### Opening Updates!



The spring 2023 Memorial Day crew was greeted on arrival with a task list that filled three full whiteboards! By the end of the weekend, they were almost all done. One task not on the list was installation of the waterfront docks. Why? Because our new swim platforms had arrived the previous week, and had already been put in the water. They are steady and ready for campers. The new donor wall honoring those who contributed to this effort has been designed, painted, and installed on the waterfront building.


Some of the other major tasks included a new roof on the waterfront building, and cleaning and inventory of the Unit House out in Adirondack/Islanders. Also, a staff room was created in the Boathouse - we removed all the fixtures from the "kitchen" room, and installed a new floor and bunk beds. Now we can house 6 campers and 2 staff in the building. The Boathouse porch will still be used for Arts & Crafts, and a new clean-up sink is being added on the south side porch. Many, many other tasks were completed, including trail clearing, sweeping, kitchen organizing, and sailboat launching!

Our next major projects are a new septic field for the Adirondack/Islanders tent area and Phase III Historic Preservation Renovations!

#### Volunteer Highlight: Annie Wells by Anna Nelson

Little did Annie Wells know when she left Eagle Island in the summer of 2007 as a junior counselor, after being a camper since 2000, that it would be 16 years before she returned. She grieved when she heard the camp had closed but was excited to later learn that the camp had reopened. In May, she volunteered for two weeks to help prepare the camp for the summer, doing a variety of tasks—cleaning the green johns and the kitchen, sweeping out platform tents, and helping with roofing at the waterfront.

She found the camp practically the same as she had left it—with the familiar buildings, tent units, and waterfront she knew as a camper still there, and the same "feeling" about the camp. On closer inspection, though, she noted the improvements made to many of the buildings, a number with new names. Looking ahead to the future of the camp, she hopes the rich traditions she experienced at Eagle Island will continue and hopes one day to attend family camp with her sister and two young nephews.

## Honoring the past to celebrate the future: Graves Family at Eagle Island



Long before the current campers set foot on Eagle Island, the Graves family spent nearly 30 summers on the property, enjoying the fresh air and unique setting. Today's campers walk in their footsteps and learn about Eagle Island's history. Staff member, Hanna Sue Percy created a video that uses historic photos to explore how the buildings looked during the Graves era, and how they are being used by the newest generation of Eagle Island summer residents.



This Great Camp building complex was designed by William Coulter, a prominent Adirondack Great Camp architect, and constructed in 1903. As stated in the National Historic Landmark nomination: "Eagle Island is arguably Coulter's finest extant rustic camp with design integrity to the original construction period."



Eagle Island will continue to educate campers and visitors about the rich Graves history and continue the legacy of Florence and Henry Graves, Jr., who gifted Eagle Island so that it "would forever be a place for children to play and to flourish."

#### First-Time Eagle Island Camper: Scarlett Fields By Anna Nelson

The first impression Scarlett Fields had upon arriving at Eagle Island for a week in the 2022 Camp Sampler program was "it would be the best experience of her life." And her first impression did not disappoint. She loved her week at camp, her first time at a sleepaway camp, particularly making crafts such as bracelets and pins, as well as creating fairy houses with objects found on the island, like moss, mushrooms, and wood. Her days were full—starting with early morning swimming before breakfast, and numerous activities for the rest of the day, including crafts, games such as capture the flag, tug of war, and hide and seek tag (played at night with flashlights), and kayaking and boating. She also became a fan of Adam the Moose, bringing him gifts of flowers and celebrating his "Work" looking out for campers for decades.



She found the food at camp amazing, especially the yogurt bar at breakfast and the salad bars at lunch and dinner. She also enjoyed the camp parties, like the Glow Party, which included glow sticks and lemonade, punch, and Sprite served as a "glow" drink. Scarlett will be entering seventh grade in the fall and can't wait to return to Eagle Island this summer.

Scarlett showed an" increase in her confidence and general exuberance to try new things following her time at Eagle Island," said her mother, Amber.



Eagle Island is a place where all girls are given a chance to learn to do hard things (e.g., climb a mountain, swim around the island, skipper a sailboat, write and perform a skit); develop close friendships with peers; try new activities; work independently and collaboratively; and take risks in a safe environment. Our fundamental belief is that summer camp—its activities, its rustic and communal setting, its supportive and girlled community, its focus on belonging and its unplugged-ness— helps girls develop the very skills they need to successfully navigate girlhood and adolescence.



We need to grow Eagle Island's capacity so more girls can experience this magic! In order to do this, we must complete a number of projects and operational investments in order for the camp to expand. This begins with opening the Adirondack/Islanders tent areas, retaining and rewarding enthusiastic staff, providing financial assistance to more campers, and investing in resources to support the fast increase in camper registrations.


- May 2023 Inventoried tents, flies, and beds in the Adirondack Unit House - we are in good shape!
- June 2023 Bid documents are due
- September 2023 Adirondack Septic Project begins
- October 2023 Adirondack Septic Project completed and reviewed for approval
- October 2023 Open registration for programs housed at Adirondack/Islanders
- June 2024 40 Campers and up to 8 staff will be housed in the Adirondack/Islanders tent area

By securing these final funds, we can direct our focus towards investing in other crucial areas such as financial aid and future camp capital projects.
