MR. SANGER: We're just getting started 1 with our Closed Session. 2 COMMISSIONER GELDZILER: Okay. COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: How you doing? 4 5 COMMISSIONER GELDZILER: Good. How are 6 you? 7 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Good. MR. SANGER: And at this time we're going 8 to have Mr. Pizzillo start us off with our Closed Session items. 10 Mr. Pizzillo? 11 MR. PIZZILLO: Thank you, Mr. Sanger. 12 Good evening, Commissioners. 13 14 Happy New Year again. 15 So I just wanted to touch base. Our last meeting was in November. Unfortunately that was 16 17 the day of that terrible snowstorm and I tried very hard to get here but I was 90 minutes in 18 Jersey City and I just couldn't get out. 19 So, I apologize for missing last -- last 20 21 meeting. I just wanted to bring up --22 MR. SANGER: A number of us didn't get home 23 until 11 o'clock that night, so. 24 25 VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: I know.

COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: And I never got here 1 because I was on the Turnpike. So I can relate. 2 VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: I get home --3 MR. PIZZILLO: Yeah, it was brutal. 4 VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: -- almost by 5 6 11 --7 MR. PIZZILLO: It was brutal. 8 VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: -- from New York --9 10 MR. PIZZILLO: It was -- it was brutal. 11 VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: -- from two o'clock in the afternoon. 12 13 ACCOUNT'S RECEIVABLES/DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS: 14 15 16 MR. PIZZILLO: But last time we met in October, it was obviously before October 29th, and 17 18 I just wanted to give you guys an update as to 19 where the tenancies were at that time. Obviously, a vast majority of them were 20 dismissed, as the tenants pay in full prior to us 21 going to court. 22 I believe we ended up going to court with 23 six -- six tenants or -- actually less than that; 24 one, two, three, four, five. 25

We made settlement agreements at that time and as of today all those tenants are still up-to-date and in compliance with the agreements.

So I just wanted to kind of tie a bow around, you know, September and October, just because I couldn't be here on -- in November.

And then on page 2 just shows the current tenancies that are pending.

And they would be for November, December, and essentially January's rent because we do have court next week. So at that time they'll be -- you know, the notices will be sufficient.

And whoever's not paid, you know, we're going to ask for -- whoever's on this list that's pending in court, we're going to demand that January's rent get paid as well at that time.

So, obviously, there's a -- you know, kind of the -- to buttress the January delinquency report, which is part of your Commissioner packages.

There's 34 tenants that are, as of today, still outstanding in rent.

Of those 34, 14 we already have suit on, which will be next week.

Just to break it down a little bit -- one

1 level further, of those 34, 21 owe one month
2 rent. So they're just outstanding for January.

There's 14 that owe more than one month rent. But all of those 14 people are actually on -- you know, on for court on Wednesday.

So the hope is, you know, obviously all of those individuals will either be paid up to date prior to, you know, court or we will, you know, do whatever we need to do at court.

Whether that's, A) make an agreement; or,
B), you know, evict them. We'll just have to
kind of wait and see, you know, when we get
there, who shows up and those things.

We were able actually to dismiss several right before -- before court. I didn't formally dismiss them yet but that's what we will do.

I spoke with Rosadela this afternoon. And you'll see on -- on page 2 the four tenants that we will be dismissing.

The good news about those tenants are, if you look, the little -- the little number next to their rent is the amount of rent that they had outstanding.

So all of those people were actually on the delinquency list of owing more than one month

rent.

So it was two of the people that owed three months rent and two of the tenants that owed two months rent.

MR. SANGER: That's good.

MR. PIZZILLO: So, we're actually -- you know, we're really, as -- as Mr. Sanger's continuously said in prior meetings, we're really being aggressive in taking a proactive approach to these tenants that, you know, think they can go several months without paying rent. And we obviously, you know, continue and -- continue to make that a priority to curb, you know, those tenants who decide to go more than two months with rent -- or withholding their rental payments.

You know, obviously I think Mr. Sanger and I have discussed just even taking it -- being a bit more aggressive in terms of some of these tenants because they are repeat offenders. And a lot of these names you'll see on both tables, you know, --

SANGER: -- then make a payment; and then go another three, four months, make a 12 13 payment; go another three and four months. 14 So what it is, they call it a habitual. 15 Okay? These are people who are habitually delinquent. 16 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Um-hum. 17 MR. SANGER: That is the people that, I'm 18 19 talking with Gerard about now, that I have to go 20 after. This puts a tremendous strain on the 21 Housing Authority --22 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Absolutely. MR. SANGER: -- financially. 23 24 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Sure. MR. SANGER: And they -- many -- and this 25

These are the people now that we will be taking a special interest in and a special focus upon that we're going to try to be real firm with and show, historically, how they've been doing this. And if they do not stop, what— whatever agreement that comes with the — within the courts —

Because a lot's up to the judge.

-- an agreement that we do. We're going to try to be as aggressive as possible, as we've said with the same -- you know, and try to instill in the judge that we need action or this -- these type -- this type of performance is going to continue. You know this type of thing's going to continue.

So that's -- that's what we're trying to do.

SANGER: How she manages her personal 8 finances and -- and she looks to get members of 9 her family to help her at the end. And she gets 10 people from extended family and living elsewhere 11 to send her money. And things of that nature. 12 And --13 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: So it's just her --14 There's many things involved. MR. SANGER: 15 There's --16 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: -- management 17 skills --18 MR. SANGER: Yeah, management skills. 19 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: -- with her money. 20 MR. SANGER: Her social issues in her life 21 might be affecting her finance. 22 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Understood. 23 MR. SANGER: And things of -- things of 24 that nature. 25

COMMISSIONER DINARDO: I got it. 1 MR. PIZZILLO: I'm very familiar with 2 Yadira. I've -- several -- several, several, 3 several conversations with her. 4 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Oh, I'm sure --5 In various --MR. PIZZILLO: 6 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: -- you've met with 7 her a couple --8 MR. PIZZILLO: -- various months, --9 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: -- every couple of 10 11 months. MR. PIZZILLO: -- in the -- in the court--12 in the courtroom. 13 You know she also claims to have a child 14 support issue but, you know, there's always 15 stories. 16 But, you know, --17 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Of course. 18 MR. PIZZILLO: -- you know it as -- you 19 know it as an attorney, there's always stories 20 that, you know, people -- people spin. 21 But just to -- to piggyback what Mr. Sanger 22 was saying in terms of these habitual -- you 23 know, there are mechanisms within the anti-24 eviction act that, you know, although New 25

Jersey's very a tenant-friendly state, there are 1 some mechanisms that we can use in terms of 2 filing complaints against these habitual tenants; 3 the tenants that are habitually late in rental payments. 5 So, I'm going to -- obviously, you know, 6 this is one of the initiatives that Mr. Sanger 7 and I, you know, have discussed. So I'm going to be looking into, you know, what the best way is to stem -- to stem these. 10 I mean when we first came on obviously we 11 took a very aggressive approach just to even 12 trying to balance the rental, you know the rental 13 book, because it was so out of whack. And we 14 have done a good job. 15 It's not perfect. We still have work to 16 do. But that's going to be our initiative, I 17 think, you know in terms of the tenancy for 2019 18 is, you know, curtailing the habitual -- the 19 people that --20 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: And it's so many --21 MR. PIZZILLO: -- habitually --22 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: -- other factors 23

COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Yes.

MR. SANGER: With drug distribution and drug -- whatever, substance abuse, whatever it might have been.

We were able to help evict that because they were certainly having a negative impact on our buildings and the quality of life and things of that nature.

We were able to get a -- a number of families involved with drugs and -- and that type thing through the courts and have -- again, now, is going to be like another second phase of that.

COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: Sure.

MR. SANGER: We're working very closely with the Union City Police Department. I just met with them recently. We're down -- we have -- you know, we're working with our -- with our camera system. We're working with different people now and we're starting to see a new little

influx of drug dealing and drug influx and things 1 of that nature, which is -- which is a constant. It's ongoing. You get a new group of people coming in. 4 Many -- a number who live here but most who don't 5 -- who do not even live here. 6 COMMISSIONER DINARDO: Mmm. 7 MR. SANGER: But -- but you have the few 8 that do live here that are attracting them here. 9 COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Um-hum. 10 MR. SANGER: And then they're coming in --11 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Exactly. 12 MR. SANGER: -- and things of that nature. 13 So, we're working hard on that and I -- I 14 think the next three or four months, with your 15 support, -- and, of course, we're looking to do 16 the right thing for the people. And one thing we 17 can't tolerate is drug distribution and -- and 18 things of that -- you know, within our -- within 19 our buildings. It disrupts everyone's life in so 20 many different ways. 21 So it's getting to the point now that 22 I've --23 And I've relayed this message very, you 24 know, very directly to the -- the Chief in Union

City -- our new Chief, and she's been very cooperative. 2 -- is the fact now that people are saying 3 . 4 to me that they're afraid to come in and out of their apartments at times. 5 6 Not all buildings but particularly one building. 7 8 COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Um-hum. 9 MR. SANGER: Okay. 10 And it's -- people are saying, well if I go 11 out and I go to a store or if I go to Bergenline and come back, I don't know if I come back if 12 they're going to intimidate me. 13 14 They're being intimidated. They're being a 15 bit harassed. Someone might say a few things and 16 think --So you have people that are hanging around 17 18 through drug, whatever now, who are intimidating 19 some of our good people that are living here are 20 saying sometimes they're prisoners in their 21 own --VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: That's 22 23 terrible, yes. MR. SANGER: -- two or three people have 24

said this to me.

1 COMMISSIONER DiNARDO: That's terrible. MR. SANGER: Okay? And when I hear that it's very -- it's 3 annoying. 4 5 VICE CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: It's sad. 6 It's --7 MR. SANGER: Okay? And anyone who is a professional and when 8 someone says I'm afraid to come in and out of my 9 10 house or you're intimidated and things like that, 11 now you're truly disrupting peoples' lives and 12 putting fear in them and things of that nature. 13 And so we're trying very hard now to 14 refocus upon another new wave of drug dealer that are around and to try to keep -- have an ongoing 15 16 -- you know, ongoing fight, you know, with this 17 and trying to, you know, do this. 18 So you're going to see that the next few 19 months. And it's going to go through Gerard. 20 Some people with families or drug --I'm meeting, this Tuesday, with four 21 families right at this table. And I'm telling 22 23 parents about some of the people that are on 24 their lease and not on their lease that are there
