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A Word from Dee



SCAN, Inc., celebrated 45 years of service in 2019. For the past four decades, passionate staff members have worked to support children and families to Stop Child Abuse and Neglect in northern Indiana. SCAN opened its doors in 1974 with one paid staff member and 12 volunteers. From there, it evolved as concerned citizens finally shone n a light on the horrors of child abuse and neglect, resulting in the creation of new laws and procedures.

As the years went by, we learned that child abuse and neglect has a lasting impact — transcending generations, but that there is hope in building resilience through protective factors. In this spirit of hope, SCAN offers both Intervention and Prevention Services, giving families the tools they need to heal from the trauma of abuse and neglect,

as well as equipping families to live free of this trauma and build stable relationships.

In 2019, SCAN served nearly 12,000 children and families throughout 35 counties in northern Indiana. Your support made it possible for us to protect children, prepare parents, strengthen families and educate our community as we work to Stop Child Abuse and Neglect. With your support, we have focused on equipping our staff to better serve families by using evidence-based curriculum for parenting and improving assessment tools to understand the impact of trauma. This has a direct impact on our outcomes. Thank you for making this possible.

I'm proud to say that we came together as an agency to achieve some of our biggest successes yet. For the first time in 45 years,

we have achieved agency-wide accreditation from the Council on Accreditation. This serves as an incredible validation of our hard work at all levels of the agency. We came together as a team to generate and implement new approaches to Quality Assurance and ensure that our families continue to receive impeccable service.

Each day, I walk through the office and I see children experiencing hope as they rebuild their relationships with their parents. I hear parents talk about how they are unlearning old habits and developing new ones. I think of the pain and heartbreak many of these families have experienced, and I am grateful to work with a team that's willing to shoulder these burdens and forge new paths toward wholeness and resilience.

Nancy Rogers' Lasting Legacy

A gift many years in the making will give children the chance to process their trauma and rebuild relationships to enjoy a life free from the effects of abuse and neglect.

Family meant a lot to Nancy Rogers. As the mother of seven children, she learned to anchor her family's life by having her family gather around the dinner table for a shared meal each night. No matter what.

Decades later, that same table serves as the conference table for the family business two of her sons have taken on as third generation owners. They still come back to that table together day after day, carrying out their parents' legacy.

"I remember a lot of family meals around this table," Nancy's son, John, said. "Every day, you sat down and ate together. That's a big thing about family. It's not all quality time, it's quantity too. When I think of Mom and Dad, they were always there."

When Nancy died in 2019, she made a lasting impact for SCAN by leaving a legacy gift in her will. John Rogers, Nancy's son, has been a passionate supporter and board member of SCAN.

"I had talked to her over the years, a lot, about SCAN," John said. "I think there's a great opportunity when you have a child – you can mess them up or not mess them up."

The Rogers family involvement with SCAN originated in the 1980s when John Rogers, Sr., served on the Board of Directors for Daybreak Crisis Nursery which was led by Rachel Tobin-Smith at the time. He was vital in the efforts to open this facility, offering short-term respite care for parents in Allen County in 1984. When he passed away, his son, John, joined the board in his place.

When Rachel Tobin-Smith became the executive director of SCAN in 1985, she asked John Rogers to join the board. Since then, he has served as a board and committee member for 35 years, acting as a guiding force for SCAN through decades of growth and impact on the community.

Nancy spent her life investing in her children and giving back to the community. She was especially supportive of Fort Wayne's YWCA shelter. She combined her passion for the community with the frugal habits she formed during the Great Depression to leave a legacy in Fort Wayne.

"Nancy was a force within our community. She was a woman to be admired by my generation for getting things done," said former Executive Director, Rachel Tobin-Smith. "Nancy had spent many years raising her children and knew that childrearing was hard under the best of circumstances."

In 1984, John Rogers, Sr., passed away and Nancy became interested in investing. She and two friends did their research and took up a new hobby of building their estates through smart investments. Nancy envisioned increasing the money she and John had saved over the years to the point where she could leave a significant gift to help families in Fort Wayne.

"Mom had a real caring spot for people in need," John said. "She wanted to help in a lasting way, so she made it a primary thing in her life to invest – and she was good at it."

The Rogers' legacy gift supported several needs at SCAN, including the Daybreak program. After Daybreak received a funding reduction in 2019, the Rogers' gift gave dozens of children a safe place while their parents addressed crises that could put their children in danger. An investment was also made to SCAN's Intervention Services, providing therapy and other services to help strengthen families who have experienced the trauma of abuse and neglect. A portion of the gift was also designated to the endowment to keep children safe for years to come.

"It's incredible to think about the many children and parents who will benefit from Nancy and John Sr.'s investment in SCAN," said Dee Szyndrowski, MS, MBA, LMHC, Chief Executive Officer of SCAN. "Because of their planned gift, hundreds of families will receive support during their greatest time of need, today and in years to come."

Achieving Accreditation

One of SCAN's most momentous accomplishments of 2019 was receiving full agency accreditation from the Council on Accreditation. This means that SCAN passed more than 700 rigorous service standards related to ethics, programming and risk prevention.

This was the culmination of two solid years of evaluation and teamwork at every level of SCAN. This involved documenting each service standard, creating surveys, conducting mock interviews and constantly refining SCAN's policies and procedures.

In April 2019, a team of peer reviewers spent four days touring SCAN's three

facilities. They checked safety standards, interviewed staff members, interviewed families served, reviewed files from every department and ensured adherence to best practices for quality assurance.

At the end of the meeting, they hosted an exit visit praising the outstanding systems and services found at SCAN.

In August 2019, SCAN received full accreditation, an outward seal of approval to guarantee to our community that we hold ourselves accountable to provide the best services possible to families who need it most.

Dee and her team did a wonderful job balancing the every day needs of our clients while pushing SCAN towards its future. COA Accreditation will allow SCAN to stand out as a best in class provider to families in need by recruiting and training the best therapists in the field. Intervention Services

Indiana is currently ranked second in the United States for the most child abuse and neglect cases. With more than twice the national average rate of instances of child abuse and neglect, Indiana children need quality services when they enter the Department of Child Services (DCS) so their homes can heal and they can reclaim their lives.

In Intervention Services, SCAN works to repair and rebuild relationships, ensuring that families referred to SCAN by DCS leave our services changed and unlikely to re-enter DCS system. We work to provide therapy and other services focused on building family relationships, as well as the skills of attachment, initiative and self-regulation, empowering children to enjoy healthy relationships and a safe family environment.

Intervention Services are provided to families referred to SCAN by DCS due to an occurrence or those who are at an immediate risk for removal due to an incidence of child abuse or neglect. SCAN works with parents to create safe homes and healthy environments for their children through the following Intervention Services:

Clinical Services

people served SCAN offers evidence-based therapeutic services (ie:Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy) and family systems work designed to restore families. This includes the implementation of the Family Centered Treatment © model, in partnership with the Family Centered Treatment Foundation. FCT is designed to restructure critical areas of functioning and use emotion to build attachments. Therapists provide intensive services, being in the home environment multiple hours a day for multiple days per week to work with the family to understand the functions of behavior rather than simply treating the symptoms.

Family Connections

people served

Divorce can be a traumatic, divisive event for families. Through Family Connections, a fee-for-service program, parents can take classes, access mediation and use supervised parenting time to resolve their conflicts and start their new family life off on the right foot.

456

Fatherhood Engagement

people served When a dad begins to take greater responsibility in their child's life, this program helps fathers establish that active role in a healthy manner while building a stable relationship with their child. SCAN staff use the evidence-based model of Motivational Interviewing, Nurturing Parents Curriculum and 24/7 Dads curriculum to support the attachment, bonding and relationship building between a father and his child.

- Homemaker Services

Following the evidence-based model of Motivational Interviewing and the Nurturing Parenting curriculum, SCAN staff assist parents in understanding the importance of household routines; basic parenting skills, including child nutrition; the importance of order and structure in the home; and healthy attachments. Through this, we build resiliency in the home.

Home-Based Casework

Provides in-home, one-on-one services to parents to help families recover from abuse or neglect. By having a caseworker in the home environment, families can pinpoint key issues and work together to resolve their conflicts.

Intensive Intervention Team

Rapidly responds to crisis situations at immediate risk for maltreatment and could lead to child's removal from the home.

Supervised Visitation

Conducted at SCAN, in the client's home, or in public, this service teaches families parenting skills while maintaining the safety of children who have been removed from the home. This service also makes it possible for siblings and extended family members to maintain relationships when children are in foster care.



92.5%

of families with children in their home who received supervised visits and homebased services were able to improve their functioning and parenting so they could keep their children in the home.

88.5%

of families with children in the home who received clinical therapeutic services after abuse and neglect were able to improve their ability to function as a family so that the children could stay in the home.

93%

of parents in Family Connections scored better on their parenting and co-parenting skills following services.



SCAN's Prevention Programs work to address the root causes of child abuse and neglect, setting children, families and young adults up for security and success.

Prevention Education

people served Did you know SCAN provides free education to schools, churches and community organizations? SCAN's Community Outreach Coordinator trains children, ages three through 18, as well as adults, on indicators of child abuse and neglect, body safety, gun safety and internet safety.

Community Partners

people served Unfortunately, many families are just one step away from having a household in crisis. When the car breaks down, the baby won't stop crying or mom can't wrap her head around the implications of her child's new medical diagnosis, a parent's stress level rises. Studies repeatedly show this can lead to child abuse or neglect. Community Partners answers this need by providing short-term case management services to families in crisis, connecting them to resources in our community. They assist in resolving the situation so the family can maintain stability and security in their home.

98%

of parents did not have a substantiated child abuse case after receiving services.

118

Daybreak Crisis Homes

people served For more than 30 years, Daybreak Crisis Homes have given distraught parents a place to go when they face a situation in which they are temporarily unable to provide a secure home environment for their children. For four hours up to seven days, children can stay in short-term foster care through Daybreak. Many parents use this service during the birth of another child, a housing crisis or a mental health issue.

of children were kept safe from abuse and neglect during family crisis.

1,426

Healthy Families

people served New parents often need reassurance and support. Healthy Families, a voluntary program, assigns a Home Visitor to qualifying new families from 38 weeks pregnant up to 12 weeks after a baby is born. This Home Visitor will then spend three years working with the family. They help track developmental goals, coach parents in nurturing their child and encourage the family to make stable, positive decisions.







