About the Poll

These results are based on a survey of 1,203 Latinx residents of Massachusetts. Interviews were conducted December 7-17, 2022 via live telephone, online, and text-to-web interviewing. Both telephone and online questionnaires were offered in English and Spanish. Results were weighted to known and estimated demographic parameters on age, gender, nationality, education, and region. The margin of sampling error for the full sample is +/- 3.5 percentage points with a 95 percent level of confidence, inclusive of the design effect. This project was sponsored by Amplify Latinx.
