


Shared Parenting Polling: A National Consensus


Between February 2019 and January 2021, National Parents Organization commissioned polling, conducted by an independent, professional polling company, Researchscape International, in nine states about American's beliefs and attitudes concerning shared parenting when parents live apart.


The results show broad and extremely strong support for equal shared parenting by separated parents and, importantly, overwhelming support for creating a *legal presumption* in favor of shared parenting. This national consensus is exhibited in every state that we polled and is shared across demographic divides of race, ethnicity, income, educational level, and gender. In cases where parents are living apart because of divorce or separation:


- Overwhelmingly, Americans believe that it is *in the best interest of children* to spend as much time as possible with both parents.
- Overwhelmingly, Americans believe that *children have a right* to spend equal or nearly equal time with each parent.
- Overwhelmingly, Americans support a legal presumption of shared parenting.
- Overwhelmingly, Americans believe that an award of sole custody increases parental conflict.




Would "be more likely to vote for a candidate who supports children spending significant, up to equal, amounts of time with each parent following separation or divorce"
