I INTRODUCTION

I.I General Plan Update

The City of Oceanside is developing an updated General Plan that will help facilitate its ongoing transformation to a vibrant 21st century community. The State of California requires each city and county to have a comprehensive General Plan that outlines the community's long-term policies related to growth and development. Most of Oceanside's current General Plan dates to 1970s and 1980s. The updated General Plan will address a spectrum of topics including land use, housing, transportation, public services, environmental quality, and safety.

1.2 Public Involvement and Participation

The process of drafting a new General Plan enables the community to assess opportunities and challenges, establish a vision for the city's future, and outline a systematic process to achieve the vision. Preparation of the General Plan is far more than a legal formality – it is an opportunity for community members to define Oceanside's future, and to ensure a high quality of life for themselves and for subsequent generations.

While the planning process will take direction from many sources, the most important voice is that of the community. The valuable input of community members is essential to the creation of a new General Plan that accurately reflects the common goals, needs, visions, and desires of the community. Key outreach efforts in the General Plan process to date include:

- 1. Onward Oceanside Visioning Survey (November 2020)
- 2. Neighborhood Planning Areas (NPA) Survey (November 2020)
- 3. Virtual Community Workshops (January 2021)

2 This Report

2.1 Community Workshops

This report describes the process and results of three community workshops. The workshops were designed to engage the attention, interest, and active involvement of a broad spectrum of Oceanside community members and provide opportunities for energetic discussion of and effective input into the community's vision of Oceanside's future. Participants discussed what the community would like to preserve, improve, and create to ensure that all residents of Oceanside feel included in and proud of the future of the city.

TOPICS

The three workshops covered the following topics related to the General Plan Update:

- Workshop 1, January 12, 2021: Land Use, Mobility, and Noise
- Workshop 2, January 13, 2021: Community Facilities, Conservation/Open Space
- Workshop 3, January 19, 2021: Housing

SCHEDULE AND ATTENDANCE

The community workshops were held virtually over Zoom due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Workshops took place on three different weekday evenings in January 2021. Each workshop focused on different topics but followed a similar structure, including an informational presentation and interactive polling, followed by small breakout group discussions, and report back discussions. Peak attendance (not including City staff and the planning team) for the three workshops was 170, 130, and 97 members of the public, respectively.

WORKSHOP STRUCTURE/ ACTIVITIES

Each online workshop began with a PowerPoint presentation over Zoom led by members of project staff. Interspersed throughout the presentation were Zoom polls to collect basic demographic information and insight on community priorities from the participants. To keep the format engaging, the second and third workshop followed presentations with

virtual interactive activities. In all three workshops, participants engaged in 35–45-minute breakout discussion groups led by a project staff facilitator and guided by staff-provided discussion questions. Upon reconvening with the larger group, facilitators shared key points from the discussion.

2.2 Report Organization

The remainder of this report delves into the key themes that emerged from the community's input during each workshop. These themes reflect input from the breakout group discussions as well as the Zoom polls and interactive online activities. The complete record of the workshops' activities can be found in the appendix. Further community input, including stakeholder interviews and community survey results, are summarized in separate reports available on the project website, www.onwardoceanside.com. The key themes, priorities, and conclusions from these early reports will guide development of Onward Oceanside's vision and guiding principles, and will inform land use, urban design, and circulation alternatives to achieve the community's goals through the planning process.

3 Key Themes

The following summary reflects key themes that emerged from zoom poll results and breakout room discussions for Workshops 1, 2, and 3. A full record of materials can be found in Appendix A, B, and C, respectively.

Open space

Many participants stressed the importance of open space and recreation areas as key to preserving and enhancing Oceanside's quality of life. Open space areas that came up often in group discussions included the San Luis Rey River Trail, the future preservation of the El Corazon area, Oceanside's beaches and the agricultural open spaces of the South Morro Hills area. The San Luis Rey River Trail in particular was viewed as an underutilized resource by many participants due to the presence of homeless encampments along the trail and a perception of the trail as unsafe, especially at night. Some participants suggested increasing access to the River Trail by adding access to the north side, and pursing habitat restoration along the riverbanks. The importance and value of Oceanside's



beaches was emphasized in many groups and participants saw sand retention and beach improvement projects as highly important to Oceanside's future.

Development Character

Many participants echoed the City's priority for concentrating new development along the major corridors. There was also a broad agreement on need for pedestrian and bicycle friendliness in all new developments. Participants also emphasized that new development should be compatible with existing development and pleasant to be around, suggesting requirements for setbacks, open spaces, accessible sidewalks, and design guidelines to ensure visual interest.

Economic Development

Workshop participant felt that Oceanside needed to do more to make itself attractive to employers, young professionals, and new families. Many participants supported efforts by the City to attract higher paying jobs with good benefits, but many also saw support and access to services for all levels of wage earners as important.

Alternative Transportation (pedestrians, bikes, transit)

While 75 percent of participants in a Zoom poll responded that they are currently able to conveniently access most of the goods and service they need within Oceanside, in the breakout discussions many voiced a desire for a more connected, complete, and safer bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure for transportation and recreation. The desire for continuous bikeways along the three principal east-west river/creeks was emphasized. Last mile connections to city's rail/Sprinter stations were also seen as key to improving transit access in Oceanside, and several participants championed a downtown shuttle or trolley system to improve beach access and reduce traffic.

Transportation and Parking

Some participants raised concerns about the implications of growth and new development on access to parking, especially the potential for overflow into residential neighborhoods. Participants suggested a variety of ways to provide more parking in Oceanside, including underground parking garages, and re-configured streets with room for parking. Participants also saw improvements to the City's bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure and public transportation system as ways to decrease the reliance on individual vehicles in the City, and therefore reduce the demand for parking. A shuttle

system to connect downtown areas and link inland neighborhoods to the coast was suggested in several discussion groups. A few participants mentioned the need to plan for reduced parking need in future, referencing the impacts of autonomous vehicles. Some participants were concerned with parking oversupply issues rather than lack of parking, noting the high costs of providing surplus parking, and instead pushed for unbundled parking, shared parking, parking demand management strategies, and new parking technologies.

Safety

While 80 percent of Zoom poll respondents reported feeling safe in Oceanside's public spaces, participants expressed a desire for an increased feeling of safety at community facilities throughout the city, especially parks. Homeless encampments along the San Luis Rey River trail and in other areas made some residents feel unsafe. Participants also felt that if public transit felt safer and more pleasant, more Oceanside residents would choose to forgo their cars. Most participants said that public spaces felt safest when more people were around. Bicycle and pedestrian safety were also brought up as important issues for the City to address. Participants called for better bike infrastructure, separated pedestrian and bicycle trails, and more safe places to cross major thoroughfares.

Natural Resources

Open spaces and natural resources were seen by most participants as important assets to Oceanside, and important contributors to a high quality of life. There was a strong consensus that Oceanside's greatest natural assets are its beaches and that efforts needed to be taken to preserve and protect them. Meeting participants emphasized sand retention (climate change and because of the harbor) and developing more amenities such as parking and restrooms as being important to ensuring the continued value of the city's beaches. Participants also valued El Corazon highly as an open space, and many called for it to be officially preserved as a park. Participants also emphasized a need for universal access to parks and open spaces, and called for improvements to the city's trail network, particularly the rail and river trails. Preservation of agricultural uses in the South Morro Hills area was also seen as important by some residents.

Community Facilities

Meeting participants were divided on whether Oceanside's community facilities matched neighboring cities' in quality and quantity. Participants identified several types of



facilities as needing improvement including facilities that catered to the arts, pools, parks, and beaches. Many participants identified the east side of the city as lacking access to high- quality community facilities.

Cultural Resources

Participants called attention to the Oceanside's rich cultural history and the presence of significant cultural resources as a strong foundation to build upon. The Mission was called out by many participants as an important cultural resource that should be preserved. Participants also viewed the Native American heritage of Oceanside as an important to its culture, suggesting that a museum or historical society could help bring attention to the city's pre-European settlement era. The City's existing amphitheaters, museums and arts centers were seen as valuable resources that should be expanded and invested in. Strategies that honor Oceanside's history and help enhance the City's cultural identity were seen as a way to spur greater interest in the city's cultural history and future.

Sustainability / Resiliency

Improved public transportation options to get people out of single occupant cars was seen by many as the single most effective strategy to combat climate change and promote long-term sustainability. Participants also desired Oceanside to prepare for the future by investing in Electric Vehicle (EV) infrastructure. Wildfire risk and extreme heat events were identified as concerns by many participants, as were rising sea levels and coastal erosion.

Increased Housing Opportunity and Options

The number one housing concern that workshop participants identified in a Zoom poll was overcrowding, followed closely by housing affordability. In small group discussions, participants identified housing affordability as one of the biggest issues facing Oceanside. Although a Zoom poll indicated that workshop participants preferred single-family homes with yards over other types of housing, in small group discussions many participants emphasized the need for a range of housing types, sizes, and affordability levels, including affordable housing, senior housing, accessory dwelling units, multi-family housing, smaller housing units, mobile home parks, and transitional housing. Several groups discussed ways to ensure greater access to housing in Oceanside including imposing stricter limits on vacation rentals and removing in lieu fees as an option for developers, requiring them to build affordable housing in place. Prioritizing housing

development and access was also seen as an important part of addressing homelessness in Oceanside by some workshop partcipants.

Location and Type of New Development

Mixed-Use development was a major point of discussion with a variety of opinions. Some community members see mixed-use and multi-unit development as necessary solutions Oceanside's needs, while other members voiced a desire to protect existing single-family zones. Regardless of type, many participants identified the corridors as the suitable location for most new development, as reflected in both the small group discussions and the Maptionnaire housing location activity. The character and design of new development were also important to many participants, with many suggesting visually interesting and pedestrian-friendly development that enhances Oceanside's unique character.



4 Appendix A: Workshop 1

4.1 Appendix A-1: Workshop Overview

The first workshop in the series covered land use, mobility, and noise. Interactive portions of the workshop included Zoom polls interspersed throughout the presentations, and small group discussions focused on key questions and facilitated by the project team. Key findings from the Zoom polls and breakout room discussions at Workshop #1 are summarized below.

BREAKOUT ROOM DISCUSSIONS


Following the presentation, participants were sent to Zoom breakout rooms to discuss the topics of the workshop. Each room had a project team facilitator and 5-7 participants, and discussions lasted 40 minutes before everyone was reconvened for a report back, led by each room's facilitator. The project team provided each facilitator with a series of discussion questions, intended to serve as rough guidelines for the conversation, and detailed notes as well as the breakout room chat record were collected after the meeting. The discussion questions provided for Workshop 1 are as follows:

- 1. **Quality of Life.** A fundamental goal of the General Plan Update is to enhance quality of life for Oceanside residents. What factors do you believe have the greatest influence on quality of life in Oceanside and how would you prioritize them?
- 2. **Economic Growth.** Oceanside has one of the lowest jobs-to-housing ratios in the San Diego region, and the vast majority of Oceanside residents commute to jobs outside of the city.
 - How can the City promote business activity and employment growth through land use policies and zoning standards?
- 3. **Sustainability.** The term "sustainability" typically refers to the management of both natural resources and the built environment in a manner that ensures these assets remain available to future generations.
 - o In what ways can the City operate more sustainably?



 - What more can the City do to reduce dependence on the automobile, one of the priorities identified as part of Phase I?



 - Desire to preserve "funky beach town" vibe, part of that involves people of all income levels being able to stay.
- Balance of land uses, done "in the right way"-
 - "Right way" = mixed use, design techniques, amenities like green space, adequate parking, supported by infrastructure-in the corridors.
- Balancing new development with open space (a few disliked new development downtown) Several discussed the desire to preserve agriculture and not add a significant amount of homes in South Morro Hills.
- Support for mixed use and amenity-rich development.
- Concerns:
- Issues of safety and homelessness- encampments in SLR Trail. People living in their cars. This can be off-putting to families.
- With new development comes increases in traffic and noise.

- People want to walk to services and goods, churches etc, but most people are not living in areas where this is possible.
- Potentially look at charges for parking, or creating a restricted parking district in the downtown area for on-street parking for residents to offset parking congestion around short term rentals.
- Expressed concerned with recent road diet on S Coast Highway in south Oceanside. This area is congested with 1 lane to get out of the neighborhood. The adjacent land uses seem to not lend themselves well to walking or biking so its still very auto dependent. This seems like an opportunity to emphasize this corridor a more mixed use to promote walking/biking.



• Concern about future road diets – making sure these are in appropriate places and have land use that support these changes.

- One participant lives next to a park but finds herself driving to a different park. Some parks in the city are not visually appealing, do not feel safe due to lighting, existence of porta-pottys in parks. Should first focus on the neglected parks.
- Excitement for making El Corazon park a central park for Oceanside
- The mixture of people and community's culture is a boon to Oceanside, there is a neighborhood vibe
- Placemaking downtown with new hotel developments, the Starbucks and its fountain is an example of placemaking that has been a success that is not a park.
- For the 17 different areas of Oceanside, the Land uses need to be looked at collaboratively, are parks close to schools? can you walk there?
 - There are parts of town where sidewalks just end-- fix this
- Mixed Use development could be attractive of changing the commercial strip malls. Make those areas a little more vivacious.
 - Debate over if Mixed Use was good for oceanside: people say they do not want to live in those areas but could provide space for small businesses which would be positive.
 - Concerned that Mixed Use development is one solution for a much larger problem.
 - Would need transportation and make sure that parking overflow would not go into the neighborhoods.
 - Should not be hung up on single family home ideals because since ADUs have been approved most properties are three-unit properties anyway.

- One participant brought up Vancouver as an ideal with the division of bike, rollerblade, and walking lanes.
- More blinking light crosswalks-- Carlsbad on the corridor along the water feels very safe.

- In South Morro Hills there should be the development of Agritourism. Waves to Wine concept of a shuttle that would transport people.
- Think about the branding of Oceanside, pitch it as unique and a positive. It is more rural than OC and Newport that should be our selling point.

Summary: The variety and accessibility of open space makes Oceanside the great community it is. Threats to quality of life include development encroaching on natural land (increasing fire concern), noise primarily from car traffic, and increasing pedestrian collisions (especially around schools).

- Open space for people of all ages to explore
- Recreation places to ride your bike, walk your dog

- Safety don't want development to create fire safety issues Capistrano area has concerns only having one ingress and egress
- We need to build places for low-income people to live, young families
- Ability to work and live in the same area
- Traffic has increased due to ADUs and vacation rentals Accidents around elementary schools increase greatly
- A lot of noise issue comes from car traffic and speeding roads are too wide roundabouts are much better than stoplights for slowing traffic speed limits and traffic calming measures are needed, some residential areas are 50 mph vegetation as well can help reduce traffic noise

Summary: Concerns were raised about the need for better schools to ensure employees want to live in Oceanside. The group was interested in encouraging nontraditional business forms, such as smaller footprints and home-based businesses. The group also emphasized the importance of attracting high-quality and high-paying jobs by becoming a cutting-edge city, in particular with regard to transportation and climate planning.

Lastly, the group had concerns about water planning, and emphasized the City must be planning for the effects of climate change on the City's water supplies.

- Low income housing along Mission, big block housing. Balance with workforce housing. Still lacking in low income housing (40% of RHNA needs to be lower income categories).
- Instead of in-lieu fee, make developers build affordable housing on-site as part of the project or pool resources to make new developments. More mixed income housing, incentives.
- Cost of business still high, look at ways to reduce costs of business to attract new businesses.
- Tourism in downtown makes it lively and tourists have always been a part of Oceanside. Although don't mind sharing, it has become all-year around tourism attraction which has stresses on the community.



- COVID-19 has hit restaurants and downtown hard. Oceanside was blossoming with people and reduction of crime. Nice restaurants, good food, good people, not afraid to go out at night. Lost of revenue to city. Retail is greatly impacted, a lot of stores aren't going to make it.
- What could have been done? Oceanside could have done better about stepping things up the hill to increase views and value of apartments.

- Should be mixed use in neighborhoods with essential services, shorter time to walk to bus stops, if could live without car I would live here forever
- What happened in LA will happen here, be smart about growth
- Oside is unique in diversity of geography, hills, not all flat, not all concrete like LA
- Gems- Oside has many gems. Balance things we want to do, and pay for it. Bring more visitors, but polish gems like harbor, beaches, el Corazon, pier, mission. 5.1 Appendix B-1: Workshop Overview

The second workshop in the series focused on community facilities, conservation, and open space. Interactive elements of the workshop included Zoom polls interspersed throughout the presentation, small breakout room discussions led by project team facilitators, and a Miro board activity, an interactive online sticky note activity platform described in detail below.

MIRO BOARD ACTIVITY

Following the informational presentation and Zoom polls, the meeting participants were invited to respond to questions concerning the meeting's themes using Miro, an interactive online collaboration tool. Participants were given a link to the interactive board during the workshop to provide comments and view comments by others in real time. For those who were unable to or chose not to engage through the Miro platform, they were invited to post their comments in the Zoom chat. A member of the project team was copying chat comments onto the Miro board in real time during the meeting. The boards provided areas to comment on the following questions posed by the project team:

- 1. In what areas of the city should access to community facilities (e.g., libraries, cultural venues, community centers) be improved? What improvements would you make? What specific facilities are in need of expansion/ renovation/ programming?
- 2. What do you consider to be the primary purpose of the city's green spaces and why?
- 3. In your view, what natural hazards present the greatest risk to the city and why?

The Miro boards were displayed on the Zoom meeting shared screen, and the final boards with all of the submitted comments can be found in Appendix B.




BREAKOUT ROOM DISCUSSIONS

Community Facilities. What concerns do you have regarding the safety, quality, and/or accessibility of the City's open spaces, parks, libraries, and/or community centers? What improvements would you make, and where in the City would you make them?

- Garrison creek trail feels very safe, habitat. More people makes places feel safer.
- Desire for plans to be granular-Fireside Park does not feel safe. Nephew at Mira Costa College was robbed.
- More buses and cars- safety concern when people are using public transport
- Concerns about transients. Cant sit in front yard because of transient population.
- If we stop treating people as visitors and unwelcome, they wont act unwelcome
- Challenge in open spaces and people's behavior
- Mira costa area- oceanside is made of diverse, moving pieces. There are some safety Issues in different places, some in none.
- We have a great community, but there are areas that are difficult because of interactions with homeless populations, those with mental health issues, etc. When bike riding, there are some spots that feel unsafe.
- Comm facilities- bike trail and levee- if facilities are done in a nice way and improved upon, and the environment is welcoming to residents, and a large use of it by residents, you have a good environment that prevents those who want to do harm. If we're present, we're preventing some of the problems before they occur
- Realities in the difference of outcomes in policing
- We should not be giving up places of community value (ex: Nature Center). If we treated people better, and said they can't live like that, it would be a good thing.
- Creeks are not throwaway places- need to be highly valued places.
- Taken the bike trail up on Douglas- opportunity there to make it the safest place it can be. People don't feel as safe as they used to. Some way to manage it. Management.
- The more we utilize spaces, the safer they feel.

- The pedestrian crossing over I-5 from Eastside Capistrano to the Harbor area is unsafe and unsightly, discouraging its use
- The City should institute shuttle service that both connects inland neighborhoods to the coastal area and provides another mobility option for residents and visitors traveling between coastal locales (e.g., from the downtown area to the Harbor)
- Following decommissioning of the La Salina Wastewater Treatment Plant, the property should be dedicated to public use e.g., public park
- The City should commit to expanding the urban forest within the public right-of-way and City-owned properties, with emphasis on low-maintenance native species
- The City should renovate the Beach Community Center into first-class public amenity
- Restoration and preservation of sensitive habitat in Loma Alta Creek should be a priority

Participants in Workshop #3 were provided link to a Maptionnaire map of Oceanside and asked to place pins where they would like to see housing development. Comments explaining the pin placements were encouraged but not required.

BREAKOUT ROOM DISCUSSIONS



- 3. Are there any housing programs that the City should be offering?



From Mary Reese to Everyone: The first thing we should do with STRs is making them pay a fee for their customers to park on our city streets. For every bed they advertise, there should be a fee for one parking space unless they provide that on the property.

From Roger Davenport to Everyone: Emphasize small units. They are more affordable and could help people get into the market.

From Andrew M. Andrioff to Everyone : We need housing of all levels, from first home buyers, to senior housing and executive homes.





Facilitator Name: Gabriella Folino

Based on your experience, what are some of the main challenges residents face when trying to find access to housing options in Oceanside? (High rent? Availability? Location? Transportation?)

- Many residents in Oceanside in the hospitality industry or are in the military. Oceanside is a working-class family city. We need affordable housing for all.
- Need to protect existing single-family zoning.
- We should not be building any more single-family housing.
- Growth should occur along the corridors.
- Need to have all housing types to accommodate different needs.
- Challenges include the cost of land and cost of infrastructure.
- Young people don't want the work involved with a single-family house such as yard work.
- One resident does not want to live near a six pack as a single-family neighborhood.
- Place the majority of housing along the corridors. Need to also add East and West corridors to connect to sprinter lines (for example Rancho del Oro).
- Mass transportation needs to also be developed as density increases.
- Big job centers should have housing around it smart growth.
- We should not use open space for development such as El Corazon.
- Regulatory issues slow down the process.
- Need to consider city growth for next 50+ years not 8-10 years as identified by the housing element.

Do you have any recommendations on how to increase housing affordability or access to housing?

- Mixed use development should include the first floor as retail, second as office space. Housing should be placed near office.
- We haven't defined downtown in Oceanside. We need a skyline.



- St Mary's church and the Bank of America are potential development sites.
- One resident believes Oceanside lacks parking. Parking should be built underground and meet the needs of all development.
- \$25,000 a spot once you go underground makes all project not affordable.
- Paying for parking would be an incentive for less people to own vehicles. Need to change the focus to alternative modes of transportation.
- Young people are not thinking about parking.
- Need to streamline the process to gain affordable housing.
- Homeowner don't get help from the City. To build ADU you need to figure it out on your own. It is a hardship for the owner.
- If we increase development along the corridors, we need to change our streets to be safer.
- Streets could be designed to accommodate more parking.
- Mixed feeling from the group regarding roundabouts.

What are some of the main challenges in helping the homeless find permanent housing?

- The solution needs to be more holistic. It can not just be about housing. A full range of services are necessary including job creation.
- WPA program is an example.
- The closed military base could be converted to housing for the homeless.

Based on your experience, what are some of the main challenges residents face when trying to find access to housing options in Oceanside? (High rent? Availability? Location? Transportation?)

- Seniors are being forced out of their housing they've lost part time jobs, not enough money on social security to afford their mortgages
- Potential solution could be tiny houses for single people or small families
- North county food bank exposes dire need of families right now
- Multiple families are living in one home crowding

- Rent is too high need to adopt a program to cut the rent
- Affordability is the biggest issue we have unfortunately you make a bigger profit
 when you make a SFH with a big yard that's capitalism we need to have more
 ways to build affordable housing but also workforce housing what about the
 people working at Trader Joe's making moderate income so they don't qualify for
 low-income housing
- Tiny houses have a place, but what we need is multi-story multi-family housing
- Need to put housing where services are so they're more accessible
- Affordability is the number one issue, and having access to services nearby is number two
- Tiny houses are a good idea, but they take space on land and don't allow for a lot of housing (need to build up)
- Take advantage of AB1851 to build housing for low-income and homeless on religious facilities sites
- Churches have retreat space another option to provide housing support
- There's a model in Scandinavia essentially a cruise ship on land each family has their own little apartment, and they share facilities and some resources
- So many mobile home parks in Oceanside provide opportunity for all different types of people
- Also need access to services safe transport from these different housing options
 to where people need to go shuttles, special buses, or something if you have
 to go to the doctor and you have no way to get there, or for homeless people you
 must provide social services on site
- More housing on Oceanside Blvd make this a mixed-use corridor
- The Mission has a lot of land should be preserved as open space, but the existing buildings should be used for housing (retreat center)
- There are some old developments on Oceanside Blvd that need re-development –
 we don't need that many auto-serving uses (car shops, car repair shops)
- We have plenty of large SFH on large lots we need to look at increasing density, smart-growth
- ADUs are too often converted to Airbnb's lose out on affordable housing stock, especially rentals



- People are given perks to build these because they're not supposed to be shortterm rentals, supposed to contribute to the affordable housing stock
- Is there any way that the City could provide subsidy or implement a policy for rents to be re-structured so that seniors could remain in their homes?
- Covid relief focused on seniors
- Seniors are often burdened by healthcare costs as well there must be some sort of relief
- Seniors working part-time or in minimum wage jobs, they're not going to be able to afford rent – most seniors are not homeowners
- The senior share of the population is only going to grow
- There are so many banked affordable housing units that haven't actually been built for the city
- Insidious issue of city council members in the pockets of developers
- City council needs to do what's right for Oceanside
- We should limit what city councilmembers are able to take from developers in campaign contributions
- The city should provide the housing and development commission meetings on Zoom allow for people to advocate at these meetings
- Area around Tri-City Hospital should be revitalized with new housing nice multi-family housing in that location would be good it's a huge employer for the city and provides many medical services
- We have an empty Sears building at the mall there's no business big enough to go in there – should be converted to housing for young professionals and families (technically in Carlsbad – Oceanside should push for this)
- Big supermarkets that are now empty should be converted to housing or even temporary housing for the homeless
- Homelessness is only going to become a greater issue
- Oceanside doesn't have almost any transitional shelters for homelessness this
 is going to be critical in the short-term and the long-term
- Old hotels should be converted permanently to supportive homeless housing
- Find the empty buildings and convert them to transitional housing

Facilitator Name: Alison Moore

Based on your experience, what are some of the main challenges residents face when trying to find access to housing options in Oceanside? (High rent? Availability? Location? Transportation?)

- Lack of choice. Oceanside residents do not have a lot of options for housing types- most seem to be larger and more expensive.
- The quality of jobs is a barrier to affording larger housing units, especially for single people or even couples.
- **Affordability**. Affordability is a major concern in Oceanside, especially for new young couples, young people, or people who are downsizing.
- Mobile home parks. These areas are often the last bastion of affordable housing and were once a key political constituency. There are challenges in balancing need to maintain affordability with property use. Property owners are allowed to seek the highest and best use of their land (the land could be used for large developments.)
- If mobile home park land is redeveloped, offering preference for existing residents would be great, but there is nothing that forces a developer to produce any more affordable units outside of inclusionary requirements.
- Preserving the zoning for mobile home parks could be one way to preserve affordability/these existing mobile home park use.

Do you have any recommendations on how to increase housing affordability or access to housing?

- Unit size and fees. Need smaller units that are the right size. Develoepr fees should be related to square footage, rather than the number of units—this removes disincentive for developing smaller units.
- Developers need guidance
- Increasing/enforcing inclusionary fees for affordable housing development
- Nonprofit partnerships. Work with nonprofits to develop projects. If you have a shovel ready project, nonprofits are scouring the county for places that will work with them on these kinds of projects.



- Nonprofit leadership- Hope that Oceanside has someone like Margery Pierce (retired) who is reaching out to affordable housing agencies. Need for a strong advocate and coordinator.
- Coordination on land leasing/donation for affordable projects
- Narrative/Education. The conversation around affordable housing is still marred
 by discrimination and stigma. There is a need to reinvent the conversation about
 what "affordable housing" really means, including factors like cost, types of affordable housing ,etc.
- Some landlords are reluctant about Section 8; could use education about the law.
- Section 8 vouchers are just one solution in talking about affordability; can sometimes take 7-8 years to obtain.
- Creation of incentive zones for higher density housing, especially in corridors
- In exchange for height/density in the corridors, developers could pay into conservation banks/trail improvement efforts.
- Should incentivize driving less, using public transit.
- Need for Transportation Demand Management strategy
- Road diets help to make places more attractive to live/walk around
- Parking. Give people more choice about how much parking they want to pay for. Parking is expensive to provide.
- Car parking system- strategy already in climate action plan.
- Demand responsive parking pricing
- Unbundling parking from housing
- Incorporation of new technologies

Are there any housing programs that the City should be offering?

- Transitional housing. Some youth in Oceanside are living in their cars. Even
 people going to college, or those with lower income jobs, could use come kind of
 support.
- Programs that relate to these populations could be useful.

• **MiraCosta**. MiraCosta doesn't yet have leadership looking for housing solutions. Land is the issue, though they do have large parking lots. Limited support for safe parking lot project. Could be some room to coordinate on that.

Other discussion points

- Interest in relationship between climate change/sustainability and relationship to housing
- Dichotomy between what developers would like to do and what might be best for the community (perception that developers are only building larger units, or luxury units)
- Support for affordable projects like Mission Cove and La Mision (both built in partnership with nonprofits, funding came from developer fees).

- Affordability ocean property is expensive. Even if we build cheap housing and price will go up
 - Price and the supply
 - Tied in with this is supply at all levels of housing there is a lack of supply. Long waiting lists for affordable housing and market rate housing
 - Needed throughout the city, such a strong demand for affordable housing it is going to be filled wherever you put it.
- This housing element focuses on same traffic corridors as past housing elements.
- What is meant by affordable housing? There is so much cash in the market right now where a person would be able to afford something at one price but then someone can come along with cash and the price will be raised. It is a very difficult time for affordable housing
 - Need to educate the community about what affordable housing actually means in order to prevent NIMBYism

- When talking in terms of affordable housing, what does it mean? what does it look like? if not subsidized housing then we need a broader term for what is included.
- An understanding of how deed restricted affordable housing gets built. IE: In Carlsbad new development is required to build atleast 10% affordable housing in the community. They have affordable housing in every neighborhood-- cannot distinguish affordable housing between normal housing.
- Was an eye opener to see what the different classifications actually mean
- City should have incentives for market rate housing to then carry the burden of affordable housing
 - What is the difference between market rate housing, workforce housing, attainable housing?
- Goal should be to have affordable housing throughout the city not just on the Coast-- affordable housing everywhere
- Worried about adding more housing and not adding more cars, roads are already in poor condition

Do you have any recommendations on how to increase housing affordability or access to housing?

- Alternative modes of transportation- want to have growth which is close to major corridors on Oceanside BLvd to the East of 5 they have a yellow sign for tentative development 200 or some townhomes/apartments there are two modes of transportation sprinter slash but it is just one exit ramp away from I-5, a corridor close to a major node. A good example of a space that is available that has the acreage and space.
- Finding areas, that have proximity to freeways and sprinter that are ripe for those development

Item 9-

Now that the city has installed hazardous synthetic turf at the Aquatics Center, despite the plans for no synthetic turf in El Corazon Park, do not add additional hazardous waste in the form of Trex or other composite fencing.

I met with the regional representative (3 state area) of Trex in 2018 at my home. Composite wood products contain myriad hazardous and carcinogenic chemicals, are as combustible as wood, have a prorated (25 yr) warranty and are not recyclable. I was informed that they lose color and display uneven color with water exposure, as well. Finally, the representative informed me that upon removal, they are piling up in warehouses in Los Angeles because they are hazardous waste.

HDPE (high density Polyethylene) shade sails contain PFAS and other toxic and carcinogenic chemicals found in plastics. They, too, are considered hazardous waste.

These products contain hazardous materials at installation and disposal. They are not magically non-hazardous during use.

Please consider hardwood timber fencing or concrete fencing as in Mance Buchanan Park. Consider non-hazardous materials and canopy trees for shade structures and pavilions.

Oppose biosolid use on Agricultural, commercial and residential applications in Oceanside. I agree that we need to redouble our efforts to reduce homelessness in Oceanside and North County, but I hope we don't decide against new public gathering spaces for fear of the homeless occupying them. You've motivated me to do some research on how other jurisdictions address the maintenance and security of public spaces in areas where homelessness is prevalent. Let me know of any information you might have on this subject.



I have some additional comments and responses below. Thank you.

Mr. Cunningham,

My family and I are residents of the Guajome neighborhood of Oceanside. We have lived here for over a decade. I have major concerns about the direction, or lack-there-of, throughout Oceanside. Any identity that downtown Oceanside (Townside and South Oside) once had has been rapidly stripped away over the last few years by the rubber-stamp development of high-rise buildings that block the ocean views and add zero aesthetics to the area. Many long-time residents share this sentiment. I personally don't. I lived in the downtown from 2000 to 2010 (and I still own a condo in the area). In 2000, much of the downtown was blighted, theft and other petty crime was rampant, and there was little pedestrian activity, as many people didn't feel safe walking around and there weren't that many places to go. There was an unsettling amount of violence occurring around the bars and in other areas after dark. Prostitutes were a fixture on some street corners. Drug sales took place in plain view. There was a strip club on Pier View. There was no Pier View pedestrian underpass. The area straddling Mission Avenue west of the railroad was a sea of asphalt (before that, it was a railroad stockyard). The block of South Pacific between Mission and Seagaze was littered with rundown buildings. I'm not a huge fan of the architecture of some of the recent midrise development; I would've liked to see more vertical articulation, higher quality finish materials, more conspicuous points of entry, etc. That said, to some extent, the quality of the architecture is in the eye of the beholder. I think the biggest miss was not incorporating more public plazas and green spaces in the nine-block master plan area, but at the time the plan was prepared, the homeless were occupying much of the public realm and there was concern that plaza, etc. would just attract that population.

I agree that, in the years leading up to the development, much of the downtown area had become blighted. However, that doesn't excuse the approval of the designs that we're now stuck with. Hight restrictions can be established and enforced, like they once had in Carlsbad Village. A more "terraced" design approach could've been taken. Requiring a mix of public/private use parking structures for new buildings downtown could've been pursued, as was done in San Marcos near Urge Gastropub. I'm not saying extensive work wasn't needed in that area. I'm saying what we got

did not measure up to what was needed. This is, in part because of a lack of focus or clear vision for what an end goal of major revitalization should/could look like (recognizing that development is a more of a continual process over many years).

This adds to the "identity crisis" that Oceanside seems to be experiencing all over. What was the City's identify before downtown redevelopment? What preexisting character would you like to see restored? I know a lot of people are nostalgic for the "scrappy" downtown, though in truth a lot of these folks were not spending time in the downtown when things were "scrappy."

I wasn't arguing for any major preexisting character to be restored, but an attempt to preserve whatever small, beach-town charm and history of Oceanside could be preserved then cleaned up and improved. The "scrappy" downtown may have been outgrown, but what style, architecture, and design elements will allow Oceanside to stand apart from other beach towns. I've similarly been sad to see the erasure of the charm and character of Carlsbad Village. Many of the Tudor-style buildings and European charm only dated back to the 1960's, but it was clearly part of a city plan to create a cohesive area with specific design elements that made it stand out from neighboring areas. It was the "Carmel of Southern California". Revitalization doesn't always have to be "restoration" or nostalgic. When done properly, it can create a community that draws people in based on it's uniqueness. Perhaps Oceanside's history can be used as a road map for design elements to incorporate? The city could try to accentuate the San Luis Rey area and the Mexican/Spanish influence, incorporate nods to the WWII era establishment of Camp Pendleton and the positive aspects of that relationship over the decades, and maybe take styling cues from the 1940's/1950's when the two came together (but with a more modern flare). I'm not a designer, but I'm trying to make a point that a properly executed and unique identity can make a huge difference in the ability to draw visitors in over longer periods of time and provide some sustainability for smaller businesses. The recent downturn in Carlsbad Village is most likely a result of mismanagement from the city and a lack of interest in preserving their unique charm, resulting in the current transition period where height restrictions are being waived and design/materials are not at all cohesive throughout the area. How many La Jolla's does San Diego county need? Is that the goal of Oceanside? That is the identity crisis of which I was speaking.

In my neighborhood, there have many attempts over the years to develop the private land East and West of Melrose, at Oceanside Blvd./Bobier. Thankfully, they have not been successful yet. Plans to develop the northeast and northwest corners of Melrose and Oceanside were approved over a year ago. Maybe, but no work on those parcels has occurred, making me wonder if the developers have had financial issues (hopefully), and thus not yet successful in their buildout. The parcel at the southeast corner has not been entitled. The road at Melrose already bottle-necks north of that intersection and is already insufficient for the amount of traffic. Widening of it is needed even without additional development. I'll inquire with Traffic Engineering about the buildout configuration of Melrose. The fact is, the City is not going to build its way out of traffic congestion. The plans that the developers proposed (and evidently got approved) included a widening of Melrose just north of that intersection (maybe, in part, because they were going to have difficulty getting their heavy equipment on-site otherwise and saw it as a way to entice the city into approving the plans). Since widening is already needed, adding 300 or 700 (or whatever the number of homes is) to the area is only going to put us in the same place we are now, in terms of congestion. I agree that we can't build our way out of congestion, but "we" can avoid massively adding to it. Adding more homes increases the issues of emergency evacuation and response for all residents of the area, both new and pre-existing. As part of the updating of the Safety Element, we will be looking at evacuation routes and protocols. Included in the last proposed development was another strip mall that no one asked for or needs. There was no discussion by the developers of any interest by local businesses or any pre-negotiated leases. The sycophantic developers (none of whom are Oside residents) are operating off of the "if you build it, they will come" idea. Vacancies drag down surrounding property values and increase issues with homelessness and crime. To some degree, commercial vacancy results from a surplus of commercial zoning in Oceanside. One approach to addressing this surplus is to facilitate housing within the City's commercial corridors, either through mixeduse development or standalone residential. The Smart and Sustainable Corridors Specific Plan (SSCSP) will seek to find the right balance between residential and non-residential use along Oceanside Boulevard and the City's other major east-west commercial corridors. It should be noted that residential use in conjunction with mixed-use development has been allowed in the City's commercial districts for generations. Just because it's been allowed, doesn't mean it's always needed or a good idea. Since I don't have an HOA, I'm allowed to paint my house a ridiculous color but it doesn't mean it's going to help me, my neighbors, or the community around me. If there's already a surplus of commercial zoning, why approve more, without a compelling need or some evidence that it won't sit vacant for some period of time? If more commercial space is needed in certain areas, to make them more

walkable, great! But, allowing developers to build it just because they can or because it's allowed doesn't help anyone. By far, the largest issue is that the last version of plans do not address the increased strain on the infrastructure in the immediate area. What schools would those homes be zoned for? The same schools already relying on multiple portables and struggling to provide sub-par education. OUSD enrollment is down over 1,500 students since 2015. The district is closing several elementary schools. Are those totals representing every area of Oceanside, or pocketed in specific areas, like near the back gate of Pendleton and possibly due to the reduction (which began around that time) of active duty Marines on Pendleton by attrition? Does that mean that basic aid will be reduced for all schools in OUSD? How is that going to help schools that are 3/10 or 5/10, which hurt property values and undermine city efforts to attract larger/higher value employers? There is a lag in allocation of funding to account for the population increase, and even longer lag in the realization of tax revenue from those areas. The police and fire will have much more to patrol and the closest fire station doesn't have sufficient real estate to expand any further. It seems clear to anyone with half a brain that zero thought was given to any of these matters. Instead, the city seems blinded by outside investors dangling a mirage of dollar signs in their face so that the city will continue to reduce open space, pander to lazy and greedy developers, and put zero thought into long-term impacts. With some exceptions, development in Oceanside over the past few decades has occurred on properties designated for the uses proposed and approved. Designating a property for a certain category of uses essentially establishes a development right for that property. While the City maintains some discretion over proposed development through the project review process, property owners have legal rights to develop their properties consistent with applicable land use and zoning designations and standards. There have been some re-designations of property to accommodate housing (Mission/Academy, Mission between Foussat and Carolyn Circle, Old Grove near College, Oceanside/Vine). We hope an updated General Plan will discourage such re-designations in the future. hope so too!

I have my doubts that this General Plan update will address any real issues, only continue the problems of the last few years into the next 20. I believe the first step in addressing this is to determine what kind of city Oceanside wants to be, a carbon copy of the other beach towns up and down the coast, an affordable option and bedroom community for the North County and San Diego proper areas, or something else entirely. What is your vision for Oceanside? What path would you suggest the City follow over the next 20 years? In addition to what I stated above, regarding design elements and identity, I think there has to be some acknowledgement of the aging population, and the explosion of retiring baby-boomers (for one). I don't have data on the demographics of the surrounding areas, but 5BR, \$750k split-level homes are not affordable for many people on a fixed income. For people that had high paying jobs, were able to invest, etc. maybe they can afford some of the more affluent areas, but what about everyone else? In addition to the aging population, there are younger people unable to purchase a home because of the outrageous starting price. What if Oceanside focused its development on smaller, "starter homes" and retirement friendly properties. Along with that, something should be done about Tri-City hospital to provide better healthcare to the surrounding area. I've made it known to my wife that, if I am incapacitated, under no circumstances should I be taken to "Die-City", and I will risk the few extra miles to go to Scripps Encinitas. So, I suppose my vision would be to make Oceanside more attractive to working class individuals, both young and older, and to be both a starting point and/or final destination for people that want to make a life for themselves in Southern California, without having to go all the way to Ramona, etc. Areas like Del Mar, La Jolla, parts of Rancho Bernardo will likely always be strongholds for retirees with means, but Oceanside can effectively "corner the market" in affordable housing and ensure long-term stability. Then, figure out how to carve out areas that will be essentially designated for smaller, more affordable homes, for seniors and lower income individuals (where state authorized rent control is in effect). This has the added benefit of reducing homelessness caused by people that have been pushed out of their homes by prices that have outpaced wages. Additionally, any available Open Space should be protected and developers should be pointed towards re-development of rundown and vacant areas. This is precisely what we hope to do. This is the principal intent of the SSCSP, which will inform the development of "smart growth" goals and policies in the Land Use Element and other components of the General Plan. I'm glad to hear you support the provision of additional housing, as the state and region are in the midst of a significant housing crisis and housing has an important role (as noted above) in stabilizing the City's commercial sector. I'm a little bit suspicious of the severity of the housing crisis, mainly because of areas where outside/foreign investors have been so active in acquiring properties. There are numerous neighborhoods in Carmel Valley that have been sold, but sit empty because they were purchased by foreign real estate speculators. Many other investors own multiple residential properties for passive income (which I'm not opposed to), but rent increases force people out or prevent them from affording it in the first place. In some cases, increased operating costs drive rent increases, and in some it's probably greed. Regardless of the reason, I suspect that the lack of inventory is more a manufactured issue (not by any one group). They hate that because demolition of pre-existing structures costs time and money, so they prefer a "blank canvas" (hence my

claims of laziness). It's mostly land costs that motivate developers to pursue outlying properties. I have no doubt that is an initial motivating factor, but if there were two lots of equal size and price but one was raw land and the other had some sort of structure on it...l'd be willing to bet they would choose the raw land every time. Unfortunately, the long-term cost of providing and maintaining infrastructure It seems like the modern approach is for developers to pass infrastructure costs on to new residents in the form of a Mello Roos, which is absolutely abhorrent in my opinion. So, what does Oceanside want to be when it grows up? While this is largely for the community to decide through this process, it's important to note that there are also state and regional priorities that have to be accommodated. I'd be happy to discuss these with you.

My guess is that none of these virtual workshops or any surveys are honest or legitimate attempts to get input from residents. It is most likely a "dog and pony" show just to give the appearance of caring about anyone other than themselves and their own self-interests. I'm sharing these thoughts so that I know that I at least said something...even if it falls on deaf ears. Nope. We're listening. While finding consensus and establishing a clear and consistent direction will be challenging, with so many voices and perspectives among community members, we're going to try. I hope you are right, because there is a difference between "hearing" and "listening". And, it's more about what is done with the information once you have it. You can't make everyone happy but I think, at the end of the day, most people want the same thing...a safe, affordable place to call home. I am encouraged by the response in the workshops and the consistent themes, for the most part. One area that gives me pause is the desire to attract larger, tech-focused employers. No one has to say it, but I think everyone knows that people are envisioning Google, Facebook, Amazon, etc. and I do not think companies like that would end up helping the area. I believe caution is needed when looking at what kinds of industries Oceanside would like to attract. In contracting, a business partner on one project can be a competitor on another. Oceanside would be well served by understanding that and it's role in the county, and surrounding areas. Grab small businesses that are being pushed out of Carlsbad Village by their high rents, market Oceanside as a close and more affordable lodging option for Legoland visitors. At the same time, let Del Mar, La Jolla, Fashion Valley, etc. have all of the extravagance instead of dreaming to compete with them. It doesn't mean Oceanside can't or shouldn't have nice things, but keep in mind what else is in the area. One comment I made in one of the workshop sessions was, if you had \$50k+ to spend on a wedding or other event, is there anywhere in Oceanside you would want to have it? (For me, the answer is "no").

Regarding the excellent Mobility-Land Use discussion of January 12th:

- 1. Why wasn't the Coast Highway included as a "Smart and Sustainable Corridor"? This corridor was addressed by the Incentive District, adopted last year. The ID will provide some guidance for updated zoning standards and review processes for the major east-west corridors. Sounds good. Perhaps this should have been mentioned?
- 2. I also think that "car parking" should have been included on both the "Mobility" list and the "Mobility Issues" list. In retrospect, I believe parking should've been addressed more explicitly. With so many community members still perceiving a general lack of parking, this is a very difficult conversation to have, but we need to have this reckoning sooner rather than later. I welcome ideas and data that help us make the argument that parking should not be the sole driver of what can and can't be built in the corridors. In the near term, we should identify those corridor segments where spillover parking could be an issue. If

parking is value-priced and shared, less is needed and spillover and driving to seek parking is reduced. Driving to seek parking is reduce by good technology allowing a driver to select price and walk-distance and them be guide to the optimum spot.

- 3. Also, for the Bikes discussion, I think that the LCI (League Certified Instructed) Traffic Skills class should have been mentioned. Yes, we should take every opportunity to highlight these programs. Send me some information. I hope Tom can do that. The Bike-Ped Committee has done great work. The Bicycle League feels the LCI class increases riding.
- 4. For Noise, I think loud vehicles (often motorcycles) should have been mentioned. Many respondents to the neighborhood planning area survey expressed frustration over motorcycle noise. I've reached out to OOD on this subject, to understand if/how enforcement might be enhanced. Perfect.
- 5. And of course the big one: to shift significantly from the SOV mode, we MUST include the need to implement systems to improve the way we pay for the use of roads (RUC = Road Use Charge) and parking (DAP = Dividend Account Parking). I'd like to see SANDAG move into the RUC space and bring the cities along with them. As for DAP, the more you can simplify the message, the better. DAP is a carparking system in which the parking is value-priced, shared, automated, and in which the parking earnings go to to those losing money because the parking is being provided OR for whom the parking is built.
- 6. For safety, the advantage of round-a-bouts versus signalized intersections should have been included (91% fewer fatalities). Roundabouts within the east-west corridors may be a tough sell, given how these corridors function now (i.e., they are thoroughfares and key links to employment centers, freeways, etc.). We'll see what the traffic study shows. We should have it soon.

The road diet would certainly work well on Vista Way from Jefferson to Walmart. I think a "super roundabout" should be studied to replace the stop light at the SR-78/I-5/Vista Way intersection (or just leave it alone).

For Items 4 and for the RUC of 5, Oceanside needs to petition the State. SANDAG also.
