In this historic and joyful season, we invite you to pray for guidance for our church and our new presiding bishop as he leads us in envisioning the reign of God in our midst. May our celebration unite us as a sacramental community, and may we be filled with new energy to bear witness to God's work of redemption.

Who: Everyone is invited!

**What:** The Episcopal Church will officially welcome the Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe as its 28th presiding bishop with a smaller, simpler investiture service aimed at reducing carbon footprint and increasing churchwide virtual participation.

**When:** Nov. 2, with a prelude featuring a "roll call" of dioceses starting at 9:30 a.m. ET. The service itself starts at 11 a.m. ET.

**Where:** The service will be livestreamed on this page and on <u>The Episcopal Church's Facebook</u> <u>page</u>. A recording will be posted and distributed after the service.

**How can I participate?** Churches, dioceses, small groups, seminaries, and other Episcopal communities are encouraged to organize watch parties to participate in real time with Episcopalians around the world.

Deacon Lynne and Warden Lynn both attended the Lunch & Learn at The Good News Center, by Steve Chatterton, Director of Risk Management, Northeast Region at CLPS. Mr. Steve Chatterton is a retired Police Captain with over 22 years of law enforcement experience, which included 10 years as a School Resource Officer (SRO). His topic was Protecting Houses of Worship.

Three points to start with are preparedness, prevention and protection. To be prepared, a church or a family should plan, train, drill and then

evaluate. St Stephen's has Exit Signs when we need to evacuate the buildings, but does everyone know to meet up at the corner of the parking lot directly behind the rectory so we can assess that all are present? If we were to have a drill during coffee hour, then we could see how much time it takes for people to get out. Also, we could evaluate if another location would be better to meet up.

Prevention means early intervention by having security features in place, people with skills to greet newcomers, and communication systems for both internal and external resources. At St. Stephen's a sensing device at the parish hall entrance to alert ushers would improve coverage to greet anyone new arriving after services begin. Also, we can share skills with each other as to who knows CPR, first aid, or how to use a fire extinguisher.

Protection of our church family involves shared knowledge of who to call and when. It also involves a simple response strategy when we get information from the community, like if there's an alarm from local police. "Hold" means we should stay right where we are, "Shelter" means we should go to a safe area inside (like the basement or inner rooms). "Evacuate" means we should all leave the building, "Lock-Out" means we should keep ourselves inside and not let others in, and "Lock-Down" means to both lock the doors and go to safer areas inside.

Mr. Chatterton offered ten recommendations to reduce risk: 1. Performa threat of vulnerability assessment of our church. 2. Establish a church safety team. 3. Have emergency plan and procedures shared with all. 4.Control access points, with locks, cameras, sensors, or greeters. 5. Set up security posture procedures during church activities. 6. Identify evacuation routes, staging and shelter points. 7. Have a reliable communication system and plan (including signs and lights). 8. Provide situational awareness training. 9. Store adequate emergency supplies on site. 10. Collaborate with local first responders and have them know the site.

This information is being shared with the St. Stephen's vestry to review, but all comments, questions and suggestions are welcome.
