# Hackney Black History Season 2022

Here in Hackney we celebrate Black culture and history all year round. As we strive to be an anti-racist borough, it remains important to have focused time to learn, share and celebrate our African and African-Caribbean heritage and culture in Hackney and around the World.

Hackney Libraries have curated a family-friendly programme with poetry readings, book clubs, film screenings and history-inspired craft sessions.

Hackney Museum's focus is on how African heritage individuals have shaped Hackney, sharing inspirational stories in the exhibition: Movers, Shakers and Community Makers. Join in the collaborative conversation that will help develop the 2023 exhibition on East African communities, by sharing your stories and memories.

A special programme of educational and interactive activities will take place in our youth hubs, sports hubs and adventure playgrounds, so children and young people in the borough can learn about Black history and the significance of the Black contribution nationally and internationally.

Hackney's Children and Education services are inviting Black and Global Majority students, residents and Council staff to share intergenerational stories of growing up, living or working in Hackney and will present these experiences as part of 'Stories Untold: An intergenerational exhibition of stories about life in Hackney' at the Tomlinson Centre until the end of the year.

The season will end with an in-person event with Jay Blades, sharing lived experiences with a Hackney youth panel at Hackney Archives.

## The World Reimagined

13 Aug - 31 Oct

The World Reimagined will see trails of over a hundred large globes in seven cities across the UK from 13 August – 31 October 2022.



The sculptures have been created by artists to bring to life the reality and impact of the transatlantic trade in enslaved Africans and invite the public to engage with the dialogue and actions of making racial justice a reality.

All artists have created globes responding to the themes ranging from 'Mother Africa' and 'The Reality of Being Enslaved' to 'Still We Rise' and 'Expanding Soul'.

Expect to see writing, art, music, poetry - and plenty more - displayed in the Tomlinson Centre through to the end of the year.





# Hackney Windrush Artworks

Hackney is home to two permanent public artworks that have been commissioned as symbols of honour and respect for the Windrush generation in Hackney and in recognition of their legacy and contribution to life in Hackney today.

**'Warm Shores'** by artist **Thomas J Price**, can be found in Hackney Town Hall square. The two striking 9ft bronze figures were informed by 3D scans of 30 Hackney residents with a connection to the Windrush generation, capturing their stature, stance, clothing, features and posture.



A short walk away, next to St Augustine's Tower, you will find three large marble and bronze sculptures of Caribbean fruits by **Turner Prize nominee Veronica Ryan OBE - 'Custard Apple, Breadfruit and Soursop'** is inspired by the artist's memories of visiting Hackney's Ridley Road Market as a child.

# Windrush Compensation Scheme

The Windrush generation refers to people who, between 1948 to 1971, were invited by successive governments to relocate to Britain from their homes in Commonwealth countries in the Caribbean to address labour shortages.

New laws which came into force with the 2014 Immigration Act, which the Government called its 'hostile environment' approach, led to some facing immigration checks and despite being British citizens, many from the Windrush generation didn't have formal papers to prove their lawful status. This led to many being denied access to benefits, healthcare, social housing and losing their jobs, with some even wrongly detained and deported.

In April 2018 the Windrush Compensation Scheme was launched for those who have 'suffered a loss' because they couldn't easily demonstrate their right to live in the UK.

The scheme is open to anyone from a Commonwealth country who arrived before 1 January 1973, and those with a 'right of abode' or 'settled status' who arrived in the UK before 31 December 1988, regardless of their original nationality. As well as those directly affected, it also covers other family members such as children and carers.

## Compensation could be paid for losses related to:

- employment
- immigration fees
- housing
- health
- education
- driving licences
- banking
- impact on normal daily life (for example, you missed key family events or were unable to travel)
- detention and removal
