make all involved in the process have something to look back and be proud of. Bringing it all back to life! I'd love to see future campers and guests make unforgettable memories like the ones I hold so near and dear to me. Homes are always a work in progress, but all the memories are priceless."

CONSTRUCTION ON THE ISLAND

In early September, EI awarded the contract for much of the building restoration and repair work to Don Bennett Building Repair and Maintenance, a local contractor out of Tupper Lake. Over the past two months, Bennett and his crew have been extremely busy. The work includes:

- Replacing more than two dozen supporting piers and columns under the dining pavilion, kitchen, main lodge, family cabin, and infirmary/guidehouse—work critical to ensuring the structural soundness of the buildings for years to come.
- Preparation of the dining pavilion basement area for later installation of water tanks and treatment equipment.
- Extensive excavation under the kitchen down to the bedrock to allow for a much-needed drainage system, necessary to protect the kitchen foundations, floors, and walls from water-induced rotting.
- Removal of rotted sills, floor joists, and flooring and replacement with new lumber in much of the rear part of the kitchen building.
- Preparation of the dining pavilion and kitchen for new roofing, which will be installed over the next two weeks.
- Excavation of road and pipe-laying for a portion of water and septic systems, with improvements to roadway coming up to Main Camp.
- Masonry repairs on chimneys and foundations.

Todd Hall and Adirondack Camp Care have also been busy with repairs, renovations, and site improvements. Their work includes:

- Foundation and repair work in the front part of the kitchen to ready the area for the kitchen improvements
- Trenching and laying of conduit to Main Camp for the upgraded electrical service.

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WHAT EIC DID FOR ME Adriane Collett

At age 11, I realized I was different from other kids...I had unpopular ideas about what I liked and who I wanted to be. My favorite books were about nonconformist girls, and I decided that was what I wanted to be. The minute I stepped onto Eagle Island with my sisters, I knew it was the place for me.

Women wore whatever they wanted, and sang out loud and danced with abandon, and did all the jobs I had only seen men do. Other girls liked me despite how weird I thought I was. And my counselors showed us how to become self-possessed, capable women, whether climbing Mt. Ampersand, mopping the Green Johns, or learning to sail.

Eagle Island embraced every girl: Confidence and the ability to laugh at yourself were valued more than how popular you were at home. I came home empowered to stand up for myself and understanding the awesome strength of bonds with other women, helping me carve out my own path as an adult: being myself and always fighting for my beliefs.

I attended a women's college and became a teacher. I married a man who liked everything that made me feel unusual, and we had two daughters. I sing them camp songs, take them into the woods, and tell them stories of a magical place where girls make the rules, stick together, climb mountains, and make forever friends.

I carry a shield of confidence and acceptance everywhere I go: I got it at Eagle Island.
