Abuse

Elder abuse is defined as neglect, exploitation, or "painful or harmful" mistreatment of anyone who is 65 or older (or anyone aged 18 to 64 who falls under the legal definition of a "dependent" adult). It can involve physical violence, psychological abuse, isolation, abandonment, abduction, false imprisonment, or a caregiver's neglect. It could also involve the unlawful taking of a senior's money or property.

Elder abuse involves various crimes, such as theft, assault or identity theft that happen to victims of all ages. However, when the victim is 65 years or older (or a dependent adult), the criminal could face stiffer penalties.

Dementia/Memory Loss

See also the sections Caregiver Support Information & Resources, Support Groups, and the Appendix topic Suggestions for New Caregivers.

Often the first thought when you hear the term "memory loss" is dementia or Alzheimer's. However, there are many causes of memory loss: stress, lack of sleep, side effects of medication, side effects of medical conditions, urinary tract infections (UTI), brain tumors, the effect of drugs and alcohol, concussion, stroke and traumatic brain injury (TBI) to name a few.

Dementia does not necessarily mean Alzheimer's. Dementia is a disease symptom. There are over 100 diseases that may cause dementia. These include Alzheimer's, vascular dementia, and dementia with Lewy Bodies. It is important to obtain a medical diagnosis before proceeding with obtaining resources.

However, if the deceased is active military or a veteran, some of the services may be assisted by the Veterans Administration (VA). If the individual is indigent and has very limited income or has no next of kin, the county coroner can assist with burial.

Healthcare

Healthcare is provided by primary care physicians who often work in physician groups. Secondary healthcare is provided in hospital settings (acute care) which may lead to specialized hospital or medical referrals. These services are funded for seniors by:

- Medi-Cal, the state of California's Medicaid program.
- Medicare (Part A for hospitalization and Part B for medical services) along with a Medicare advantage plan (Part C) which includes prescription coverage; or a supplemental health care plan and prescription coverage (Part D).
- Private insurance
- VA benefits
- Retirement health care coverage from CalPERS, Federal Retirement,
 Tri-Care, or other retirement coverage.

To learn more about Medicare and options associated with the coverage you may meet with a Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) counselor by calling Seniors First for an appointment.

Hospice/Palliative Care

Hospice care is a specialized care designed to provide support to you and your loved ones during an advanced illness. Hospice care focuses on comfort and quality of life, rather than cure. The goal of hospice care is to live each day as fully as possible. Hospice care affirms life and views death as a natural process.

Hospice services must be prescribed by a physician, typically when life expectancy is anticipated to be six months or less. It can be provided in the home or in a residential or nursing facility and includes the termination of curative treatment of the disease.

Palliative care focuses on providing relief from the symptoms and stress of a serious illness. The goal of both hospice and palliative care is to

improve quality of life for both the patient and the family. This may be accomplished by nurses, medical and religious staff, caregivers, and financial professionals. Funding of hospice care is provided by Medicare, Medicare Advantage plans, supplemental insurance, and Medi-Cal.

Housing Options

There are a variety of residential options available for seniors that include but not limited to:

- Living in your own home(independently or with support)
- Sharing housing with a senior roommate
- Living in a room and board, where the rent includes the provision of meals and housekeeping
- Licensed, supervised board and care (B&C
- Assisted living communities
- Skilled Nursing /LTC
- Memory Care

As your needs for assistance increase, or possibly in preparation for future needs for assistance, you may choose to move to an assisted living community (licensed under state regulation by Community Care Licensing (CCL)) which may consist of private homes or apartments with communal dining room meals and housekeeping provided. In addition to communal dining, apartments or homes in assisted living communities have kitchens for preparing your own food. The residence has staff available to assist you with medication and activities for daily living as you need them. There may also be a specific part of the community set aside for individuals with dementia who have more advanced needs. Assisted living is typically funded with Long Term Care (LTC) insurance or private funds. California has funding available under the assisted living waiver pilot project in seven counties for individuals who have full scope Medi-Cal.

Board and care (B&C) facilities are typically small residential homes in the community (typically 6–15 beds) called Residential Care Facilities for the Elderly (RCFE). These homes are licensed through CCL and provide room and board (private or semi-private), meals, housekeeping, and nonmedical staff to assist you. B&C facilities are typically funded privately.

If you need medical assistance or rehabilitation, there are rehabilitation facilities, typically used when someone is being discharged from the hospital but continues to require therapeutic follow up. This may be funded by Medicare for up to 100 days if the individual continues to make progress with their therapies. If there is no progress, Medicare will discontinue funding.

Skilled nursing facilities (SNF) offer medical services but are not typically paid by Medicare. Medi-Cal does fund these services in specific facilities that accept that payment for service.

In-Home Care

Caregiving generally begins at home with family members providing care. Care may also be provided through licensed and bonded care agencies, which are privately funded. The range of payment is typically \$20 - \$30 per hour based on services required. These agencies may be funded with private funds or long-term care insurance.

There is also a registry of individuals (see PIRS below) who have been screened and are willing or interested in providing in-home care and would be privately employed directly by the individual requiring the care. These individuals may or may not be licensed or bonded.

It is possible for family members or others to be paid through the In-Home Support Services (IHSS) through Placer County. This program funds up to 283 hours of in-home care per month. This may include personal care services, cleaning, cooking, shopping, and assistance with activities of daily living (ADL's). The number of hours provided is determined by the county based upon a formula that is used throughout the state.

The Veterans Administration also has a program of aid and attendance that provides funding for Veterans, and widow or widower of a Veteran, for in-home care or assisted living.



Discounts

Who is a senior? Although not clearly defined, we generally think of a Senior as someone who is 65+ years old. However, for the purpose of discounts it can be anywhere from age 50+ for the Humane Society, 55+ at the veterinarian, 60+ for home delivered meals from Seniors First. It is always worth asking if agencies have a discount and what age is applicable. The following are a few of the discounts available for seniors.

As a senior citizen 62 years or older you can purchase a lifetime Senior Pass under the America the Beautiful program for \$10. This pass provides you with access to all national parks and federal recreation lands for the rest of your life. (There may also be a discount at state parks based upon each state's regulation.) See www.nps.gov

Low income seniors, disabled individuals, and honorably discharged disabled Veterans can obtain a California resident fishing license at a reduced fee of \$6.95 per year versus the regular \$47.00 fee. See www.wildlife.ca.gov

Silver Sneakers Fitness: Your Medicare supplemental or Medicare Advantage Plan may participate in the Silver Sneakers program and pay for your gym membership.

If you are a member of the American Automobile Association (AAA) you may receive the following discounts: 20% off Turbo Tax, 30% off LensCrafters, 25% off Papa John's pizza, 30% off movie tickets, free maps and travel guides. For a complete list of discounts see www.AAA.com or call 800-222-4357.

Elder Abuse

Elder abuse is causing physical, emotional, or financial harm to an older person, whether intentionally or unintentionally. There are many possible signs of abuse:

- Bruises, pressure marks, broken bones, abrasions, and burns may be signs of physical abuse, neglect or mistreatment.
- Unexplained withdrawal from normal activities, a sudden change in alertness, and unusual depression may indicate emotional abuse.
- Sudden financial losses may be the result of exploitation.
- Bedsores, unattended medical needs, poor hygiene, and unusual, unexplained weight loss might be signs of neglect.
- Behavior such as belittling, threats, and other uses of power and control by spouses or other adults may signify verbal or emotional abuse.
- Strained or tense relationships and frequent arguments between the caregiver and older person can suggest mistreatment, either by the caregiver or the person receiving care.

Included in elder abuse is self-neglect. Self-neglect describes situations in which older people put themselves at high risk. People who neglect themselves may have a disorder that impairs their judgement or memory. They may have a chronic disease. Knowing where to draw the line between a person's right to independence and self-neglect can be hard.

Here are some signs that may mean it's time to intervene, although they can be hard to recognize during a short visit:

- Hoarding
- Failure to take essential medications or refusal to seek medical treatment for serious illness
- Leaving a burning stove unattended

- Poor hygiene
- Not wearing suitable clothing for the weather
- Confusion
- Inability to attend to housekeeping
- Dehydration

Scams

There are many common scams. The following is a list of tips to avoid being scammed. If you think you are being scammed, contact A Project of Wise & Healthy Aging www.wiseandhealthyaging.org (310) 394-9871.

Scam Prevention Tips

Don't answer the phone if you don't recognize the number. If it's someone who needs to talk to you for a legitimate reason, they will leave a message.

Don't wire money to cover travel, medical emergencies, hotel bills, hospital bills, visas, losses from a temporary financial setback. In fact, it's a good idea to never wire money period, unless you know for sure that your family or friend is abroad and needs it.

Don't send money to tide someone over after a mugging or robbery, and don't do anyone a favor by making an online purchase or forwarding a package to another country for them.

Don't use public Wi-Fi to check sensitive financial information, or to make purchases using your credit card.

Social media: If you are on sites like Facebook, make sure that your privacy settings don't allow strangers to view your information. Follow @placerprotect on Facebook to be alerted of scams and other types of fraud.

Reach out: Get involved in your community. Call a friend. Talk to your neighbors.

Ask someone: Run offers and deals by people you trust to see if they are

legitimate.

Check your statements including credit cards and Medicare statements to ensure that there are no unauthorized charges or service not provided.

Fall Prevention

Injuries from falls are the leading reason seniors lose their independence. However, falls are preventable through exercise, medication management, eye exams, and home modifications.

- Stay physically active. Regular exercise makes you stronger. Weight-bearing activities, such as walking or climbing stairs, may slow bone loss from osteoporosis.
- Have your eyes and hearing tested regularly. Always wear your glasses. If you have a hearing aid, be sure it fits well, and wear it.
- Find out about the side effects of any medicine you take. Have your physician and pharmacist do a medication review for you to insure you are taking

appropriate medications. If a drug makes you sleepy or dizzy, tell your doctor and pharmacist.

- Get enough sleep. The average person needs between 7 -9 hours of sleep per night. If you are sleepy you are more likely to fall.
- Limit the amount of alcohol you drink. Even a small amount can affect balance and reflexes.
- Stand up slowly after eating, lying down, or sitting. Getting up too quickly can cause your blood pressure to drop, which can make you feel faint.
- Wear rubber-soled, low-heeled shoes that fully support your feet. Wearing only socks or shoes/slippers with smooth soles on stairs or floors without carpet can be unsafe.
- Have your home evaluated for fall risk: Install grab bars in the tub and shower, remove throw rugs.

Life Planning for All of Us

We are all aging and aging forces change. We are living longer, healthier lives with more options available than previous generations. To ensure that your wishes for your future are followed you need to research your options, initiate conversations with your chosen support team and put your wishes in writing. Planning for your future should include the "40—70" Checklist described later.

There are many resources available to help you with the development of your "action plan for successful aging." One tool is entitled exactly that: An Action Plan for Successful Aging (Plan) researched and written by Home Instead Senior Care. This plan can be found at www.caregiverstress.com. The Plan encourages you to ACT (Assess, Consider, Talk). It provides questions and an outline to start your assessment of your potential needs and wants and includes discussion and references to assist

you in reviewing your options. The Plan may also be helpful in developing a plan for your family members.

"Experts have said that by the time you're approaching 40 and a loved one is around 70, you should have had the "talk" about issues so many families want to avoid." Typically, you will find conversations about these topics are not initiated until there is a crisis. The Plan refers to the "40–70 Rule" which includes "tips" on how to initiate these conversations.

Organizing Information

What information should a family caregiver organize? The answer to this question is different for every family. You might want to help organize the following information and update it regularly. This list is just a starting point.

• Full legal name and residence

- Birthdate and place, with a copy of birth certificate
- Social Security and Medicare numbers and cards
- Education and military records (DD 214)
- Employment history with dates and addresses
- Sources of income and assets:
 - o investment income
 - o stocks and bonds
 - o property
 - o insurance policies
 - bank accounts
 - o deeds
 - o investments and other valuables
- Most recent income tax return
- Money owed, to whom and when payments are due
- Plan for future care and needs

Suggestions for New Caregivers

When you are starting out as a family caregiver it is hard to know where to begin. It may be that you and other family members have observed changes in your family member's behavior or personality, cognitive decline, or confusion. It is time to act. The following suggestions describe how to begin.

• Obtain a medical diagnosis. Gather observations from those who know your family member well and attend the doctor's appointment prepared to share those observations. Do not send your family member to the appointment alone. If they are having cognitive or memory problems, they will not be a good reporter

for the physician, nor will they be able to bring back accurate information to you.

- Educate yourself about the medical procedures used to determine an appropriate edical diagnosis and act as an advocate on your family member's behalf.
- Discuss your family member's resources and future wishes. This is often difficult to discuss with parents, as we do not want to be invasive, however, we want to keep our family members safe and secure and we may be approaching a time where we must take charge of their financial affairs.
 - Health care benefits—you may need a Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) appointment to fully understand what health care coverage your family has in place.
 - Finances: income, assets, property. (See Appendix topic Organizing Information.)
 - Future wishes as to how they would like to live their life and what type of care they would like to receive as the diagnosis progresses
- Learn about the diagnosis, treatment options, community resources, and support groups.
- Find support groups for yourself, join, and attend.

	 3. Develop the habit of keeping at least a quarter tank of gas in your car at all times. Gas stations get crowded during evacuations. Cars get stranded on the road while idling during evacuations.
	 4. Identify multiple evacuation driving routes from your home to major roadways. Your normal driving routes may be crowded, closed, or dangerous during evacuations. Be familiar with alternatives.
	 5. Keep a pet carrier readily accessible. Whether for a dog, cat, rat or reptile, keep something readily accessible that your pet can stay in comfortably and reliably as you evacuate. Your pet may need to stay in this carrier at your

 - Keep a cell phone charger in your car at all times.
 - Memorize essential phone numbers (in case you can't access such numbers on your phone). Consider printing out a back-up copy.
- ☐ 7. Plan where you may go if evacuated from your home.
 - Hotels fill up quickly.
 - You may need or want to get as far away as possible.
 - Consider family or friends outside of the impacted area. Talk to them ahead of time.
- □ 8. Plan what you will take (if there is time) and what you will take it in.
 - Prescription pharmaceuticals.
 - Important documents, photos, computer back-ups, etc.
 - Clothing, shoes, toiletries (may be purchased later).
 - Sleeping bags, pillows, blankets (may be purchased later).
