SCE Basic FERS Retirement Calculator Instructions

This calculator has been designed to provide a basic estimate of what a person's SCE FERS retirement benefits may be, based upon specific information provided by the user. This calculator is <u>NOT</u> meant to provide exact benefits for your specific circumstances, and it should <u>NOT</u> be used to determine your benefits. Additionally, this calculator should <u>NOT</u> be considered legal or financial advice. It is intended for entertainment value only and you should seek out this information on your own and verify it is correct. It is merely meant to provide a "ballpark" estimate of your potential benefits. You should contact your personnel office for official agency estimates of your FERS retirement benefits.

I highly recommend everyone interested in incredibly detailed information concerning the FERS Retirement go to Amazon.com and get Dan Jamison's FERSGUIDE Book. Both Dan and the FERSGuide Book were instrumental in the creation of this calculator, and I use the info from the book to update the calculator every year. I was a member of Dan's FERSGuide website for years, and I believe his FERS Retirement info is excellent.

The Federal Employee Retirement System (FERS) replaced the Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) in 1984 as the Federal Government's defined-benefit retirement system.¹

FERS contains one set of benefit provisions that are applicable to "Special Category Employees" (SCEs). SCEs include Law-Enforcement Officers, Customs and Border Patrol Officers, Border Patrol Agents, Firefighters, DSS Agents, Nuclear Material Couriers, and Air-Traffic Controllers. All these SCE positions all have a mandatory retirement age of 57, except for air-traffic controllers, who face mandatory retirement at age 56.²

FERS utilizes a three-tiered approach to retirement benefits by providing 1) a FERS definedbenefit annuity; 2) Social Security benefits; and 3) employee savings (through the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP)). These benefits are frequently referred to as the "benefit pyramid". The advent of FERS effectively transferred market risk from the government to the employee.³

A SCE FERS retirement is comprised of four (4) components:

1) FERS Basic Annuity:

The annuity is based on a percentage of your **High 3-Year Average** salary. Your High-3 *includes* Administratively Uncontrollable Overtime (AUO), and Law Enforcement Availability Pay (LEAP) up to the 25% level, and "locality-based comparability payments" (i.e., Locality Pay).⁴

Your High-3 *excludes* foreign-post and non-foreign-post differentials, night differential, Sunday differential, holiday pay, scheduled overtime, bonus pay, all "allowances" such as the "Danger pay Allowance" paid pursuant to 5 USC 5928; and about everything else, with a few exceptions.⁵

The High 3-Year Average Salary is <u>limited to</u> the rate for level IV of the Executive Schedule (EX-IV) per (5 U.S.C. 5304 (g)(1))⁶. For 2024, the EX-IV limit is \$191,900.

For US Secret Service personnel working protection duties, per PL-116-269 – Secret Service Overtime Pay Extension Act, the "Super Max Pay Cap" for 2024 is level II of the Executive Schedule (EX-II) \$221,900.

The High-3 is a weighted-average calculation. **If you were at your highest salary for only one month when you retired, that only counts for 1/36th of the High-3.**⁷ Someone may want to stay on to work one day into the following year or move to a higher locality area for one month to increase their High-3 by the scheduled pay adjustment. This action will have no effect on your High-3. It will have a small effect on your unused annual leave paid out to you, but that is small compared to the effect of not having your FERS annuity begin until February 1, in this example. The High-3 does not have to be the last 36 months of service. It is a period of 36 consecutive months of service where your pay was the highest. Your High-3 is computed on the pay you received where a FERS retirement deduction was taken.⁸

The percentage you receive is calculated by multiplying your first 20 years of service by 1.7% then adding an additional 1.0% for every additional year of service after the first 20 years. (*Example: 30 years of service would calculate to* ($20 \times 1.7\% + 10 \times 1.0\%$ or 34% + 10% = 44%).

If you have non-SCE (Regular FERS) creditable time, you will receive 1% per year of non-SCE (Regular FERS) creditable time in this calculator.

Former honorable military time is creditable under FERS, but a deposit must be made to your agency to "buy" those years of service into FERS. This time counts at the 1% per-year-of-service rate. Making a deposit into FERS for creditable military service can be a complex task and should be done with the assistance of a human resources specialist at your agency. There are two (2) components to this deposit:

1) A fee based upon the percentage of total military base pay; and

2) An interest charge if the service deposit is made after the grace period.

The cost of making a deposit for this service is a set percentage (usually 3%) multiplied by your base pay earned from your military service.⁹

The SCE FERS Basic Annuity has a Spousal Benefit Survivor Annuity (SBSA) Option. The SBSA refers to the reduction in your SCE FERS Basic Annuity monthly benefit that provides for the continuation of a portion of your benefits to be paid to your spouse upon your untimely demise. <u>Without a survivor annuity</u>, when you die, your annuity <u>"dies with you."</u> You have three (3) options for the SBSA:

- 1) A 10% reduction in your annuity that provides the surviving spouse with an annuity equal to 50% of the retiree's unreduced annuity, or
- 2) A 5% reduction in your annuity that provides the surviving spouse an annuity equal to 25% of the retiree's unreduced annuity, or
- 3) A 0% reduction in your annuity. A surviving spouse would **NOT** get any of your annuity after your death. **NO CONTINUED FEHBP COVERAGE**.

If you want to select the 0% or 5% SBSA option under SCE FERS, you must obtain the notarized consent of your spouse on your retirement application for such an election. Also remember that <u>you must select the SBSA 5% or 10% option for</u> <u>your spouse to keep FEHBAPA (health) insurance if you die before your spouse</u>.¹⁰

Households with dual federal retirees are generally not faced with the FEHBP issue as each retiree would likely have access to the FEHBP in his or her own right, so many of these folks' op to forego the survivor annuity.¹¹

If you separate from Government service prior to reaching retirement eligibility, your annuity benefits are <u>severely</u> reduced. Your reduced benefits are described as follows:

- <u>Less than 20 years</u> of FERS SCE creditable service, you will receive a deferred annuity at <u>age 62</u> based on a 1% per year of your high 3-year average salary at the time of your separation; NO Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS); and NO Federal Employee Health Benefits (FEHB).
- b. <u>20 or More years</u> of FERS SCE creditable service but <u>not eligible to retire</u>, you will receive a deferred annuity at your <u>Minimum Retirement Age (MRA)</u> which is either 56 or 57 and based on a 1% per year of your high 3-year average salary at the time of your separation; NO Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS); and NO Federal Employee Health Benefits (FEHB).
- c. The calculator will provide the user with an estimate of their earned benefits if they separate from the government prior to being eligible to retire. <u>Cell AD13</u> will display whether you will receive your annuity payments upon retirement (reached eligibility); at your MRA (minimum of 20 years of FERS SCE service but not eligible); or at age 62 (less than 20 years of SCE FERS service) as described above.

Your FERS annuity is eligible to receive Cost-of-Living-Adjustments (COLA). The COLA is based upon the Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index for Urban and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). If the CPI-W increase is 2% or less, you receive the same increase for your COLA. If the CPI-W increase is more than 2% but less than 3%, you will receive a 2% COLA. If the CPI-W increase is more than 3%, you will receive the CPI increase minus 1%. COLA adjustments are effective in December and will appear in the January annuity payment. The COLA is prorated until you have been an annuitant for a full year¹².

For example, if you retired on May 30, you would receive 6/12^{ths} (one-half) of the COLA adjustment for the following year, because you were an annuitant for 6 of the 12 months in OPM's year, which runs from 12/1 through 11/30. In the following year, you would receive the full COLA¹³.

The COLA begins at retirement for SCEs – even if you retire before age 50 with 25 years. This is a great benefit for being in a SCE-covered position, as all other FERS participants must wait until age 62 to start receiving a $COLA^{14}$.

From inception through the 2024 adjustment, the FERS COLA has averaged 2.31%. The COLA can vary widely from year to year. There were no COLAs in 2010, 2011 and 2016. The 2022 COLA was 4.9%, the 2023 COLA was a whopping 7.7% and the 2024 COLA drops to 2.2%¹⁵.

2) FERS Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS):

The FERS Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS) is unique to FERS. It is a payment from OPM *in addition to* the FERS basic-annuity payment. It is intended as a substitute for the Social Security benefit portion of your complete FERS benefits package, from the date of retirement until the earlier of:

- a) the last day of the month in which the annuitant becomes age 62; or
- b) the last day of the month before the first month for which the annuitant would be entitled to Social Security benefit¹⁶.

The RAS stops as age 62 even if you elect to delay the receipt of Social Security benefits until a later age.¹⁷ Receiving this benefit is <u>**not**</u> an election – if the annuitant is eligible to receive it, and it will be paid to him or her by OPM.¹⁸

Like Social Security benefits, the RAS is subject to an earnings test, which means that the RAS is reduced if your earned (non-passive) income from wages or self-employment is higher than the allowable amount. The earnings test kicks in at your Minimum Retirement Age (MRA); typically, 56 or 57. For example, if you retire at 50, you will collect the RAS *without* an earnings test until your MRA. Retire at 57, and the RAS is earnings tested right away.¹⁹ For 2024, the allowable amount is \$**22,320**.²⁰

Should you phase out of the RAS, but later stop working before age 62, you will be eligible to restart the RAS after you notify OPM. To apply for a reinstatement of your RAS benefits, you will need to send copies of your most recent tax return and all related W-2s and Form 1099s, which are part of the return.²¹

In the same way that OPM lags in ending or reducing the RAS, there is also a lag in restarting it. You need a year of earnings below the income test level, currently **\$22,320** (for 2024), for the RAS to be restarted because the previous year's earnings determine the amount of the RAS that can be paid. Restarting the RAS can be a very time-consuming process that can take 8+ months with plenty of telephone calls and follow-up emails. Be very patient.²²

There are no COLA adjustments applied to the FERS RAS²³.

If you do separate from Government service prior to becoming eligible for full retirement benefits, you <u>will not</u> receive the Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS). It will display zero (0) in <u>cell K28</u> and <u>cell AD28</u> will display that you are not eligible for the RAS.

3) Social Security:

At age 62, you will lose your RAS payment, but you become eligible to receive your full Social Security benefits. You should review your annual Social Security Summary Statement for your specific Social Security benefits.

4) The Thrift Savings Plan (TSP):

The TSP is a 401k plan that allows for employee contributions as well as agency matching funds.

The most important factor to a successful FERS retirement is contributing the maximum to the TSP as soon as you can afford to do so. As mentioned earlier, the risk is now on the employee to produce income from the TSP to replace what was lost when CSRS ended.

This calculator will use the **Equal Withdrawals over Time** option with the possibility of utilizing a one-time partial withdrawal.

SCE Basic FERS Retirement Calculator Data Entry

**** IMPORTANT NOTE**** - The Basic Calculator is designed to have all data entered from the top to the bottom. All cells requiring input are highlighted in **YELLOW**. When data is entered into a **YELLOW** highlighted cell, the yellow highlight will go away. Several cells that have auto-calculating formulas will not calculate until the **YELLOW** data input cells above them have values entered. If the data requested in any cell does not apply to you, please enter a zero (0) unless otherwise directed to leave the cells blank. An entered zero (0) is different than a blank cell.

1) Estimated SCE FERS Basic Annuity Percentage Computation

This section will provide an estimate of your annual SCE FERS Basic Annuity <u>percentage</u>. The percentage of your high 3-year average salary you may receive is based on your years of creditable FERS SCE service, creditable FERS NON-SCE service, military time bought back, and total accumulated/unused sick leave hours. Starting in 2014, you can redeem unused sick hours at retirement for additional years-of-service credit.

a. Enter your FERS SCE EOD Date and your Expected Retirement Date: (Cell J5 & K5)

Enter your **FERS SCE** EOD date and your expected retirement date. By entering these two dates, the calculator will determine the number of complete years and complete months of service you will have completed between the two dates.

Your annuity percentage calculation is made by determining how many full years and full months of service you have had since your **FERS SCE EOD** date. Any extra days that do not make up a full month will be truncated. You get credit for complete months as well as complete years.

As an example, if you will have 27 years, 9 months, and 17 days between your FERS EOD date and your entered retirement date, your percentage would be:

20 x 1.7% = 34% + 7 x 1% = 7% + .75% for your 9 months, or 34% + 7% +.75% = 41.75%

b. Enter any Military Buy Back Years Start and End Dates: (Cell J6 & K6)


Enter the start and end dates of any years of active-duty military time that you have "bought back" from OPM. This "buy back" time is credited at the 1% per-year- of-service rate. <u>Use cell J6 for the start date and cell K6 for the end</u> <u>date</u>. ****If you do not have any Military "buy back" time, please leave it blank.**

c. Enter you EXPECTED age at Retirement: (Cell J7)

Enter your expected age at the retirement date you entered in <u>Cell K5</u>.

d. Enter any NON-SCE Creditable Service Time: (Cells H9 & H10)

You can calculate your potential retirement benefits including any creditable FERS <u>NON-SCE</u> service time. If you have creditable FERS <u>NON-SCE</u> service time, enter the start date in <u>cell H9</u> and the end date in <u>cell H10</u>. By entering these start and end dates, the <u>NON-SCE</u> service time will be added to the end of your service time in the Total Yrs of Service % in <u>cell K9</u>. **IMPORTANT** If you do not have any NON-SCE service time, leave both cells blank.



e. Enter you CURRENT Number of Sick Leave Hours: (Cell J11)

Using your most recent pay statement from your NFC EPP Page, (https://www.nfc.usda.gov/epps/eplogin.aspx) enter your current number of sick leave hours. This will calculate the number of hours of sick leave you will have on the date of your retirement that you entered above in <u>Cell K5, assuming you do</u> <u>not use any sick leave prior to your entered retirement date</u>.

Since January 1, 2014, FERS annuitants receive a 100% service credit for their unused sick leave, just like CSRS annuitants have always enjoyed. There are 2,087 hours in OPM's work year. That means if you retire with 2,087 hours of unused sick leave, you will receive an additional year (1%) of service credit. <u>You must retire on an immediate annuity (one payable within 30 days of your last</u> day at work) for unused sick leave to be counted for retirement credit.²⁵

Approximately 5.8 hours of unused sick leave equates to one day of calendar service credit because service credit is calculated using <u>calendar days</u>, not workdays. For example, if you have 174 hours of unused sick leave at retirement, that equals one additional month of service. When performing this calculation, <u>all months have 30 days for OPM's purposes</u>. (174 hours of unused sick leave/5.8 hours = 30 calendar days.)²⁶ You would then use this result to look up these hours on the SL Conversion Chart Tab to determine the months and days you will get credit for. If your exact number does not appear on the conversion chart, then use the next higher number. For example, if you are looking up 936 hours, use the 939 hours line, which is 5 month and 12 days.²⁷

OPM only counts *whole* years and *whole* months in your final service credit retirement calculation.²⁸ Any leftover sick leave days that are less than 30, will be dropped (lost). If you have 1 year, 1 month and 25 days of sick leave, you will only get credit for 1 year and 1 month. The 25 days would be lost. The number of any expected sick days lost is displayed on the <u>Basic Calculator</u> TAB in <u>cell AD12</u>. This is the number of SL days you can take, prior to your entered retirement date, without reducing your additional service credit percentage.

(Example: 3,048 hours of sick leave at retirement would calculate as 1 year; 5 months; and 16 CALENDAR days. Then you must convert the CALENDAR days to WORKDAYS by multiplying the 16 CALENDAR days by .725 to calculate the number of WORKDAYS (16 x .725 = 11). You could use the 11 days of sick leave, prior to retirement, and not reduce your additional service credit %. If you do not use the extra 11 days, you will lose them upon retirement). <u>**Confirm with Agency Benefits Office**</u>

f. Total Estimated Annual Annuity %: (Cell K13)

This is a self-calculating field that will estimate your total annual annuity % based upon your years of SCE service time, NON-SCE Service time, Honorable Military (buy back) service time, and hours of unused sick leave (USL) you enter above.

****IMPORTANT NOTE**** - If this % calculates using less than 1.7% per year for the first 20 years, you must enter your expected age at retirement in **cell J7**. This will allow the calculator to determine if you have reached retirement eligibility. <u>See info on page 4 of this document on reduced benefits if leaving Government service prior to retirement eligibility</u>.

2) Estimated SCE FERS Basic Annuity Amount Computation

This section will provide an estimate of your annual SCE FERS Basic Annuity <u>amount</u>. It will utilize the total estimated annual annuity % calculated above and multiply your estimated high 3-year average salary by that percentage.

a. Estimated High 3-Year Average Salary: (Cell J17)

Enter the estimated amount of your high 3-year average salary at the time of retirement.

I have added <u>additional functionality</u> that will help you estimate what your high 3-year salary may be, based on a user entered average annual cost-of-living raise for the years remaining until your entered retirement date in <u>cell K5</u>. This new functionality is located on the <u>Basic Calculator</u> TAB to the right of the cell where you enter your <u>Estimated High 3-year Average Salary</u> (line #17; Column AD on the calculator). To use this new functionality, the following cells will need your input (highlighted in yellow):

- 1. <u>Expected Locality Area</u>: Choose the locality area you expect to retire in from the drop-down menu (cell AE17).
- Expected Grade: Enter the GS Grade you expect to be when you retire (cell AE18).
- Expected Step: Enter the GS Step you expect to be when you retire (cell AE19).
- 4. <u>US BOP:</u> For Bureau of Prisons (BOP) personnel who want to estimate future base salary without LEAP, check the box (<u>cell AE25</u>).
- <u>Average Annual Base Pay Raise</u>: Enter the average annual pay raise you want to use for the calculation. For 2022, the POTUS and the US Congress approved a 2.7% raise. I usually use 2.0% in this field as I believe this is an average annual raise percentage. You can use whatever percentage you want (<u>cell AE26</u>).

Once you have entered values in all the above cells, the calculator will autocalculate the following cells:

- <u>Current Base Pay (w/o LEAP)</u>: This is your current base salary without LEAP for the COLA area you entered and your GS Grade/Step (cell <u>AE21</u>).
- 2. <u>Current Base Pay Hourly Rate</u>: This is your current base salary hourly rate for the COLA area you entered and your GS Grade/Step (cell <u>AE22</u>).
- 3. <u>Current Base Pay SOT Rate</u>: This is your current base salary SOT rate for the COLA area you entered and your GS Grade/Step (cell <u>AE23</u>).
- 4. <u>Current Base Pay with LEAP</u>: This is your current base salary with LEAP for the COLA area you entered and your GS Grade/Step (cell <u>AE24</u>). This figure is either your base salary + 25% or your current MAXOUT limit, whichever is lower.
- 5. Estimated Base Salary in XX Years: This is the amount your Base + LEAP salary could be if the average annual raise received is the amount you entered in <u>cell AE26</u> described above. The XX is based on the number of YEARS between now and the date you enter in the calculator as your expected retirement date (<u>cell K5</u>). This is the amount (cell AE27) you can use as your high 3-year average salary in the calculator (cell J17) if you want to estimate the annual raises until you retire.

b. Calculate for Spousal Benefit Survivor Annuity (SBSA): (Cell J18)

Enter the percentage you wish to use to calculate your Spousal Benefit Survivor Annuity. Your options are 0%, 5% or 10%. This will reduce your monthly & annual FERS Basic Annuity amount by the percentage you select.

c. Total Estimated Annual Defined-Benefit Annuity Amount: (Cell K19)

This is a self-calculated field that will estimate your annual SCE FERS Basic Annuity amount. This is based on the amount you enter as your average high-3 salary and the percentage calculated above.


3) Estimated Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS) – Until Age 62

This section will provide an estimate of your annual and monthly RAS benefit. It will utilize your estimated Social Security benefit at age 62 as well as any deductions for earning tests if your situation applies.

a. Monthly Social Security Benefit at Age 62 (From SSA Statement): (Cell J23)

Utilizing your annual Social Security Summary Report (<u>www.socialsecurity.gov</u>), look under the "*Your Estimated Benefits*" section on page 1 and enter the amount shown on the line for starting benefits at "*age 62*". This amount will be used to calculate your SRS monthly payment.

b. RAS Percentage Calculation: (Cell J24)

This is a self-calculated field that will estimate the % of your "age 62 Social Security payment" based on your years of service at retirement.

To calculate your RAS %, you should take your years of service divided by 40. (*Example: 30 years of service would calculate to (30/40 = 75%*).

You do not get credit for full months in the RAS Percentage Calculation, but it does round your time up to the next number of years. (Example: 30 years & 5 months of service would be 30/40 = 75%. 30 years & 6 months of service would round up to be 31/40 = 77.5%)

c. Age at Retirement: (Cell J25)

This cell is automatically entered by the calculator from the age you enter in cell J7 as described above. This will be used to determine if your RAS benefit is subject to an earnings test, and it is used to determine if you have reached the age requirement to be retirement eligible.

At your MRA, you will lose \$1 of RAS benefit for every \$2 you receive in earned income (non-passive income) over **\$22,320** per year (the amount for 2024 earnings; this amount is inflation-adjusted each year).²⁹

d. Estimated Income from After-Retirement Employment (Annual): (Cell J26)

If you will have known employment after you retire, enter the amount of salary (<u>annual</u>) you will receive from this employment. This amount will be used to determine your RAS benefit if you are over age 57 at which time your RAS benefit becomes subject to the earnings test.

If you do not expect to have new employment or do not know the salary amount, enter zero (\$0).

e. Earnings Test Reduction: (Cell K26)

This is a self-calculating field that will show the annual reduction to your RAS benefit if you are at/over your MRA, and your after-retirement earned (non-passive) income from wages or self-employment exceed the earnings test limit. For 2024, the annual earnings limit is \$22,320.³⁰

f. Approximate Monthly Retiree Annuity Supplement: (Cell J27)

This is a self-calculating field that will show the estimated amount of your <u>monthly</u> RAS benefit based on your years of service and any earnings test reductions if they apply.

g. Total Estimated Annual RAS Amount: (Cell K28)

This is a self-calculating field that will show the estimated amount of your <u>annual</u> RAS benefit based on your years of service and any earnings test reductions if they apply.

4) TSP Future Value Calculator

This section will assist you in estimating the potential future value of your TSP account. It uses a monthly compounding interest formula with a fixed monthly contribution. ****NOTE**** these calculations assume the monthly contributions remain constant for the period you enter. This is unlikely due to grade/step increases, potential COLA increases, and potential locality pay adjustments. This estimated future value may be conservatively low. By entering the required data, you will be able to conduct "what-if" scenarios with different interest rates of return and different time spans.

The total estimated TSP balance from this section will automatically be used in the next section <u>"Estimated TSP Income & Years TSP Funds Will Last"</u> as described below. It simply provides the user with a way to estimate the future value of their TSP at the time of retirement.

a. Current TSP Balance: (Cell J32)

Enter your current TSP value. You can find this amount from your TSP statements or from the <u>www.tsp.gov</u> web site.

b. TSP Contributions per Pay Period: (Cell J33)

Enter the contributions made to your TSP account each **pay period**. This should include:

1) the employee contribution (regular and catch-up),

- 2) the automatic agency 1% (TSP BASIC), and
- 3) any agency matching funds (TSP MATCHING).

If you are paid by the National Finance Center (NFC), you can find this information from your current pay statement found at

<u>https://www.nfc.usda.gov/epps/eplogin.aspx</u>. Your employee contribution is near the top of your pay statement on the line listed as Code 75 <u>TSP-FERS</u> and <u>TSP CATCH-UP</u> if you have elected to contribute to the Catch-up. You can find the automatic 1% and the agency matching amounts at the bottom of the web page view of your pay statement, in the <u>Agency Contributions to Employee Benefits this Pay Period</u> section, on the lines labeled as TSP Basic and TSP Matching.

c. TSP Contributions per Month: (Cell J34)

This is a self-calculating field. It will calculate the monthly contributions to your TSP account using the formula: PP contributions x 26 pay periods /12 months. As an example, if your pay period contributions equal \$500 then your monthly contributions would be: $500 \times 26 = 13,000 / 12 = 1,083.33$.

d. TSP Contributions per Year: (Cell J35)

This is a self-calculating field. It will calculate the annual contributions to your TSP account using the formula: PP contributions x 26 pay periods. As an example, if your pay period contributions equal \$500 then your annual contributions would be: \$500 x 26=\$13,000.

e. Estimated Interest Rate of Return: (Cell J36)

Enter the **ANNUAL** interest rate you want to use to calculate your future TSP balance. The interest rate should be entered as a decimal number. As an example, to use 10% it should be entered at 10. For an example of the 10-year average annual returns for the individual funds, see the chart below.

The below chart provides the average monthly rates of return from 2014 to 2023 (10-yr performance) for the Individual Funds:³¹

f. Years Until Retirement: (Cell J37)

This is a self-calculating field that will determine the number of years until your expected retirement date (contributions end) based on today's date and the expected retirement date entered above (<u>Cell K5</u>). This number will be used to calculate the monthly compounded interest added to your account based upon your current balance and the estimated interest rate of return number you entered above.

g. Change in TSP Value: (Cell J38)

This is a self-calculating field. It will estimate the difference in your current TSP value and the estimated future TSP value, based upon the variables you entered above.

h. Estimated TSP Future Value: (Cell K39)

This is a self-calculated field. It will estimate the future value of your TSP account based upon all the variables you entered above. It uses the following formula:

$$FV = [((1 + i)n) * PV] + [PMT * (((1 + i)n - 1) / i)]$$

FV = Future Valuei = Interest Rate per periodn = number of periodsPV = Present ValuePMT = Monthly Contributions

5) Estimated TSP Income After Retirement & Years TSP Will Last

This section will provide an estimated annual TSP benefit based upon the estimated TSP balance at retirement and the number of years that your TSP funds will last. This section allows you to do multiple "what-if" scenarios changing any of the variables except your TSP balance at retirement to determine what affect your entered variables will have on future balances. Although there are several different withdrawal options that are available for your TSP funds, this calculator will only use the equal payments over a fixed time in its calculations. Additionally, you will be able to utilize the one-time partial withdrawal option available from the TSP.

When making calculations for future TSP balances, the following financial formulas are utilized:

a. Compounded Interest without an Annual Withdrawal

$$\mathsf{A} = \mathsf{P}\big(1 + \frac{i}{n}\big)^{\mathsf{nt}}$$

- **P** = principal amount (the initial amount you deposit)
- i = annual rate of interest (as a decimal)
- t = number of years the amount is deposited for.
- A = amount of money accumulated after t years, including interest.
- **n** = number of times the interest is compounded per year

This option will be used if you do not elect to begin to make annual withdrawals at the time of your retirement. For example, if you retire at age 55 and wait to begin TSP withdrawals until age 62, this formula would be used for the years from 55 to 62.

b. Compounded Interest with a fixed annual withdrawal

$P \ge (1+i)^n - (w \ge ((1+i)^{n-1})/i)$

P = principal amount (the initial amount you borrow or deposit)

i = annual rate of interest (as a decimal)

w = fixed annual withdrawal.

n = number of times the interest is compounded per year

This option will be used once you begin to make annual withdrawals from your TSP Account. For example, if you retire at age 55 and wait to begin TSP withdrawals until age 62, this formula will be used starting at age 62.

Each field in this section is described as follows:

a. Estimated TSP Balance at Retirement: (Cell J43)

This amount will be auto populated from the TSP Future Value Calculator section described above. This amount will be used to estimate your future TSP balances.

b. One-Time Withdrawal at Retirement: (Cell J44)

If you choose to take a one-time partial withdrawal from your TSP funds at the time of your retirement, enter the amount of the one-time withdrawal. By entering a number in this cell, it will deduct your one-time withdrawal from your TSP Balance, at the age you specify, and use this "new" balance to calculate future balances.

c. Age You Will Take a One-Time Withdrawal: (Cell J45)

Enter the age you will be when/if you choose to take a one-time withdrawal at retirement. ****IMPORTANT**** this age MUST be the same or higher than the age you entered in cell J7. ****IMPORTANT**** If you enter an age for the One-Time withdrawal (<u>cell J45</u>) that is older than the age you entered in <u>cell J7</u>, your One-Time withdrawal will <u>NOT</u> show up in the <u>Est. Annual Income Summary in Yr 1 of Retirement</u> section because that section <u>ONLY</u> shows retirement income in YEAR 1 of retirement.

d. Amount You Want to Withdrawal Each Year (Equal Amounts): (Cell J46)

Enter the amount you want to receive from your TSP funds each year. By changing this number, it will allow you to do "what-If" scenarios with different annual withdrawal amounts and see what affect the different withdrawal amounts will have on future balances and the number of years your TSP funds will last before being exhausted.

e. Age You Will Start Annual Withdrawals: (Cell J47)

Enter the age you plan to begin your annual withdrawals from your TSP account. For example, if you retire at age 55 and you plan to start your annual withdrawals at age 62, then for the first 7 years, your balance will only be affected (increased) by the interest rate percentage that you enter as described below. After the first 7 years, your balance will be affected by the interest rate you entered and by the annual withdrawal amount you entered as described above which may increase or decrease your balance. ****IMPORTANT**** this age MUST be the same or higher than the age you entered in cell J7. ****IMPORTANT**** If you enter an age to start annual withdrawals (**cell J47**) that is older than the age you entered in <u>cell J7</u>, your annual withdrawal will <u>NOT</u> show up in the <u>Est. Annual Income Summary in Yr 1 of Retirement</u> section because that section <u>ONLY</u> shows retirement income in YEAR 1 of retirement.

f. <u>Estimated Interest Rate of Return (Annual) where TSP Funds are Invested After</u> <u>Retirement: (Cell J48)</u>

This is a user entered amount. Enter the interest rate % you want to use to estimate your future TSP value. It does not matter whether you leave your TSP funds in the TSP or if you move them to another investment vehicle.

g. Your Age when ALL TSP Funds are Withdrawn - Balance of zero (0): (Cell J49)

This is a self-calculating field. It will estimate the number of years your TSP funds will last according to the variables you entered as described above. This field may provide an answer of "NEVER." If you see "NEVER" in this field, it means that your TSP funds will not be exhausted for at least 100 years based on the variables you entered above including balance, one-time withdrawal, annual withdrawals, age you begin annual withdrawals, and annual interest rates.

h. Balance at Age 85: (Cell K49)

This is a self-calculating field. It estimates what your TSP balance may be at age 85 based upon the variables you entered above including balance, one-time withdrawal, annual withdrawals, age you begin annual withdrawals, and annual interest rates. Additionally, it uses the "Age at Retirement" field you entered as described in the "Estimated Social Security Special Supplement (SRS)" section above.

6) Estimated Annual Income Summary

This section will provide a summary of your estimated annual retirement income IN YEAR 1 of RETIREMENT based upon all the user input described above. <u>All these</u> estimates are PRE-TAX amounts.

a. Estimated FERS Basic Annuity Income: (Cell D52)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated annual FERS Basic Annuity amount. It uses the data input above in the *"Estimated Annuity Percentage and Amount Computation"* sections to determine your estimated annual FERS Basic Annuity.

b. Estimated FERS RAS: (Cell D53)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated annual FERS Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS) benefit. It accounts for your estimated Social Security benefit at age 62 and any benefit reductions from the MRA earnings test.

c. Estimated TSP Income: (Cell D54)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated annual TSP income based on your estimated TSP balance at retirement and the number of years you want to receive equal benefits. ****IMPORTANT**** If you enter an age for a One-Time Withdrawal or annual TSP withdrawals that is older than the age you entered in <u>cell J7</u>, your TSP withdrawals will <u>NOT</u> show up here because this <u>ONLY</u> shows retirement income in YEAR 1 of retirement. As an example, if you enter your age at retirement in <u>cell J7</u> as 55 and you enter your age to take a One-Time Withdrawal or to begin TSP withdrawals in <u>cell J45</u> and/or <u>cell J47</u> as 60, this will show a zero (\$0). If you enter the same age in <u>cell J45</u> and <u>cell J47</u> as you did in <u>cell J7</u>, your TSP withdrawal amount will display here.

d. Estimated After-Retirement Income: (Cell D55)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated annual income from after-retirement employment, if you entered any in <u>cell J26</u>.

e. Total Estimated Annual Income (Pre-Tax): (Cell D56)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your total estimated annual income from your combined total FERS retirement benefits and any estimated after retirement income.

7) Federal Tax Filing

This section will ask you to select your Federal Tax filing status to determine what Federal Tax Bracket you will be in based upon the Total Estimated Annual income (Pre-Tax) amount as described above. This will automatically change based upon the "whatif" scenarios you use by changing the numerous variables so you can determine if your scenario causes additional tax liabilities. The current Inflation-Adjusted Federal Tax Brackets for 2024 are described in the tables below³²:

8) Estimated Monthly Income Summary

This section will provide a summary of your estimated monthly retirement income IN <u>YEAR 1 of RETIREMENT</u> based upon all the user input described above. <u>All these</u> <u>estimates are PRE-TAX amounts</u>.

a. Estimated SCE FERS Basic Annuity Income: (Cell K52)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated monthly SCE FERS Basic Annuity amount. It uses the data input above in the *"Estimated Annuity Percentage and Amount Computation"* sections to determine your estimated annual defined-benefit annuity.

b. Estimated FERS RAS: (Cell K53)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated monthly FERS Retiree Annuity Supplement (RAS) benefit. It accounts for your estimated Social Security benefit at age 62 and any benefit reductions from the age 57 earnings test.

c. Estimated TSP Income: (Cell K54)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated monthly income from after-retirement employment, if you entered any in <u>cell J26</u>.

IMPORTANT If you enter an age for a One-Time Withdrawal or annual TSP withdrawals that is older than the age you entered in <u>cell J7</u>, your TSP withdrawals will <u>NOT</u> show up here because this <u>ONLY</u> shows retirement income in YEAR 1 of retirement. As an example, if you enter your age at retirement in <u>cell J7</u> as 55 and you enter your age to take a One-Time Withdrawal or to begin TSP withdrawals in <u>cell J45</u> and/or <u>cell J47</u> as 60, this will show a zero (\$0). If you enter the same age in <u>cell J45</u> and <u>cell J47</u> as you did in <u>cell J7</u>, your TSP withdrawal amount will display here.

d. Estimated After-Retirement Income: (Cell K55)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your estimated monthly income from employment after you retire.

e. Total Estimated Monthly Income (Pre-Tax): (Cell K56)

This is a self-calculating field that displays your total estimated monthly income from your combined total SCE FERS retirement benefits and any estimated after retirement income.

9) Income Comparison Tab

This tab at the bottom of the sheet will provide the user with the ability to compare their current working gross/net income and their estimated retirement gross/net income.

The info in this section assumes that the amount of money deposited in your bank account (Net Pay) now, as an employed Fed, is enough to support you in retirement. The estimates provided in this section will show you how much additional income (post-retirement employment, TSP withdrawal, etc.) you will need to have to deposit the same Net Pay amount in retirement that you are now as an employed Fed.

The left side is for your current working income/deductions and the right side is for estimating your post-retirement income/deductions.

Any cells that require input are highlighted in YELLOW. Using a recent base pay stub (no OT), enter your gross pay for the pay period, then enter all your deductions for the pay period. I have included the most common deductions including:

- a) Retirement Deduction
- b) TSP Regular Deduction
- c) TSP Catch-Up Deduction
- d) Social Security Tax Deduction
- e) Federal Tax Deduction
- f) State Tax Deduction
- g) Life Insurance Deduction
- h) Health Insurance Deduction
- i) Dental Insurance Deduction
- j) FSA Health Care Deduction
- k) Medicare Tax Deduction

In the event you have additional deductions not covered above, there are six (6) lines that say, "OTHER DEDUCTIONS". Please replace the "OTHER DEDUCTION" cell with a new deduction description and enter the pay period deduction amount. The sheet will automatically calculate the monthly deduction amount.

When calculating the monthly deduction on your current working income side, the sheet uses the pay period deduction the user enters, multiplies that by 26 pay periods, and divides that amount my 12 months.

Once you enter all your current working gross pay and deductions, you will have an idea of the differences in your current working gross/net income and the estimated retirement gross/net income. Now you can go back to the **BASIC CALCULATOR** tab and change the retirement job income and any TSP income (lines 26 & 46) as described above, to see what it will take to make up any difference in your current working gross/net income and your estimated retirement gross/net income.

Annual amount totals columns have been added to both the pre and post-Retirement income sections to provide better understanding of the annual amount totals for all lines.

At the bottom of the page, there are several sections that provide an estimate of <u>vital</u> <u>information</u> that you should understand when considering your ability to maintain your current lifestyle in retirement. These sections include:

- <u>% of Gross Pay you take home (Net Pay) Pre-Retirement</u> This will show you what % of your gross pay you deposit in your account each pay period (Net Pay) now as a current Federal employee.
- 2) <u>% of Gross Pay you take home (Net Pay) Post-Retirement</u> This will show you what % of your gross pay you deposit in your account each pay period (Net Pay) in retirement based on your estimated retirement benefits from the Basic Calculator Page. You should notice that you keep a much larger % of your gross income in retirement.
- 3) <u>Difference (Monthly Amount to Make-Up)</u> This is a critical estimate to know. This will show you an estimate of the <u>difference</u> you would have to make up monthly to deposit the same amount in your bank account as you do now as an employed Federal employee. If the number in this section is highlighted in <u>RED</u>, then you will have less net income in retirement than you do now as an employed Federal employee. If the number is highlighted in <u>GREEN</u>, then you will have more net income in retirement than you do now as an employed Federal employee.

4) <u>Difference (Annual Amount to Make-Up)</u> – This is a critical estimate to know. This will show you an estimate of the <u>difference</u> you would have to "make up" on an annual basis to deposit the same amount in your bank account as you do now as an employed Federal employee. If the numbers in this section are highlighted in <u>RED</u>, then you will have less net income in retirement than you do now as an employed Federal employee. If the numbers are highlighted in <u>GREEN</u>, then you will have more net income in retirement than you do now as an employed Federal employee.

10) <u>TSP Annual Balance After Retirement Tab</u>

This tab at the bottom of the sheet will provide the user with the estimated balance of their TSP funds after retirement whether the funds remain in the TSP or are moved to another investment vehicle. These balances will take the following elements into account when estimating the year-ending TSP balance:

- i. Estimated TSP balance at retirement.
- ii. Age at retirement.
- iii. Amount (if any) of a one-time partial withdrawal from your TSP funds.
- iv. Age to take the one-time partial withdrawal.
- v. Amount to take in annual voluntary withdrawals from your TSP funds. <u>**IMPORTANT NOTE**</u> - Functionality exists to allow users to indicate if they want to estimate an increase in their voluntary TSP withdrawal each year based on inflation. Starting with Cell A15, each year has a check box added. Check the box if you want to increase this particular by a %. Once you check the box, add the % increase in the cells in Column B for that year. For example, if you want to estimate and increase your voluntary TSP withdrawal by 2% for inflation, you will check the box on the line that represents your age when you want the increase to happen and you would enter 2 in the ENTER % OF INFLATION INCREASE cell. In the example below, it assumes an initial voluntary TSP withdrawal of \$60,000 annually with a 2% increase in the 2nd year and a 3% increase in the 3rd year. Once an increase is selected, all following years estimate will continue with the same annual amount until another increase is entered.



- vi. Age to begin to take annual withdrawals from your TSP funds.
- vii. Estimated annual interest rate of return on funds left after any one-time partial withdrawal from your TSP funds.
- viii. Required Minimum Disbursements (RMD's) that begin at age 72.

When estimating the annual balances of your TSP funds, the following assumptions are used in the calculations and formulas.

- i. The interest on your funds is compounded annually (once a year) on your total balance. This is different than most compounding interest accounts that may compound quarterly or bi-annually. I would rather be more conservative in my calculations.
- ii. The One-Time partial withdrawal is made at the beginning of the year that you elect to make this withdrawal. That means that when calculating the interest earned on the remaining balance for the year the one-time partial withdrawal is made, the withdrawal is made first then the interest calculation is made on the remaining balance. As an example, if you have \$1,000,000 in your account and you do a one-time partial withdrawal of \$200,000, then the interest calculation made for that year will be on a balance of \$800,000.
- iii. Your voluntary annual withdrawal is made at the end of the year. This means that your starting balance at the beginning of the year has the interest added to your account before taking out the annual withdrawal amount. I would rather take the annual withdrawal out first, but this is how the formula is written. As an example, if you have a beginning balance of \$1,000,000 at the beginning of the year, and you are using 5% as your estimated rate of return, then your beginning balance of \$1,000,000 will be used to calculate your annual interest for that year which would add \$50,000 to your balance. If you have elected to take an annual withdrawal in this year of \$50,000, then your ending balance would still be \$1,000,000 (\$1,000,000 x 5% = \$1,050,000 \$50,000 annual withdrawal = \$1,000,000)

iv. Required Minimum Disbursements (RMD's) are calculated by dividing your previous year's TSP balance by the below listed distribution period (see chart below). RMD's are now required at age 72, up from 70½. The RMD for your 72nd birth year must be taken by December 31 of the year. As an example, if your TSP balance on Dec 31st of your 71st birth year is \$1,000,000 then by December 31st of your 72nd birth year you would have to withdrawal \$39,062.50 (\$1,000,000 divided by 25.6). Your RMD for each year starting in your 72nd birth year is estimated in the REQUIRED MINIMUM DISBURSEMENT column on the <u>TSP Annual Balance after Retire</u> tab.

11) <u>Total Payments After Retire Tab</u>

This tab at the bottom of the sheet will provide the user with the estimated total payments from all their FERS benefits in the out-years after retirement. These total payments include the following payments:

i. Annual Annuity Amount

- 1. The estimated initial annuity amount, in the year of retirement, is automatically entered from user data entry on the Basic Calculator tab.
- 2. Starting in the year after retirement, the user will have the ability to estimate an increase in their annuity payment each individual year by a potential COLA increase %. This will allow the user to estimate their annuity payment in the out years based on a user entered COLA increase % each year. The user will need to check the box in the Annuity Column, in the row of the year they want to increase (Column A) and enter the % increase they want to use (Column B). In the example below, the initial annuity payment at retirement is \$86,135.36 with a 2% increase in the 3rd year and a 3% increase in the 4th year. Once an increase is selected, all following years will continue with the same annual amount until another increase is entered.

ii. Annual RAS or Social Security Amount

- These cells will automatically enter the RAS amount from user data entry on the Basic Calculator tab in <u>cell J23</u> until the age of 62. At age 62, the RAS will stop even if you elect to delay receiving your Social Security payments.
- 2. These cells will include Social Security payment in the years that you select to start receiving payments in <u>cell C7</u>.

If the age you select to start receiving your Social Security payments in <u>cell C7</u> is age 62, then the amount in the Annual RAS or Social Security Amount column will be based on the values you entered on the Basic Calculator tab in <u>cell J23</u> times 12 months (J23*12).

In the example below, the annual RAS payment at retirement is \$25,500.00 and it continues until age 62. Social Security payments would then start at the user entered age of 62 (<u>Cell C7</u>) for \$30,000.00. ****NOTE**** This assumes there is no post-retirement income that would be means tested at age 57 and would affect the RAS benefit.



If you are planning to remain in this post-retirement job at/after age 57, you should check the box for each year you plan to remain.

12) <u>TSP Historical Rates of Return Tab</u>

This tab at the bottom of the sheet will provide the user with the historical average monthly and annual rates of return for all the existing TSP funds. For the G, F, and C funds, the data goes back to 1988 which is as far back as the TSP web site goes. The S and I fund data begin in 2001, the year that these funds entered into existence. The L Income, L 2030, and L 2040 funds began in 2006 and the L 2050 began in 2011. The L 2025, L 2035, L 2045, L 2055, and L 2065 began in July, 2020.

Also shown on this page are the TSP Milestone Average Rates of Return. This will show the 1-yr, 3-yr, 5-yr, 10-yr, 15-yr, 20-yr, 25-yr, 30-yr, 35-yr and 40-yr average monthly and annual rates of returns for all the existing TSP funds (if applicable).

13) Min Withdrawal Factors

This tab displays the Uniform Lifetime Table for Calculating Minimum Distributions. This information is used to calculate your Required Minimum Disbursements (RMD's) as described above in Section 10iv.

14) <u>SL Conversion Chart</u>

This tab is used to calculate the number of sick leave hours you can use, prior to your retirement day, without losing any service credit. These hours will be lost at retirement if not used. There is no user input on this tab.

For example: 441 hours of unused sick leave equals 2 months and 16 days. Find the # of hours (441) in the row where 441 is between the HOURS START and HOURS END columns. The column where the hours fall is highlighted in column F as displayed below. The MONTHS and DAYS columns will show the number of months and days that number of unused sick leave hours converts to.

There is no limit to the amount of sick leave that can be added to the earned service of an eligible employee. If the sick leave balance is greater than 2,087, subtract 2,087 from your balance and calculate the amount of time in addition to the one year of credit you will receive. (See additional explanation below). **NOTE**: For retirement credit purposes, sick leave days are 5.8 hours long. By law there are 2,087 hours in a work year. Since OPM calculates annuities on a 360-day (12 equal months of 30 days in length), 360 divided into 2,087 equals 5.8 hours.

FERS employees receive 100% credit for their sick leave balance. The days of unused sick leave that are added are used only in counting your number of years and months of service for annuity computation purposes. The sick leave cannot be used in computing your "high-3" average salary or for meeting the minimum length of service for retirement eligibility³⁴.

15) Hours per Week Chart Tab

This tab at the bottom of the sheet will provide the user with a visual representation of annual income for an hourly wage retirement job.

This tab is designed for those of you who will be looking for a retirement job, but do not want to lose any of your SRS benefits that become means tested once you reach age 57. This tab will allow you to look at the number of hours you want to work per week in retirement and what hourly wage you can make before you hit the IRS RAS means testing limit (\$22,320 for 2024) and you begin losing SRS benefits.

For example, if you want to work 20 per week in a retirement, hourly wage job, you can make up to \$20.25 per hour without hitting the limit and losing SRS benefits.

16) <u>GS Pay Scale</u>

This tab displays the current GS Pay Scale for all grades (1-15) and steps (1-10) to include the Annual, Hourly, and SOT pay amounts for each grade/step.

17) <u>Websites</u>

This tab lists several web sites that have valuable information concerning retirement related issues.

18) <u>New Year Data</u>

This information on this tab is hidden from the user and is used by the Basic Calculator tab for various calculations.

19) <u>SL Calculations</u>

This information on this tab is hidden from the user and is used by the Basic Calculator tab to calculate the user's estimated sick leave hours at their estimated retirement date.
