The President's Message.

There have been requests for copies of the short speech I gave at the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina's annual convention, held last January in High Point. It is reprinted here. First, though, a few comments to help put it in perspective.

The Rev. Rick Lindsey, rector of All Saints' Church in Hilton Head Island, South Carolina has said, "Faith is that point of departure that claims our will, to do and be that which seems impossible. It is not the abundance of talent that is at stake, rather the faith to allow God to shape our lives and by that holy movement, to that which God has given us." These words resonate with me in large measure because so many



Episcopal women do step out in faith day in and day out, using what God has provided to further mission and ministry. This is what our organized sisterhood is all about, and this is what we need to be shouting from the mountaintops. We cannot afford, literally or figuratively, to miss any opportunity to tell the story of Episcopal Church Women and what we are accomplishing by giving back that which God has given.

Good morning!

My name is Lisa Towle and I bring you greetings from the Episcopal Church Women.

Last November 8th, at St. Timothy's Church in Winston-Salem, I was installed as president of the Diocesan ECW by our Bishop Suffragan, Gary Gloster. That day and every day since, I have, in ways big and small, been reminded of the legacy of ECW – which dates to 1871 – and our missionary roots. It was 133 years ago that the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was established by General Convention.

The women I follow in this job have, each in their own way, worked to build on the collegiality and mission we all share. They are known to many of you: Sylvia Nash. Gail Fennimore. Shara Partin. Carolyn Darst. Mittie Landi. June Gregory. May Grimsley. Scott Evans Hughes. And the list goes on.

They and I are but the tip of an iceberg, for known or unknown, an **army** of women are out there contributing to the health and welfare of the Diocese of North Carolina every single day. We are making disciples and making a difference.

Through the discipline of regular offerings for prayers of thanks and praise – United Thank Offerings – we have made a difference in the lives of the people of La Guadalupana and St. Mark's in Wilson. In 2003, they received a sizeable UTO grant -- \$30,000. The difference this money will make in their community will, I believe, help form disciples.

Through the Church Periodical Club, the ministry of the word, we have made a difference in the lives of many, many seminarians and parishes too poor to afford prayer books, hymnals and other worship-enhancing literature.

Through the Lex Mathews Scholarship Fund we have made a difference in the lives of adult women seeking to better their circumstances through education. With that difference comes disciples.

And in March, acting in concert with Thompson Children's Home, we will launch a literacy project that will make a difference in the lives of pre-schoolers and by extension their families. Yet more disciples. *And the list goes on.*

We are a spiritual, worshiping, educating, outreaching community of believers who will continue to look for ways in which to help our parishes and each others fulfill the call to embrace mission and discipleship.

I want to take this moment to thank both of our bishops for supporting our lay-led ministry. They don't just talk the talk, they have walked the walk when it comes to affirming and encouraging Episcopal Church Women.

I also give a heartfelt thank you to the clergy who have welcomed the ECW year in and year out.

For those who may not know of ECW – and even for those who do – you will be hearing more from us and about us as, I hope, better communication will be a hallmark of my tenure. As a start, I invite you to visit our new and first-ever web site! That's www.ecw-nc.org

For all the women who came before me, for the women here now, and in preparation for the generations to come, it is my prayer that we continue in faith and vision so the work in our parishes ... in our diocese ... in our world ... grows in God's way.

Note: From the president's memo to the Board: The first meeting of the year is traditionally an overnight session and used primarily for planning purposes. As a newly configured board living in a diocese and working on behalf of a church that is undergoing stress and change, it is even more imperative we learn how to better understand each other and communicate. As many of you have already heard me say, better communication – with each other, our constituency and the greater ECW organization—is going to be our watchword for the next few years. So, the board's new year will begin with a way to start that learning and communication process, as well as fulfillment of a promise made to Province IV.

A bit of background: About a year ago our ECW received a small grant from Province IV. The idea was that this seed money, so to speak, would be used to help us join with others in the region who were witnessing to the mission and ministry of the women of the church by addressing the national Call to Action challenge. We asked to consider creating a program related to the areas of Jubilee, anti-racism, economic justice, environmental stewardship, or global peace and justice. We indicated to Province IV leaders that our Executive Board would tackle, in some fashion, the issue of racism. It made the most sense to approach a topic at the February meeting since it offered the board the most time together. Ultimately the idea of a workshop on diversity emerged.

The workshop, was facilitated by Jodi Barnes Nelson, PhD, author, consult-

ant and MBA instructor at N.C. State University and Shani Barrax, a consultant and former director of Race Study Circles at The Greater Triangle YWCA. These women, both Episcopalian and highly trained, gently led us in a series of discussions and introspections.

(From Jodi): Our 2003 General Convention's theme, Engaging God's Mission, included four pillars: receiving, repenting, reconciling and restoring. This workshop will focus primarily on restoring our best selves, the selves that God created as possible and doable. Within today's culture, restoration has evolved to mean needed rest, relaxation, or getting our batteries recharged. The General Convention places a broader and yet more spiritual emphasis on restoration:

Restoration is reconciliation at home. at last. To restore is the act of having our relationships and our lives once again in the place God intends. Not only are we restored to the God who created us and to his will and way, but to our own best self. If there is a "going out" impulse in mission, restoration teaches us that there is also a time to "come back in" to the unity of God in Christ and each other.

We will look at what "coming back in" to the unity of God and Christ and each other might mean within the context of Christianity—especially for our rich Episcopalian diversity of races, ethnicities, and nationalities—and how the very personal "coming back in" to each other is absolutely necessary for individual growth, enlightenment and restoration. What gets in the way of coming back in? How do we help one another achieve this vital goal?

The facilitators used a variety of strategies and scenarios in engaging the Women to discuss how they might be applied to coming back to the unity of God and Christ in each other as a member of ECW committed to antiracism. We were challenged to bring forth specific actions and behaviors in their application(s). They distributed literature and resources for each of us to take home and share with others.



CHURCH PERIIODICAL CLUB UPDATE Sarah Shaw: cpc@ecw-nc.org

The year 2003 was a busy, active one for the work of Church Periodical Club, Diocese of North Carolina. Thirty-six churches plus the Episcopal Church Women Diocesan Board contributed \$4,837.38. Grants totaling \$6180.00 were awarded. This means our funds are depleted. There is a need to raise monies for seminarians this semester.

Update on Activities

In March, 2003, each of the 13 seminarians from the Diocese of North Carolina received \$150.00 in book grant money.

In June, we were represented at the Province IV meeting at the Kanuga Camp and Conference Center in preparation for the Triennial Convention meeting held July, 2003 in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Diana Frady, wife of former Bishop of Honduras and director of "Little Roses" girls school and orphanage, gave dynamic and encouraging presentations based on the Episcopal Church Women's Prayer.

We were represented and participated in the 5-day Church Periodical Club Triennial and then the Episcopal Church Women Triennial held the following week in July and August.

We also participated in the National Book Granting Session where \$1500.00 from the Diocese of North Carolina was granted to purchase Bibles, Hymnals, Prayer Books, and text books to fill requests from churches inside and outside of the United States. *All grant requests must be approved by the Bishop of the requesting Diocese or Province and be associated in some way with mission of the Episcopal Church*. Over \$42,000.00 was granted during that session from all the Dioceses represented. At that CPC granting session, book grant money was made available to each of the eleven Episcopal Seminaries though their Dean. Money was awarded for missionaries from the Episcopal Church, USA to order 2 magazines per year (one is often a news magazine and the other of a

religious nature, sometimes homemaking or craft periodicals are chosen to help where missionary women are involved in helping women in poverty stricken areas to become more self sufficient and develop cooperative enterprises).

We heard the Bishop of Jerusalem give thanks for the Mile of Pennies Grants given to each of seven schools for books.

I could fill several pages with the reports of those 14 days and evenings filled with worship, fellowship, conversation, instruction, and entertainment with literally hundreds of people of many ages, experiences and diverse backgrounds and talents. I was so privileged to attend and thank you for the opportunity.

way to present the unique Ministry of the Printed Word as a concern of the entire church. Each year the Presiding Bishop designates one Sunday in the year (usually the first Sunday of May) for the observance of the work of spreading the Christian message through the Printed Word, i.e. Bibles, Prayer Books, Hymnals, Sunday school literature and allied programs, such as Alpha, or Education for Ministry, etc.

It is important that the CPC prayer and/or Litany be used at all services. The priest or parish representative should take special time to explain the mission of providing printed and related materials free to people all over the world who cannot otherwise obtain it. The offering that is collected on Church Periodical Club Sunday is customarily used only for the support of the National Books Fund. Checks should be marked for "Church Periodical Club Sunday" and sent to the ECW Treasurer.

Miles of Pennies

A mile of pennies is \$844.80. All the money collected from the 'miles of pennies' goes to supplying Children's books, videos, and tapes, or for shipping and handling charges of recycled children's books.

The Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of North Carolina ended the year 2003 in good financial shape, with surplus from unspent convocation grants and youth scholarship grants. The Annual Meeting, hosted

by the Winston-Salem Convocation at St. Timothy's Church, realized a surplus of \$1,426.19. These funds have been placed in the savings account, along with surplus from prior annual meetings, to help fund costs associated with ECW seminars and meetings.

Convocation Grants of \$200 for each convocation are budgeted again for 2004. Youth Scholarship Grants up to \$200 are also available to each convocation. Applications for these grants are included in the ECW Yearbook and may also be found of the ECW website at www.ecw-nc.org (first click on "About Us" then "Handbook and Directory."). These grants are awarded by the seven convocations, so completed applications should be returned to your convocation chairman. Grants are awarded on a first come, first served basis.

Branch treasurers are reminded that at least 50 percent of their annual pledges are due by May 1, 2004. Living the Baptismal Covenant

How many baptisms do you think you've attended over the years? What do you focus on at baptisms – the babies, the water, the sermon? When you walk out of a baptism, do you feel you have changed? Episcopalians are participants in baptism services. We are asked to promise, as witnesses to the event, to "do all in our power to support these persons in their life in Christ". We also join "with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant" each time another person joins the church. What exactly are we promising to do when we participate in this way?

We promise to "continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers". Most of us attend church and participate in Eucharist on a regular basis, but many adults are not part of a regular Christian Education class. I see entirely too many people come to church, drop off the children for Sunday School, and come back after an hour to pick them up. Part of our task as supporters of the newly baptized is to be role models for the children in our churches, and as role models, we need to be active in our own Christian formation. We have to show that learning and growing in the faith are an expected part of each person's journey. The spiritual journey is just that – a journey – not some stagnant place you arrive at a preconceived point in your life, never to do anything else again.

A journey requires preparation. You have to find out about where you are going, get the maps or directions to arrive safely, be sure your transportation method is working and fueled, and then take the first step to begin the trip if you ever want to arrive where you plan to be. Do you know where you are going? Do you read the maps and directions Christ provides us? Do you listen to the "apostles' teachings" on ways to be sure your transportation is working and fueled? All of these things are part of Christian formation and are important for adults as well as children. I encourage you to find a class or program that will help you on your personal journey as we move into the joyous season of Easter.




THANK YOU CHRIST CHURCH ECW, CHARLOTTE, Note: If you at-

THE APPEAL


