And even though it was the summertime, business -- business was moving ahead strongly.

And we're -- you know, we're very happy for many of the projects that we had completed this summer.

And in just a few moments we're going to be giving you a little -- a little bit of a visual view of some of the projects that we had completed this summer.

But before we do that -- and this is the

Open Session of our meeting, I just want to start

off and if you wouldn't mind, because of time and

-- and things of that nature, I just wanted to

take this time, this Open part of our meeting.

INTRODUCTION OF JOHN AYALA & REMARKS BY EDITH
GUERRA:

MR. SANGER: If you recall a few months ago
I had the opportunity to introduce you to Edith
Guerra. And Edith is our new -- our new social
worker here. And -- who has worked very closely
with many of our tenants -- our residents and
just on many different areas.

And I thought it best this evening -- Edith had made a presentation to us that we all enjoyed a few months back and she gave us a little vision cast on some of the things she may like to do and a little of what she might be involved with and what -- what some of her goals and -- and, of course, what her purpose was and what she'd like to achieve in assisting the many residents that we have in the quality of their life.

So I thought this evening it best that I have someone come to us. Here with us this evening is Mr. John Ayala. Some of you may know -- may know John.

John is a resident here at the Union City

- 1 | Housing Authority. And Edith -- the Housing
- 2 Authority ourselves, our office as well as Edith
- 3 and -- and a number of surrounding agencies, have
- 4 been working very closely with John in order to
- 5 provide him with services to improve his quality
- 6 of life. And he needed services in a number of
- 7 different areas.
- 8 But I would like him just to be here
- 9 | tonight so he can tell you about how his life has
- 10 | improved since working with the Housing Authority
- 11 and working with Edith.
- 12 And just to start this off, Edith, is there
- 13 some things you might want to say or anything at
- 14 | this time?
- 15 No?
- 16 MS. DILLON: Can -- can I just ask you to
- 17 | go to the microphone?
- 18 Thank you.
- 19 MR. SANGER: Yes. Okay.
- MS. GUERRA: Sorry, John.
- 21 MR. SANGER: Before you -- before you do go
- 22 | out -- outside.
- MS. GUERRA: Oh, okay.
- 24 MR. SANGER: Okay?
- 25 MS. GUERRA: I just want to say hello

again. 1 COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Hi. COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Hi. 3 CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Hi. 4 MS. GUERRA: And we've been working very 5 hard. Most of the work has been just getting 6 7 ourselves out there; telling the -- the residents 8 that we're here. We've been involved -- Mr. Sanger will 9 involve me in cases where there's disputes 10 between residents. 11 12 We have a couple of residents that do suffer from mental health issues. So we try to 13 get involved with them; link them to services. 14 15 We're working really hard. They're tough to 16 engage but we're -- we're really trying with 17 them. We brought Mr. Ayala tonight. I asked him 18 if he wanted to come and speak with you guys for 19 20 a little because from the start he's been a case that we've been working with. And I think he's a 21 22 good example. 23 It's been a short period of time but there's been a lot of progress made. And I --24

you know, I wanted him to share a little bit of

AYALA: Well, since my accident in 19 years ago I don't have no kind of income, you 17 know. I have trouble to -- to, you know, to 18 19 be --20 How -- how can I say? -- be -- have a good -- a good -- better 21 life for myself. 22 23 MR. SANGER: Um-hum. Um-hum. 24 MR. AYALA: Too many trouble to -- to get benefits and somewhere else, you know, when I'm 25

going to Welfare, how -- and how can some --1 MR. SANGER: Medicare? MR. AYALA: No. Social -- Social Security. 3 MR. SANGER: Um-hum. 4 MR. AYALA: Because, you know, when you 5 try to apply you have all too many medical 6 documentation, you know medical records. And --7 and they -- you know, I have trouble with the 8 insurance, you know, to get at that time, you 10 know. And before come living in Housing and I 11 12 have too many troubles. The only person that give me some help on that time is the Mayor Brian 13 Stack. Mayor Brian Stack help me to get 14 15 something and I'm be a little bit better. 16 But when I get on -- on Housing, it starting getting more improved because I have 17 housing, I have an -- an apartment and -- and 18 19 living, you know, better situation. 20 Before the -- and then after when she come it's even more, more, more better the 21 situation because I have --22 How can I say? 23 -- problem of my health, problem of 24

depression. Depression. Yeah. And depression.

- 1 | So but I have in my apartment and I live in my
- 2 apartment -- so bad, you know. Even the people
- 3 can walk so good, you know, it's sad. You know,
- 4 | leaving the trash and, you know, garbage
- 5 everything because the -- the depression is so
- 6 bad. You know? No -- no good.
- 7 And when -- when they come, it -- it
- 8 starting improving more -- more better and I get
- 9 more better. You know? Everything nice. Get
- 10 some more dress, you know. More insurance and,
- 11 | you know, and proof of going to the medicals, you
- 12 know. Everything nice.
- And I feel much better now. My apartment
- 14 | is, you know, more clean and everything that, you
- 15 know, good. And I feel much better, you know.
- 16 I'm sorry because my English not so good; I
- 17 | try but, you know, --
- 18 | COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: You're doing fine.
- 19 MR. SANGER: You're doing great.
- MR. AYALA: Yeah.

MR. SANGER: -- because of his condition; 24

transportation; things of that nature.

for HVAC --

Of course that's heating and -- and air conditioning.

-- Repair Service for the Union City Housing Authority.

You're going to see that we did have ten maintenance contracts that we do each and every year at this time.

One we did not get -- there -- no one did submit. No contractor or vendor did submit. So we're looking to re-bid and we're doing so with this Resolution.

Resolution number 44 is a Resolution

Approving the Execution and Memorialization of

Shared Service Agreement Between the Union City

Housing Authority and Union City Board of

Education.

We're looking to continue with the Board of Education in renting our facility and our pavilion behind us for the sum of \$3500.00 per month.

Allows the Board of Education to use the facility for some of its -- for some of its special education services and also allows us to -- you know, an income for the Union City Housing Authority.

But, most importantly is, we're -- we're allowing our facilities to be utilized by the community to support the community and support the children of Union City.

So we did have some -- some of our properties that were underused and we're looking for ways now to utilize them and so -- so we can get maximum benefit from them.

Resolution number 45 is Resolution

Approving and Authorizing the Union City Housing

Authority to Enter into Executive Cooperative

Pricing Agreement.

And what we have been doing at the Housing Authority and what we have shared with you a number of times that during the bid procurement process and the bidding process, it -- unfortunately it's very hard sometimes to get various vendors and contractors to submit bids.

And after you do exhaust the bid process, you could then follow some State guidelines and work with State cooperatives.

And State cooperatives are already vendors or contractors who have been already approved by the State of New Jersey as far as their -- as being responsible, having the right

- certifications and having the right licenses,
  things of that nature, the insurances and
  whatever it might be.
- So Jorge has worked very hard on this to

  get us in -- in contact and in a working

  relationship with the -- with the co-ops. We had

  done one already and we're asking tonight that we

  enter into a cooperative pricing agreement with

  -- with Educational Service Commission of New

  Jersey for the purchase of good and -- for goods

  and -- and services.

- So this allows us, when we exhaust the procurement process and if we cannot get the bids, it allows us to go now to a State-certified agency that allows us to -- we can choose someone to work with us and these people have already been pre- -- pre-approved by the State. And it's all done through a legal process.
- So we already -- already are working with the Hunterdon County group.

And we're going to have a second, being the Educational Service Commission of New Jersey and -- and allows us to move forward and, basically, it doesn't hold us up. We don't have to wait another month to re-bid, two months to re-bid,

1 things of that nature. And Jorge has done a real good job with 2 this, reaching out and getting into contact, 3 establishing relationship with them, and -- and 4 in working on this. 5 So, we're glad to be --6 7 COMMISSIONER JETTER: You did a good job. MR. SANGER: -- glad to have that 8 Resolution as well. 10 COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Um-hum. MR. SANGER: The next is a Resolution 11 12 Permitting Union City Housing Authority to Publish Bid for General Counsel and Labor -- and 13 Labor Legal Services. 14 15 Each year we go out to bid for our 16 attorneys and we have two -- two different areas. And, again, the Authority received an estimate from RIS Construction Corp. as an approved vendor from the -- this is from the Hunterdon County -- this HCESCCP, whatever. That is the --

COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Um-hum.

MR. SANGER: -- the Hunterdon County shared services, you know, people for General Contracting Services for 519-521 Summit Avenue, the COAH Project.

We've mentioned this to you for about a year now. We finally -- we're very happy to announce tonight that we will be -- we did get a bidder. We are awarding a bid with your -- of course, with your help tonight if you see fit. And we will be able to start construction on or about October 1st.

And we're hoping within 40 days we will be into that building with 12 new units -- 12 new units for the people of Union City downtown. So

1 we're very happy with that. Number 48 is Resolution Approving Contract 2 for Boiler Water Treatment Services. And that's 3 to be awarded. Again, these are -- all people -- low 5 bidders and were responsible. 6 7 Okay? And they all --8 9 COMMISSIONER JETTER: Ask Gerard, he's always there. 10 MR. SANGER: -- you could be sure to 11 12 that --13 COMMISSIONER JETTER: I'm always there. MR. SANGER: Yes. 14 And all approved by Gerard. We have gone 15 16 through the process; approved by Gerard. And we're -- we're happy to now get these moving --17 moving tonight. And, again, puts us in good 18 19 shape. 20 The only difference you'll see in all of these, back in -- in June you had given us 21 approval to go to multi-year contracts. We used 22 to be one-year contracts. Now all of these 23 24 contracts with the vendors are going to be two-

year --

1 COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Right. MR. SANGER: -- contracts, which is better. 2 So you don't have to go through this whole 3 process each and every year. It's every two years. And it does make things easier for 5 everyone. 6 7 All right? So the first is for the Boiler Water to 8 9 Metro Group and the bid will not exceed 10 \$11,610.00. Again, we have a cap on everything. The 11 12 cap you approved over two, three years ago. we're keeping a cap on that as well. 13 But realize the cap has been doubled 14 15 because of two years. 16 All right. The other is Resolution Approving Contract for Elevator Maintenance.

Very, very important for the Union City

Housing Authority for the safety of our residents

and for any-- anyone visiting, of course.

And it's very important that we do have a contractor in elevator service, people who are extremely responsible.

We're happy to continue working with G&S (sic) Elevator Industries. And they've -- we've had a good working relationship with them in recent years. They work well with Waldo in many -- you know, and working towards that.

And would not -- we would not exceed \$48,072.00 for the two-year period.

This is probably one of the biggest contracts we have. And also realizing that elevator safety is most important with elevators and the issues that come with the elevators when you have so many different buildings that we have.

And, of course, dealing with senior citizens and, you know, people -- handicap people as well living in our buildings. We want to be

sure that the elevators are, you know, as, you 1 know, well-run and that they are in excellent shape, you know, to help, you know, assist all of 3 our -- our residents. 4 So we're happy with that as well. 5 Also, Resolution number 51. 6 7 Approving Contract for Emergency Electrical 8 Repair. And any -- anytime we may have any electric 10 issues that we're not able to do with our maintenance staff, through Waldo, we are going to 11 12 enter into an agreement with TS-- TSUJ Corporation. 13 And it will be the rates of \$75.00 the 14 first hour and then 75 each weekday hours and 15 16 hundred and twelve dollars for on the weekend for first hour and hundred and twelve -- hundred 17 twelve for additional hours on the weekend. 18 So we're looking to work -- to continue 19 20 working with them for electrical services. Resolution number 52. 21 Resolution Approving Contract for 22 Exterminating Services. 23 24 Again, something -- you know it's very

important for the -- for the health of all our

1 residents.

And we're going to continue working -
we're happy with E&G Exterminators. They were

the lowest responsible bidder. And their rate

will not exceed \$16,640.00.

and Elevator Phone Repair.

And we're again working -- happy to be -continue working with United Federated Systems.

And their -- the amounts of the various hours and
their services are right here, which will not
basically exceed \$85.00 for the first hour and

fifty cents for those hour -- on the weekend.

Next is number 54.

Resolution Approving Contract for the Fire Sprinkler System Repair.

And, again, we'll be working -- we're awarding as the lowest responsible bidder to Fire -- Fire Prevention Contractors.

And, again, their rates are \$80.00 per hour; hundred thirty dollars for emergency hour; and yearly inspection fee of \$3,000.00.

And, again, we're happy to be working with

1 | them again as well.

The next is a Resolution Approving Contract

for Generator Maintenance Services.

And we'll be -- and the Resolution would be for Energy-Redux (sic) -- Rudox, Generator

6 Maintenance Service. And their bid would not exceed \$3,360.00.

And Resolution number 56.

Resolution Approving Contract for Fuel Oil Delivery.

Essential for the -- most important for the people. And we'll be entering into the lowest respon-- we're working with the lowest responsible bidder, National Fuel Oil. And they're .8 cents per -- per gallon and for -- and for each delivery.

So we're happy to be working with them.

Those are all the Resolutions that I do have, as far as, you know, all the services we're looking to procure and have for all our residents.

Are there any questions towards that?

You know, these are -- most of these are our regular maintenance contracts that we've been working with for many different years.

We are happy that this year a number of the vendors and contractors that we have worked with in past years have again continued to work with us. They've come in with their bids that have been -- as the lowest bidder. And they are very responsible. And we've had good working relationships.

So that's nice. It's nice when you continue -- can continue working with these people. And --

COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Um-hum.

MR. SANGER: -- they get to know you. You get to know them. And it just leads for, you know, good productivity for our tenants.

So good things happening.

Waldo works very closely with a lot of them and he gets the work orders each and every morning and there are some things he can do with his maintenance staff and there's some things he can't do where he has to call in the professionals. And that's why we have all these people onboard, you know, to maintain our buildings as best we can.

So with that being said, that's my first thing for this.

It goes to show you the work of the -- the administrative office, the maintenance staff, working with different vendors. It really is a collective, collaborative effort and a collaborative achievement for the many things we do.

I'm very fortunate to have Waldo working -with Waldo working with Jorge. Some very good
people working around me that allows us to get
many of these things accomplished.

And we have a good maintenance staff and good office staff and we're moving forward with many projects.

But the last six or seven months -- I just want to read to you some of the bullets of things we have done. And it's something we should all be proud of because it's only through your support and your help and your vote that allows us to do these things.

And one, of course, is the purchase of the Renaissance Building at 2601 Central Avenue.

We now have 36 units of additional

affordable housing in Union City. So that is our 1 building; 2601 Central Avenue is now the -- under 2

Authority. And is going to be -- in one short

- the ownership of the Union City Housing
- month is going to be under the -- the --5
- MR. MORIN: Management. 6
- 7 MR. SANGER: -- the management of the Union 8 City Housing Authority.

- 19 Also, our Columbian Courts downtown. 20 is new lighting, new fencing, new fire escapes, railings and walkways. And this was all done 21

This was all done with our capital fund --1 capital funding there. And I believe nothing --2 this is the first time in about 20, 25 years or 3 so that it was -- it was redone and resurfaced. As you could -- you know, as you could see, 5 too, if you could see some of the -- around some 6 of the greenery and some of the -- working with 7 the landscapers, we've done a better job downtown with that. 10 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, absolutely. MR. SANGER: The next one Jorge was just 11 12 at. We also had done the -- this whole patio here. Back patio was redone, repainted, the 13 fencing was -- and stairs were reconditioned. 14 15 And that was -- in the past that was all chipped 16 and dented and there was a lot of, --MR. MORIN: Rust. 17 MR. SANGER: -- you know, a lot of rust. 18 19 And also a lot of -- some of the stairwells were 20 broken. But the bottom line is, you know, we were

able to provide all of the water park for

everyone there, the new playground and, you know,

good things happening there.

Also, with capital funds, we have new fire doors and windows at Hillside Terrace.

There's an example of the fire door -- the exterior fire doors that were put up. And talked to you about that and you -- you had approved that months ago. So this is the final product of that.

Also, the SDA Building at 519-521 Summit Avenue.

You just approved to a Consent Agenda that that building, we -- we just awarded the contractor and awarded the -- you know, the Resolution and the bid. And they'll -- they'll be starting there Monday morning.

This is the building at 519-521 Summit

Avenue right there on the corner. There are 12

units there. There are nine one-bedroom units

and three two-bedroom units.

And that is all being fixed up for the -- the amount of \$156,000.00, so we make it livable

for -- for tenants. 1 And this is be extension of our Veterans 2 homes -- Veterans Housing in Union City. So, 3 this building's going to have 12 new units for --4 COMMISSIONER JETTER: Veterans? 5 MR. SANGER: -- people. 6 Um-hum. Um-hum. 7 COMMISSIONER JETTER: More Veterans. 8 9 MR. SANGER: Um-hum. 10 COMMISSIONER JETTER: Yay! MR. SANGER: Okay. 11 12 The other is the COAH at Vets and Cantello Street Project Procurement for Improvements to 13 the 40 Units and Exterior Safety Items. 14 15 And what we'll be doing there is, right at 16 Cantello Street with the 40 units, right after we're -- we get this project going, which will be 17 Monday, the next week or two we're going to sit 18 down and work with Gerard and our administrative 19 20 team here and to really put some plans together now to get another vendor coming to us from the 21 22 State contract as we spoke about -- from the

And I'm hoping within the next two months or so that work will begin on the units -- the

State cooperative to work on our Veterans.

1 | Veterans units on Cantello Street.

So we're very happy with it.

It's going to take a lot of planning

because is work is going to be done while people

are living there, while they are occupied -
tenant occupied, resident occupied. And so

there's going to -- obviously that takes a lot of

coordination and working together but we're very

happy to say for, you know, say that that's going

to begin.

The other is Phase II, which is additional money from COAH, was approved by the court so we could -- by the court -- our courts and what we'll be able to do is to address the needs of the other 62 Veterans units in Union City with Phase II. And that has been approved by the courts to -- to allow to use COAH funds.

The amount of the COAH fund has yet -- not yet been attached but it has been approved. I've been informed by the -- the City Clerk of the City of Union City that the courts did approve for Phase II but the money attachment has yet to -- is yet to be discussed and to be, you know, finalized.

So we're very happy with that.

We'll continue leasing with the Union City 1 Board of Education, the Pavilion as I mentioned. 2 Additional security cameras at the Senior 3 Citizen Building. We have had additional part-time cleaning 5 staff, stressing cleanliness in all our 6 buildings. 7 Working with Waldo and Jorge, we were able to find funding and money now that we're getting 9 -- in all of our buildings here we're going to 10 have two cleaning -- cleaning people. You know, 11 12 people to help with cleaning. Like do some custodial and also some 13 cleaning. So we're happy with that. 14 15 We also painted a lot of the lines in our 16 parking lot for safety and uniformity. We have -- we have extensive use of our new 17 social worker for residents. We spoke about that 18 19 already. 20 We're researching RAD Process for the Union City Housing Authority, which basically means 21 that it's --22 RAD stands for Residents Assistance 23 Program. 24

And will allow us to get funding from the

- 1 federal government, through the federal
- 2 government. And that will allow us, basically,
- 3 that have a big mortgage and clean -- and help do
- 4 the same in all of these buildings here in our
- 5 | public housing throughout Union City and making
- 6 capital improvements in our public housing.
- 7 So we're -- that's another -- we'll be
- 8 discussing that in the future but another project
- 9 | we're hoping to do.
- 10 We made positive gains in our collecting
- 11 delinquent rents, which we -- we've done with
- 12 | Gerard. He's done a good job with that.
- We've -- we've absorbed 40 portables from
- 14 | surrounding housing authorities for financial
- 15 gain. In other words, we took in in our Section
- 16 8. Portables are, once you have a housing
- 17 | voucher in Section 8, you can use that voucher
- 18 anywhere.
- 19 All right?
- So we were able to absorb 40 and -- which
- 21 gives us, you know, allows -- allows us to help
- 22 | with -- help us financially, as well as help
- 23 people with housing in Union City.
- 24 Section 8 focused on -- on contacting
- 25 | potential tenants from -- from our waiting list.

- 1 We're working closely with that. We're updating
  2 the waiting list in Section 8; computerizing all
  3 the data.
- We've improved coordination with the Union

  City Police Department, addressing drug dealing

  and trespassing issues within a lot of our

  facilities.

We have closer planning with landscaping
 company to improve appearance and health/safety
 of Union City Housing Authority properties.

Large old trees have been removed from
Union City properties. Downtown we removed three
huge 80 year old trees that were becoming a bit
of a safety issue.

And, you know, there's a tremendous amount of -- I didn't realize the costs of tree removal and amount. It's a lot of money. A lot of money.

COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Mmm.

MR. SANGER: And I -- I've -- some lessons
I learned this summer as well with some of these
projects.

And, you know, just getting trees removed and whatever, you know, anyone in the area, you know, five, six, six, seven thousand dollars, you

1 know, just for tree removal.

2 So, you know, good things there.

New uniforms for our maintenance men and our security staff.

Purchase of new maintenance vehicle for more conducive to our needs. We had two big trucks. We said, listen, we have to do this -- do this a little smarter. We got a smaller truck. And the truck is helping, you know, -- which is allowing to get us around town better. And it just helps a lot more with -- you know, with getting the men, you know, ready and prepared for their day.

The other is we now have roving security guards at all of our sites. And we have this site here and the site downtown; we have a roving security guard from eight o'clock at night till four o'clock in the morning at both sites and helping with that, of course for safety.

We -- this -- this site right here, 3911, was the summer free lunch program, in cooperation with the Union City Board of Education. So all of our residents had the free summer breakfast and lunch program with that for -- for nutrition. And happy with that.

65 1 Entered into the membership of the Hunterdon County -- what we talked about, 2 procurement. 3 And we purchased new landscaping equipment for ourselves, such as blowers and -- and cutting 5 of -- you know, machinery to cut the hedges and 6 -- and things of that nature. 7 So just to give you a little idea of what we have done in the last six months or so. 9 10 But also, for the last three years, you have an ongoing now list of all our 11 12 accomplishments at the Union City Housing Authority. If you look at this, for the last 13 three years, you'll see all the things we were 14 able to achieve. 15 16 Right? So bottom line, what happens, it goes from 17 this agenda --18 19 COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Um-hum. 20 MR. SANGER: -- it goes from this agenda to our staff, to our maintenance people, and then 21 22 we're able to implement -- implement it all and here is the -- here's the results of our 23

planning. We plan; results. You approve; we

plan; we implement; and this is the results for

So that's the process. 2 So it all starts with you and a lot of the good things we're doing we're very proud of this. 3 So we'll have an ongoing list of all of our 4 achievements and -- and accomplishments. 5 6 So that is my report.
