7 ways to use wall paper

Wallpaper can transform a room, changing its look and feel by adding pattern, colour and texture to the walls. Don't feel held back by the size or shape of the room, as the right paper can bring a space to life.

Like fabric, wallpaper can vary in price and quality, and although papering a room looks fantastic, it is a much more expensive option than paint. As with paint and fabric, always get samples before choosing and purchasing. The wallpaper samples are often too small to get a good overall feel for the pattern and its repeat. For a small fee, some companies will offer you returnable larger samples that will give you a better idea of your space's overall design and colours.

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Using wallpaper can also be a great way to cover up any imperfections in your walls, which may be especially relevant in older homes. Wall cracks can be well hidden, avoiding lining paper, which may have been needed if painting. There is an incredible array of wallpaper finishes, including wipeable options and shiny, matt and textured finishes such as seagrass and fabric.

Use wallpaper to tell your story, for example, if you love the birds in your garden, decorate your study with beautiful bird-design wallpaper, a perfect way of bringing the outside in and surrounding yourself with something you love as you go about your everyday.

Remember that the other fabrics, textures or furniture in the room will balance out bold prints or bright colours – don't let it put you off going for a wallpaper you love.
