The AIDS Memorial Quilt— Paying Tribute

Through the generosity of Steven Clay & Mike Smith and the National AIDS Memorial, Mosaic is proud to display six panels from the National AIDS Memorial Quilt during our production of one in two. Conceived of in 1985, the AIDS Memorial Quilt now includes 50,000 panels and is recognized as the largest ongoing community folk art project in the world.

one in two was inspired by playwright Donja R. Love's own HIV diagnosis, and like his powerful play, the AIDS Memorial Quilt is dedicated to healing, hope, remembrance, and ending stigma. As Donja embraced his craft to share his deeply personal story, people have used the Quilt to tell their stories or honor the stories of others—its panels pay tribute to 110,000 individuals.

The panels on display for *one in two* commemorate mothers and daughters like Belinda and Monica, activists like Eric Jordan and Dr. Mark Colomb, who led the establishment of National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day, cultural icons like Alvin Ailey, and brave individuals like 14-year-old Michael Felton, the first child in the state of Mississippi to speak publicly about his positive status. Some names are more familiar than others, but all of their stories ring with significance.

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PLAYWRIGHT & DIRECTOR



Donja R. Love (Playwright; he/they) is Black, Queer, living with HIV, and thriving. He's graced the cover of POZ magazine's POZ 100 issue, A&U magazine, and Positively Aware. He's one of Plus Magazine's "Most Amazing People Living with HIV." He's the recipient of POZ's Best in Performing Arts Award, the Horton Foote Playwriting Award, the Terrence McNally Award, the Antonyo's inaugural Langston Hughes Award, the Helen Merrill Award, the Laurents/Hatcher Foundation Award, and the Princess Grace Playwriting Award. Other honors include the Philadelphia Adult Grand Slam Poetry Championship. He's the co-founder of The Each-Other Project, a digital media platform that celebrates and fosters community through art and activism for Black Queer and Trans communities, through which he's produced numerous short films and digital series. He's also the creator of Write It Out!. a playwright's program and prize for people living with HIV. Plays include soft (world premiere; MCC Theater), one in two (world premiere; The New Group), Fireflies (world premiere; Atlantic Theater Company), Sugar in Our Wounds (world premiere: Manhattan Theatre Club), and What Will Happen to All That Beauty? He's a graduate of the Lila Acheson Wallace American Playwrights Program at The Juilliard School.



Raymond O. Caldwell (Director; he/him) was born in Wiesbaden, Germany and raised all over the world. Raymond is an awardwinning director, writer, and producer who has been leading Washington, DC's Theater Alliance as Producing Artistic Director since 2018. Regionally he has directed for Signature Theatre, Round House Theatre, Imagination Stage, Mosaic Theater Company, The Kennedy Center, National Players/Olney Theatre Center, Solas Nua, CulturalDC, African Continuum Theatre Company, and the Hegira. Prior to leading Theater Alliance, he was a faculty member and resident director in Howard University's Department of Theatre Arts for six years, and spent six seasons as the Community Engagement Partnership Manager at Arena Stage. He is committed to using theater as a tool to transform communities, and has partnered and worked with artists, activists, nonprofits, and NGOs throughout the world. In October 2022—in partnership with the US Department of State and Contact Base, a cultural NGO based in West Bengal—he developed the play A GLOBAL I.D.E.A. with 23 artists and activists from Bangladesh, Nepal, India, and the US that explored what Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility mean on the global stage. He has done similar work throughout the US, India, Ukraine, and Croatia. He earned an MFA in Acting and New Play Development from The Ohio State University and a BFA in Acting from the University of Florida. raymondocaldwell.com.

Managing Director **Serge Seiden** (he/him) helped found Mosaic Theater Company in 2015 and has held leadership positions with the Company since then. From 1990 to 2015, Serge held many positions at Studio Theatre, including Stage Manager, Literary Manager, and Producing Director. Seiden was a key player in Studio's 1996 and 2004 expansions—developments crucial to the reemergence of 14th Street NW as a DC cultural hub. He is also an acting teacher and director. For Mosaic, he most recently directed Birds of North America.
