

What is Thy Kingdom Come?

After Jesus' ascension, his disciples gathered, constantly devoting themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. We know that the transforming work of the Holy Spirit is still needed in every land and amongst every people - and we believe that our prayers make a difference. Like those first disciples, we want our friends, family and the whole world to hear the Good News; to experience God and His Kingdom.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus and experience his Kingdom. Jesus teaches us to pray "Thy Kingdom Come" and so we follow his leading, joining with others around the world to:

- Pray for five of our friends or family to come to know God.
- Pray for the world to hear the Good News; to experience God and His Kingdom.
- Ask God to help us speak Good News and live God's Kingdom way.

During Thy Kingdom Come, you are invited to discover new habits and ways of praying to God, that those whom you know might come to know Jesus. Whether you are new to 'structured' prayer or an old hand, you are invited to try praying with us. We hope you may find in it a spiritual rhythm which will nourish your heart and keep prayer on your lips, enabling you to become part of this global wave of prayer.

What's this booklet for?

This book is intended to help you, your whānau and your local faith community to pray and worship together over this time. It includes liturgies for:

- Daily Prayer – designed to be used for all ages, any time of the day, either by yourself or in a group setting.
- Night Prayer – if you pray more than once a day, this liturgy is best suited for use in the evening or night.

Pray for Five

Praying for others to know Jesus is one of the most powerful things we can do. Persistent prayer for others brings transformation to their lives. Consistently praying for others takes discipline, and there are many ways that we can build up habits that will help us to pray for our friends and family.

Over Thy Kingdom Come we are encouraged to pray for five friends or family to come to know God.

Choose five people you would regularly like to pray for and write their names down onto a list. If you're not sure who to pray for, ask God to guide you as you choose. Once you have settled on five names, commit to praying for them regularly. You may find it useful to try one of these to remind you to pray for them:

- Take a piece of string or cord, and tie five knots in it to represent each of the five people you have committed to pray for. You could carry the knotted string in your pocket, tie it round your wrist or place it somewhere that you'll see it regularly. Use the knots to remind you to pray for each person on your list of five.
- Find five small stones (light coloured ones are best) and write each of the people on your list onto each of the stones. Place them on your desk, bedside table or fireplace as a reminder to pray. Alternatively, you could place each stone in a different room of your home and pray for each person as you enter or leave the room.
- Grab a piece of card that will easily fit inside your wallet, purse or book. Write your list of five names onto the card before putting it in your wallet or book. Use this card as a daily reminder to pray for them.
- Add your list of five people to the alerts section of your phone and set reminders to pray for them. You could choose one name per day, or pray for all five across your day. Remember to set alerts for a suitable time where you can stop to pray for your list.
- Use five post-it notes and write one name onto each. Stick them onto your mirror, above your bed or somewhere that you'll see them regularly and will be reminded to pray.

Notes on the liturgies

These liturgies are written so that anyone can lead. Sometimes one person will lead the whole liturgy. Or people can take turns leading different parts. Kei a koutou – it's up to you!

The normal text is read by the leader. We say the parts in **bold** together. The parts in *italics* are instructions.

God doesn't need us to do anything special in order to show up. However, having tangible reminders of God's beauty and the story that we have been invited into helps us to respond to God's goodness and beauty. One way we do this is through visual symbols (a candle, the communion, a cross, a bowl of water). Another way we do this is by creating a space where all our senses can engage. For example, this might include ensuring that everyone is comfortable and removing things that might distract us from participating fully (e.g. putting our cell phones away).

At times te reo Māori and the English words sit side by side or the alternative is provided in italics. These are not direct translations of one another. They frequently fulfil the same structural purpose but the cultural concepts, the flow of words, and poetry do not allow for easy translation between languages.



A LITURGY FOR DAILY PRAYER

GATHERING

O Lord, open our lips

Āmine, **āmine.**


PREPARATION

PRAYERS

If you are using the Strandz Thy Kingdom Come resource, use it now to help you to pray together and finish with the blessing for today.

Another simple tool is to use the letters PRAY:

Pause *'Be still and know I am God', pause in God's presence soaking in his grace*

Rejoice *Offer prayers of rejoicing, thanksgiving and adoration*

Ask *Bring your needs and the needs of others before God & 'pray for five'*

Yes *Surrender afresh (yield) to God this day the things needed to be put down*

Conclude this time of prayer by praying The Lord's Prayer:


CLOSING PRAYER AND BLESSING

Have a time of silence bringing your five before God in prayer. You may want to do something to symbolise you bringing them to God such as placing a rock before a candle.

For the person who needs to experience your goodness: **Lord hear our prayer.**

For the person who needs to know your peace: **Lord hear our prayer.**

For the person who needs to know your grace: **Lord hear our prayer.**

For the person who needs to experience liberation: **Lord hear our prayer.**

For all those on our hearts in need of your good news: **Lord hear our prayer.**

LISTENING (Optional)

Come now, Holy Spirit, and open our hearts to hear God's voice.

Come now, Word of God, and transform us.

Ruler of the everlasting kingdom,
Prince of peace, champion of the despised:
You are the king;
You make a cross your throne;
