### Kaela Homburger-New Eagle Island Kitchen Director by Anna Nelson

Kaela Homburger, the new Kitchen Director at Eagle Island, has a vision for the meals she plans to prepare this summer. Not only will she provide traditional camp food, she also plans to include foods inspired by the cultural backgrounds of our campers. This is designed to help campers feel connected via a familiar cuisine and will also introduce campers to new foods.



She also will give special attention to dietary needs, such as gluten-free, non-dairy, and vegetarian, providing comparable meals to follow these restrictions. On occasion, Kaela will prepare a main entrée that follows these restrictions for the entire camp rather than providing separate meals. She will ensure fresh fruits and vegetables are served, with a fresh fruit bar at breakfast and a salad bar at lunch and dinner. She also hopes to prepare special themed meals tied to particular camp theme days. Overall Kaela wants to meet the dietary needs of all the individuals she is serving each week, as well as preparing nourishing meals that provide the energy to fully engage in camp activities. All who dine at camp this summer are in for a treat—not only will the meals be delicious, they will be nutritious as well.



# Learning the Island Business by Executive Director Danielle LaCavalla

I am so lucky to have the opportunity to go to the Island a few days a week.

This spring, I have made some observations that seem obvious to most seasoned visitors, and now, obvious to me:

Not a bad work commute!



- Eagle Island is Fiji time. When on the Island, time disappears so stay focused on who you should connect with, and when to do computer work and other projects to make the most of your time.
- A package that is shipped to the mainland garage will be touched a number of times (1. garage to boat, 2. boat to target location on island, 3. from target location on island to recycling, 4. from recycling to boat, 5. boat to mainland, 6. mainland to recycling).
- Septic testing is not as bad as it sounds.
- If the sink is running, we are water testing. The sink will otherwise not be left running.
- Always know the boat times so you can coordinate your travel to and from the Island.
- Volunteers do not need a peppermint on their pillow when they arrive. They step foot on the Island and get to work on a number of projects.
- Trash removal, weather damage, fuel prices, ongoing repairs: the Island business is expensive, however so rewarding and I am incredibly THANKFUL for the donors who invest their treasure, time, and talent to support Eagle Island!

#### New Happenings at Camp This Summer

Eagle Island, Inc. has invested in a number of new programs and program equipment to support the camper experience, thanks to the generosity of our broad spectrum of donors:

- Kestrel touring kayaks and paddles
- Special workshops from members of the Akwesasne community, such as medicine walks and basket weaving these will allow our campers to leave Eagle Island with an understanding of traditional, land-based, and cultural practices.
- A new position, the Director of Belonging, who will support the mental and behavioral health of campers and staff.
- A partnership with ADK ArtRise, a local art organization, who will provide a creative outlet for some of our youth programs.
- New overnight camping tents for adventuring in the Adirondacks.


