Sugar Maple** <i>Acer Saccharum</i>	L	40-80	30-60	Slow-Med	3-4'	April	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Beautiful fall color. Intolerant of road salt, poorly drained and/or compacted soils.
River Birch* <i>Betula nigra</i>	M	30-40	25-35	Med	4-5'	April-May	Full sun-part shade	Medium Wet	Beautiful exfoliating white bark. Tolerates temporary flooding and clay soils. Note: roots infiltrate subsurface drainage. Keep at least 100' from any buried drainage pipes.
N. Pecan <i>Carya illinoensis</i>	L	70-100	40-70	Med	3-4'	April-May	Full sun	Medium	Begins to bear nuts in 6-10 years. Excellent food source for humans and wildlife.
Shagbark Hickory <i>Carya ovata</i>	L	60-80	30-50	Slow	2-3'	April-May	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Requires large area to grow. Great shade tree with interesting bark in maturity. Tolerates clay soils.
N. Catalpa <i>Catalpa speciosa</i>	M/L	40-70	20-50	Med-Fast	4-5'	May-June	Full sun-part shade	Medium-Wet	Tolerant of wet and dry soils and seasonal flooding. Dramatic white flowers, long slender seedpods. Catalpa sphinx moth caterpillars common. Messy for prominent areas.
Persimmon* ** <i>Diospyros virginiana</i> <b>1 GALLON POTS ONLY</b>	M	35-60	25-35	Med	1-2'	Fruit in Sept.	Full sun-part shade	Dry-Medium	Ornamental tree with edible food crop. Male and female trees necessary for fruiting. Prune suckers for central leader. <b>1 GALLON POTS ONLY</b>
American Beech <i>Fagus grandifolia</i>	L	50-80	40-80	Med.	3-4'	April-May	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Large tree for large space. Large lawn or parks. Beechnuts ripen in fall and are edible. Tolerates deer and black walnut toxicity.
Kentucky Coffeetree <i>Gymnocladus dioica</i> <b>1 GALLON POTS ONLY</b>	M	60-75	30-50	Slow-Med	2-3'	May-Jun	Full Sun	Dry-Wet	Shade and ornamental tree with pyramidal shape. Produces seed pods. Very drought tolerant. <b>1 GALLON POTS ONLY</b>

Sycamore* <i>Platanus occidentalis</i>	L	75-100	75-100	Fast	4-5'	April	Full sun	Medium-Wet	Largest diameter deciduous tree in N. America. Prefers rich organic soils, tolerant of urban pollution. Avoid planting near drainage tiles.
White Oak <i>Quercus alba</i> <b>1 GALLON POTS ONLY</b>	L	50-80	50-80	Slow	2-3'	May	Full sun	Dry-Medium	Adapts to a wide variety of soil conditions with good drought tolerance. Slow growing. Large shade tree, street tree or lawn tree. <b>1 GALLON POTS ONLY</b>
Swamp White Oak <i>Quercus bicolor</i>	M	50-60	50-60	Fast	4-5'	April	Full sun	Medium-Wet	Prefers acidic soils. Great for wet spots with surprising drought tolerance.
Scarlet Oak <i>Quercus coccinea</i>	M/L	50-70	40-50	Medium	4-5'	April-May	Full sun	Dry-Medium	Shade tree with large crown. Tolerates drought and dry soil. Great fall color. Low maintenance.
Bur Oak <i>Quercus macrocarpa</i>	L	60-80	60-80	Slow	4-5'	April	Full sun	Dry-Medium	Adapts to a wide range of soil conditions but prefers moist well-drained soils. May take up to 35 years to bear first acorns. Acorns are an important food source for wildlife.
Red Oak <i>Quercus rubra</i>	M/L	50-75	50-75	Medium	4-5'	May	Full sun	Dry-Medium	Prefers well drained acidic soils. Needs ample growing space. Tolerates pollution, compacted soils, drought and salt spray. Does not tolerate flooding.
White Pine <i>Pinus strobus</i>	L Evergreen	50-80	20-40	Fast	12-18"	Evergreen	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Low maintenance, rapid growing evergreen tree. Great specimen tree – allow space for future growth. Great for windbreaks. Susceptible to many pests.
N. White Cedar <i>Thuja occidentalis</i>	M Evergreen	20-40	10-15	Medium	1-2'	Evergreen	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Best in full sun but appreciates some light afternoon shade. Intolerant of dry conditions.
E. Red Cedar* <i>Juniper virginiana</i>	M Evergreen	30-65	8-25	Medium	2-3'	Evergreen	Full sun	Dry-Medium	Good for screen or windbreak. Intolerant of shade.
Bald Cypress <i>Taxodium distichum</i>	L-Deciduous conifer	50-70	20-45	Medium	4-5'	Deciduous conifer	Full sun	Medium-Wet	Tolerates a wide range of soils – dry to standing water. Looses needles in the fall.
Canadian Hemlock <i>Tsuga canadensis</i>	M- Evergreen	40-70	25-35	Medium	2-3'	Evergreen	Part shade- full shade	Medium	Best sited in part shade in sheltered locations protected from strong drying winds and hot afternoon sun. Intolerant of drought and should be watered regularly in prolonged dry spells. Appreciates a thick winter mulch.
Allegheny Serviceberry <i>Amelanchier laevis</i> **	S	15-40	15-40	Medium	3-4'	April	Full sun- part shade	Medium	Edible berries attract birds. Attractive understory tree for lawns, street tree or screening.
Paw Paw** <i>Asimina triloba</i>	S	15-30	15-30	Slow	6-12"	Fruit in Fall	Full sun- shade	Medium- Moist	"Indiana Banana" - Great understory tree. Tolerates shade and competition. Large edible fruit ripens in October. Need multiple trees for fruit production.
Redbud* <i>Cercis Canadensis</i>	S	20-30	25-35	Medium	4-5'	April	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Showy pink spring flowers. Avoid poorly drained soils. Tolerates deer browse, clay soil, and black walnut toxicity.
Pagoda Dogwood <i>Cornus alternifolia</i>	S	15-25	20-32	Medium	3-4'	May-June	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Tiered horizontal branching – reference to its common name. Small, fragrant yellowish-white flower. Flowers give way to bluish-black fruits. Attracts birds and butterflies. Provide consistent moisture and mulch root zone.
Red Osier Dogwood <i>Cornus sericea</i>	Shrub	6-9	7-10	Fast	2-3'	May-June	Full sun- part shade	Medium-Wet	Red branches for great winter interest. Tolerates clay soil, wet soil and deer browse. Can be used for erosion control or screening.
Black Chokeberry** <i>Aronia melanocarpa</i>	Shrub	3-6	3-6	Medium	18-24"	May	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Great for borders and wet areas. Prune suckers to limit spread. Loved by birds.



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New Jersey Tea** <i>Ceanothus americanus</i>	Shrub	3-4	3-5	Medium	2-3"	May-July	Full sun-part shade	Dry-Medium	Compact, dense, rounded shrub great for well-drained areas. Drought tolerant, very adaptable. Nectar source and larval host to azure butterflies and mottled Duskywing. Nitrogen fixer.
Buttonbush** <i>Cephalanthus occidentalis</i>	Shrub	5-12	4-8	Medium	2-3'	June	Full sun-part shade	Medium-Wet	Grows well in wet soils. Showy unique flower heads.
Common Ninebark** <i>Physocarpus opulifolius</i>	Shrub	5-8	4-6	Medium	2-3'	May-June	Full sun-part shade	Dry-Medium	Versatile shrub for screening, hedges or specimen planting. Prune regularly for landscape aesthetic. Tolerates road salt, clay soil, occasional drought and flooding.
Hazelnut <i>Corylus americana</i>	Shrub	10-16	8-13	Medium	2-3'	March-April	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Best grown in naturalized areas, open woodland garden or prairies where it can be allowed to spread. Can be used as a screen/planting for the rear of shrub border. Edible nuts. Monoecious (separate male and female flowers on same plant).
Common Witchhazel <i>Hamamelis virginiana</i>	Shrub	15-20	15-20	Medium	1-2'	October-December	Full sun-part shade	Medium	Bright yellow flowers in the Fall. Prefers moist, acidic, organically rich soils. Tolerates heavy clay soils and deer. Remove suckers to prevent colonial spread.
Winterberry** <i>Ilex verticillata</i>	Shrub	3-12	3-12	Slow	2-3'	June-July	Full sun-part shade	Medium-Wet	Adaptable to both light and heavy soils. Good tolerance for poorly drained soils. Females produce bright red berries in late summer to fall that will persist through the winter. Male and female species required to produce fruit.
Meadowsweet** <i>Spiraea alba</i>	Shrub	3-4	3-4	Medium	1-2'	June-August	Full sun-part shade	Medium-Wet	Needs constant moisture and soil must not be allowed to dry out. Effective along streams or ponds, in low spots or boggy areas, or with regular watering, in a border, cottage garden or rain garden. Attracts butterflies.
Coralberry** <i>Symphoricarpos orbiculatus</i>	Shrub	2-5	4-8	Fast	2-3'	April-May	Full sun-part shade	Medium-Dry	Coral-red berries provide winter interest. Naturalize in open woodland areas where it can be allowed to spread. Erosion control. Native plant gardens.
Arrowwood Viburnum <i>Viburnum dentatum</i> **	Shrub	6-10	6-10	Medium	2-3"	May-June	Full sun-part shade	Dry-Medium	Tolerates a wide range of soils. Flowers give way to blue-black berries that are attractive to birds and wildlife. Variable fall color – yellow, red, orange. Winter hardy, vigorous and reliable.
Smooth Hydrangea <i>Hydrangea arborescens</i>	Shrub	3-5	3-5	Medium	2-3'	June-Sept.	Part shade	Medium	Also called "wild hydrangea". Great for naturalized settings in woodland or native plant gardens. Showy white flowers. Low maintenance.
Blackhaw Viburnum <i>Viburnum prunifolium</i>	Shrub	12-15	6-12	Medium	2-3'	May-June	Full sun-part shade	Dry-Medium	Easily grown in dry soil, tolerates drought and clay soil. Can be a multi-stem shrub or trained into a single stem small tree.
Lead Plant** <i>Amorpha canescens</i>	Shrub	2-3	2-2.5	Fast	1-2"	July-Sept.	Full sun	Dry-Medium	Does well in poor, sandy and somewhat dry soils. Grayish-green leaflets and an attractive spike-like cluster of bluish-purple flower provide interest. Good plant for naturalizing in a native or wildflower garden, prairie or meadow. Attracts butterflies.
Spicebush** <i>Lindera benzoin</i>	Shrub	6-12	6-10	Medium	2-3'	April	Sun-shade	Dry-Wet	Good in moist, shady spaces. Larval host to Swallowtail butterfly.
