

Our sixth form students make a significant contribution to the life of the school, as senior prefects and mentors, fund raising for charities as well as working in a range of areas such as pupil mentoring.





PASTORAL PROVISION

The pastoral philosophy of the College is to provide a happy, caring and safe environment where our pupils are encouraged to succeed and achieve their full potential.

The Pastoral Care System in St. Joseph's College helps to promote a sense of community, raises self-esteem, recognises effort and achievement and maintains good discipline throughout the College.

The Form Teacher has a detailed knowledge of the many individual needs, aspirations, interests and academic progress of each pupil in their class and will work with teachers, parents and others in supporting the learning and development of each pupil.

The Head of Year supported by a member of the Senior Leadership Team, oversees the general welfare of all pupils in the year group. We make available to pupils the help and support of a number of services to meet the varied and often complex needs of pupils. We also provide a Peer Mentoring scheme which provides additional support for pupils making the transition from primary to post primary education.

SAFEGUARDING AND CHILD PROTECTION

The aim of our Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy is to protect our pupils by ensuring that everyone who works in our school - teachers, non-teaching staff and volunteers - has clear guidance on the detection and management of situations where abuse or neglect of a child is suspected. The central principle our staff support is that every child has the fundamental right to be safe from harm and to have proper care given to their physical, emotional and spiritual well-being.

ANTI-BULLYING

St Joseph's College is completely opposed to bullying and will not tolerate any form of bullying behaviour. It is entirely contrary to our values and ethos as a caring community and is unequivocally rejected by all members of our staff. Our Anti-Bullying Policy is integral to our policy of Pastoral Care and it is firmly embedded in our School Mission Statement and School Aims and Objectives.







STUDENT COUNCIL & PUPIL VOICE

Student Council work is important in St Joseph's College as it provides opportunities for pupils to take on roles of responsibility and to become involved in real decision making. The Student Council also provides opportunities for pupils to develop leadership skills, becoming confident and active participants in the life of the college. Pupils and staff work together, to develop positive working relationships which improves the college as a learning community.

We look forward to five new Year 8 pupils representing their Form Classes next year, taking on roles of responsibility and becoming involved in the work of the Student Council.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM

The Sixth Form is a community of young adults. The freedoms that come with Sixth Form study accompany an ethos of ownership and shared responsibility.

Students in Year 13 and Year 14 apply for positions of leadership that help shape life in the Sixth Form. The students meet regularly with the Head of Sixth Form and the Principal. They organise charitable activity, a range of clubs and societies and work in the local community. They also lead Pupil Voice, briefing SLT on their responses to learning and act as ambassadors for the College.









OPPORTUNITY AND ENRICHMENT

In St. Joseph's we believe in offering pupils opportunities to extend their learning far beyond the classroom.

To assist in this aspect of our pupils' development:

- Pupils are actively encouraged to take part in a range of extra curricular sporting activities. Coaching is provided by qualified coaches who specialise in working with children. Strong partnerships have also been developed with local sporting clubs.
- The programme is diverse in nature to benefit as many pupils as possible.
- This programme is run alongside school teams who complete in inter school competitions.

A rich sporting culture exists in St Joseph's College with our school teams competing and achieving at the highest level.

There are a number of trips and residentials organised each year by our teachers. We have links through the Irish Children's Programme with Rochester in the USA and our children and teachers travel each July to renew friendships. Pupils take part in Science, History, Geography and Drama field trips at home and abroad, as well as visits to museums, theatres and art galleries. We run leagues, competitions, fundraising events, citizenship programmes, Shared Education projects, work experience, business/enterprise project, visits to industry, and environmental projects through the school. We welcome representatives from industry and commerce to our Annual Celebration of Achievement.





CARITAS – SERVICE TO OTHERS

In St. Joseph's College we recognise that children spend only a fraction of their life-time in school, and that good habits of responsible lifestyles and commitment to being a good citizen must also be developed through our links with the wider community.

Examples of our links include:

CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION, ADVICE AND GUIDANCE (CEIAG)

All pupils follow a structured careers education programme and are provided with opportunities to:

- Research and follow their career goals
- Discuss their career aspirations with Careers staff, Careers Service NI, employers and external agencies
- Recognise their abilities and strengths and plan for careers that will enrich and reward them
- Be prepared for further and higher education
- Experience the World of Work
- Participate in mock interviews with a range of professionals from across Northern Ireland
- Visit different industries and develop links with employers
- Use Unifrog, a specific careers education support programme that helps students to make the best choices, and submit the strongest applications to further and higher education.
- Access support through 'Barclays Lifeskills' to support careers education in Year 12.

The College ensures that sixth form students have opportunities to attend Queen's Senior Academy; Queen's Pathway Programme; University Open Days, etc.

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

ADMISSIONS TO YEAR 8

St Joseph's College accepts those pupils whose parents demonstrate confidence in the College and who support the ethos of this Catholic school.

In the event of a number of applications exceeding the College's admission number, the Board of Governors will apply the following criteria in the order stated below:

- 1. Applicants enrolled in the following Primary Schools in the Parishes of;

 Drumbo & Carryduff (St Joseph's PS, St Ita's PS), Holy Rosary (Holy Rosary PS, St Michael's PS), St Bernadette's (St Bernard's PS), St Brigid's (St Bride's PS), St Colmcille's (St Joseph's PS), St Malachy's (St Malachy's PS) and St Matthew's (St Matthew's PS).
- 2. Applicants who have a sister or a brother already enrolled in the school.
- 3. Applicants who are the eldest child in their family.
- 4. Pupils who are deemed by the Board of Governors, on the basis of the supporting evidence from parents and/or medical personnel and/or statutory agencies and/or other sources, to have special circumstances e.g. medical, social, pastoral or other. All supporting evidence must be submitted with the Transfer Form. Parents/Guardians should note that not every special circumstances applicant will be automatically deemed by the Board of Governors to have special circumstances.
- 5. Applicants whose Transfer Form expresses a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th or 5th preference for St Joseph's College, with admission being granted in that order, after the above criteria have been applied. Having applied the above criteria in the order stated, where places still remain, final selection will be made by lot.
- 6. Final placement will be determined on distance by foot from home to College as measured using maps.google.co.uk.
