



PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- 1. State law requires that all cities and counties adopt a General Plan that addresses specific topics (land use, circulation, housing, environmental justice, military readiness, conservation, open space, safety, and noise).
- 2. The City has never comprehensively updated its General Plan.
- 3. The first phase of the update was adopted in May 2019.
 - Economic Development Element
 - Energy and Climate Action Element
 - Climate Action Plan

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- 4. The second phase of the update includes several related components.
 - Updates of existing GP elements
 - Land Use
 - Mobility (formerly entitled Circulation)
 - Housing (addressed by a separate environmental review process)
 - Conservation and Open Space
 - Community Facilities (optional element adopted in 1990)
 - Safety (emphasis on natural hazards)
 - Noise
 - South Morro Hills Community Plan
 - Smart and Sustainable Corridors Specific Plan
 - Active Transportation Plan and Master Trails Plan
 - Update of the Climate Action Plan

SMART AND SUSTAINABLE CORRIDORS



PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- 5. The project team may decide to take a thematic approach to the organization of the updated General Plan.
 - Healthy and Safe Community
 - Stable and Prosperous Local Economy
 - Visually Appealing Environment
 - Resilient Resources
 - Welcoming and Equitable Community

The project will be supported by a Programmatic Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) that identifies and establishes mitigation for potentially significant environmental impacts.

WHAT IS CEQA?

California Environmental Quality Act

- Disclose environmental effects
- Prevent or minimize environmental impacts
- Enhance public participation






WHAT IS A PROJECT?

Project Level



Includes exact details of physical disturbance

Programmatic



Includes land use concepts but does not authorize specific development

TRANSPORTATION

- 1. New Metric is Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT)
- 2. CEQA no longer allows use of Level of Service (LOS) as the transportation metric
- 3. City has developed VMT Guidelines.
- 4. Goal reduce trip length and promote non-vehicular modes of travel.
- 5. Local Transportation Study evaluating LOS may still be required consistent with the City's TIA Guidelines, but this will be separate from CEQA.





Perceived safety concerns and lack of park activities are main issues.



Facilities

Infrastructure improvements, such as new or upsized sewer pipes, may be needed as more development occurs.



Oceanside has three major watersheds, each of which plays an important part of the City's natural environment.






Existing Open Space

The City's draft Multiple Habitat Subarea Plan (SAP) has never been adopted.





Historic Resources

Oceanside's national, state, and locally designated historic resources are primarily found west of I-5, and near Mission San Luis Rey.

Oceanside's most recent historical survey was conducted in 1992.

Landslide Susceptibility

Some areas of the city have high landslide susceptibility.

Landslide risk can be exacerbated by other incidents including fires and earthquakes.

FEMA Flood Zones

Flood zones follow major corridors in Oceanside. The San Luis Rey River presents the greatest risk from flooding.

Fire Hazard Severity Zones

The western and southeastern edge of the city and small portions of South Morro Hills are classified as very high fire hazard severity zones.
