





Parks and Open Space

Most parks and community resources in Oceanside are well distributed.

Perceived safety concerns and lack of park activities are main issues.



Facilities

Public safety and community facilities exist throughout Oceanside, though additional population growth might mean the need for expanded or relocated facilities to better serve people's needs.





Infrastructure

Infrastructure improvements, such as new or upsized sewer pipes, may be needed as more development occurs.



FACILITIES - ISSUES

1. Park programs and safety

 Major issues include improving park service offerings and increasing feelings of safety.

2. Expansion of police and fire

 Though police and fire services are highly rated, an increased population could necessitate the need for expanded or relocated facilities in more well-suited locations.


3. Infrastructure changes

 Oceanside's infrastructure includes roadways, sewer, storm drainage, and water system. New growth and population increases will require infrastructure capacity upgrades.



Oceanside has three major watersheds, each of which plays an important part of the City's natural environment.






Existing Open Space

The City's draft Multiple Habitat Subarea Plan (SAP) has never been adopted.





Historic Resources

Oceanside's national, state, and locally designated historic resources are primarily found west of I-5, and near Mission San Luis Rey.

Oceanside's most recent historical survey was conducted in 1992.

CONSERVATION/OPEN SPACE – ISSUES

1. Water Quality

Need to address drainage, flooding, water quality, and water conservation

2. Habitat and Wildlife Protection

- Oceanside supports 60 sensitive plant and wildlife species and includes critical habitat.
- Opportunity to increase inventory

3. Historic Resources

Potential to explore and preserve additional historic resources

4. Farmland

 Consider preservation of farmland as part of strategies that promote its farming's continued viability, such as agritourism


Maintain a high level of air, water, and soil quality Average 4.66

Landslide Susceptibility

Some areas of the city have high landslide susceptibility.

Landslide risk can be exacerbated by other incidents including fires and earthquakes.

FEMA Flood Zones

Flood zones follow major corridors in Oceanside. The San Luis Rey River presents the greatest risk from flooding.



Fire Hazard Severity Zones Non-Wildland/Non-Urban Moderate High Very High San Diego County Vista Pacific Ocean Carlsbad

Fire Hazard Severity Zones

The western and southeastern edge of the city and small portions of South Morro Hills are classified as very high fire hazard severity zones.



SAFETY - ISSUES

1. Risk of landslides

Portions of Oceanside Boulevard are at higher risk for landslides.

2. Potential for flooding

 The San Luis Rey River area is prone to flooding. Coastal flooding due to sea level rise is also a threat to many of Oceanside's coastal amenities.

3. Wildfire threats

 Oceanside faces threats to wildfire near its boundaries and in parts of South Morro Hills.


