

WHAT IS THE POINT IN TIME (PIT) COUNT?

The O'ahu Point In Time Count (PIT) Count is an annual street and shelter count that determines the number of people experiencing homelessness on O'ahu on a single night in January. This project included a brief survey to identify the needs and characteristics of individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Every Continuum of Care in the U.S. is required to submit PIT Count results to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as part of a national effort to identify the extent of homelessness across the country.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

The PIT Count is an important source of data on homelessness. It is reported to Congress and affects the flow of federal funding to the community. Additionally, the PIT Count is a primary source of unsheltered homeless numbers and helps to inform communities on the number of people who do not access services such as Emergency Shelters or Transitional Housing at any given point in time.

POINT IN TIME COUNT ON O'AHU

Partners In Care - O'ahu Continuum of Care was the lead organization for the O'ahu 2023 PIT Count. This responsibility included creating a digital survey to collect the data, soliciting volunteers and donations, analysis of the collected information, and ensuring the health and safety of volunteers and community members in regard to COVID-19. The O'ahu Continuum of Care is a membership organization that is made up of more than 70 agencies and other stakeholders that provide services throughout the island of O'ahu to those experiencing homelessness. The Count was split among 7 regions across the island based on outreach territories.

IMPORTANT CONSIDERATIONS

The PIT Count is a one-night snapshot of homelessness that is limited by weather conditions, number of volunteers and their training, self-reported survey responses, and other factors. There are more people who experience homelessness over the course of the year than on any given single night. Every year, the Continuum of Care works toward improving the Count's accuracy. The Oʻahu Continuum of Care is committed to using data from the PIT Count and the Oʻahu Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to understand more about the population experiencing homelessness on Oʻahu and to provide solutions that will make homelessness rare, brief, and a one-time experience.

Partners In Care's mission is to eliminate homelessness through open and inclusive participation and the coordination of integrated responses.



METHODOLOGY



The Point In Time (PIT) Count was held on January 23, 2023, from 5:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m., asking individuals where they slept on the night of January 22, 2023.

- The unsheltered count relies on interviews and observations taken by volunteers.
- The sheltered count relies on data exports from the Homeless Management Information System.
- Capturing a snapshot of the O'ahu population in a short period of time requires months of planning and organization with service providers, government partners, outreach workers, and volunteers. Volunteers included previous volunteers, staff from our partner service agencies, and community individuals recruited through news and social media.

2023 Methodology

- We utilized a mobile app—Survey123 for ArcGIS—to collect surveys of unsheltered individuals. The app went through several phases of customization, testing, editing, and user feedback.
- An observational tool was included on the Survey123 mobile app to capture individuals who refused to be surveyed, were sleeping, or were inaccessible due to safety reasons. The observational tool is based on HUD's observational tool that captures minimal but highly important demographic information.
- The O'ahu PIT Count continues to take place on one day based on HUD's best practices and guidelines.
- A review of the number of individuals who received any type of homelessness system service is included in the community report this year to further inform our community on the utilization of services over the course of an entire year.

MAIN FINDINGS





The data suggests that the number of people in the PIT Count peaked in 2017 and began decreasing in 2018 before increasing slightly from 2022 to 2023. In 2018, the number of unsheltered bypassed the number of sheltered for the first time. The unsheltered numbers increased significantly in 2019 and then decreased slightly in 2020 and has somewhat stabilized in the last couple of counts.


TOTAL PIT COUNT BY YEAR, 2010 - 2023

Emergency Shelter (ES): Short-term accommodations providing shelter to individuals and families. Transitional Housing (TH): Mid-term accommodations, designed to provide housing and supportive services to clients to facilitate movement to independent living. Safe Haven (SH): A form of supportive housing that serves hard-to-reach homeless persons with severe mental illness (Oʻahu does not currently have any HUD funded Safe Havens). Mental Health Kokua began a Safe Haven (Puʻuhonua) on Oʻahu in 1995. In 2016, it was re-categorized as a Permanent Supportive Housing Program under HUD's definition. Vet Safe Haven (Vet SH): A VA funded program that serves hard-to-reach homeless persons with severe mental illness (this is separate to HUD funded Safe Havens).

SUB-POPULATIONS OVER TIME



Veteran homelessness has decreased by 52% since 2015 and by 37% since 2020. The large decrease may be in part due to increased efforts to house veterans through the Mayor's Challenge and Built for Zero initiatives. Veteran homelessness remained relatively stable from 2022 to 2023, with the number of sheltered veterans increasing offset by the decreased number of unsheltered veterans.

Veteran: A person who has served in the United States Armed Forces. For the purposes of this report we do not distinguish between active duty and non-active duty veterans. **Keiki:** Persons under 18 years old.

Keiki Population, 2015 - 2023



The number of keiki experiencing homelessness on O'ahu has decreased by 58% since 2015 and increased by 3% from 2022 to 2023.


Number of Individuals in Households with Adults and Keiki, 2015 - 2023



The number of individuals in families (Adult(s) with Keiki) has decreased by 60% since 2015 and increased slightly from 2022 to 2023 (+2%).

DEMOGRAPHICS



Demographics on all 4,028 individuals are reported here. *All percentages are approximated. For exact numbers, please see the appendices.*

- The majority of the PIT Count population identified as Men/Boys (57%).
- 35% identified as Women/Girls and 1% identified as Transgender or Gender Non-Conforming.
- 7% of the individuals counted were of unknown gender due to a high number of observations.

Adults: Persons 18 years and older.


Keiki: Persons under 18 years old.

Youth: Persons aged 18-24.

Transgender: A general term used to describe people whose gender identity differs from the sex they were assigned at birth.


Gender Non-Conforming:

Refers to people who do not adhere to traditional gender roles or stereotypes about how they should look or act based on the sex they were assigned at birth.



559 keiki were counted in the PIT Count. The majority of these keiki were sheltered (84%). The vast majority of individuals were adults (86% or 3,469) and Single Adults (25 years and older) account for 55% of the population. Adult(s) with minor keiki and Adult Only Households account for 22% and 18% of the population, respectively.

Individuals in Each Household Type




Household: Any group of individuals that presents together for assistance and self-identifies as a family/household. Single Adults: Person living alone who is 25 years old or older. Adult Only Households: Two or more adults living together with no one under the age of 18. Adult(s) with Keiki: One or more adults living with one or more keiki under the age of 18. Parenting Youth (PY): Persons age 24 and under living with one or more keiki under the age of 18. Unaccompanied Youth (UY): Persons age 24 and under who are not accompanied by a parent, guardian, or household member 25 or older and are not a parent. UY can include single youth, youth couples, and groups of youth together as a household. Unaccompanied Minors (UM): Persons under the age of 18 who are not accompanied by a parent, guardian, or household member 25 or older and are not a parent.

RACE & RACIAL EQUITY

Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders (NHPI) and Multiracial individuals made up the largest percentages of the PIT Count population. 56% (n=2,288) of the overall PIT Count identified NHPI as either their only race or part of their multiracial identity. 82% (n=707) of Multiracial individuals indicated having NHPI racial background.


Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (NHPI): Person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawai'i, Guam, Samoa, Tonga, Micronesia, or other Pacific Islands.

Comparing the percentage of each of the racial groups on Oʻahu to the percentage of each of the racial groups included in the 2023 PIT Count; Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders, American Indian, Alaska Native, or Indigenous (AIANI), and Black, African American, or African individuals were all over-represented in the PIT Count Population.


Hispanic Ethnicity



Of all persons in the PIT, 28% (n=1,146) identified as Native Hawaiian, a larger percentage than the total population on O'ahu that identifies as Native Hawaiian (19%). When considering only individuals with known race data (3,095), this percentage rises to 37% of the PIT.

12% (n=468) of the PIT Count Population identified as Hispanic/Latin(o)(a)(x), which is slightly higher than the percentage of the overall Oʻahu Population (10%).


Native Hawaiian Race (Race Alone or in Combination), 2023 PIT Compared to Oʻahu Population.

CHARACTERISTICS

This section examines characteristics of 1,161 unsheltered individuals who were surveyed and 1,663 individuals who were sheltered. It excludes the 1,204 unsheltered observations because these individuals were not asked about these conditions. Analyzed data includes 2,824 individuals in 1,975 households, including 2,294 adults, 10 unaccompanied minors (UM), and 520 keiki (excluding UM). Because the 2022 report included missing data, percentages from 2022 were artificially lower.




Repeaters: Persons who have been counted in PIT Counts between 2017 and 2023.

HMIS: The O'ahu Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is a countywide software program that is designed to capture client-level information over time on services used.


Chronically Homeless: A person who is homeless and lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter AND has been homeless for a least 1 year continuously or on at least 4 or more occasions over the past 3 years that add up to at least 12 months AND has a long term disability.

Mental Health Illness, Substance Use, and Physical/Developmental or Other Disability are classified as conditions that substantially impair a person's day to day life.



SHELTERED POPULATION


This section examines the characteristics of the 1,663 individuals in 1,027 households counted in the sheltered 2023 PIT Count, including 1,192 adults, 7 unaccompanied minors, and 464 keiki.



*Vet Safe Haven was previously labeled under Safe Haven. However, this is separate to HUD-funded Safe Havens and therefore has been separated.

The majority of the individuals (1,116) in the sheltered count were staying in Emergency Shelters in 2023. The number of individuals in Emergency Shelters steadily increased from 2015-2020, until a 25% decrease from 2020-2022. Since 2015, the number of individuals in Transitional Shelters has decreased by 69%.

Over half (63%) of all adults and UMs in Shelters reported one or more disabling conditions (mental illness, substance use, physical, developmental or other disabilities, and/or HIV); 42% reported a mental illness.

SHELTER AVAILABILITY OVER TIME

Housing Inventory Count (HIC): The Housing Inventory Count is a count of the number of beds available (in shelter) for individuals on the night of the PIT Count for that given year and the number of individuals served in permanent housing programs on a given day. This number represents the total possible number of individuals that could be staying in each shelter or be housed through permanent housing programs.

Total Shelter HIC Beds vs Total Sheltered Count Over Time



The total number of beds available across all shelters have decreased by 27% since 2015, most notably in Transitional Housing, which had decreased by 66% from 2,354 to 809 beds between 2015 and 2022. The following year saw an increase of 196 Transitional Housing beds and 48 Emergency Shelter beds.




Total bed utilization rates remained steady from 2015 until 2021, at which point there was a decrease in individuals using shelters. This is most likely due to COVID-19, and individuals' social distancing. Given that shelter utilization remained steady until 2021, the decreasing number of individuals in shelters is most likely linked to the decrease in the number of beds over time.

Total ES, TH, & SH Emergency (ES)

*Bed utilization rates shown here are a snapshot of one night during the PIT Count. This is meant to show the overall trends of the system over time and may not accurately show year-round utilization rates. Later in the report we have detailed the utilization of beds over the course of one year.

Total Number of Individuals in Permanent Housing Over Time




While the number of beds in shelters is decreasing, we see the number of individuals in Permanent Housing Programs (Rapid Re-Housing, Permanent Supportive Housing, and Other Permanent Housing) increasing over time. This may indicate that despite a lower number of shelter beds available, there has been an increase in permanent housing to meet the population. From 2020-2022 (due to the COVID-19 Pandemic) we have seen new and increasing resources in permanent housing and services.

Transitional (TH)

DEEPER DIVE: SHELTERED POPULATION

Average Length of Stay in Program by Program Type and Household Structure



The overall average length of stay is 248 days for Emergency Shelter, 344 days for Transitional Housing, and 196 for Vet Safe Haven. There were 19% increases in average lengths of stay for both Transitional Housing and Emergency Shelters.


Sexual & Gender Minorities (SGM): An umbrella term that encompasses populations included in the acronym "LGBTI" (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender & intersex) and individuals whose sexual orientation or gender identity varies.

Sexual and Gender Minorities

8% of adults and unaccompanied minors (UM) in shelters identify as a Sexual or Gender Minority, through gender, orientation, or being born intersex. This is higher than the general population in Hawai'i, where 4.5% percent of adults (18+) identify as SGM.


Gender Diverse (29)

1% of adults and UMs in shelters identify as Gender Diverse. This means that the individual identifies as a gender other than the sex they were assigned at birth.

7% of adults and UMs in shelters identify with a sexual orientation other than straight.





UNSHELTERED POPULATION


This section examines the characteristics of the 2,365 individuals in 1,852 households counted in the unsheltered 2023 PIT Count, including 2,277 adults, 6 unaccompanied minors, and 82 keiki.





A slight majority of individuals counted in 2023 were observed (51%) as compared to those surveyed (49%).


The overall unsheltered population number has plateaued over the past 5 years.



Prior to 2020, the Unsheltered Count consisted of a survey conducted over multiple days. Since 2020, the Unsheltered Count has included surveys and observations conducted on one day.

Region 7 (Wai'anae) has the largest percentage of the unsheltered population at 27%. This region saw an 18% increase over the 2022 count.

Region 1 (Downtown Honolulu, Kalihi, Nu'uanu) and Region 2 (East Honolulu) have the second largest percentages of the unsheltered population with 22% each.

Region 6 (Windward) has the island's smallest unsheltered population at 2%; followed by Region 5 at 6% and Region 4 at 7%.





Region 1 and 2 each have 22% of the 2nd largest percentages of the 2023 unsheltered population. This region also has the largest percentage of Veterans. There has been a decrease in the population of Region 1 since 2020 while other regions have seen an increase.





Region 2 has the second largest population of unsheltered NHPI individuals this year. In the 2022 PIT Count, they had the smallest population of NHPI by percentage. This region has the highest percentage of Single Adult households. It has seen a sharp increase in its share of the unsheltered population in recent years, with a 71% increase since 2019, this may be in part due to the migration of individuals from downtown.



Region 3 dropped from the highest percentage of chronically homeless individuals (81%) to the lowest percentage of 38% in 2023. Region 3 also has a slightly higher percentage of Asian and NHPI individuals compared to the overall unsheltered population. Region 3's percent of the unsheltered population has more than doubled since 2010.





Region 4's percent of the unsheltered population had been steadily decreasing since its peak in 2018. 77% of the household types in Region 4 were Single Adult Household Type. The region saw an uptick of 18 individuals over the past year.





Region 5 has seen a sharp decrease in its percent of the unsheltered population since its peak in 2017 and stayed at 7% or below for the past three counts. Region 5 has the 2nd lowest percentage of Chronically Homeless Households among the regions. Region 5 saw a large increase in persons encountered in the count in 2017, and has seen a consistent decrease in the number counted since that time. This year saw the lowest count in the region since 2014.





Region 6 has the lowest percentage of adults in any region as well as the highest percentages of Minors and Adult(s) with Keiki households, Region 6 also has the lowest percentages of Multiracial individuals. There were zero unaccompanied minors and zero veterans counted in Region 6. Please note that due to the small number of people in Region 6, percentages can be highly affected by small changes in absolute numbers.





Region 7's percentage of the unsheltered population has increased by 206 individuals since the 2022 count. NHPI individuals are over-represented in this region. Black, and White individuals are underrepresented, with Region 7 having the smallest percentage of these individuals compared to the overall unsheltered population,





This section examines data collected on 1,161 people in 948 households, including 1,102 adults, 3 unaccompanied minors, and 56 keiki that completed surveys. This data is not available for the 1,204 individuals who were observed. The in-depth surveys offer the chance to examine important individual and system data.

The majority (63%) of the unsheltered surveyed individuals (737) had records in the O'ahu HMIS. However, only 24% (278) of unsheltered surveyed individuals had an open enrollment at the time of the PIT Count, suggesting that the majority of individuals are not currently connected to services.

Of unsheltered surveyed individuals, 33% (382) have been counted in previous PIT Counts from 2017-2023. Of these "repeaters", 28% (107) have been counted in previous sheltered counts; 42% (159) have been counted in previous unsheltered counts; and 30% (116) have been counted in both. 37% (142) have been counted in two total PIT Counts (including 2023); 27% (104) have been in three; 19% (71) have been in 4, and another 17% (65) have been counted in 5 or more PIT Counts.

HMIS: The O'ahu Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is a countywide software program that is designed to capture client-level information over time on the characteristics and service needs of individuals at-risk of and experiencing homelessness.



DEEPER DIVE: UNSHELTERED SURVEYED

Self-Reported Factors Leading to Homelessness

The most common self-reported causes of homelessness among surveyed adults and unaccompanied minors were financial and/or employment factors. These findings are in line with a recent study of unsheltered homeless in Atlanta that found loss of job and financial factors were the most frequently reported causes of homelessness (Barile, Pruitt, & Parker, 2018). Break-up of family was the second most reported reason.

* Surveyed individuals may choose multiple reasons for why they are currently experiencing homelessness. **Unable to Pay Rent is included in Financial Problem. For more detailed data, please see the Appendices.



Hawaiian Homelands

Of unsheltered surveyed adults, 486 identified as Native Hawaiian. Of these, 45% (219) indicated they were eligible for Hawaiian Homelands, with 17% (80), or 37% of those eligible, reporting they were on the waitlist.


Percent of Native Hawaiian Adults (486)



Sexual and Gender Minorities


10% (n=108) of unsheltered surveyed adults and unaccompanied minors (UM) (n=1,105) identify as a Sexual or Gender Minority, through gender, orientation, or being born intersex. This is higher than the general population in Hawai'i, where 4.5% percent of adults (18+) identify as SGM (Gallup/Williams, 2019).

6% (n=62) of unsheltered surveyed adults and UMs reported identifying as Gender Diverse (i.e., identifies as a gender other than the sex they were assigned at birth).6% (n=71) of unsheltered surveyed adults and UMs reported identifying a sexual orientation other than straight. Four percent (n=47) identified as intersex.




Domestic violence survivors account for 23% (539 out of 2,304) of all unsheltered surveyed adults & UMs and sheltered adults & UMs, and 13% of the total 2023 PIT population.

The number of DV survivors and their percent of the total PIT population has been increasing since 2018, when this data began being reliably collected.

In 2023, compared to the overall PIT population, the DV survivor population had a higher percentage of Chronically Homeless individuals (45%) as compared to the overall PIT Count population (36%) and higher rates of all disabling conditions.

The DV survivor shelter population has a higher percentage of women/girls and and Adults with Keiki compared to the DV survivor unsheltered population. The DV unsheltered population has a higher percentage of Single Adult Households and a higher percentage of survivors identifying as Asian, NHPI, and other race than the DV survivor sheltered population.


While the PIT Count analyzes homelessness on one night of the year, the HMIS Inflow-Outflow section examines enrollment and exit data taken from the O'ahu CoC Homeless Management Information System, to identify trends in system engagement between January 2022 and January 2023. Not all individuals in HMIS are currently experiencing homelessness, some are housed. A client may be enrolled in multiple programs at one time and could have been enrolled in the same project type multiple times in one year.









LITERAL PROGRAM INFLOW OUTFLOW BY MONTH, 2022 - 2023






Race Alone, 2023 Total HMIS Population Compared to 2022 O'ahu Population



Comparing the percentage of each of the racial groups on O'ahu to the percentage of each of the racial groups included in the HMIS between 2022 and 2023: Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders, American Indian, Alaska Native, or Indigenous (AIANI), and Black, African American, or African individuals were all over-represented in the Homeless Population. Most of those served (81%) identified as non-Hispanic or -Latinx.



Just over half of HMIS participants identified as male (54%) with almost half female (42%) and a small percentage of transgender, questioning, or something other than male or female (1%).

Almost one quarter of HMIS participants were under 18 (22%). 8% were Transitional Age Youth, just over half were adults between 18 and 59 (52%), and 17% were 60 years of age or older.



This section examines characteristics of all 12,855 participants in the O'ahu CoC Homeless Management Information System. Most of this information is asked each time someone is enrolled into a program and therefore was filtered to the most recent information collected in the reporting time period.



Households by Type

A large majority of the 16,780 households enrolled in programs in HMIS were single adults or individuals (80%). 5% of households were multiple adults only. 14% were households with adults and children, and less than 1% were made up of only children or children on their own.



NEXT STEPS & CONCLUSION

Continued Research

Partners In Care plans to use the 2023 PIT Count data to explore relevant issues and populations in more depth and to disseminate these findings in a format that will be most useful for service providers and policy makers. These plans include:

- Releasing multiple sub-reports highlighting these findings.
- Developing online dashboards that provide easy access to numbers and breakdowns by region.

Partners In Care also plans to continue using PIT Count data from the past 6 years to help identify PIT Count "repeaters" and connect them to services.
