
Rector's Report

Dear Friends,

Each passing month brings new hope that we are coming closer to the end of the pandemic. More people are vaccinated, and the warm weather brings both hope and impatience: when are we going to get back to "normal"?

Here at Trinity, we have made two realizations. First, when we gather in small groups as fully vaccinated people, it does feel like it did before the pandemic. Let me hasten to add that we have protocols for how all committees, commissions, and other ministries are to gather.

your group gather in person, please contact the office
(info@trinitycovington.org) to schedule your meeting—
regardless of whether you are gathering as a fully vaccinated group or as a mixed group of vaccinated and unvaccinated people. For mixed groups, we will continue
to mask, physically distance, and follow other precautions making things feel less normal. But again, when I
gathered recently with the Stephen Ministers, all of
whom were vaccinated, it was a return to a comfortable
kind of normal.



Second, when it comes to in-person worship, we are a little further from normal: masks and physical distancing may be around for a while. As far as worship goes, we are building this plane as we fly it, to use a tired, but useful, image. None of the staff and Sunday volunteers have ever done hybrid worship before, and we discover new twists and turns each week. Despite this, I sense even now, just a few weeks into this adventure, that people are starting to get impatient. They want normal now. For those feeling this way, I would ask your patience.

In the meantime, we are working to make the reservation system easier to navigate and less of a barrier to participation. We are also working to make hybrid worship (in-person and online) more welcoming and inclusive so that our "virtual" parishioners feel a part of the community. I am meeting with Trinity's online folks to discuss how we can engage them and care for them.

Summary of vestry minutes: March 8, 2021

NEW BUSINESS

2021 budget:

- Total income from pledgers and non-pledgers was \$59,120; expenses totaled \$109,655.
- Giving was up 6% and the average pledge went up 26%. The number of pledging units increased by 10% from 2020; however, some previous pledging units are not giving at this time.
- New budget includes a deficit of \$40,827.

Physical Resources discussion:

- Suggestion made to use \$50,000 from the capital campaign to renovate the kitchen. Physicial Resources chair is consulting with the architect and will present a preliminary report to vestry.
- Sacristy will be rearranged to make room for the stream team. Cameras and wiring have been installed, and cabinets have been moved out of the sacristy.
- Now that the budget has passed, Physical Resources chair will work with insurance company to settle a claim for wind damage
- In preparation for in-person services with COVID restrictions, additional hand sanitizer stations and four ionization units will be added to the sanctuary; and two additional portable air units will be added to the elevator and office.

Worship plans:

- Kenton County is in the "orange zone" for COVID cases. In-person services will begin on March 21 with a maximum of 80 people (25% capacity). There will be an online system for reservations. All parishioners will have their temperatures checked before the service and will be asked to use hand sanitizer and sit in a designated pew for worship.
- There will be Easter services at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. and drive-through communion will be offered after the services.
- In April and May there will be services at 10 a.m. with some of the services taking place outside.

ONGOING BUSINESS

Vestry listening session follow-up:

- How does the vestry share the information from the retreat listening sessions with parishioners? Each group or commission will discuss these topics in upcoming issues of the *Chimes*.
- What will the vestry do with this information? The vestry will wait until April and May to have this discussion.
- When will small group meetings be allowed to return to the church? Peter will ask the Bishop.

Final concert of virtual 40th season

Pianist Jiao Sun is our performer for A Midday Musical Menu concert on Wednesday, May 19 at 12:15 p.m. Jiao will perform a Haydn sonata, the first movement of a Brahms sonata, and selections from Prokofiev Visions Fugitives. The recital will be live streamed and then available afterwards for viewing on

Jiao Sun was born in Harbin, China, and grew up in Beijing, where she was admitted to the Central Conservatory of Music at age nine as a national first prize winner. She debuted with orchestra at age eleven. Jiao has captured top prizes at the Memphis Repertory Orchestra International Concerto Competition, A Step Towards Mastery International Piano Competition, two Chautauqua Piano Competitions, the CCM Concerto Competition, the Rising Star Piano Competition, and the Golden Bell National Piano Competition for young musicians. She has performed in Russia, Britain, Hong Kong, and extensively in the United States and Mainland China.

Her highlights this season include winning the 3rd prize at the Ohio Tuesday Musical Scholarship Competition, winning the CCM Graduate Excellence in Teaching Award, being chosen as one of the twelve Semifinalists of the Washington International Piano Competition, which will be held this June. Recently she has been featured in the CCM Etude Project and in the emerging Chinese Magazine *ALONG*.

Jiao has earned an Artist's Diploma with Soyeon Kate Lee at CCM (College-Conservatory of Music of the University of Cincinnati), where she is currently completing a Doctoral of Musical Arts degree in piano performance.

She has received a Master of Music degree in piano performance and literature with Douglas Humpherys and a Bachelor of Music degree in piano performance with Rebecca Penneys at the Eastman School of Music.

She has also worked with Paul Schenly, Ann Schein, Bernadene Blaha, Amy I-Lin Cheng, and Guangren Zhou.

FOCUS ON MISSION

Diocese of Lexington Virtual Reading Camp Receives \$12,000 UTO Grant

Inited Thank Offering (UTO) has announced that the Diocese of Lexington will receive a \$12,000 grant for Virtual Reading Camp. The focus of the granting process this year was *Recovering with Love and Gratitude: An Episcopal Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic in Local Contexts.*

In March 2020, the COVID-19 crisis forced Reading Camp to put their typical in-person programs on hold and look for new ways to help struggling readers.

Pandemic has slowed progress in reading

While better-resourced families were able to access private help, underserved students did not have these opportunities and were quickly falling even further behind. Students who speak English as their second language were particularly disadvantaged. As families struggled to feed their families, education oftentimes ended up as a lower priority.

Virtual Reading Camp has helped these students catch up with their peers by distributing hundreds of free books, supplies, and pen-pal letters. A virtual literacy support program, Reading Camp Book Buddies, allows campers to meet remotely in a small group to work on reading skills, while Crafts with Counselors focuses on social and emotional wellness.

Intense demand for virtual reading camp program

The demand has been intense. Within hours of opening registration for the spring Reading Camp Book Buddies, all 45 slots for the program were filled and dozens more were placed on a waiting list.

The UTO grant will ensure that Virtual Reading Camp can continue to serve struggling students from Central and Eastern Kentucky. The funds will support a part-time staff position to focus on coordinating the virtual program, a pro Zoom subscription, and sets of books and instructional materials to ensure all have the same learning experience despite the virtual format.

Reading Camp Buddies new session fall 2021

A new session of Reading Camp Buddies is planned for fall 2021. It is hoped that the summer of

2022 will see the return of the familiar summer camp format for Reading Camp.



In an effort to respond quickly to communities impacted by the pandemic, UTO divided the 2020 ingathering funds into two separate granting cycles. Reading Camp applied for and received funding in the second granting cycle.

St. Martha's Episcopal Church, in partnership with Word of Hope Lutheran Church, received a COVID-19 pandemic grant in the first granting cycle of 2020 for their food ministry, A Caring Place.

Trinity has generously supported UTO for many years. A spring in-gathering will be held in May. If you have questions about how UTO funds grants, contact Diane Gabbard, Diocesan UTO Coordinator.

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As part of this, we will continue to have online coffee hour, even as we re-introduce "Punch in the Garden" on Sunday mornings so that parishioners can mingle outside after church.

My suspicion is that part of what is driving some of this impatience is unrecognized grief. Coming back in for worship, people find it is not the same as it was, and not what they imagined it would feel like when they came back. It's feeling let down mixed with a fear that things may never feel the same way they did before the pandemic.

At some point, in the not-too-distant future, I hope, we can return to "normal" worship with singing and people in pews close to each other, and we can give thanks to God that we have come through a difficult time guided by God's grace and love.
