





WEEKLY UPDATES FROM CAMP PAGWEAK

WEEK # 1 – ODYSSEY

I am thrilled to say that we have had a great week at camp! The first week of camp always has its challenges as we open more buildings, use more of the property, adjust to new schedules, try out new activities and we had our fair share. However, all in all it was a great first week.

We had 34 campers with us this week and they were tremendous. Our adjustments to accommodate camp in a Covid world were easily accepted by them and were therefore not ever an issue. They participated well and even though we opened on a rainy Sunday almost a week ago their excitement at being back at camp was

evident from the moment they arrived and their enthusiasm carried on throughout the week.

We were blessed with Pastor Michael Fredericks from Immanuel Baptist in Truro this week as our Camp Pastor. He spoke on the life of Jesus through the eyes of Peter. Each day he shared a key thought on what Peter and we can learn by walking us through a story of Peter interacting with our Saviour. He talked to us about how we are accepted by Jesus, how we are helped by Jesus, how we are forgiven by Jesus, saved by Jesus and how we can live for Jesus.

One of the key things that happened is that we baptized a young camper from Pastor Michael's church on Thursday night. Talk of that led to another camper who has been coming to camp for years (actually accepted Christ 3 summers ago at camp) who wished to be baptized and he also was baptized by Michael on Thursday. When I contacted his parents (who according to him rarely go to church) his mom was thrilled that we would be able to baptize him which was a real encouragement to us.

As well, a camper in one of our boys cabins decided on Thursday to ask Jesus to be His saviour. We saw many others moving in that direction as well throughout the week. There were 2 campers in particular, one male, and one female, who both at the beginning of the week stated they just came to camp for the fun (which is OK) but had no interest in God, but were asking a lot of questions by Friday about God and Jesus and starting to take a real interest in where God fits into their life. Quite a turnaround in 5 days, and I am sure there were many more who we had the privilege to help move along their spiritual journey as Christ calls them to Him.

The new activities were a big success in my mind though they did need a bit of tweaking. Some of the grips on the new bouldering wall were a bit loose but they are all pretty snug now. One of the ramps in the new bike trail was a bit too peaked and bikes were hitting the top as they went up and over, so we fixed that. Our new pews once we had kids sit in them began to rock and then lean forward so we have staked them now into the ground and they are very secure. Again, just part of week one.

The staff has already come together as one and it is great to see how they have accepted those that are new to our camp family either from other camps and even those that have never been on camp before. Already at this point you can see them operating as one body of believers committed to serving Him and ministering with all that they have to these young campers.

WEEK # 2 – ADVENTURE 1

Wow, what an awesome week. We had amazing weather this week (especially no rain on registration or pick up). It was hot and muggy at times but the weather allowed us to use all of our property and enjoy using it and having adventures together.

It surprises me this year as to how many of our campers have never been to our camp before. At this point we are running around 75% or higher. The other thing we are noticing is that campers are more anxious and struggling with being away from home. After no camp last year and being asked by the government to be in their family bubble or circle for most of the past year, it is a little more challenging for some to be away from home. This week we started out with 36 campers and only lost 2 of them to home early, and last week we only lost 1 (and he is coming back for day camp next week). So we are pleased with how God is allowing us to work with the others that have struggled and they each therefore have enjoyed a full week of camp.

This week our Camp Pastor was Kristy Short from Fredericton. She has served before as our camp pastor and also is our Ladies Retreat speaker (remember September 17-19). She is a gifted speaker and teacher and this week used the stories of Daniel in the Old Testament to teach us about Faithfulness and then each chapel time transitioned into a story of Jesus from the New Testament and how that relates to our lives today. She is a gifted story teller and with all of her props and involving kids at times in her stories of the Bible the kids were totally captivated.

This year we are not doing cabin devotions at bedtime but have moved them to just after dinner and are calling them Evening Times with God. We are all doing the same message (Sunday – creation, Monday the Fall, Tuesday – the Rescuer, and Wednesday – Our transformation) and through Kristy’s messages and these devotions, God decided to allow the staff to lead 5 campers into a relationship with Jesus. Hallelujah !!! Praise God !!

I am continually amazed at how our first year Senior Cabin Leaders are doing after not having another year as a Junior Cabin Leader last year, how our first year Juniors are excelling beyond my expectations, despite the same or in some cases being entirely new in leadership at Pagweak and our young volunteers they too are going above and beyond our expectations and it is only 2 weeks in.

It was a great thrill on Wednesday morning as we entered Phase 4 and at flagpole all of our campers were allowed (some chose not to) put away their masks. My biggest thrill of that was to walk into the dining hall after breakfast had just started and to see all of their smiling faces, I am so grateful that we are open and that things in our province are continuing to improve.

It was a rather younger group than what we had expected and so there were a bunch of modifications to our plans to accommodate them. As well, the weather played havoc with our plans too as it rained most of Thursday, from dawn till dusk. Despite that we had a great time. Even in the midst of one particular heavy downpour on Thursday a basketball game broke out on the court and during circle games in the chapel earlier that day, a dance concert broke out. Many other things happened due to the creativity of our program director, the staff or even the campers themselves.

Pastor Natasha Davidson from Springhill was our camp pastor this week and she fit in like a glove with our staff. Her talks this week matched very well with our weekly devotion material we are using this year. She spoke on Creation and how God made space for us to live, then on Sin’s entrance into our world, and then that Jesus came into our world and did some crazy unexpected things, and then on how Jesus then revealed himself as our rescuer. She had lots of interaction with the kids during chapel times and outside of them and really involved herself in our camp activities which is greatly appreciated.

On Friday morning, 2 girls prayed with their cabin leaders to accept Christ as their Saviour and numerous Bibles went home with kids with words of encouragement from our staff in the front of them.

In the evenings we had numerous activities planned for the staff to enhance their team bonding but also to help them improve as camp leaders. On Monday night we all got in kayaks, paddled to Pugwash, had ice cream, swam at the wharf and then paddled home. When we got back to our beach I led a session on how we can support our kayak activity leader and lifeguard better during that session each day and improve our care of the campers while in their kayaks. On Tuesday there were separate and crazy activities for the male staff and others specifically for the females. On Wednesday, Jared and Melanie led a great session on how better to deal with homesickness and then we had this most amazing Worship and Communion and Encouragement session together (2 hours). On Thursday we of course had campers but there wasn't a one who felt homesick that evening so we were really excited.

Remember our Supporters Picnic on September 25th and a special request for prayer and registrations for our Ladies Retreat on September 17-19. The numbers for this event are lower than I would like at this point so if there are any ladies out there still considering it I need to know if your plans by this coming Monday before I go to bed so I can make a wise decision about the viability of this event for this year.

Again, thank you for your prayers over the past year and especially the past few months. I know that without them I would not be here writing this report waiting for the campers to wake up. We have had no serious health issues, we have had no serious camper or staff dramas, we have had no serious staff conflicts or disagreements, we have been praised by our camp pastors as they see our staff work as one at all times and the peace that they sense throughout each week they are here. That I truly believe is because of the prayers you offer up to our God each day, each week, hopefully each hour. Your work on your knees or wherever you pray are one of the biggest reasons we have been able to do what we have done. Thank you.

NEW DEVELOPMENTS/EVENTS 2021

- Our camp opened with a two of my senior staff arriving from New Brunswick on June 4 and while they were self-isolating we together got the property and new activities ready for campers.
- Staff training was done as a 6 day experience this year from June 25-30 as we could not gather together as we have in the past until near the end of June. It was a great week together. The new and old staff bonded together right from the first day. It was really great as halfway through this week we finally got the Guidelines for Overnight Camping and they fit almost perfectly with the Operational Plan I put together months before.
- We were very fortunate to receive (5) Student grants - two Provincial and three Federal grants.
- Our Canadian Baptist Women also support one of our positions – Global Adventures. They have been doing this faithfully for many summers and we are blessed to have their support. This year Heather McKinnon was our Global Adventures leader with a focus on supporting students in Rwanda who can't afford to go to school. The campers raised \$ 1,204.55 through their mission soakers on Friday mornings.
- A \$1000 recreation grant was received from the County of Cumberland which enabled us to purchase some bikes for our new bike course.
- We also received another grant this year from the Baptist Foundation in the amount of \$3400 and this was used to finish our new bouldering shelter, purchase archery targets and nets and finish the bike trail.
- Due to Covid we had to find a way to social distance while we worshiped and were being taught by our camp pastors so we started to dream of an outdoor worship center. I felt the best location was right behind the Worship Center overlooking the ocean. Through donations of pews by First Baptist New Glasgow and Parrsboro Baptist (in March) we had just the right number of pews to handle our campers in cohorts and also for our leadership/volunteer staff cohort. As well, through the donation by Nova Tree we were able to put in about six inches of wood chips underneath the pews.
- As well, due to Covid we needed to figure out how to do campfire and again keep our campers in cohorts and our benches really needed replacing. Thanks to Ralph Weeks in Wallace as he made us 12 benches and donated them and delivered them. They again were the perfect number (and I only asked for 10), and they are beautiful.
- A successful Ladies Retreat was held on September 17-19. The attendance was low but I was really encouraged as a majority of the ladies who came were younger than 40 and I am hoping this is a rekindling of the Ladies Retreat with a new generation of ladies. I truly hope that next June the older generation that did not feel comfortable returning to this event just yet, join this younger generation. Guest speaker was again Kristy Short and our worship leader was Katrina Drost.
- Preserving our camp history is important and one of our main objectives. We are proud to display photos of every church within our Associations. Sadly there are churches which have had to close during our 70 years of camping and these churches have supported the camp for many years. One of those churches, Bass River closed this year but we were thrilled to receive a significant donation from the proceeds of the sale of the church, the property and the parsonage. We have already put some of that donation towards sponsorship over the past summer as well as buying enough air conditioners to make every camper cabin cool on the hot

days. The board is currently looking at how best to use the rest of this donation to honor Bass River's commitment to our camp over the years and also help us move forward and best meet the needs of our communities.

- Rentals are scheduled throughout the fall. All rentals are coordinated by our director, David Throop. We have had a girls choir from Truro out for the weekend already and mid-October a university student Christian group will be at the camp.
- Unfortunately due to Covid gathering limits primarily we had to again cancel our annual celebrations, Celebration Sunday and Supporters Picnic. If you were planning on attending and thinking of making a donation we would appreciate you forwarding your donation to our treasurer or doing so through Canada Helps. It is our strong desire that next year we will be able to again have these events and see you all at camp !!
- We owe a great deal of thanks to Terry Wambolt who not only is our Treasurer but keeps the grass mowed all summer long.
- Camp promotion and camp partnership continues to be a main objective. If your church is open and willing David is also willing and open to coming and sharing a Camp Pagweak video presentation with your church family during the next number of months.
