Provides psychological evaluations, assessment of intellectual functioning, personality assessment, assessment of anxiety, including post-traumatic stress disorder and obsessive-compulsive disorder, assessment for depression, academic assessments, including learning disability, attention-deficit disorder, and attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder. Referrals may include people who are difficult to diagnose, who appear to have more than one mental health diagnosis, who are seeking assistance in understanding difficulties they might experience at work or at school, and who are looking for an independent evaluation related to special education.
