The ideas you'll find in this guide can be used with kids of all ages. Use the guide as a key piece of your literature curriculum, or as an enjoyable supplement.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SCHEDULING YOUR FAMILY BOOK CLUB

a quick dip

Short on time? Do your Family Book Club in a single sitting by combining it with mealtime.

- Choose whichever activity in the SHARE AN EXPERIENCE section most suits you. The cookie activity works well for this.
- While you eat, <u>watch the LOOKING</u>
   <u>CLOSELY video together</u>, then read the book gloud.
- Choose one question from the LET'S TALK
  ABOUT IT section to discuss. If your kids
  have questions for the author/illustrator,
  make sure to submit them in advance
  (you'll find the link on p. 3 of this guide).

a longer linger

If you'd like to spread your Family Book Club out over the month, try this schedule.

- Week 1: Watch the LOOKING CLOSELY video together, and begin reading aloud.
- Week 2: Keep reading!
- Week 3: Choose something to do from the SHARE AN EXPERIENCE section.
  Also choose a few questions from the LET'S TALK ABOUT IT section to discuss. If your kids have questions for the author, submit them in advance (you'll find the link on p. 3 of this guide).
- Week 4: Plan to meet both James Ransome and Lesa Cline-Ransome on February 17th, or watch the replay afterward.

If your kids want more, get ideas from the RELATED READING & EXPLORING section.



TITLE: Before She Was Harriet



This lush, lyrical biography in verse begins with a glimpse of Harriet Tubman as an old woman, and travels back in time through the many roles she played through her life. Winner of a Coretta Scott King Honor and the Christopher Award.





## Looking closely



### WATCH SARAH INTRODUCE THIS BOOK ON VIDEO (6 MIN)

- The book opens with an image of a train—even before we get to the title page. Do you think this might be an example of foreshadowing?
- The author compares the Combahee River to the River Jordan in an allusion. An allusion is a brief reference to a person, place, thing, event, or literary work the reader may be familiar with. They let an author pack a lot of meaning into a single word or phrase! What might the author have been getting at with this allusion?
- Consider how the illustrations alternate between scenes of daylight and scenes of darkness. Why do you think the illustrator chose to do that?
- This story was written as a poem, rather than prose. Compare it to a book written in prose (like Sweet Clara and the Freedom Quilt by Deborah Hopkinson) and notice that prose is told in paragraphs, while poetry is written in short lines. What effect does that have on the story?
- One thing poets do when thinking about line breaks is read down the right hand margin. If you do this, you get a hidden poem within the larger poem. Read down the right margin of Before She Was Harriet to discover the bones of this poem.



## De Let's talk about it

Use any of the following questions with kids of all ages.

Asking open-ended questions is more important than getting compelling answers. We want to help our kids develop the habit of asking questions; this is how we raise discerning readers.

- Why do you think Harriet was called Moses? How are Harriet and Moses alike? How are they different?
- Harriet had many different roles throughout her life. How did she stay the same? How did she change?
- Harriet took many risks during her life. Do you think she should have done that?
- What might have happened if Harriet hadn't taken those risks? (This helps us see the "so what" of this valuable story. <u>Hear more about why the question "So what?" matters in RAR #151</u>)
- What's something you don't want to forget about Harriet Tubman?

Make star cookies to enjoy during your read-aloud. Need a recipe? <u>Here's one from Taste of Home</u>.







BY ALAN SCHROEDER, ILLUSTRATED BY JERRY PINKNEY



BY DEBORAH HOPKINSON, ILLUSTRATED BY JAMESM RANSOME



BY JACQUELINE WOODSON, ILLUSTRATED BY HUDSON TALBOTT

Soonie's great-grandma was just 7 years old when she was sold to a big plantation without her ma and pa, and with only some fabric and needles to call her own. She pieced together bright patches with names like North Star and Crossroads, patches with secret meanings made into quilts - maps for slaves to follow to freedom. Winner of the Newbery Honor.



#### THE UNDERGROUND ABDUCTOR

BY NATHAN HALE

Nathan Hale's historical graphic novels really cannot be beat. This one tells the story of Araminta Ross (Harriet Tubman), who risked her life to help countless enslaved people escape to freedom. Highly recommended. This one is probably best for ages 9+.
