Community led projects: moving forward together.

Fremantle Foundation established WARRF (WA Relief and Recovery Fund) in early 2020 in response to the **COVID-19** pandemic and subsequent crises, including the **Wooroloo bushfires 2021** in the Perth outer metropolitan area and **Fitzroy River floods 2023** in WA's Kimberley region.

All funds raised through WARRF support non-profit, charitable organisations working in impacted communities by providing small to medium-sized grants to aid recovery and build resilience for the future.

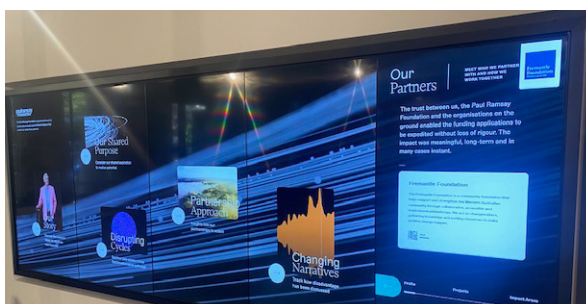
Importantly, the fund provides a much-needed way for West Australians and philanthropic partners, such as the Paul Ramsay Foundation, to support our impacted communities following the pandemic and devastating natural disasters.

Why Fremantle Foundation took the lead

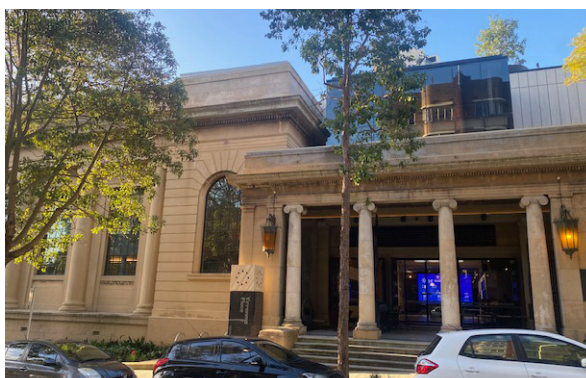
As a community foundation we are ideally placed to support communities in recovery post disaster due to our fundraising capability, relationship with local philanthropists, efficient grant-making infrastructure and our community engagement approach that enables a **community led process** to rise to the top.

Through a broad-reaching fundraising campaign Fremantle Foundation was able to mobilise tax-deductible donations from West Australians looking for a way to support those communities impacted by **COVID-19**, **bushfires** and **floods**.

Prominent national philanthropic foundation the Paul Ramsay Foundation, as well as community members and Fremantle Foundation Named Fund donors, in particular the Bibbulmun Fund, all contributed to the overall fundraising efforts.

Combined with major gifts from Paul Ramsay Foundation and community donors, Fremantle Foundation raised **\$1,144,959** to support communities affected by **COVID-19**, **Wooroloo bushfires** and **flood-impacted** remote communities of the **Fitzroy River Region**, exactly when they needed it most.

As of November 2023, we have **awarded 28 grants** and **distributed \$1,091,504** to community organisations.

In the first weeks of COVID-19 we were inundated by charities seeking funds to assist those most vulnerable. With the impact of COVID-19 becoming clear we launched WARRF successfully raising \$318,200.	To gain a deeper and clear understanding of community needs, we engaged with councils, community leaders and those on the ground in the impacted regions. Grants opened and applications received with ten grants awarded across the WA community.	The week long Wooroloo bushfires burnt 27,000 acres, devastating communities and environment. We engaged with council, community leaders and those on the ground to identify needs. Four grants were awarded.	The second major surge of COVID-19 infections in WA happened. We raised an additional \$3000,000 from Paul Ramsay Foundation. Engaged with community and thirteen grants were awarded across WA.	WA's Kimberley Fitzroy River flooded devastating property and vital infrastructure. We raised \$500,000 with our granting co-led by Indigenous leaders.	Since visiting Fitzroy five Indigenous led or owned charitable organisations have been funded to date.

Community Foundations have established deep connections to their local communities. As such, they can rapidly provide vital support to address short-term and long-term community needs by supporting local non-profit organisations that provide direct and critical services to those impacted by disasters and crises.

By utilising Fremantle Foundation's fundraising and grant-making capability and leveraging our relationships with donors, philanthropists, government, charities and community leaders, we can support affected communities in their recovery post a disaster, leading to stronger, more resilient and inclusive communities for the future.

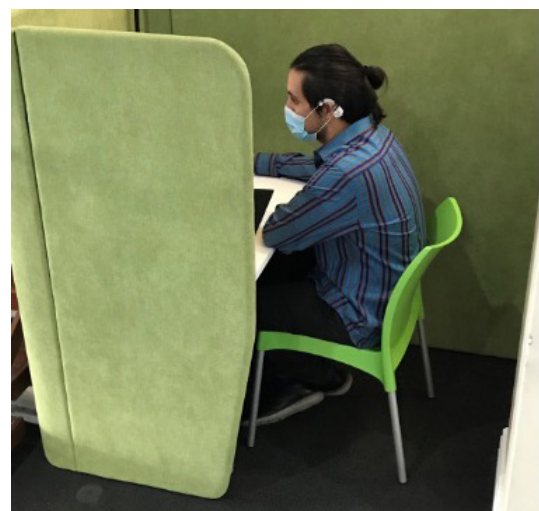

In early January 2023, Western Australia's Kimberley region was battered by ex-tropical cyclone Ellie, causing the **Fitzroy River** to rise to record high levels, devastating property and vital infrastructure and leaving hundreds of people homeless, and further isolating up to 40 vulnerable indigenous communities who rely on services and medical assistance in Fitzroy Crossing.

In response, Sue Stepatschuk from the Fremantle Foundation and Kim Collard, highly regarded Indigenous leader and Chair/ Founder of The Bibbulmun Fund, in partnership with the Paul Ramsay Foundation, raised \$500,000 to support the Fitzroy River community.

Together, we **co-designed a culturally appropriate project delivery and community engagement method** that placed community input and knowledge at the forefront of the process. This included visiting Fitzroy River to meet and consult with community leaders, in person, to identify areas of need and where funding gaps existed .

This enabled a **community led process** to rise to the top that directly integrated community goals, and objectives into the project..

Broadening our reach and educating our community.

During the initial disaster recovery campaign, we worked closely with local media and peak body Philanthropy Australia to amplify our call to West Australians to donate and support the WA community.

This philanthropic endeavour made it into the headlines, with two lead articles, "Fremantle Foundation transmits a lifeline" and "The power of local funds to ease the impact of a national health crisis" along with an invitation to present at the Philanthropy Australia National Conference 2022 with the Paul Ramsay Foundation.

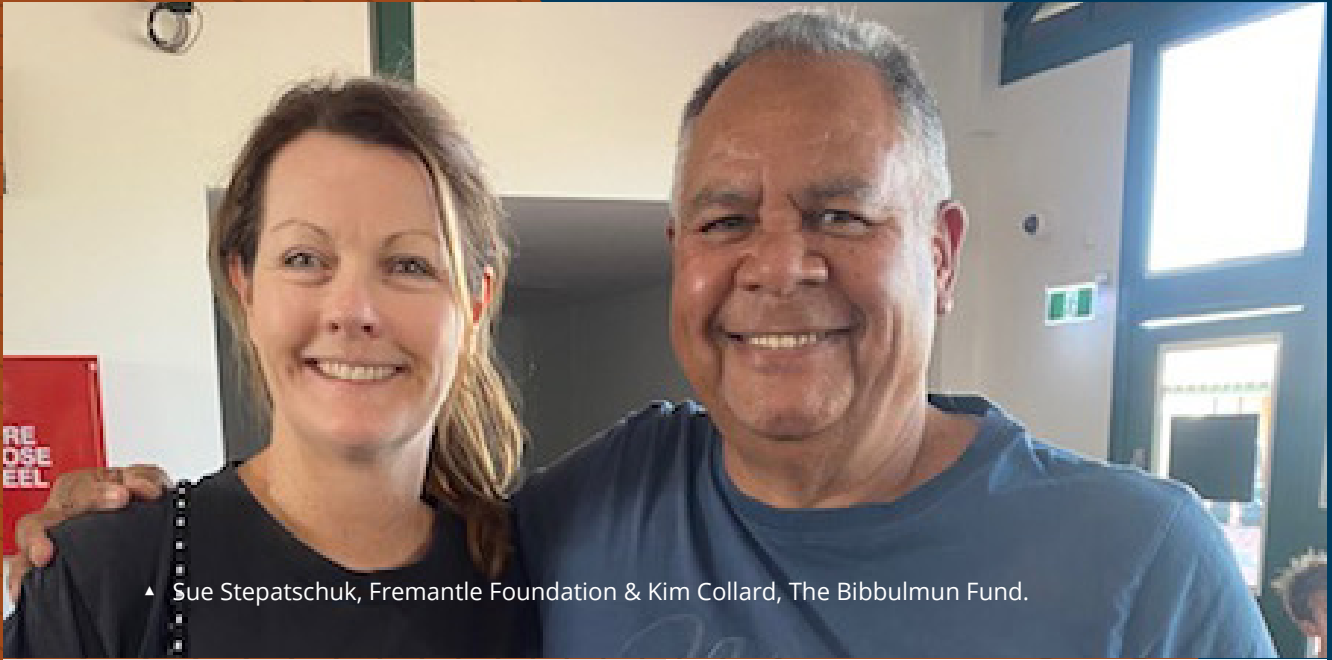

In Perth and across the broader south-west of the nation, the Wungening Aboriginal Corporation is being funded to deliver food and hygiene parcels to thousands of Aboriginal clients through a collective of 18 local member Aboriginal community-controlled organisations.
