

Make your plan to vote NOW

- Are you registered?
- How will you vote?

In person?

By mail?







Voter Registration

Who can?

- U.S. Citizen
- At least 18 years old by Election Day (November 3)
- Live at your address at least 30 days before the election
- Not claim the right to vote elsewhere
- Not in prison or jail serving time for a conviction

Who should?

- First time voter
- Moved since last time voted
- Name change







How to Register to Vote



Many ways to register to vote...

- Opt in at DMV
- By mail (postmarked on or before Oct 6)
- Online (completed on or before Oct 18)
- In person with a Deputy Voter Registrar
- In person when you vote
 - □ During early voting (Oct 19 Nov 2)
 - On election day (Nov 3)










Two forms of ID needed to register to vote

- One with your current address
- Photo ID not needed

Your signature is your ID on Election Day

In Person Voting

Illinois made several changes for in-person voting

during COVID-19

November 3, 2020 is a state holiday

- Schools can be polling places
- Election judges can be 16 years & older
- Expanded early voting hours at some locations

3 Simple Steps to Vote by Mail

Vote by Mail = "Absentee voting"

Anyone in Illinois can vote by mail.
In any election
No "excuse" needed

Apply for mail ballot

NOW - Oct 29

Online – recommended!

By mail

Receive ballot

August 24 – Nov 3

By mail only

Return ballot

August 25 – Nov 3

By mail In person







Apply for Mail Ballot



The State of Illinois and the League of Women Voters recommend applying for mail ballot online now.

To apply online, you need:

- Driver's license/state ID number or the last four digits of your Social Security Number
- Address where you would like your ballot mailed; and
- An email address

You can also apply with a paper application


- Many will receive it in the mail (started Aug 1)
- Or you can download and print it online

Complete Your Ballot

Complete Your Ballot

Read all instructions

Most common reasons mail ballots are rejected:

- Mailed or received passed deadline
- Signature missing or didn't match
- Envelope returned w/o the ballot inside

Other instructions



- Do NOT make any other marks on the ballot.
- DO NOT give your ballot to someone else to mark, unless you are in need of assistance because of a Disability

Complete the Envelope

It is important to complete the envelope correctly

- 1. Place your completed ballot inside the voter certification envelope
- 2. Complete Section 1: Voter Certification
- 3. Sign your name in the box
 - As shown on your voter registration and driver's license
- 4. Print your name and address
- 5. Print the date you filled out the Voter Certification Envelope.

Note: If you received assistance marking your ballot or signing your envelope, the person assisting you must complete Section 2: Voter Assistance





Return Your Mail Ballot

Options for returning your completed ballot

- Mail
 - No postage needed for suburban Cook County and the City of Chicago
 - Must be postmarked by Nov 3 and received by Nov 17



- Ballot drop boxes at every early voting site
- More locations may be announced
- Strongly recommend returning your ballot as soon as possible
 - In the unlikely event you encounter problems, there will be time to fix them.








Track Your Mail Ballot

Provide an email in your mail ballot application!

- Receive email notifications when...
 - Your application has been submitted
 - Your ballot is being mailed
 - Your ballot has been received
 - Your ballot has been approved for counting
 - If there are issues with the ballot itself

What If There's a Problem?

Returning your ballot ASAP gives you time to resolve any issues.

Example Problems	Example Solutions
 Signature doesn't match Ballot envelope delivered opened or taped No signature on ballot return envelope Already cast a ballot 	 Voter notified within 2 days via mail and/or email Signature exception: voter submits statement Open envelope exception: Vote in person or request new
 Not registered in precinct 	vote-by-mail ballot






Vote Early... PLEASE!


Flatten the Ballot Return Curve
